Jicarilla Correspondence.

September 6, 1905.

W. A. McIvers is rushing work on the mill for the Wisconsin Co., and will have it running ore from the company's mines in about six weeks.

The Jicarilla camp looks good in general; several good strikes have been made in the last two weeks. They are, Richard Murphy's tunnel opening, where he struck free milling ore that assayed \$12.00 per ton. At the present time only one wall is in sight, but he is crosscutting for the other wall. He has about six feet of good grade milling ore.

E. H. Talbert struck a large body of free milling ore in the Summit mine. It pans freely, and from the pannings it should assay around ten dollars per ton.

The other new strike was made on the Etta claim, owned by Phil Reasoner. He has over three feet of a vein in decomposed quartz porphyry that shows big in panning. As yet he has no returns from the samples sent to El Paso.

All the claim owners are developing ore to be ready for the mills that are now being erected by the Wisconsin company and the Jicarilla Reduction Co. This latter company is composed of Chicago people. They have the greater part of their machinery at Ancho station, and have finished grading their mill site. They will begin hauling their machinery next Monday.

Mr. Irving Newton, a skilled mill man from Chicago, Ill., is in charge of the construction work, and will push the mill to completion as rapidly as possible.

This will give Jicarilla camp two up-to-date mills, and there is talk in camp of a cyanide plant going up in the near future.

There are many good low grade gold properties here that will pay well to mill, if handled economically, to say nothing of the high grade sulphide properties that require concentration to profitably reduce the ores.

The water question was a great bugaboo here until the American Placer Co. produced a fine well of water; then came the Free Gold company with two wells, and later the Wisconsin Milling & Smelting Co struck water on the Zulu claim at a

depth of 45 feet, and drilled 200 feet, and the water has now risen to within 20 feet of the surface, insuring them an abundance of water for their mill. Their plant consists of a Sampson crusher, an Elspass mill, Pierce amalgamator, an Isbell classifier and two new standard concentrators. The power is furnished by a Scotch type 60 horse power boiler and a 35 H. P. slide valve engine. The mill is prepared to handle the ores of the camp—both free milling and concentrating, and will be added to from time to time as the camp develops.

The mines and mill of this company are under the supervision and management of W. A. McIvers, and the president of the company, Mr. C. L. Scheler, gives his time and labor to the advancement of the company.

Two harder workers than the above-named gentlemen are hard to find, and Lincoln county needs a few more like them, as they are the kind that do things.

James Woodland, the boss mill right of this country, is doing the work on the Wisconsin mill, which is a guarantee that the mills will go up as it should. Mr. Woodland will also have the contract to do the wood work on the smelter that Mr. McIvers will erect for Michigan people.

\$225,000,000 for Warships.

London, Sept. 10.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from St. Petersburg says that the ministry of marine will vote \$225,000,000, to be expended chiefly in the construction of battleships and cruisers destined for the Amur station.

Cars to be Relettered.

The El Paso Herald of the 13th says:

"As rapidly as possible all El Paso-Northeastern system equipment is being restenciled, using the initials of the El Paso & Southwestern. The work is being carried on both at Alamogordo and in this city. Soon not even the name of the Northeastern will be in evidence on any of the rolling stock, to recall the line owned by the New Mexico Railway and Coal company.

"A number of new flat cars have been received by the Southwestern and put into service in work trains. Other cars which were ordered some months ago have not yet been delivered."

Honors from Abroad.

Lyons, France, Sept. 11.—The Republican is receiving a large number of subscriptions for its proposed medal of honor for President Roosevelt, French as well as American citizens entering heartily into the scheme. The medal will be presented to Mr. Roosevelt as a testimonial of gratitude for his intervention in favor of peace and will be of solid gold, with a laurel wreath and olive branch.

Zemstvo Congress.

Moscow, Sept. 11.—The Congress of Zemstvos assembled here today. Gen. Trepoff, the assistant minister of the interior, has announced that the authorities will not interfere with the delegates as long as the sessions are orderly and not hostile to the government.

Bees Make Good Messengers

Experiments Have Shown That Their Sense of Direction May Be Utilized—Can Travel Far in a Short Time.

A very curious and interesting investigation has been going on for some time past among naturalists with regard to the senses of the lower animals. It has been found that in most cases these are very different from ours, and it cannot any longer be denied that instances occur in which special senses that are not possessed by human beings are developed in animals. One of these, called "the sense of direction," enables bees to return from long distances to their hives, unaided by any of the five different ways we have of recognizing our surroundings.

To test this matter thoroughly, the fertile honey makers have been taken considerable distances from their hives, to localities which it was certain that they had never before visited; yet when set free they flew as unhesitatingly, as directly and as unerringly home as from places perfectly known to them.

A few years ago it occurred to a well known bee-keeper that this remarkable ability on the part of bees might be made useful. Convincing himself that he could rely upon their speedy return from anywhere within

the range of three or four miles from their hives, whether they had ever been at the place from which they started homeward or not, he set to work to test their ability to carry messages, as do homing pigeons. He accordingly procured a few bees from a friend who lived on the further side of a barren, sandy tract of land, which, offering no inducements in the way of possible food supplies, was never visited by the insects, and crossed over to his own home.

Going to his garden with his children he touched certain tiny packages, prepared for the occasion, with bird lime. Upon these were written, in minute handwriting, certain messages from his two little girls. The packages consisted of the thinnest paper fastened with the thinnest of thread and done up in the smallest parcels possible.

Releasing the bees, one by one, from the pasteboard box in which they had been imprisoned he fastened with a trained hand each of the little packets to the back of a bee, which he then allowed to fly away.

Like homing pigeons, they started off at once across the unfamiliar desert for their home, arriving there in an incredibly short space of time with their packages secure upon their backs.—St. Nicholas.

Queer Habits of Penguins

Method of Bringing Up the Young Birds Well Illustrates the Principle of the Survival of the Fittest—Stones for Nests.

Members of the recent Scottish expedition to the antarctic gathered some interesting information regarding penguins. In the far south beyond the pack ice they came upon the rookeries. It was found that the birds had been hatched in August during the period of the greatest cold and complete darkness. As soon as they are hatched the young literally live on the feet of the old birds and are thus protected from the cold. When they are a little older the chicks are herded in great colonies, their life illustrating in a very ruthless way the principle of the survival of the fittest. The colonies are left to be shepherded by two or three old birds, while the rest of the parents go to seek crustaceans in the cracks of the ice. Each parent as it returns is usually unable to find its own young, since it is mobbed at sight by the more vigorous birds, and, finally, obliged to disgorge the food to the more persistent. All the feebler chicks

thus die of starvation and are eaten by the gulls.

Some of the penguins weigh as much as eighty pounds and are about four feet high, with a splendid orange patch on the neck. The young take three years to develop fully and even then the plumage is distinctly less brilliant than in the older birds. Both the movements and migration of the penguins are remarkable. When first followed the bird prefers to walk, but when in danger of being caught it drops on to its abdomen and, with the help of the wings, glissades at a pace too great to be overtaken by a man walking. They seem aware of the movements of the great ice fields and use them to help their migration to the pack ice in the north. They take trouble to collect stones—which they delight to steal from one another's piles—for nests.

Many of the ways of the penguins are suggestive of preserved instincts. Their attitude when sleeping is modeled on that of birds with fully developed wings. But the penguin has to be content with reaching the shelter of the wing with no more than the tip of his beak.

Extreme Unrest in China

Movement on Foot That Threatens to Rival the Boxer Uprising—Bearded Woman Said to Be Leader of Malcontents.

Says a writer in the China Mail: "It is reported that in the eastern part of the province of Kwangtung there is a considerable movement on foot which, in some respects, resembles the Boxer outbreak of 1900. The leader of this restlessness is said to be a bearded woman. She has been urging the people to form themselves into a guild or association. She gives out that she is an incarnation of a fairy, who has come down to teach the people the arts of magic. During the spring large numbers of people have been moved to follow her lead. She gives out that by sorcery and magic she can cast out fox devils—in which the Chinese are profound believers—can foretell events distinctly and announce what happiness or misery shall befall the lot of others.

"By the same 'might magic,' moreover, like the leaders of the Boxer insurrection, she promises immunity to

all her sincere followers from bullet or rifle and thrust of spear, as well as from the effects of water and fire. The people are said to be deeply moved. Wealth is pouring into the coffers of the leaders, so that they have provided themselves with weapons and are now being joined by large numbers of local banditti, of whom, in every place in China, there is more than enough. They have already assumed the offensive and have looted some rice stores and other shops.

"What their ultimate purpose is does not yet appear, but they are laying in stores of provisions, and have so far terrorized their neighbors that many of the well-to-do of the people are fleeing for their lives and seeking safety in quieter districts. It is reported that already they can muster more than 10,000.



STATEHOOD.

The NEWS has been a consistent advocate of joint statehood ever since the proposition was suggested, and has many times in the past given its reasons for such a faith.

These reasons consisted chiefly of an increased taxable valuation, a cutting down of officials, and, naturally, a reduction of the burdensome rate of taxation. This must result, as a union of the combined wealth of two territories, would produce a valuation sufficient to support a state government of such a size and dignity as "Arizona the Great" destines to be.

However, one of the best arguments we have seen on the proposition is from a paragraph in an article from the pen of Judge A. A. Freeman in the Carlsbad Current. The paragraph reads:

"I favor joint statehood because it is more difficult for combines and corporations to control a large state than a small one. Should the two territories combine into one state, it is possible that the people would have some rights that corporations would be compelled to respect. Such a condition, however, does not exist in New Mexico."

"Battling" Nelson won the lightweight championship over Jimmey Britt, at San Francisco Saturday night, in an eighteen round contest. The winner got \$18,000 of the gate receipts, while the loser took \$12,000, which paid both quite well for black eyes and bloody noses.

Over 30,000 grand army men have died during the past year, according to the statistics presented to the G. A. R. meeting at Denver last week. From the same source it is also learned that the pension list now contains less than three-quarters of a million names, Corporal Tanner, commissioner of pensions under Harrison, was selected as commander.

Growth of the President's Cabinet.

The following from Leslie's Weekly contains a bit of American history, and shows the evolution of the American cabinet:

"It is understood that President Roosevelt, in his message at the opening of congress, will urge that body to create a department of mines, with its head a member of the cabinet. A bill for that purpose is to be introduced, on the first day of the session. Only four persons—the heads of the state, treasury, and war departments, and the attorney general—sat down at President Washington's counsel table. A secretary of the navy came in John Adams' time; the postmaster general was advanced to cabinet grade in Jackson's days, and a secretary of the interior came in Taylor's presidency. These seven constituted the president's official advisers until long after the civil war. A secretary of agriculture was created in the latter part of Cleveland's first term, and a secretary of commerce and labor came two years ago. Thus the cabinet, which started out with four members eleven and a half decades ago, has been increased to nine. If Roosevelt gets a secretary of mining, he will have obtained two new cabinet departments, which will mean that he has broken the presidential record in a new place."

Struck Oil at Lakewood.

All Lakewood and surrounding country was set agog last night by the discovery of oil in the town well that is being drilled there to secure water for the town's use. The oil comes up with the immense flow of water and it is hard to tell just how much of the valuable fluid exists, but expert drillers estimate that the flow even though it is held down by a seven thousand gallon flow of water, amounts to between fifteen and twenty barrels per day. That is considered to be in paying quantities, even though a stronger flow is not discovered.

The well is down about a thousand feet and it is quite likely that it will drop lower.

The oil is of fine quality and is what the drillers call paraffin oil. The people of Lakewood are delighted with their discovery and the whole valley rejoices with them and wish with them for the greatest results.—Artesia Advocate.

A Funny Little "Fiddler."

One of the most interesting members of the crab family is the queer and grotesque "fiddler" which lives in burrows in the banks of creeks and estuaries back of the beach. Into these burrows the crab retires in autumn and composes itself for a long winter sleep. The eye-stalks are then folded down into sockets beneath the shell, and the large claw rests closed and inert against the body, while the legs are folded up until the entire animal is snugly closed upon itself, and it remains in this dormant condition until the spring. Early in April the fiddlers awaken and immediately attend to cleaning out their burrows. The large claw is useless for eating, only the small one being available for this purpose. It is amusing to see the delicacy with which this little claw feels about and picks up the particles of vegetable matter and places them in the mouth, while the eyes are all the time raised aloft on their stalks and apparently looking off into the distance. The female crabs have both claws small and of equal size, so they are both used in feeding, and she can satisfy her hunger just twice as easily and quickly as the male. These fiddler crabs also gather food and store it in their burrows for future use.—St. Nicholas.

Manx Laws Seem Strange

Curious Enactments of the Isle of Man—Every Woman Entitled to Vote at Elections for Members of the House of Keys.

Peculiar to itself is the code of laws of the Isle of Man. The laws of England have never prevailed there and some of the Manx enactments are very curious. One of the earliest enjoined "all Scots to avoid the land with the next vessel that goeth into Scotland, upon pain of forfeiture of their goods and bodies to prison." Another enacted that "Irish women loitering and not working be commanded forth of this isle with as much convenient speed as may be" (1561). The first of these laws was the result of a series of raids on the Manx coast by a Galloway rover named MacCulloch. It is said that it was at this period that the Manx custom originated of "eating the meat before they supped the broth," lest they should be deprived of the more substantial part by the appearance at their doors of this Scotchman and his crew. About this time the parish clerks were ordered "to stand at the church doors at the time of service and whip and beat all the dogs." During the seventeenth century a law was made that "whosoever shall be found or detected to pull horse taylor shall be punished upon the wooden horse of the parish, thereon to con-

tinue two hours, and to be whipped naked from the waist upward."

Manx deemsters—the high court judges—are still sworn, as they have been for hundreds of years, by the following curious oath: "By this book and the contents thereof, and by the wonderful works that God hath miraculously wrought in the heaven above and in the earth beneath in six days and seven nights, I do swear that I will, without respect of favor or friendship, loss or gain, consanguinity or affinity, envy or malice, execute the laws of this isle justly between party and party as indifferently as the herring backbone doth lie in the midst of the fish. So help me God and the contents of this book."

Every woman, widow or spinster in the Isle of Man, whether she be owner, occupier or even lodger, enjoys the franchise for the Manx House of Keys elections. Every widow enjoys half of her husband's personal estate and has a life interest in his real estate, and she cannot be deprived of this by will. Her written consent must be obtained to all transfers and deeds affecting her husband's property. On the other hand, no married woman can legally own in her own right either money or property in the Isle of Man; she can have no separate estate unless specially provided before marriage.

"Divine Storm" Saved Japan

Mighty Force Gathered by Kublai for the Subjugation of the Island Empire Annihilated by a Fearful Typhoon.

About 600 years ago Japan was threatened with an invasion from continental Asia, much as England was threatened with invasion by the Spaniards. The beaten Spanish armada was dispersed by storm and Japan was delivered in much the same way, but without an engagement. A Japanese writer, Okakura Yoshisaburo, says: "The mighty Kublai, grandson of the great Genghis Khan, haughty with his restless army, whose devastating intrepidity taught even Europe to tremble at the mention of his name, dispatched an embassy to the Japanese court to demand the subjection of the country. The message was indignantly dismissed. Enraged at this, Kublai equipped a large number of vessels with the choicest soldiers China could furnish. The invading force was successful at first and committed massacres in Iki and Tsushima, islands lying between Korea and Japan. The position was menacing: even the steel nerves of the trained samurai felt that strange thrill a patriot knows. Shinto priests and

Buddhist monks were busy at their prayers.

"A tremendous Chinese fleet gathered in the boisterous bay of Genkai in the summer of 1281. At last the evening came with the ominous glow on the horizon that foretells an approaching storm. It was the plan of the conquering army victoriously to land the next morning on the holy soil of Kyushu. But during this critical night a fearful typhoon, known to this day as the 'divine storm,' arose, breaking the jet-black sky with its tremendous roar of thunder and bathing the glittering armor of our soldiers guarding the coastline in white flashes of dazzling light. The very heaven and earth shook before the mighty anger of nature.

"Dawn of the next morning saw the whole fleet of the proud Yuan, that had darkened the water for miles, swept completely away into the bottomless sea of Genkai, to the great relief of the horror-stricken populace, and to the unspeakable disappointment of our determined soldiers. Out of the 100,000 warriors who manned the invading ships only three are recorded to have survived the destruction to tell the dismal tale to their crestfallen great khan!"

Narrow Escape From Shark

Ferocious Monster Leaped in Boat After Prey—Presence of Mind and Quick Action Saved Life of Boy.

The yellow fever was raging in the city of Vera Cruz that year, and one of the large West Indian liners, which arrived on a certain day was obliged to anchor off in the harbor. A small boat, known as a dingey, floated astern, and in this an active young colored boy of about fifteen was busy at work washing off the seats. The boat lurched over with a sudden dip as the boy bore his weight on one of the thwart, and Pedro heard a warning shout from the steamer's deck just in time to give one terrified glance around and to hear a noise he knew only too well.

Without an instant's hesitation he jumped overboard from the opposite side of the boat. For as he looked he caught sight of the jaws of a great shark which, spying this tempting

morsel of a plump little darky boy, had leaped toward the careened boat with open mouth. So vigorous was the shark's leap that as Pedro went over one side of the boat the shark flopped in at the other. Not being used to these surroundings, and missing his prey, he floundered around until his head bore down the gunwale and he slid from the careening boat into the sea again before the people on the steamer could fling a harpoon at him. Almost as he disappeared poor Pedro's head popped up on the opposite side of the boat, and in a terrible fright he clambered into the dingey again, as thoroughly scared a young darky as ever had a narrow escape.

Had he not thus saved himself from the man-eater, help from the steamer would have been necessary, and even then it is more than probable that the boy would not have been saved. This is a remarkable instance of the ferocity of a shark seeking his prey out of the water.—St. Nicholas.

New Version of "O. K."

Now comes a fourth version. Gen. Warren Keifer, in the *Archæological Quarterly*, says that in Urbana, Ohio, in 1840, when the Harrison campaign was in progress, a Whig farmer drove into town with this legend painted on his wagon: "The people is Oil Korrect." The Democrats made fun of the spelling, but a Whig tavern keeper near Springfield stuck the letters "O. K." over his door, where they remained until the building was torn down, in 1901. This seems more probable than any of the other statements. The use of "O. K.," however it started, has long been widespread and respectable. College presidents, bank officials and even proofreaders find the initials indispensable in their business.

Reflects in America.

It is reported that the separation of Norway and Sweden will make a new line of political cleavage among the American citizens of the Northwest. The sons and grandsons of the Scandinavians who make up the bulk of the population of the states west of the Great lakes and at the headwaters of the Mississippi want to import their quarrel from the Old World, and be no longer Republicans and Democrats, but Norwegians and Swedes.
