IS 100 YEARS OLD

REV. MOYNIHAN, PRIEST IN CHI CAGO, TURNS CENTURY MARK.

Refuses to Disclose His Exact Age-Is Still Very Active and Reads Without the Aid of Glasses-Was Born in Ireland.

· Almost a century in the service of his church, 70 years of which have élapsed since he was ôrdained a priest, - and yet to be able to celebrate mass before an altar constructed in his own room, is the proud record of Very Rev. Canon Jeremiah Moynihan, who now makes his home with friends at 193 Thirty-ninth street.

Just exactly how old this grand old priest is remains a secret which he



guardo as carefully as does a coy maiden who has passed that mystic birthday when women would rather remain silent than divulge their age. He admits that he was born in 1808, but says that he will not tell any man, woman or child the exact date of his birthday.

"They'd make a fuss about it," he says, "and that would be useless."

"Old Father Jerry," as he is familiarly known by thousands of admirers. says to live long and keep good health one must eat and sleep regularly, shun tobacco and liquors and banish worry.

Canon Moynihan is active, he eats well, he sleeps well, he laughs-oh, so heartily-and ha declares that he can place a man of 70 on his back in a twinkling. Were it not for his advanced age, he says he would have been a bishop, and very likely the archbishop of New Orleans. He is not at all discouraged with life, but sees humor in everything possible. WRIGHTS HAVE NEW MACHINE.


Air Navigators Can Replace Broken Aeroplane with Stronger One.

Manteo, N. C.—The Wright brothera are not disheartened over the recent accident to their aeropiane. They have been using their old machine here, and it is learned that they have a new and stronger machine already built in Dayton and will return here with that in August to go on with their experiments.

It was also learned from official sources that the flight interrupted by the accident was designed to be the most important performance ever at tempted by an aeroplane. It was to have been an endurance test in which the operator expected to remain in the air, one hour and twenty minutes. That would have meant a flight of about 80 miles. In the government test next August the Wright machine will have to remain in the air an hour, but will not be required to cover as great a distance as was contemplated in the unfortunate performance.

One or both of the brothers will go to Europe within a few weeks, but they will be back here with their now machine next August.

In the great immigration problem the main question, concerning requirements for admission, can never be satisfactorily answered, and no one can tell what the effect of immigration will be on our future national life. But on one point all are agreed—that everything should be done to make the immigrant's passage and reception as comfortable as possible. Years ago Dickens protested against the moral and physical conditions of the steerpgo. The wordt abuses have been corrected by law and in the course of the general improvement of steamship service. TAY ASHINGTON.—The cenaus taken recently by the police force of the District of Columbia indicated that the national capital is growing in population at an exceptional rate. The increase in inhabitants for the last year is reported as 9,812, which would mean a growth, if steadily maintained, of almost 100,000 for the current decade.

278,718. The population reported by the police in 1908 is 339,403, so that the increase in eight years has been 60.685. By 1910 Washington may be expected to gain at least 15,000 more inhabitants and its population to rice to about 355,000.

It is an ideal residence city, and its charms appeal mont potently to Americans with leisure enough to enjoy them. M'KINLEY'S ·WATCH.

TIMEPIECE WORN WHEN HE WAS SHOT TREASURED BY NEPHEW.

Prominent Resident of Fort Worth, Tex., Falls Heir to Historic Relic -- Is Magnificent Example of Goldsmith's Art.

Fort Worth, Tex.-It was discovered the other day that the heavy gold watch which was carried by President William McKinley when he was shot by the anarchist, Czolgesz, at Buffalo, is owned and in the possession of a Fort Worth man, a nephew of the victim of the assassin's bullet.

The nephew is A. J. Duncan, secretary and general manager of the Citizens' Light and Power company. He is a son of one of President McKin-· ley's two sisters. His mother, Mrs. A. J. Duncah, was formerly Miss Sarah E. McKinley. She now lives at the family house in Cleveland, O., with the other sister. Both women are more than 70 years old.

It had long been the understanding in the McKinley and Duncan families that A. J. Duncan was to receive William McKinley's watch, as a cousin inherited the grandfather's timeplece, but none of the members of the two families had any idea w · what tragic circumstances the watch would fall into Mr. Duncan's hands.

After the Buffalo tragedy and the subsequent death of President McKinley the watch was left in the possession of Mrs. McKinley until her death. more than a year ago. Then it was turned over to Mr. Duncan, as had understood. been originally The watch, until a few weeks ago, remained with Mr. Duncan's mother in Cleveland.

presidency the first time Mr. McKinley had the watch specially made for him in Canton, O. While not a large watch, it is heavy, as it contains a large amount of gold decoration. The iten cents is being charged. All day timeplece is open-faced, with gold people from all parts of the old go mumbers embossed on the face.

On the rear of the watch is the national emblem, an eagle supporting a shjeld bearing 13 stars. The figure is not engraved, but is embossed on the back of the watch. The whole watch is the result of careful and painstalting workmanship and is a magnificent example of the goldsmith's art. Attached to a beautifully rolled gold link chain is a black ivory seal with President McKinley's monogram:

Mr. Duncan is attached to the watch by many ties. Not only is it for him a family beirloom, but it is a relic of historic value. He keeps the watch carefully guarded.

All of President McKinley's personal effects are now in the possession of members of the Duncan family. Most of them are in their Cleveland and New York homes. The collection embraces the president's books, paintings, furniture, and everything which was intimately connected with his private life. In the course of time Mr. Duncan expects to have many of the books and art subjects brought to his Fort Worth home.

PICTORIAL MAP OF DENVE

Shows important Buildings So That They Can Be Easily Recognizad.

The new map of the city of Denver, copies of the original drawings of which have been on exhibition and which have attracted much attention because of the careful and accurate portrayal of the city, has just been issued from the office of the Bird's-Eye-View Publishing Company of this city. Tho map, which is a pictorial repre-

sentation of Denver, looking south from the Twenty-third street viaduct and printed in eight colors, is one of the most complete, accurate and artistic representations ever made of any city. Every building is so carefully and accurately pictured that no one living in the city need have any difficulty in finding on the map the exact house in which he lives.

In the downtown sections the principal buildings are co faithfully portrayed that they can easily be recognized-from-their-appearanco-but-for the benefit of those who are unfamiliar with the city, the names of several hundred of the principal hotels, business houses, schools, churches and office buildings are designated on the buildings themselves. In addition to this there is a marginal index, with thirty-two reference figures at the bottom and top of the map and all the letters of the alphabet at the sides. By the aid of these about 500 of the principal buildings and points of interest in the city can be located in the shortest possible time.

The work is done in several colors, so carefully selected and placed that the perspective of the city is brought out in the best possible manner, considering the extent of the undertaking. The map is in reality a huge picture of the city.

In the margin are found thirty-four photographs of the most important buildings and places of interest in tho city, including the new auditorium, the state capitol, the union depot, the Union stockyards and the City park. The picture map is printed on a sheet 64 by 44 inches in size.
