Special Meeting of Board of County Commissioners.

The following is a report of the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln county, N. M., held Tuesday, November 23, 1909, at Carrizozo, Lincoln county, N. Mexico.

Present—Hon. R. H. Taylor, chairman; Chas. W. Wingfield, member; Leo Oswald, deputy sheriff; J. G. Riggle, clerk.

This meeting was an adjourned meeting for the purpose of receiving bids for courthouse and jail bonds.

Bids were received as follows:

BID No. 1.—J. H. Causey & Co. for the \$28,000 courthouse bonds which you intend to issue, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest payable at the office of the county treasurer or in the city of New York at the option of the holder, bonds to be dated approximately January 1st, 1910, due in thirty years from the date, optional for redemption after twenty years from the date, denomination \$1,000 each, we will pay par and accrued interest to date of delivery, and a premium of eight hundred and forty-seven dollars (\$847.00), and will furnish the blank bonds at our expense.

BID No. 2.—The bid of Coffin & Crawford by their attorney, J. H. Canning.—We hereby propose to purchase from you \$28,000.00 courthouse bonds, maturing 30 years after their date, but subject to call for payment at any time after 20 years from their date, said bonds to be issued in strict compliance with the laws of the territory of New Mexico now in force, to be in denominations of \$1,000.00, interest to be payable semi-annually at the office of the county treasurer or in the city of New York. For such bonds on delivery to us at the Central Trust Company of Illinois, Chicago, Illinois, bearing 5 per cent interest, we will give you the sum of \$28,924.00 and accrued interest. If you will issue such bonds bearing 4½ per cent interest we will give you the par or face value thereof, plus a premium of \$12.50.

BID No. 3.—The bid of John Nuveen & Co.—For the \$28,000 legally-issued courthouse and jail bonds of Lincoln county, New Mexico, delivered to us in Chicago,

in denominations of \$1000, dated when issued and due thirty years after date, optional twenty years after date, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, both principal and semi-annual interest payable at some bank mutually satisfactory, we will pay you \$30,031.00, and in addition will furnish the county free of expense the lithographed blank bonds and draft of further proceedings to be taken in issuing the bonds. This bid is accompanied by a certified check of \$1,250.

BID No. 4.—Bid of Wooden, McNear & Moore for \$28,000.00 courthouse and jail bonds to be sold by Lincoln county, New Mexico, November 23, 1909, to bear date of December 1, 1909, and to become due and payable 30 years from date, optional 20 years from date, to bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, both principal and interest to be made payable at the county clerk's office, Carrizozo, New Mexico, in denominations of \$1,000 each, we will pay you thirty thousand and twenty-nine and 45-100 dollars (\$30,029.45).

BID No. 5.—The bid of Otis & Hough, by C. V. Saffad, of Cleveland, Ohio.—I offer for the Lincoln county 5 per cent, 20-30, interest payable semi annually, courthouse bonds, to be sold next Monday; par, accrued interest to date of delivery, and a premium of \$1,435.60. This bid is made subject to the approval of the attorneys of Otis & Hough, as to regularity and legality of procedure under which these bonds are issued, and also as to form of bonds. This bid is accompanied by a certified check of \$200.

Board adjourned to 1 p. m.

Board met as per adjournment. Members present as before.

J. V. Bergen, tax commissioner E. P. & N. E. and E. P. & R. I. Ry., appears before the board and asked that the raise made by this board be reduced to the amount as returned by the above tax commissioner. Under due consideration of the board, is retained as before.

After due consideration of all bids herewith submitted, a record of which has been made, and in conformity with the premises, the bid of Coffin & Crawford, of

"WHO IS WHITNEY?"

Career of Man Who Enters Cook-Peary Polar Controversy.

Is Perfect Specimen of the Clubman-Sportsman and Went North with Peary to Hunt—A Good Writer and Story-Teller.

New Haven Conn.—"What sort of a man is Harry Whitney?" This is the question that is being asked of every New Havenite, man, woman or child, who ventures into the zone of the Cook-Peary polar controversy. To reply to it accurately is a matter of more than a word or two.

Harry Whitney has had an interesting career. "The quiet sportsman" he has been called, for his adventures have been enjoyed and suffered without press notices, except when they could not be avoided. The world has been the theater of his exploits, and

the arctic regions were about the last section of the globe left for him to visit when he joined the Peary party.

It is not commonly known that when Whitney decided to become a member of the Peary party half a dozen other wealthy clubmen agreed to take the trip.

Whitney left on the Roosevelt, which sailed from New Bedford July 9, 1908. He went to New Bedford some time before the party left there and had two neat power boats built there, of whale boat model, which he presented to Peary as part of the expedition's equipment.

Whitney is a perfect specimen of the clubman-sportsman. His father, the late Stephen Whitney, was another such, and was known in New York and New Haven clubs as "a thoroughbred."

Harry Whitney is the elder of the two sons of Stephen Whitney, and has two sisters older than himself. His younger half-brother is Stephen Whitney. Harry's mother and Stephen's mother were sisters and the daughters of the late Bradish Johnson of New York city and Long Island. Mr. Johnson was a clubman and country gentleman of prominence and wealth, and much of his property was left to Harry and to Harry's step-brother. Both Harry's father and mother are dead.

Harry Whitney did not care to go to college, but on leaving the high school decided to learn the copper manufacturing business. He spent three years in factories in Ansonia, Conn., and then decided that he did not like the steady confinement of the work. Conceiving the idea of managing an Australian sheep ranch, he made careful preparations for the venture and sailed from New York city for Australia, where he purchased a ranch. This business was well started when a severe drought killed the sheep and

Whitney abandoned the plan and came home.

His love for ranching and open-air life remained, however, and he purchased an Arizona ranch, where he has remained a couple of months each year. He had a narrow escape from death in a peculiar manner while on his Arizona ranch a few years ago. He was riding on a mustang when an insect flew into his ear. He used every means to dislodge the creature, whose presence created excruciating pain. Tucson, the nearest place where a surgeon might be found, was 100 miles away, but he headed for it and rode at top speed. When he reached Tucson he was raving mad and was stopped for an insane man. His fate would have been uncertain but for an Elks' pin that he wore. Prominent officers of that order interested themselves in his case and he was taken to St. Mary's hospital in that city, where the physicians found out his trouble and relieved him of the insect.

In his physique Harry Whitney is slight. He is unusually tall, although a little stoop prevents this characteristic from being too evident. His face, from exposure to the weather, is as ruddy as a sea captain's, and a light drooping mustache covers his mouth.

Concerning the Eskimo.

The Eskimo is affable, brave and loyal. He speaks a language which is highly inflected—many primitive people do—and has certain rudimentary ideas of a warm and habitable heaven and a cold and cheerless hell. And in knowledge of ways and means to fight cold, ice and darkness and wrest subsistence from a frozen desert he leads all other children of the north and south. But he lives his life in a realm of ideas incalculably remote from civilization. Peary tells us of a tribe of less than 100 people who, cut off from their fellows for several generations and out of the tracks of whalers and explorers, believed themselves to be the only inhabitants of the world—a world of 'berg and floe, of naked rock and mighty glacier, of wheeling stars and quivering aurora, of immeasurable reaches of ice and snow, all existing for the empery of a race of a few score human beings in a few igloos of stones and ice.

Would Preserve Historic Spot.

The efforts of George Brandes to induce the Norwegian government to purchase and to preserve the Grimstad apothecary shop is meeting with the indorsement of many literary organizations all over Europe. The little crumbling building in the south of Norway was the scene of Henrik Ibsen's earliest activity as a writer. He was a helper and then an apprentice in the apothecary shop, and employed the few idle hours at his disposal by writing. "There," said Brandes, in his appeal, "Ibsen discovered himself. The place had at that time about 800 inhabitants and the apothecary shop was its exchange, the congregating place of the town's business leaders, where they discussed the events of the time. There he wrote his poem, 'To Hungary,' and 'Catalina,' and the place should be preserved for all time."







BROOM THAT HOLDS THE DUST

Clever Arrangement by Which Oil is Distributed to the Straw Fibers.

A new broom, which is said to be dustless, has a hollow handle designed to be filled with kerosene, and the oil saturating the broom corn has the effect of making the dust particles adhere to it, instead of floating through space. The receptacle is filled from the top, and light floor oil may be substituted for coal oil where the latter may be found preferable. The handle is a light steel tube with a tight cap on the top end and the oil is fed down-

ward to the distributing end. From there it is absorbed into the core of sponge wicking in the center of the broom, and is thence distributed evenly through the straw fibers. Pressure caused by the act of sweeping releases enough oil from the sponge wicking to supply the requisite amount of moisture to hold the dust. It is claimed that on account of the very small quantity of oil required, there is no disagreeable odor left, and the flow can be so regulated that there is no danger of spotting the floor.

When the head of the broom is worn out it may be replaced with another. These may be purchased as needed.

Corn Beef Hash.

This is the way Maggie, the famous cook of the late Senator Hanna, makes her famous hash: Put in frying pan a good-sized lump of butter. When pan is good and hot add chopped beef and let it heat. Take some freshly baked potatoes, scrape out while good and hot and add to beef. Mix with salt and pepper, add a dash of onion juice, dash of nutmeg, moisten with chicken broth or beef stock. Serve good and hot.

Coffee Cake.

Take a small tablespoon of butter and the same of lard and cream them with about one-half cup of sugar. Add an egg well beaten, three-fourths cup of milk and stir in a pint of flour in which has been sifted 1½ teaspoons of baking powder and a little salt. Stir well together and spread in a shallow pan. Sift sugar over the top, also cinnamon, and dot with little bits of butter. Bake in a hot oven.

Graham Cake.

Three eggs, one and one-half cups of sugar, one and one-half tablespoons of butter, one and one-half cups of crackers rolled fine, one and one-half cups of flour, one cup milk, three teaspoons of baking powder.

Filling—Two cups of powdered sugar, one-half cup butter, four tablespoons of cream or milk, one teaspoon of vanilla.

Cream Sauce Hot.

Heat a pint of cream slowly in a double boiler; when nearly boiling set it off from the fire, put into it a half cupful of sugar, a little nutmeg or vanilla extract; stir it thoroughly and add when cool the whites of two eggs well beaten; set it on the fire in a dish containing hot water to keep hot until needed, stirring once or more.

The New Governor.

W. J. Mills, chief justice of the territorial supreme court, has been appointed governor of New Mexico. Judge W. H. Pope, of Roswell, has been elevated to the chief justiceship. Judge Mills is credited with being a gang rule man, and, if so, we can congratulate ourselves only on securing an absolutely able, just and fearless chief justice.

Court House Bonds Sold.

The board of county commissioners met here Tuesday to open bids for bonds, which had been called for at a previous meeting, in the sum of \$28,000 for the purpose of erecting a court house and jail at Carrizozo. The bids are published elsewhere in these columns, and all of them show that Lincoln county securities are classed with the best in the market.

The lowest bid received offered a premium of \$847 on the issue at 5 per cent, while the highest bid, at the same rate, was a premium of \$2,031. The bid, however, that was accepted by the board was that of Coffin & Crawford, of Chicago, at the rate of 4½ per cent, they paying par for the issue, plus a premium of \$12.50. This makes a difference of \$756.50 in favor of the 4½ per cent bid, in a period of twenty years; provided interest is not calculated on the premium, or of \$2,181.50 in thirty years. The saving to the county, in interest, by the board disposing of the bonds at the rate named, is \$140 per annum.

On the other hand, if the board had felt that more money was needed to complete and furnish the buildings, it would have been policy to have accepted the 5 per cent bid, carrying with it the handsome premium of \$2031, for that would have given the county the use of that sum over the full issue at a very low rate of interest; but, as has been stated, would have necessitated the payment of \$140 more in annual interest. Therefore, the board figured that the bid at the lower rate was the more satisfactory, particularly as \$28,000 was deemed sufficient for all needs, and the obligation resting upon the county in the matter of interest could be more easily met.

The board accepted the afore-

said bid conditionally, one of the conditions requiring the successful bidders to deposit \$1,500 with the county treasurer by noon yesterday as a guaranty of good faith. The bidders were notified by wire of the action of the board, and Wednesday morning the deposit was made. As soon as the preliminaries can be arranged the bonds will be issued and delivered and the money placed to the credit of the county for the purposes named.

The premiums offered and the low rate of interest proposed certainly should cause a feeling of pride to the citizens of Lincoln county. Bond buyers who are willing to take our securities at such rates of interest must deem Lincoln county bonds a first class investment; and we know of no reason why they should not. We have an assessed valuation of over \$2,000,000, which probably means that the county has property that actually amounts to \$5,000,000 in value; and with only about a \$50,000 bonded indebtedness our burdens are comparatively light.

As soon as plans and specifications have been submitted and accepted, calls for which have been issued, calls for bids for the construction of a court house and jail, in conformity with plans and specifications adopted, will be made, and actual work on the buildings will probably begin in February. The money is in sight, the material is at hand and we feel highly gratified that Lincoln county is soon to have substantial public buildings, and that the people will have little difficulty in meeting the obligations imposed for this much-needed improvement.



District Court Ends.

The Lincoln county district court closed for the term, Saturday night about 10 o'clock. Judge Alford W. Cooley, District Clerk Downs and Stenographer Ungles left the next morning for Alamogordo, to be present at the opening of Otero county court as well as United States court, Monday. District Attorney Llewellyn left Sunday afternoon for El Paso, from which point he went to his home at Las Cruces. Sheriff Stevens also left Sunday for his home at Lincoln.

During the session a number of cases, both civil and criminal, were disposed of, notwithstanding the difficulties encountered, with which our readers are familiar. Since our last issue the following cases were heard:

Edwin Darling, charged with unlawfully disposing of mortgaged property. The case occupied most of the day Friday, and in the end resulted in the Judge instructing the jury to return a verdict of not guilty, the territory having failed to substantiate its allegations. Saturday was devoted to the trial of John Adams on the charge of assault. At 10 o'clock that night the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. In the Sunday closing cases

against Campbell and Gleason, the cases against Gleason were annulled, the defendant having died; a plea of guilty was entered by Campbell in five cases and a fine of \$10 and costs assessed in each. The sixth case against the same party is still pending. Jerry Lucy, who had been indicted on a charge of assault, plead guilty and was given six months in jail.

Co., and New Mexico Fuel Co; it appearing to the board that the said property is land and real estate and that the assessment of said property as fixed by the board and as it now appears on the tax rolls is just and equitable: Wherefore be it resolved by this board that the treasurer and ex-officio collector be and he hereby is instructed to make no changes or alterations in said assessment on the tax rolls and to collect said taxes and all of them, as they now appear on said tax rolls.



"Well, never mind, Pearl. Go on with the coffee and I'll do it," said the considerate mistress. "Where do they keep the soap?"

Origin of Word "Bible."

The word bible is derived from the Latin name biblia, which was treated as a singular although it comes from the Greek neuter plural, meaning "little books." This Greek diminutive was derived from byblus, or papyrus, the famous material on which ancient books were written. The title "Bible" was first used about the middle of the second Christian century in the so-called second epistle of Clement (xiv., 2).

FOUR CONFECTIONS THAT CAN BE RECOMMENDED.

Orange Jelly Baskets an Old Favorite
—Apricot Snow—Directions for Tinting Frostings—Old Reliable Scripture Cake.

Orange Jelly Baskets.—Use one orange for each person. Cut carefully about two-thirds up, leaving a strip across the top about half an inch wide for the handle. Scallop the edge of the basket and fill with orange jelly made as follows: One-half box of gelatine, one-half cup of cold water, one cup of boiling water, juice of one lemon, one cup of sugar, one pint of orange juice. Soak the gelatine in cold water until soft. Add the boiling water, orange and lemon juice and sugar. Stir until the sugar is dissolved and set in a cool place. When the jelly is heaped in the baskets a spoonful of whipped cream should be dropped on top with a piece of dried orange peel stuck into it.

Apricot Snow.—Take one cupful of apricots drained from the sirup and pressed through a vegetable press. Add one cupful of sugar, the unbeaten white of an egg, and the juice of half or a whole lemon. Beat the mixture with a perforated wood spoon until it will stand alone. It will take some minutes. Use between and above layers of cake. A few halves of apricots cut in pieces may be used to decorate the snow. The apricot gives a particularly agreeable flavor and tint.

To Tint Frostings.—When making frosting for cake, add one-half teaspoon of red cake sand, with the sugar and you will have a pretty pink frosting. If you wish blue, add blue cake sand. In this way you may get any color cake sand you want your frosting to be.

Scripture Cake.—This is a cake that has as many "revivals" as some churches, and is a cake which "takes well" at church fairs, both cake and recipe bringing good prices. Recipe, I. Kings xvii.:13; One cupful of butter, Judges, v.:35; two cupfuls of sugar, Jeremiah, vi.:20; three and one-half cupfuls of flour, I. Kings iv.:22; two cupfuls of raisins, Samuel, xxx.:18; one cupful of eggs, I. Samuel, xxx.:12; one cupful of almonds, Genesis xliii.:11; six eggs, Isaiah x.:14; little salt, Leviticus, ii.:13; one large kitchen-spoonful honey, Judges, xvi.:8; sweet spices to taste, I. Kings, x.:2; three teaspoonfuls baking powder, Galatians, v.:9; follow Solomon's advice for the making of good boys, Proverbs xxiii.:14.

About the House.

A young woman who spent the best part of the summer at a Bar Harbor hotel tells of a useful box that she invented in a wild desire to have a spot where sewing or anything could be thrown and left undisturbed until needed again. She bought four rollers from a hardware store and borrowed a hammer and a small screwdriver. She had neatly upholstered her box with cretonne, so that the glimpses of it under her bed was not unsightly. Rope handles were at the ends, and a pull wheeled it out to her feet. Toilet Soap.

One can of potash, one quart of cold water, 20 cents' worth of glycerine, three tablespoonfuls of borax, one cup of almond meal, six pounds clean grease, one cup bergamot. Put potash in cold water, add glycerine, borax, meal and oil after it is dissolved and cool. Let the grease be melted, not hot, and stir it in into the mixture until it looks like cream. Pour into a pan and cut in squares when quite hard.

New York.—When the loyal and honest Britishers pay homage of heart to the pictured Alexandra at the coronation—from the brush of Edwin R. Abbey, R. A.—it is only to their queen's head and face. The rounded arms, the well poised neck, the stately, patriarchal carriage of the figure are another's—the secret is out now. Miss Evelyn Converse, an American girl from Wisconsin at that, posed as Queen Alexandra for Mr. Abbey's great painting, "The Coronation of Edward VII."

Miss Converse hasn't sat on the royal throne, but she has worn the coronation robes. She has never

been presented at court, but she has come and gone at Buckingham palace as if born to the purple. She was never proclaimed queen in Westminster, but there she is in the picture.

The king himself ordered the painting to be hung on the walls of Buckingham palace. He posed; the queen posed; all the important personages who were nearest to their majesties on that august occasion faced Mr. Abbey for their portions of the picture. But for two years the great work was held up because there was no suitable model in England.

"For two years I've waited for you," said Mr. Abbey when he met Miss Converse. He knew he had found the model he wanted—the rest was only a matter of course. Who that could do it would refuse to pose for her majesty, consort of Edward VII., and wear her robes and jewels?

Strangely enough, Miss Converse isn't a professional model at all. She comes from Eau Claire, Wis., where her father, Henry Edward Converse, is a successful up-to-date American business man. He went there from New York and took a hand in mining and timber and made good. There is sturdy New England stock in Miss Converse, too—on her family tree is the name of Oliver Wendell Holmes.

It all happened just because Miss Converse fell in love and played model for her fiancé, a painter prince—Efflatoum Bey, son of a Russian nobleman and a French countess, who adopted Egypt as their country, where Efflatoum Pasha is one of its foremost men.

When she was 16 Miss Converse left Eau Claire and went abroad with some cousins to study. She stayed in Paris several years, studying French and music, and hoping that perhaps some day she might go into grand opera. Then she went to England, and at Cambridge she met Efflatoum

Bey, who had been to the varsity there and rowed in one of the crews. He had taken up painting—and he fell in love with Miss Converse.

They became engaged and what could be prettier on canvas than the fiancée's shell pink skin and her dusky black hair and her eyes that are sometimes black and sometimes blue and sometimes gray? And those arms, so exquisitely modeled!

Well, George Story, the artist, saw the throat and arms and shoulders at a reception at the American embassy.

"Just one sitting," he begged of the beautiful American girl, and when she told her fiancé of this he said: "It's a very great honor from such a painter—by all means pose for him."

They got along famously, and one day Mr. Story ventured to suggest that Mr. Abbey might want her for some of his next pictures. Miss Converse laughed merrily—the idea that such an artist, one of the two Americans in the Royal Academy, should want to paint her!

"Why, there are plenty of other girls who will do quite as well," she went on protesting, but she donned the robes and posed.

History in Woman's Garb.

Never before probably were so many varieties of feminine historical costumes seen as were represented in the history pageant recently in Bath, England. The founding of that famous watering place antedates the Roman invasion of ancient Britain, and every fashion in woman's dress used by the people of Bath since the days of the Picts and Scots, and of the wall separating southern Britain from the savage tribes of the north, was shown by participants in the pageant.

There were the flowing, fur-lined, heavy robes of the Saxons; the light, graceful draperies brought in by the Roman invaders; the flowered and embroidered gowns of Norman women, who were up to date in all the mode, coming as they did, from France; the rude dresses of wild beasts' skins, in which were clad the helpmeets of the Danes and Vikings, who swept through the country long before the Normans came, and every style of frock which garbed English women from the time of King Arthur and the Round Table to the present reign of King Edward.

Each of more than 200 women wore a different costume illustrative of a distinct period in British history.

Saving the North Woods.


