## FLOOD RESOLUTION PASSES THE SENATE.

Statehood went over the 7th, the date set for the vote, because of a talk-fest in which the senate engaged, but the next day the Flood resolution was adopted by a vote of 53 to 18. The Nelson substitute was ingloriously defeated. The resolution now goes back to the house for concurrence on some minor amendments, and it will be put right up to the president in a day or two.

Gloom, however, pervades the minds of all statehooders, for the president positively declares that he will veto the resolution because the recall provision in the Arizona constitution was not eliminated. Members of both houses say they will be able to pass the resolution over the president's veto. At any rate, if we do not now get statehood, the blame will be easily located.

### T. S. Anderson Dead

Friday evening, at 6 o'clock, W. M. Reily went into the Burrell rooming house and discovered the body of T. S. Anderson. Dr. Paden was called at once, examined the body and announced that death had ensued two or three days before the finding of the body. Justice Massie had a coroner's jury summoned and held an inquest, the verdict returned being as follows:

We, the Justice of the Peace, and jury, who sat upon the inquest held over the body of T. S. Anderson, found dead, and reported by Wm. Riely, in the Burrell House, in Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, on the 4th day of August 1911.

We find that the deceased came to his death by reason of causes of Heart Failure.

Deceased and his wife had been in charge of the Burrell rooming house, but business was so dull that they had given up their lease, and Mrs. Anderson and little son Lesnet left for Capitan Tuesday afternoon. The husband had intended to leave Tuesday night in search for a position, and no concern was manifested by his friends here at his non appearance. The

building was entirely unoccupied save by a young man who was sleeping upstairs, hence the failure to discover the body earlier.

The room in which the body was found was closed, and the odor from the body had not permeated the building. As soon, however, as the door was opened by Mr. Riely, who was led to the room by the bad odor, the stench from the body which was in a bad state of decomposition, became almost unbearable. It was feared at first that foul play or self destruction brought about death, but a thorough examination by the physician and the coroner's jury failed to produce anything to establish the belief. The body was found lying as he had often lain down to sleep, and the indications were that death came while he slept, just in the position he had lain down.

The wife was notified at once, and with friends, arrived from Capitan about 11 o'clock Friday night. The body was prepared for burial and was interred in the local cemetery at midnight Friday night. Rev. C. I. Walker, the Baptist minister, conducted the funeral services.

"Andy" Anderson was born in New York forty years ago, of Canadian parents. He went to Texas in early boyhood and lived there until about 15 years ago, coming to New Mexico. Nine years ago he was married to Mrs. Edith Gray, formerly Miss Edith Lesnet, at Capitan. One son, eight years old, was the fruit of the union. For ten years or more the deceased was in the employ of the local railroad company as brakeman and conductor, except the past two years, a part of the latter period having been spent in Colorado. Other than the wife's relatives, Mrs. Jno. A. Haley, Mrs. Geo. J. Dingwall, Miss Georgia Lesnet, sisters, and Mrs. Annie Lesnet, mother, all of whom are now here, deceased had no relatives in this country. He had many friends among his associate laborers and in the fraternities of which he was a member. He held a policy in the Order of Railway Conductors for \$2,000.00. The circumstances surrounding his death were particularly sad, not only his bereaved family but also to his many friends, with whom he was intimate.

## ALAS FOR THE PETITE.

Like English women, French women are growing taller—at least, in Paris. The results of the "careful and minute measurement of 255 Parisiennes, aged from twenty-one to fifty-five years," have been communicated to the Academy of Sciences, says the Pall Mall Gazette. It was found that the average height of the Parisian woman has increased from 5 feet 6-100 inches to 5 feet 1 23-100 inches. They are taller by almost 1 1/4 inches than the women of the rest of France. At the same time we are told that in 1909 1,379 English mothers and daughters were similarly measured, and the results communicated there. The average height for the mothers was found to be 5 feet 84-100 inches, and for the daughters 5 feet 2 2-5 inches. English women had thus grown just over 1 1/4 inches in a generation. Whether the 255 Parisians measured were mothers or daughters, or both, is not stated. The only conclusion to be derived from the statistics in this connection, accordingly, is that the Parisienne of 1911 in height comes between the English mother and the English daughter of 1911. But she is not half an inch taller than the former, and has still much to grow before she reaches the contemporary English girl.

## HOME MADE DRESSES

WONDERS CAN BE WROUGHT BY CLEVER WOMAN.

Any Woman With Taste and Ten Fingers Can Be Dressed in Up-to-Date Style at Very Small Expense.

Recently I saw a collection of home-made dresses, and they were all so up-to-date in style and had cost so little that, old stager as I am in matters of dress, I marveled, at the sight of them. They had been made by three sisters, young women who are expected to dress well, and the cost of the little frocks—three, mind you—was just four dollars and sixty-nine cents. This estimate may seem incredible to the casual reader, but I have made a round of the shops to look at just such materials as these girls used and found the exact ones ranging from three and a half cents a yard to fifteen. Each of the gowns seen took eight yards of goods, the texture for one costing twenty-eight cents and the other two a dollar twenty. The rest of the money went for the trimmings, thread, hooks and eyes. Fancy a dainty morning dress for sixty-nine cents and one good enough to go anywhere in the afternoon for two dollars! Why should not every woman with taste and ten fingers be



dressed as well as these three girls, who, however, I must tell you, did not select their material with the first glance through the shops. They looked until they found just the right colors for their complexions, just the right

bit of lace or net or contrasting gauze for trimming, and the result in each case was a chef d'oeuvre of taste.

Could there be a sweeter thing for morning in town or country than the little frock of plain goods trimmed with spotted shown in our illustration? Mademoiselle may wear it shopping, she may go boating in it, she may loiter about country verandas, or go visiting, or to club lunches in such toggery, with which, of course, a plain white straw sailor hat would be the proper headpiece.

Materials for the gown? They are endless, but for the outing look the style calls for the exceptions must be in the case of thin, sheer textures. For a fair girl or young matron white cotton duck could form the gown proper and this blue and white, violet and white, or green and white percale would trim acceptably. Or the dress could be entirely of linen or cotton suiting with white alone for the collar and cuffs. The dark girl would look well in a bright yellow duck with white trimmings or in mauve and white. Six yards and a half of plain and two of contrasting material are measurements for the medium figure, and there are excellent qualities of cotton suiting for twelve and a half cents a yard and bewitching percales for eight and ten. In fact, it is possible to turn out a frock as pretty as this for eighty-five cents.

In the models displayed I have sought to show many ways in which the popular kimono waist can be varied, for this style is all pervading and, considering home dressmaking, no easier bodice made could be offered. The shoulders, which are always the hardest part of a waist to fit, are adjusted through the simple matter of a waist band; no lining is required, and the stylish jumper with its cut-out neck and short sleeves may go over a dainty white bodice of any simple sort. As to the princess skirt, it is, like the bodice, adaptable to changes, a lower belt line and some trimming or other making it at once the conventional thing. But where the princess waist line is becoming, and the waist is not too big, choose it by all means, for these high-topped skirts are the latest agony.

## POINTS ON THE SHUTTLE

How Little Annoyances Can Be Obviated and Sewing Machine Made to Do Good Work.

When much machine stitching has to be done filling the shuttle is a constant annoyance. This can be partly obviated by threading the shuttle with finer cotton than that used on the needle. The sewing will be quite as strong and the shuttle will not need refilling half so often as it would if threaded with the same number of cotton as the needle, because the bobbin will hold a great deal more of the finer cotton. If you want your sewing machine to do satisfactory work, remember that it needs to be kept clean. After every ten hours' work it needs oil; but all surplus oil must be carefully wiped off afterwards. Always work it steadily and never start or stop with a jerk. The best way to finish off with a machine steam is to turn the material around and stitch backward for about an inch. This saves tying the ends of cotton, which is annoying work and takes up a great deal of time if there are many seams.

# NATIONAL CAPITAL AFFAIRS

## Spending a Million a Day on Roads



WASHINGTON.—One million dollars a day is the record that will be established throughout the United States as the expenditure for improving and maintaining public roads. Never before in the history of the country has there been such interest in the improvement of highways, and with the legislatures of the states appropriating millions of dollars for this purpose, the good roads movement has received its greatest impetus since the foundation of the republic.

The money that will be expended on the roads of this country during the next six months will be more than ever before in the same period of time. In 1904 the total expenditure for the construction and maintaining of roads and bridges in the United States amounted to about \$80,000,000, but the expenditure for this purpose in 1911 will aggregate about \$140,550,000. Exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, the outlay for roads will amount to \$1,000,000 a day during the present road building season. This includes all moneys raised by local taxation, bond issue, state

appropriation and private subscriptions.

"Every state in the Union," said Logan Waller Page, director of the United States office of public roads, in telling of the results of the great campaign for good roads, "seems at last to be thoroughly aroused to the benefits derived from investments in improved highways."

In California the state has issued \$18,000,000 in bonds with which to build a system of state highways. This work will begin during the present season. In the state of Connecticut about \$2,500,000 will be expended this year out of the state treasury for trunk line and state aid roads. Of the \$5,000,000 bond issue recently authorized in Maryland more than \$1,250,000 will be available this year for trunk line and state aid roads. Massachusetts will expend from state revenues over \$1,000,000 for the construction and maintenance of state roads. It is expected that at least \$5,000,000 will be expended on state-aid roads and on trunk line systems in the state of New York, in addition to \$7,000,000 already raised by local taxation. In 1910, thirty counties in Ohio voted \$2,500,000 in bonds to be expended this year. Ohio will also expend about \$500,000 from the state revenues for road improvement. In Pennsylvania, the state-aid appropriation will probably amount to over \$1,000,000, and a \$50,000,000 bond issue is being considered.

## Number of Dope Fiends Is Increasing

ACCORDING to statistics collected by government investigators, we are becoming a nation of drug fiends. The number of persons addicted to this degrading and debasing habit is placed at 4,000,000, and the evil is constantly growing. With the object of warning the country, the United States government has issued a bulletin, cautioning the people against what is known as the "habit-forming" compounds. The experts employed by the government are certain that new drug fiends are being created every year through the insidious patent medicine and the soft drink that contain a trace of the narcotic agents which finally form the terrible drug habit. There are 100 sanitariums throughout the country for the cure of this mind-wrecking habit and there are hundreds of graves being filled every year with unfortunate victims of the drugs.

The bureau of chemistry, under the



direction of its chief, Dr. H. W. Wiley, which made a far-reaching investigation of the drug habit, was appalled by the results of its inquiry. It found that the amount of opium being imported into the United States has doubled within the last generation. It discovered that hundreds of preparations for the cure of headaches and the relief of pain that are being sold every day were filled with alluring, enslaving agents that create the drug user's lotus land. It found that over 150,000 ounces of cocaine were being consumed annually by the drug users of the country.

## Midshipmen Being Trained for Japan

THE 194 midshipmen who recently graduated at the United States naval academy, and whom it is proposed to create ensigns as soon as possible, have in the last year of their course received special training to fit them peculiarly for a war with Japan. A member of the class has let the secret out. The hundreds of other middies will be similarly treated. The members of the graduating class during the last four months have been familiarized with the principal naval bases, armaments, naval forces, and resources of Japan, and they have in theory fought naval battles with Japan.

It could not be learned who had given the orders to instruct the midshipmen what to do in case of a war with Japan, and the greatest possible secrecy has been maintained while



the teaching was going on. In many of the places and instructions the name of Japan was not mentioned at all, and the author of them simply said, "the navy of the strongest Asiatic power."

It was further stated by the instructor that he understood the 85 graduating cadets at West Point, N. Y., had received the same instructions as to land fighting that the midshipmen had in naval warfare.

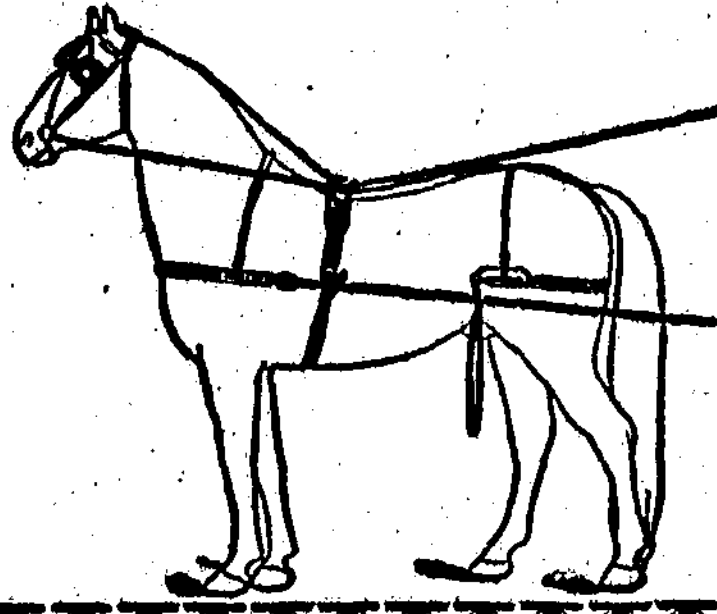

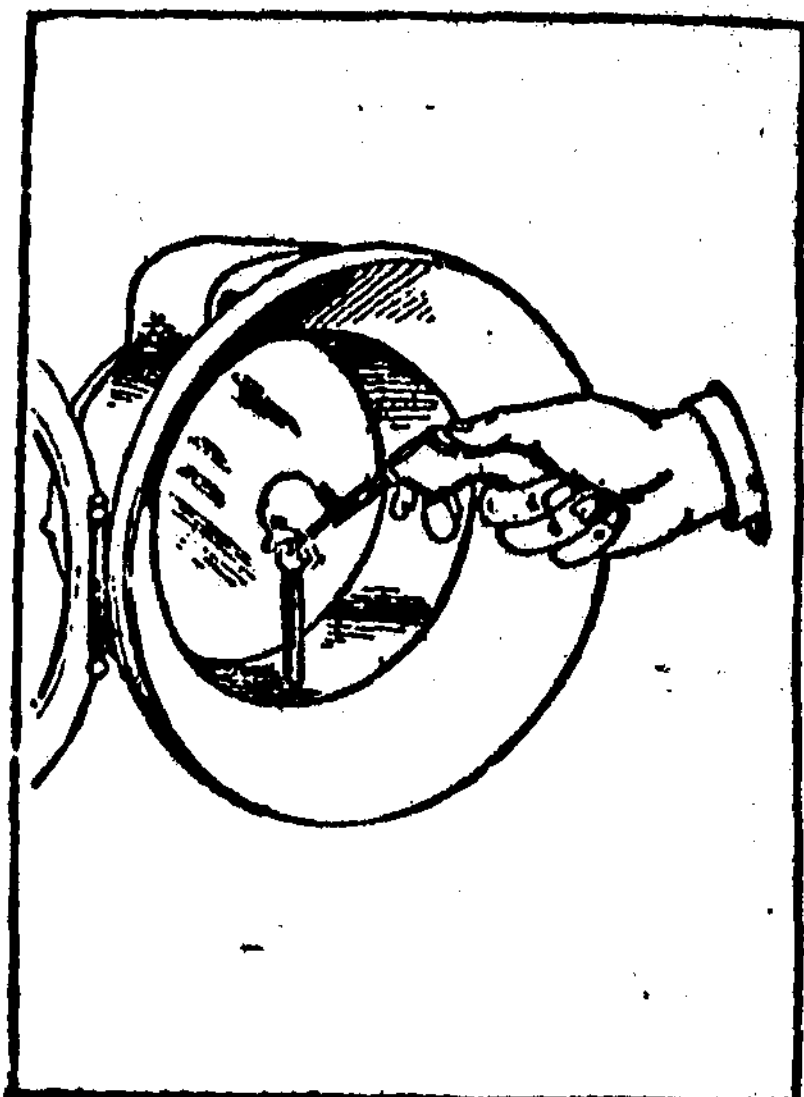
# SCIENCE AND INVENTION



## SMALL PISTOL LIGHTS GAS

When Trigger is Pulled Rod of Flint Emerges and Sparks Fly—Won't Burn Woodwork.

An invention so spectacular in nature as to seem almost a trick is the pistol-lighter devised by a New Jersey man. By pulling the trigger of this pistol a series of sparks fly out of the muzzle and ignite the gas from wall jet, kitchen range or au-



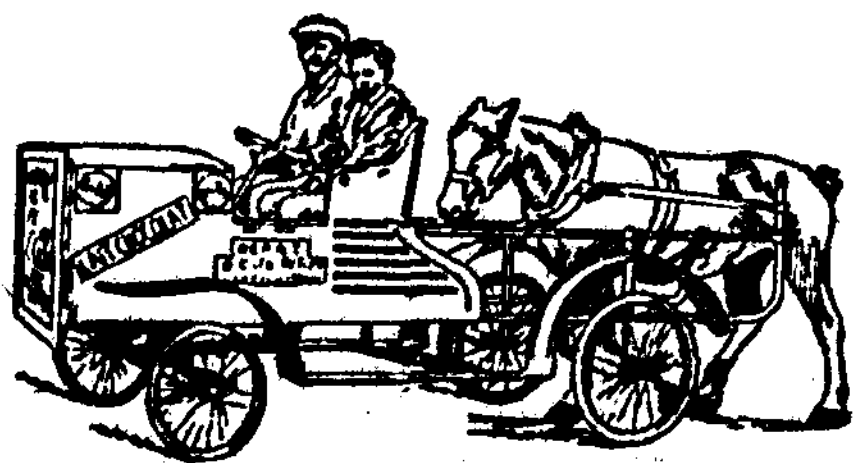
New Gas Lighter.

tomobile lamp, as the case may be. In the barrel of the pistol is a rod of flint. Penetrating the barrel near the open end is a steel cap. The pulling of the trigger shoots the flint forth as it scratches beneath the steel a shower of sparks shoot out that have power to ignite gas, but die so quickly that they would not burn woodwork or hangings or ignite anything less inflammable than gas. By pressing the plunger in front of the trigger the pistol is reloaded for another charge. As the sparks grow fewer by use of the implement the steel cap can be screwed tighter and the flint turned to offer a fresh surface to it. Matches are not needed with this weapon in the house.

## DELIVERY CART IS UNIQUE

Horse-Propelled Vehicle Familiar on Streets of Paris—In Reality Advertising Scheme.

This unique delivery vehicle, now familiar on the streets of Paris, is apparently composed of everything that goes to make up an automobile, with the exception of the motive power, and because of this exception the

## Photographs of Lightning.

In photographs of lightning, streaks of "black lightning" are often seen branching out from the main white flash, and people have long wondered what these were. It is now found, says the Scientific American, that they are due to the over-exposure of the photographic plate and the "reversal" of the negative into a positive.

## ALARM CLOCK THAT SPEAKS

Tells Hours, Half Hours and Quarters and Calls You in Time for Breakfast in Morning.

And now it is the talking clock—a timepiece that actually calls out the hours, half hours and quarters, day and night, unless shut off, and will tell you the time to the minute any hour of the night if you press a little button at your bedside, an exchange says.

The works of this remarkable clock actuate a stout belt which runs over a roll connected with a sounding box.

Upon this belt, or rather film, the hours, which have been recorded by a phonograph, are impressed by galvanization on a copper plate.

The mechanism which moves the hands is connected with the speaking device, and this with a funnel which re-enforces the sound and projects it outward through a finely grated opening attached to the narrow side of the clock.

At night a touch on a lever reduces the clock to silence. But if one wakes and wishes to know the hour without striking a light, an easily found button is pressed and the clock immediately states the time.

The speech film is practically indestructible and occupies very little space since, because of its elasticity, it may be wound upon a very small roller.

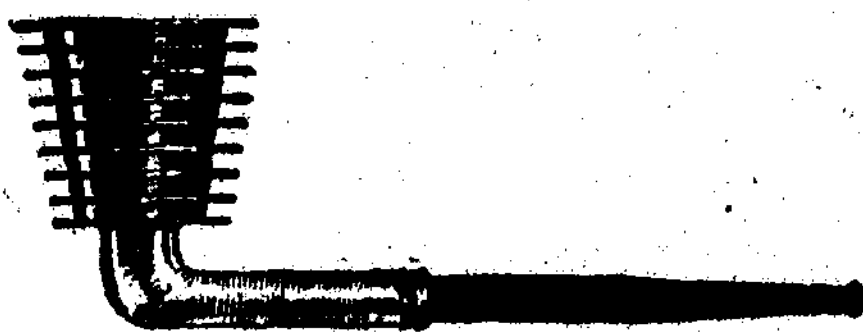
There is another new kind of alarm clock on the market. It talks, but more for the purpose of making you get out of bed in the morning than to simply give you the time. Suppose, for instance, you want to be called at 6 o'clock. You set the clock with its phonograph attachment for 6 o'clock. Then you go to bed.

At 6 o'clock in the morning the clock starts the phonograph and you are awakened by a voice yelling, "Get up; get up. Time to get up. Breakfast is waiting. You have hardly time to catch your train. Get up. Hurry, now, etc."

## ALUMINUM AIR-COOLED PIPE

Worked on Same Principle as Motorcycle and Aeroplane Engines—Heat is Radiated.

The curious pipe shown in this illustration is made of aluminum and is air-cooled in the same manner as mo-

torcycle and aeroplane engines. The series of rings around the bowl radiate heat on the same principle as those on the above mentioned gasoline engine.

## Motor for Powder Factory.

A special type of motor has been built for a British powder factory, in which precautions have been taken to render the motor flame-proof and explosion-proof. The motor case is very strongly built, so that it will stand explosion of dust or gases which might find their way into it. The joints of the motor case are packed with hemp rope dipped in tar, this being considered more durable than rubber at high temperatures. The bearings are also specially packed to prevent the escape of hot gas in case of explosion within the motor. No ventilation for the interior of the motor is provided, but the casing is formed with corrugations which furnish a large cooling surface.

## Study Internal Organs.

A French scientist has combined the moving picture camera and X-ray apparatus into an instrument by which the processes of internal organs may be studied, and has given it the name of bioroentgenograph.

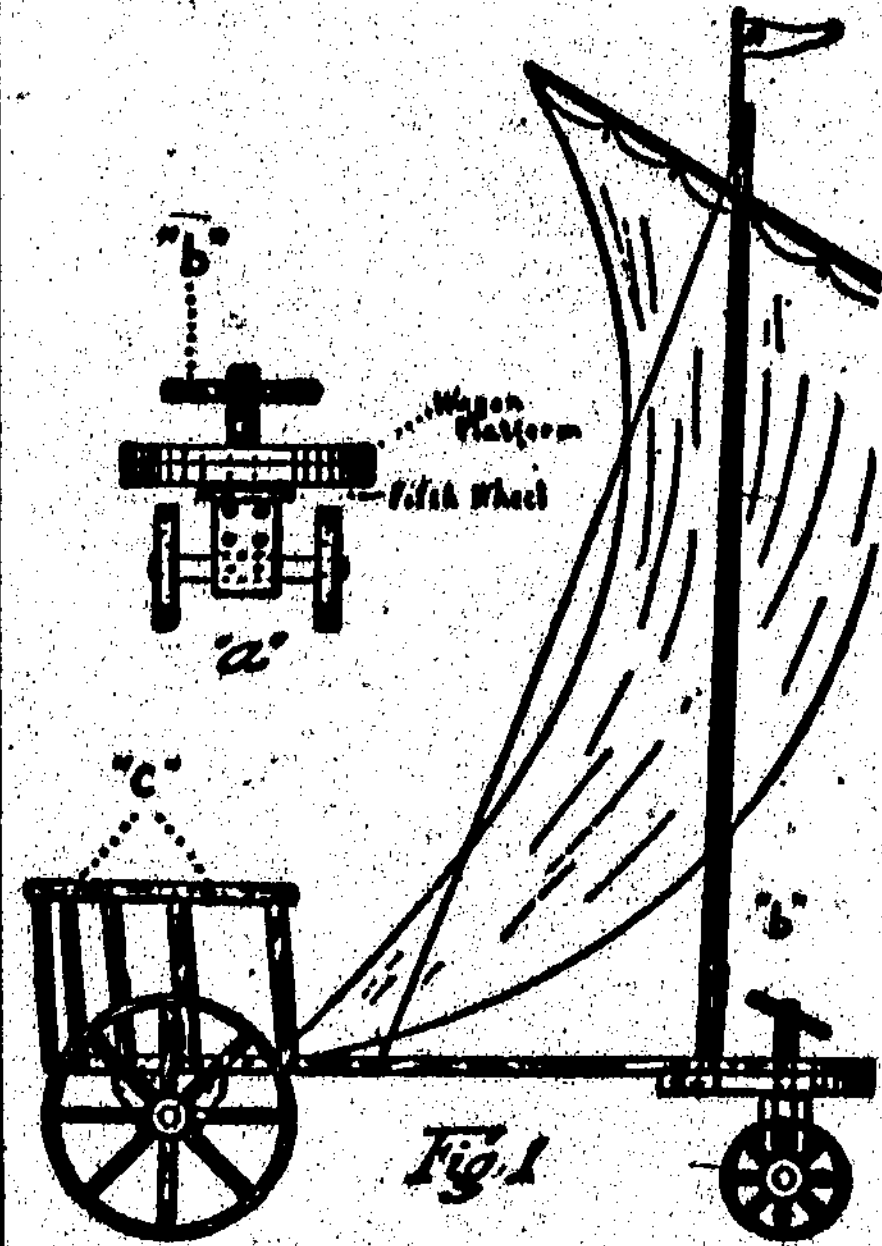

## HOW TO MAKE A SAIL WAGON

Does Not Take Average Boy Long to Arrange One to Suit Himself—General Description.

In Fig. 1 the sail wagon is shown complete with an end view at "a" showing the steering arrangement. A board about 3 feet, 6 inches in length, by 18 inches across and about one-half or three-quarters inch thick, is cut into a shape something like an ironing board, narrower at one end than at the other. A one-inch piece



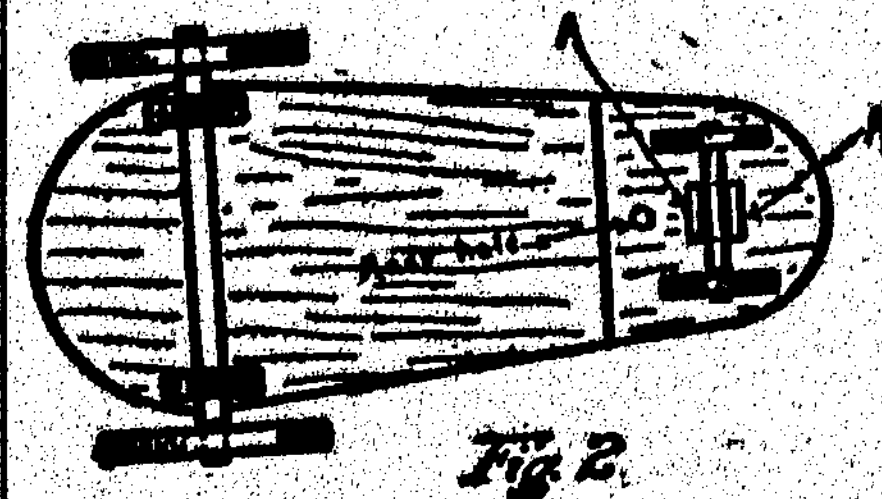
of board is secured to the front end to give strength for the mast and steering gear.

One pair of large wheels and one pair of small ones must be procured or made as described further on. The large wheels and axle can be secured to the bottom board by means of two blocks of wood as shown in Fig. 1 and Fig. 2, the latter being a view of the under side of the wagon.

The two small wheels must be rigged up a little differently. A board about the same thickness as the axle is shaped at one end into a round handle, which should fit loosely into a bored hole in the front end of the wagon. The broad end of this board rests on the axle, and is bolted to two pieces of board the same width, which come down on the front and rear sides of the axle, and are bolted to it, Fig. 2, A, A. The fifth-wheel bearing is made out of tough wood, and placed so that the steering wheel turns easily (Fig. "a") A round stick is put through the stern of the piece, to press the feet against when steering (Fig. 1 "b").

Some boys make a rail (Fig. 1, "c") around the end, that they sit on.

The mast can be made from a round stick about 4 feet, 6 inches long. A broom handle will do for the cross

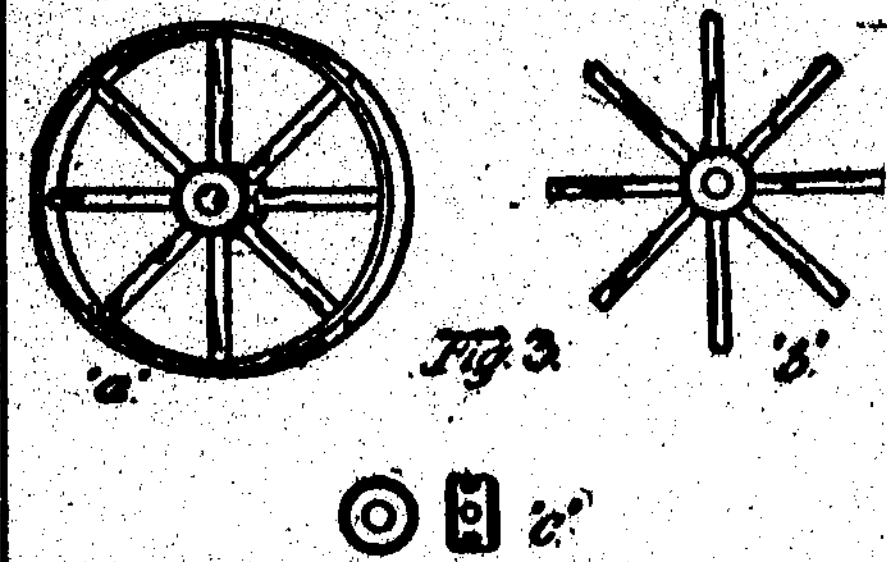


arm, to which the sail is attached. The sail should be so arranged that it can be very quickly lowered should the wind get the best of the wagon.

Should it be found inconvenient readily to procure a set of discarded baby buggy or express wagon wheels, they can easily be made by an in-

genious boy as shown in Fig. 3. A hub is made from a round block of wood, as shown at "c," and round sticks, cut from light curtain poles or broom handles, made into spokes as at "b," care being taken to get them all the same length. The rim is made from barrel hoops, although some boys make them of thin wood, well soaked in warm water and bent into shape. A nail or screw is put through the rim at each spoke, as shown at "a," the completed wheel.

While this is a general description of a sail wagon, it does not take the



average boy long to make one to suit himself out of almost any old thing he is sure to find about the place. It is interesting to notice the many and different designs of wagons and sails when once the craze is started. Smooth roads, an open space and plenty of wind is all that is necessary for a successful sail-wagon race.

## AIR CUSHIONS AID SWIMMER

Apparatus Designed by German Master Enables Person to Move About in Water Freely.

The swimming apparatus designed by a German swimming master is both for trained swimmers and those ignorant of the art. When out of use, this apparatus is readily carried in the pocket, says the Popular Mechanics. It consists of two oblong air cushions, each subdivided into five compartments which are connected together by transversal straps. Before putting on the apparatus, which consists of thin caoutchouc lined with a dense fabric, it is inflated through a valve, within a few seconds, by a few strong breaths.

Being arranged on both sides of the body, the apparatus leaves the head

and neck perfectly free, thus doing away with any pendulating motions characteristic of most salvage apparatus. The person equipped with the apparatus moves about in the water with remarkable safety and stability. A special advantage of the apparatus is its allowing the swimmer at will to take up a vertical or horizontal position, thus enabling him to remain in the water for hours without fatigue.
