3000 FOR W. C. McDONALD Remainder Democratic State Ticket Probably Elected.

Practically complete returns from every county in the state up to noon Saturday (the News waiting 24 hours for late reports) show W. C. McDonald, democrat, for governor to have a majority of 3,323 over H. O. Bursum, his republican opponent. The remainder of the democratic state ticket is somewhat behind the gubernatorial candidate, with the race for attorney general being very close. The legislature, which will elect two United States senators, appears to be republican on joint ballot. Many members of both house are elected by less than a dozen votes. 

KEEPING THE CEREAL FRESH

Try Putting Packages, Once Opened, Above Kitchen Range or on the Radiator.

Autumn now finds us with no lack of variety in the matter of cereals that can be eaten without further cooking after they leave the factory, but they are alike in one detail, if in no other. The package once opened they quickly grow flabby and tasteless and tough, unless restored by careful drying in the oven for a few minutes. One way out there is. Keep your packages on the shelf above the kitchen range or on a radiator. The contents will remain crisp and delicious and be truly "ready to serve" without risk of that scorching in the oven which always happens when we forget for only a moment.

By the way, the sudden emergency that finds us looking for bread or cracker crumbs for dipping cutlets or croquettes, only to find the jar empty, will lose its sharpness if we have a box of cusp "flakes" of any sort. These, crumbled between the hands, make a most delicate substitute for bread or cracker crumbs, be the need one for coating food that is to be fried or for the top of scallops and pates. For the latter use don't forget to dot liberally with butter. They are especially tempting with creamed fish or sweetbreads when served in scallop

if your supply of crumbs for dipping be lindted, instead of putting them in Knicker---We must reduce expenses a dish have them on a sheet of clean brown paper. Each time a chop or cutlet is laid on them to be coated the paper can be lifted at the sides and the crumbs tumbled toward the middia. Moreover, the use of paper for this purpose saves the washing of an extra dish for flouring fish try the same labor saving device, dropping the paper in the fire when it has served its turn.

MAKING ART OF NECESSITY

"New Dish Every Day" Rule Made by Young Housewife, and Strictly Adhered to.

"A new dish every day" was the selfimposed rule of a young wife who found herself in possession of a cozy home and pienty of time. The odd part of the decision was that she never cooked before in her life, but the shining new kitchen was an inspiration she could not resist, much to the delight of her husband and friends She purchased several of the best cook books on the market, preparatory to laying a scientific foundation for her culinary education. She studied ingredients and proportions, and she uaunted newsstands for papersand magazines publishing recipes. In the end she developed into a real wizard of things culinary, and she formed a perfect passion for developing original dainties that would have sent the most blase epicures into an ecstacy of enjoyment. She had discovered that possibilities of food combinations are practically inexhaustible, and so is still pursuing the rule of "something new every day," a rule entailing very little extra work and lots of enjoyment.

Egg Plant Fritters.

Peel the egg plant and cut it into dice. Drop into boiling water to which has been added a teaspoonful of iemon juice; boil until tender, drain and mash. To each pint of pulp allow one-half a cupful of flour, onequarter of a teaspoonful of pepper. one-half of a teaspoonful of sait and two well-beaten eggs. Form into small cakes and fry brown on both sides.

Old-Fashioned Milk Toust.

To one pint of scalded milk add two tablespoons of flour mixed smooth with cold water; stir until thick and add salt and two tablespoons of butter cut in small pieces. Cover toast with sauce and keep warm until soft.



Work Can Be Done More Quickly and Easily Than In the Old-Fashloned Manner.

The darning and mending of bed and table linen, towels, etc., can easily be done on a sewing machine. Several sewing machines have a special attachment to be used for this purpose, but the work can be done without it. When using the machine to darn your linen the edges of the hole should not be trimmed, as the stitching weaves over and under the ragged edges. An embroidery hoop is useful in doing this work, as it spreads the material smoothly and keeps the threads from drawing up and puckering. The cloth should be placed over the hoop wrong side out and the ring turned over when working, so that the material will lie flat under the machine foot and the right side be seen.

A small needle and fine cotton should be used and the tension of the upper and shuttle thread made loose and the stitch made as long as possible. The presser foot should not be lowered, so that the work can be done back and forth without turning the hoop at each row. Starting parallel with the thread of the linen, a row of stitching is made along the edge of the hole of the opposite side. then back to the starting place, sewing across the hole, just as if the material were there. A small space should be left between rows. After the lengthwise rows are finished, the ring should be turned and the crosswise rows put in, running back and forth, so as to have an irregular outline around the edges and bringing the rows of stitching close together.

If the hole is too-large to be covered with machine stitching, a piece cut from an old napkin may be used to mend the cloth. The table cloth is put over the loop in the same way as it would if the cloth were to be darned with stitching, then the piece, which should be out larger than the hole, is basted on the wrong side of the material over the hole, without turning in the edges. The stitching is done back and forth over the raw edges.

Fried Rye Muffins.

Three-quarters cup rye meal, threequarters cup flour, one-half teaspoon soda (mashed fine), one teaspoon cream of tartar, one tablespoon sugar. salt, one egg, one-half cup milk. Mix the dry ingredients thoroughly, beat the egg, add the milk, stir into the dry mixture. Drop by tablespoon into deep hot fat and fry until they will not stick when tried with a fork.

Radish and Olive Salad.

Slice the radishes on a fluted vegetable slicer and cut the olives in strips. Mix, add a French dressing made with four tablespoonfuls of clive oil, a half teaspoonful of vinegar, and garnish with lettuce, cress or the radish crowns.



NEW MEXICO ELECTION

The early returns, reinforced by still later confirmitory returns, show McDonald elected governor of New Mexico by between 4,000 and 5,000, and that the remainder of the democratic-progressive republican state ticket, including the congressmen, is also elected. The legislature is close and it will require the official count to settle the question. Taken all in all it was a grand triumph for progressive principles and a stinging rebuke to gang rule, and such a victory was made possible by the independent republicans who refused to be bound, gagged and delivered by the bosses.

Naturally, with this magnificent victory, there are some sore spats, but the bitter must be accepted with the sweet. In this county some of our noblest men went down to defeat, and in addition we also regret the defeat of that noble gentleman, sterling citizen and excellent lawyer, Judge Hewitt, of White Oaks, whose defeat seems quite certain, notwithstanding he received a handsome majority in his home county and that of Otero. It may require the official count to determine the judicial result, but Judge Hewitt's friends-and they include all parties—believe he is defeated by a small majority.

The full and complete returns tained—of Lincoln county are given on another page, but the official count is to be made by the territorial secretary, and will not be announced for several days. In that table it will be seen that Melvin Franks and W. M. Fer-Homestead Entry Serial 09076, for Lot 4, self guson, for commissioners from the 2d and 3d districts, democrats, are elected easily, while Porfirio Chavez, democratic candidate for sheriff, although opposed by a republican, a socialist and an independent, has been elected by a plurality of over 200. A. H. Norton, the democratic candidate for probate judge, is shown, by the unofficial returns, to have lost to other medicine so good for whoophis opponent, Doroteo Lucero, by 4 votes. Other county candidates Francis Turpin, Junction City, on the republican ticket appear to be elected from 11 to 75 majority. The victory was grand and sale by all dealers. inspiring, but lacked the local leaven to make it altogether joyous.





is diminishing in Tuberculosis amount the world over, and it is predicted that in 25 or 30 years it will have quite disappeared. This doctrine was announced by John Burns, the labor leader in parliament, and if his philosophy and fact agree, we all have reason to rejoice. There is to be another consideration added to this, which is, that the same improveed living that reduces tuberculosis will reduce our social and political maladies as well. If bad habits make disease, they also make bad thoughts. We are so accustomed in all these things, to hitch the cart before the horse, that we insist on improving our institutions without uplifting private life and habit.

While a rather low percentage of hits was attained with the 14-inch gun, which is to be the offensive weapon of the new battleships, New York and Texas, it is claimed that one wellplaced shot from this terribly powerful piece of ordnance will fatally disable or destroy any fighting ship now affoat. And the effective range of the gun in nine miles. A battleship thus armed would put its antagonist out of action before it got in range of the other battery. Why, then, are the naval constructors thinking of placing larger guns on future American battleships? The 14-inch gun is superior to any now mounted in any of the navies of the world, and one should imagine that the best would be good enough.

Nobody wants to stop cold storage. That has come to stay, and, fairly conducted, it is a benefit to the public. Nobody wants to prevent cold storage from affording reasonable returns to those who carry it on. Unless there is money in a business no one will want to follow it. There are two objections to the manner in which the cold storage business is operating in the United States at the present time. One is that it is creating artificial scarcity and exacting unreasonable profits. The other is that it is ignoring the hygienic welfare of the consumers. Cold storage will continue but its abuses must be stopped.

ECONOMY IN COOKING

PROPER USE OF THE LEFTOVERS MEANS MUCH.

Really There Should Be Little or No Waste in the Well-Conducted Kitchen-Some Ideas of Worth.

It takes thought as well as time to handle leftovers to the best advantage, but nothing proves more tempting than a savory rechauffe, says Fannie Merritt Farmer in the Woman's Home Companion. The prudent use of leftovers involves a considerable saving, and if the housewife is careful there is little need of waste.

Cold Roast Beef.—Try slicing it very thin and arrange the slices overlapping one another on a platter. Pour over a French dressing, to which has been added a little chopped green pepper; then surround with crisp lettuce leaves and garnish with parsley, stoned olives and curled celery. Curled celery makes a most attractive garnish to many dishes. Cut thick stalks of celery in three-inch pieces. With a sharp knife, beginning at outside of stalks, make five cuts parallel to each other, extending one-third the length of pieces. Make six cuts at right angles to cuts already made. Treat other ends in the same manner. Put pieces in ice water and let stand for an hour or more, when celery will curl back and be very crisp.

Beef Casserole—Cut roast beef or cold broiled steak in one-inch cubes. Put two cupfuls in a casserole dish and add one cupful of brown gravy or sauce, one-fourth cupful of celery, cut in small pieces, one-third cupful of carrots, cut in small cubes, one-half onion, thinly sliced, one-half cupful of canned tomatoes, one-half teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce, and salt and pepper to taste. Cover and cook in a slow oven one hour. Add onehalf cupful of canned pear and twothirds cupful of one-half-inch potato cubes, which have been parboiled in boiling salted water, to cover five minutes. Again cover and cook 30 minutes, or until potatoes are soft. Send to table in casserole dish.

For Savory Fish-Separate cold, cooked fish into flakes; there should be one cupful. Cut a two-inch cube of sleep left me and I passed long nights fat salt pork in very small cubes, try out and drain. To two tablespoonfuls of the fat add two tablespoonfuls of flour and stir until well blended; then pour on gradually, while stirring constantly, one cupful of rich milk. Bring to the boiling point and add fish, two and 11/2 cupfuls of hot boiled potato um. cubes. Season, and serve very hot.

Baked-Bean Soup-Put three cupfuls of cold baked beans, three pints of cold water, two slices of onion and two stalks of celery, cut in pieces, in life. a saucepan. Bring to the boiling point and let simmer 30 minutes; then rub through a sieve. Add 11/2 cupfuls of stewed and strained tomatoes, and one tablespoonful of chili sauce. Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter, and two tablespoonfuls of flour, low. and stir until well blended, then pour on gradually, while stirring constantly, the hot liquid. Bring to the boiling point, season and serve.

Salad Pyramids.

About one pound of cold new potatoes, one pound cooked beef, one cucumber, a little grated horseradish and some salad dressing. With a round cutter cut out equal-sized rounds of the potato, beet and cucumber, the slices to be about one eighth of an inch thick. Arrange-these in alternative layers in mounds or pyramids; the top layer should be rather smaller rounds. Put a heap of very finely chopped grated horseradish on the top of each. Arrange the pyramids in a bowl and pour the salad dressing are genuine, true, and full of humans round.

HEALTH AS AN INVESTMENT

Fraternal Orders, Labor Unions and insurance Companies Erect Tuberculosis Sanitoria.

As an investment in the health of their members, four large fraternal orders, two international labor unions and one of the largest insurance companies in the United States have eslished sanitoria for the treatment of tuberculosis, according to a statement issued by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis. The Royal League, the first fraternal order to establish a sanatorium, conducts a hospital for its tuberculosis members at Black Mountain. The Modern Woodmen of America conduct one at Colorado Springs; the Workmen's Circle, one at Idberty, N. Y., and the Independent Order of Foresters have one at Rainbow Lake, N. Y., and will soon open a second one at San Francisco, Cal. The International Typographical union has since 1898 conducted a sanatorium at Colorado Springs, and the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union of America has recently opened a new institution at Rogersville, Tenn. A leading life insurance company is now erecting a sanatorium at Mt. McGregor, N. Y., which will be the first of its kind established by an "old line" insurance company.



INVALID FEEDING THE

MATTER OF MUCH IMPORTANCE IN THE SICK ROOM.

Foo Frequently Insufficient Attention le Paid to This by the Nurse-Serve Food in the Daintlest Style.

Few things are more difficult than to get a sick person to take nourishing food, and no task, as a rule, is worse managed. Amateur nurses may be successful in other matters, but they generally make a failure of the food proposition.

The nurse is usually to blame when the patient will not take enough food She will bring a huge plateful of jelly or a big basinful of beef tea to bim, and he will reject it with disgust, because the sight of so much food is distasteful. If she brought a few spoonfuls at a time and served them laintily he would be glad to eat.

Give little food at a time, and give it otten. That which is eaten willingly and with relish is far better than double the amount swallowed with disgust.

If a time is fixed for the patient's meals, always be punctual. If kept waiting, most sick people lose their desire to eat and will reject the food when it is brought to them,

Be careful never to have food in the sick room in the hope that the patient may est it presently. This will prevent him from taking any food at all.

Never take a large quantity of anything at one time, thinking that because the patient had liked it before he will like it again. In nine cases out of ten a sick person's appetite is capricious. His food, therefore, should be varied as much as possible.

Don't rely too much on beef tea. It. is a useful stimulant, but it is not really nourishing, as most people suppose it to be.

Be particularly careful to serve everything in the daintlest style. Glass should be bright, silver burnished, napkins lily white and saucers free from slops. These little details will make all the difference in the patient's appetite.

Always make sure that the patient is placed in a comfortable position to est and drink and be careful that no crumbs are left in the bed.

The practice of putting dishes in the oven to warm them for the table is a bad one. The dry heat causes the enamel to crack in time and then the grease soon penetrates them, to their utter ruination. Put the dishes to be heated in a dishpan and pour boiling water over them. Let them stand and steam until ready to serve the meal, then wips with a clean, dry towel.

Rabbit Salmi.

Place two rabbits in a baking pan, add one slice of onion, one stalk of colory chopped fine and one bay leaf; brush the game with melted butter, then cook for thirty minutes. Lift the meat from the pan; add to the pan two tablespoons of butter and the same of flour and brown until dark; add one cup sherry and one cup hot water, stir well, and when smooth add one teaspoon salt, one tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, one tablespoon of capers and twelve olives. Lay the rabbits again in the pan, cover closely and simmer for thirty minutes. Dish the game, arrange the olives for a garnish, strain the sauce over the mest, sprinkle on finely chopped parsley and serve (Rabbits should be cut as for fricas-200.)

Cover for Ironing Board.

Instead of using a sheet on the ironing board, make a fitted slip of unbienched muclin or of the material used for flour sacks. Leave the slip open at each end and have it large enough to be easily drawn on or off.-Housekeeper.

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
