### Shooting Scrape in Arizona.

News came from Morrystown, Arizona, Monday night of a desperate battle there on the 8th, in which some old friends and former citizens of Lincoln county were participants. The information came in the form of a letter from Guy H. Herbert to Wm. S. Bourne, and, while lacking in some details, enough was said to show the gravity of the situation.

The statement was made that Victor Thyler, a man who was here the past summer and became the owner of the Burrell House, was killed and Ernest Burrell was in the hospital with three bullet wounds in his body, and that he was in a precarious condition. J. B. Burrell and Arthur Burrell, respectively father and brother of the wounded man, were arrested as accomplices, but the letter stated they would have no difficulty in being released.

The cause of the difficulty and the responsibility for it were not stated in the letter. All the persons involved were interested in a mine there, and the supposition here is that the trouble grew out of the mining operations. The Burrells left this county during the past year; they were among our best citizens and have many friends who sympathize with them in their trouble.

## THE BRIDE'S TROUSSEAU.

And now it is the bride-elect's turn. The public has been very lenient with her, but will be so no more. The dressmakers are at the bottom of it, says the Boston Globe. They have put the stamp of their disapproval on all brides of plutocrats of the first-class who do not spend more than \$1,000 on a trousseau. And a trousseau is what? It's French. It means a "bunch." It may be a bunch of keys, of asparagus, a kit of workman's tools, or a bunch of spinach. But to dressmakers it means a bunch of clothes—to wit, a bride's wedding outfit. The idea of a bride of a multimillionaire spending only \$1,000 on a bunch of garments, when her husband would give up more than that for automobile tires in one month! The seven tailors of Tooley street, London, got laughed at because they prepared a petition in which they memorialized parliament "in the name of the people of England." That was a joke. But it's no joke when you offend the dressmakers. Discretion bids all brides obey their decrees! To offend them is to bring down on your head imprecations of sartorial wrath. All other questions are cast into the shade by the anathemas of the modistes. A bride who should chew gum under the wedding bell might be forgiven; but to get married in only \$1,000 worth of dry goods, that is too much. It is unforgivable.

A very interesting experiment has been undertaken by Australia and New Zealand—an experiment which is likely to attract attention from all parts of the world, and which very probably will be widely followed if it turns out successful, as in all human probability it will. All boys from their twelfth year are required to be enrolled for military drill and instruction. In New Zealand the enrollment became compulsory last July. There is to be no release except for physical disability. Australia is not yet so drastic as New Zealand, but if moral suasion fails to bring about a complete enrolment of Australian boys resort will be had to more compulsory expedients. There is a growing feeling in all Australasia that Great Britain, if help were needed to repel foreign invasion, could hardly be depended upon, at least at the outset. So Australasians are preparing to defend themselves in the contingency of invasion.

It is not a little astonishing to learn that Shakspearean plays have taken a firm hold on the Japanese. There have been many enthusiastic students of the plays in Japan, and a number of them have attempted adaptations into their own language and their presentation upon the Japanese stage. Quite singularly, "Timon" was the first play presented. Then came "Othello" and the "Merchant of Venice." The court scene in the latter was particularly popular. They are now hard at work on "Hamlet." They claim that the atmosphere of Shakspeare is more harmonious to the conditions at present in Japan than among the western people.

## WITHOUT ONIONS OR SAGE

Something New in Combinations for Poultry Dressing—Summer Savory is Preferred.

Into a colander break up about one quart bread crumbs, using bread that is a day or more old. Hold colander under faucet, let water run on crumbs just long enough to wet each little piece. Now shake water from colander, hang it up or place in another convenient dish to drip almost dry. Turn crumbs into mixing bowl and with large mixing spoon break each piece as small as possible. Season with salt, pepper, summer savory, tasting as each is added. Now get very small piece of salt pork, run it through the meat cutter or scrape with sharp edge of knife. Mix it well. Add now a well-beaten egg and a pinch of baking soda, and a finely-chopped onion may be added. Personally, I don't like onion in poultry dressing, neither do I like sage. Summer savory, to my mind, is preferable. I like cold water for wetting crumbs, as hot water has a tendency to make the dressing mushy; neither do I like mixing the dressing with the hands. I find the use of a large mixing spoon most satisfactory. Butter may be used in place of pork, but the pork gives a nice flavor or taste, and must be finely minced before adding. —Boston Globe.



Two measuring cups kept in the kitchen will save rinsing out one a great many times. Keep one cup for dry ingredients, the other for liquids. Have both the same size.

To take the leather stains out of light colored hose add a tablespoon of borax to the water in which they are washed. This quantity is sufficient for only one or two pair.

To keep the hands from getting black when peeling apples use a silver knife instead of a steel one. The acid of the fruit (acetic acid) acts on the iron in the steel, but does not affect the silver.

Different uses for small scrubbing brushes may be indicated by burning the name on the back, as "vegetables," "pans," "hands," etc. Then there will be no risk of using the wrong brush.

To remove whitewash from floors, furniture and windows apply a small quantity of paraffin on a soft cloth. The stains will disappear completely and the paraffin does not injure the most delicate paint.

### The Flavor of Corn.

Some cooks think that the flavor of corn on the cob is better preserved if it is boiled in its thin inner husks. The can be turned back to remove the silk and then pushed over the ears again. Tie with a string made from a husk and put them in cold salted water. Let it come to a boil gradually and boil for four or five minutes. Corn is injured by long boiling; the exact time usually depends on the corn. Country housekeepers who own vegetable gardens and can cook very tender young ears as soon as they are plucked, do not let them boil at all. They put them over the fire in cold water and take them up when the water has begun to break out in bubbles in the center of the pot. They are delicious.

### Lobster a La Newberg.

One large lobster, one tablespoon butter, one gill of sherry, three eggs, half pint cream; take the nicest part of the lobster, cut in small slices, put in chafing dish with butter, season well with pepper and salt, a pinch of cayenne; pour the wine over it; cook ten minutes; add the beaten yolks of eggs and the cream; let all come to a boil and serve immediately.

**FOR AFTERNOON TEA SERVICE**

**Dainty Articles That Are Appropriate—Acceptable Wedding Gift for Summer Bride.**

One of the newer forms for afternoon tea service is a squat cream jug and sugar bowl of rock crystal set in a silver frame with arched handle to make passing easy.

Another useful article is a cake lifter of silver. This is on the order of ice tongs, but the one prong is flat instead of forked.

A convenient tea strainer has a silver bowl and handle, and rests on a rock crystal, silver-rimmed dish to prevent dripping on the cloth.

For tea on the lawn the wicker tables on wheels are light and convenient. They are provided with double trays and can be filled and pushed to any part of the grounds.

Tea trays for porch service are of dark green wicker rims with base of cretonne or rare old brocade covered with glass. The handles on each end are substantial enough for hard use.

Long-handled iced teaspoons make an acceptable wedding gift for the summer bride, as they will be in constant use for lunch and afternoon tea. Those with hollowed tubes through which the tea can be sipped like a straw are more novel than practical, as they are open to suspicion from a sanitary standpoint.

**FOR SUCCESS WITH POTATOES**

**Happy-Go-Lucky Cooking Will Not Do—Care in Preparation Is Well Repaid.**

Soak old potatoes in water. Change the water while cooking, if strong.

Never allow potatoes to stand in the sun.

Always pour off the water as soon as done and remove the cover to allow the steam to escape.

Potatoes cooked in their jackets should be pierced to allow the steam to escape.

Baked potatoes should be rolled in a cloth till skins burst. This prevents the potatoes from cooking too long, which makes them sticky and soggy.

Potatoes should be simmered (not boiled). It is a waste of fuel and spoils the potatoes. Too rapid boiling makes them a solid paste which is both unpalatable and indigestible.

Cook potatoes with the skins on as often as possible. Potatoes are delicious cooked in their jackets, peeled and mashed.

Potatoes may be kept warm a long time without spoiling, if the skins are broken and the kettle well ventilated.

**Kitchen Dresser.**

If your kitchen table is spotted with grease, or if the dresser has dabs and spots of grease on it, you can clean the woodwork perfectly by scrubbing it vigorously with hot water to which a teaspoonful of whiting has been added.

Wipe thoroughly dry with a clean cloth and the wood will be as good as new.

When tables or dressers are covered with white oilcloth provide yourself with thick mats of cardboard or asbestos on which to set hot plates, for heat will surely ruin any oilcloth with which it comes directly in contact.

**Haddock and Tomatoes.**

One medium sized dried haddock, one ounce of butter, one onion, three large tomatoes, pepper. Remove all the flesh from the haddock, taking care to remove the bones also. Peel and slice the onion, thinly, and slice the tomatoes. Melt the butter in a saucepan, put in the onion, and fry it a pale brown, then add the sliced tomatoes and cook it slowly for 15 minutes. Now add the fish and pepper to taste. Stir the mixture over the fire for a few minutes, then pile it up in a hot dish, sprinkle over a little chopped parsley, and serve it very hot.

### Democrats Sweep Arizona.

The expected happened--the democrats swept Arizona in Tuesday's battle of the ballots, winning every candidate on the state ticket, electing over three-fourths of the legislature, and, in addition, the advisory vote on United States senators gives that party two representatives in the upper house of congress. The majorities range from 1,000 to 3,500, out of a total vote of 26,000. The democrats secured a majority in ten of the thirteen counties. The amendment to the constitution, eliminating the recall, as a condition precedent to admission, was adopted by an overwhelming vote.

The victory was not only democratic, but it was progressive, a large number of republicans supporting the democratic candidates. The democratic platform and its candidates stood for progressive ideas, while the republicans were on the conservative order. The result was that, eliminating all personal equations, the progressive republicans in Arizona, like those in New Mexico, and throughout the country, voted their sentiments.

### Canvass to be Completed Soon.

The canvass of the election, held on the 7th of November, has been slow and, in a measure, unproductive of information. There never was any doubt about the election of the governor and some of the other state officials, but the candidates for the supreme court are so near together that that contest has absorbed all attention. Fifteen counties had been canvassed by the board

last night, the canvass by counties proceeding in alphabetical order, Rio Arriba being the fifteenth. The canvass on these offices in the fifteen counties show the following:

Hanna (progressive) 18385  
Burkhart (democrat) 18210

Dunn (democrat) 18235  
Roberts (republican) 15382  
Parker (republican) 15362  
Wright (republican) 15326  
The other eleven counties gave republican majorities, and the unofficial figures from the eleven counties indicate the

election of two republicans, Roberts and Parker, and the progressive, Hanna. In the fifteen counties the democrats have made gains, and the vote is so close that it is impossible to name the winners until the last county is completed.

**New State Keeps Bureau Busy.**  
Albuquerque, New Mexico.

December 12, 1911.

One of the most beneficial results of the completion of the New Mexico state government in the way of publicity is indicated in the large number of requests now coming into the Bureau of Immigration offices here for data, photographs, etc. having to do with the natural resources and industrial development of the new state. These requests are coming from all parts of the United States, from newspapers, news syndicates, journalists and special writers, who have found opportunity for placing articles about the state. During the past week one of the largest of the Washington news syndicates, furnishing a daily letter to more than 60 of the largest newspapers in the eastern and southern states sent a member of its staff of special writers to New Mexico to prepare a series of five articles on the state. Each one of these articles will have an immediate circulation of more than two million, through the newspapers served by this syndicate, and each one will be extensively copied, thus forming an advertisement of the highest class, and one that is without count or cost to the state. The nature of the articles now being prepared is most satisfactory. They are to deal strictly with the resources and development of the state. Not a word will be said of the "sand and cactus" dope of other days. There will be no "bad man" stories.

The character of the articles to be sent out by this syndicate is typical of the data requested by other news sources throughout the country. It would appear from the number and nature of these requests that the day for featuring "The bad man with the gun" and the sand and sago brush, with New Mexico as the background, is about over, and that with the actual completion of statehood, New Mexico is to receive a large volume of the kind of advertising to which its resources entitle it. The most satisfactory indication, however, is that there is a popular demand for information about the new state, and that the kind of information wanted is along agricultural and industrial lines.

Some months ago the Bureau of Immigration sent to large numbers of the managers of the more important newspapers in the eastern states a request that more attention be given to the resources and opportunities in New Mexico; that the "bad man" cartoons be discarded and that the new state be given a square deal. The results of this request are beginning to ap-

pear. The summary of the last annual report of Governor Mills was printed by nearly all of the larger newspapers of the country and a number of them featured the report, giving it marked attention not only in the news, but in the editorial columns. Reliable information about New Mexico is in demand, indicating a general desire throughout the country to know about the New State.

## ABOUT FARM COOKING

### REASONS WHY IT TOO OFTEN IS NOT OF THE BEST.

#### Women Not Given Proper Chance to Do Good Work—Conditions Such That Wholesome, Nutritious Meals Are Impossible.

We believe that more dyspeptics are every year produced on the farm—counting equal numbers—than in the cities, and this belief is based on many years of observation and considerable actual experience.

The reverse would naturally seem to be true, as the farm cook has a great advantage over her sister in the city in the matter of raw materials—fruits, vegetables, butter, milk and poultry, being always at hand in abundance and fresh and wholesome in condition.

With these advantages it may be the charge then is due to ignorance or carelessness or both of the women folk on the farm. But this is not always true.

The fact is that the men, who by the way are the severest critics, are themselves to blame. They do not give their wives half a chance to do good cooking. On thousands of prosperous farms the housewife never has sufficient time to do her work well; she is not provided with the proper facilities. Her kitchen is provided with nothing more than the barest necessities and she is deprived of such aids as hot and cold water, quick fuel and an abundance of cooking utensils and tableware.

She is not only the cook but the mainspring of the whole family. She is doctor, nurse, counselor and friend; beside the cares of maternity she often milks the cows, makes the butter, hoes the garden and makes new clothing for her husband and children, mends the old, sweeps and dusts, gathers her own vegetables and fruit and prepares them for cooking.

She is expected to make no excuses when the meals for the family, large or small, are not ready and on the table to the minute.

Naturally, under these conditions, which exist on thousands of farms, and they are not overdrawn, no woman, no matter how good a cook she may be, can properly prepare and cook wholesome and nutritious food.

If the farm cooking is to be improved the men must supply their wives with everything needed in the kitchen and pantry. They must supply them with help, at least until the children are old enough to assist.

The wife must insist upon having what she needs to work with and she must abandon the work of the dairy, garden and the poultry to the men folk. She can teach her children, either boys or girls, to be of great assistance in her daily tasks. She can so regulate her work hours that she will have time in which to do good cooking. But, she cannot do these things alone; she must have the active and sympathetic assistance of her husband, and if he refuses to give her these, the family must be abandoned to dyspepsia and its attendant miseries.—Exchange.

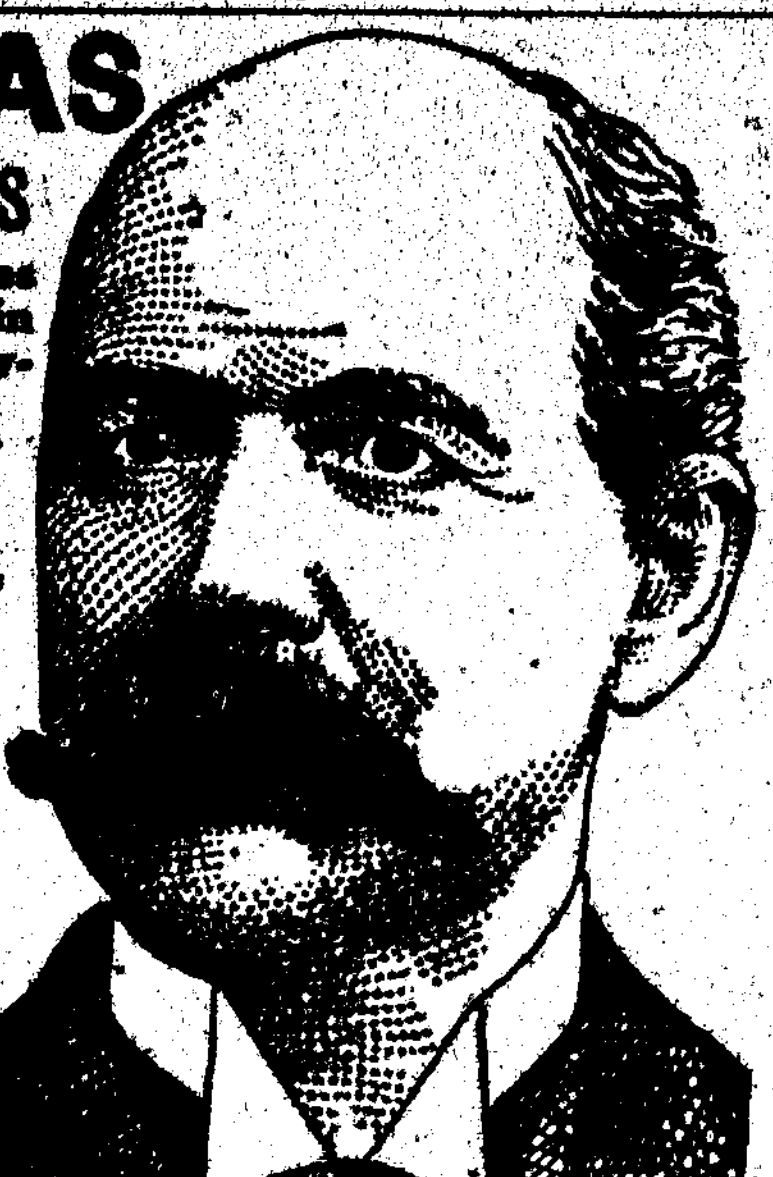

## FOR SALAD COURSE

### SOME NEW IDEAS AS TO COMPOSITION AND SERVICE.

Mixture Now Frequently Is Eaten at the Beginning of Dinner—Pineapple One of the Best for the Digestion.

They are serving salads with a difference. A salad nowadays is very frequently eaten at the beginning of dinner and voted a digestive second to none.

Of all fruits pineapple is of the greatest value to the dyspeptic and contains the most delicate acid. The following recipe for a pineapple salad will be found an excellent one, and it is, moreover, a very pretty dish to serve at the beginning of luncheon or dinner:

Pineapple in Lettuce Nests—Cut a pineapple into small pieces. Add one cupful of finely chopped celery, one cupful of walnut meats and one cupful of orange pulp. Shred one head of lettuce very finely and form into nests on individual plates.

Mix one cupful of mayonnaise and stir it lightly with the pineapple, etc.; add more mayonnaise if the fruit is not sufficiently moist, and heap into the little lettuce nests. Decorate with chopped walnuts.

Salade a La Versailles—Boil six artichokes, separate the "fonds" from the leaves and cut into small pieces. Put in a salad bowl with an equal quantity of asparagus points that have been cooked in salted water. Take a handful of salted almonds, chop them fine, pound them with the juice of two lemons and half a pint of cream, salt and pepper, and pour over the salad. A little mayonnaise may be added to the salad, but it is more delicate in flavor without it.

With cold chicken nothing is more excellent than a salad of carrots, cucumbers, and hard boiled eggs, all cut in rings and sent to table with this dressing: Two tablespoonfuls of olive oil with one of lemon juice, with salt, pepper and a speck of sugar to taste.

Mushroom Salad—Remove the skin and almost all the stalk from some button mushrooms, drop them into boiling salted water and cook for three minutes.

Lay them on a napkin and when quite cold sprinkle them with pepper and salt and finely chopped parsley. Lay on a dish and pour over two tablespoonfuls of oil to one of tarragon vinegar.

Shrimp Salad a La Bretagne—Shell a quart of boiled shrimps and lay them on young lettuce leaves in a salad bowl. Chill some mayonnaise sauce on ice, pour over the shrimps and serve.

Tongue Salad—Mix together and put in a fine dredger a small quantity each of celery, salt, red pepper and black pepper, white sugar and allspice. Take some thin slices of Russian tongue, squeeze a little lemon juice over the pieces and lightly dredge with the above mixture.

Shave up some white onions and celery and put them in the salad bowl with a few white lettuce hearts. Add the tongue next, then pour several spoonfuls of oil over the whole with a dash of vinegar. Serve at once.

### Serving Potatoes.

A delicious way of serving potatoes is the following: Boil and mash 12 medium sized white potatoes, using one tablespoonful of butter instead of milk. When they are nearly cold add the yolks of three eggs, one teaspoonful of grated nutmeg, and six drops of onion juice. Stir these ingredients together until they are smooth. Make up into small cone shaped croquettes and stand away to harden. When they are firm roll them in the beaten white of the eggs and cracker dust and fry in deep boiling fat until a light brown.
