Quo Warranto Not Complete.

The pleadings in the quo warranto proceedings, which had the effect of bringing the county seat case again before the court, were not completed on behalf of the Lincoln people in the time stipulated by law. Having failed to do so, the attorneys for Carrizozo have prepared an application, asking for a judgment—in effect, calling for a dismissal of the quo warranto—and have filed same with Judge Wright, of this district.

While not attempting to anticipate the final action of the court, still we are permitted to outline the process. The usual course will be for the court to fix a date for the hearing, quite probably in the very near future, at which time the application will be argued. If the court sustains the motion the suit will be dismissed and the injunction dissolved. Time, the great adjuster, will tell the tale, and "everything comes to him who waits"—so it is said.

Little Fighting in Mexico.

War is generally to be regretted, and yet it must be confessed that when one is in progress people are disappointed if they are denied the privilege of reading the details of a bloody and sanguinary conflict. And this is the result of the little stir in Mexico. For weeks the world was on the qui vive, daily expecting the capture of Juarez or a deadly combat between the federals and the insurrectos. Neither happened; though the insurgents were all around Juarez and federal troops were marching to the relief of the city.

At last accounts the insurrectos, like the Arab, had folded their tents and silently stole away. The relief column of federals, under the command of Navarra, marched into the city of Juarez unmolested and the siege was raised. Just why the insurrectos failed to attack Juarez when the city appeared to be at their mercy, and still more perplexing, why they allowed the relief column to reach Juarez without striking a blow is a mystery.

A great majority of the people of this country are in sympathy with the insurrectionists, and a number of Americans have joined

the insurrecto army; but the masterly inactivity of the insurrectos, and their failure to strike a decisive blow have somewhat dampened the ardor of Americans and caused them to almost lose faith in the revolution. Little interest is manifested on this side of the border in the small skirmishes reported from the interior, and unless the insurrectos produce better generals and show more fighting qualities dispatches from the seat of war will occupy less important positions in the papers.

Crossed Over the River.
Milten Read died at Mesa, Arizona, on the 9th of this month, from pneumonia, aged 67 years. He is survived by a wife and seven children, six of whom were present at the funeral.

Three sons went from Capitan, William, Monroe and Leslie, but their father died before they reached his bedside.

The deceased was born in Arkansas, moved to Texas when quite young; enlisted in the con-

federate army when a mere lad and followed the Stars and Bars until the flag was forever furled. He came to New Mexico with his family in 1897, and settled in Lincoln county near Capitan, in 1900. Went to Arizona last fall.

Mr. Read was regarded as one of our best citizens; strong but just in his opinions; of unquestioned integrity and firm convictions. He has gone to join his comrades, and, in silence, "crossed the river to rest under the shade of the trees."

LESSONS FROM THE CENSUS.

State lines do not coincide with natural divisions, and the census might be made to tell interesting stories that may lie concealed, if figures were massed according to other divisions. That the population of Iowa has declined by 7,000 in the past decade is remarkable enough; but a more striking result appears when a geographical, rather than a political, area is considered. Bounded by the Mississippi on the east, the Missouri on the south, the Missouri and the Big Sioux on the west, and the southern boundary of Minnesota on the north, is an area of 78,000 square miles, or nearly one-third larger than all New England. It comprises the entire state of Iowa and the northernmost 44 counties of Missouri. There is probably no other portion of the United States of equal extent which contains a larger proportion of good farming land. The last decade has been one of exceptional prosperity—yet in this entire region there now live 100,000 fewer people than resided there ten years ago, says the New York Evening Post. Outside the cities of more than 25,000 inhabitants, the decrease in population since 1900 has been upward of 140,000. This is a kind of story that the boldest prophet would not have ventured to predict as a possibility a quarter of a century ago, and is well worth the careful attention of political students today.

Until now the ancient mariner's compass, which has been used by navigators for centuries, has been considered a fixed quantity. It is, therefore, interesting to learn that an improved compass is being tested by the navy department on board the scout cruiser Birmingham. The new compass is combined with a rapidly revolving gyroscope, which eliminates all variation and deviation of the needle of the compass. This, according to navigators, will make the art of navigation much easier and remove the uncertainty of a ship's location due to variation and deviation of the compass. Another advantage of the improved compass is that the main instrument can be placed in the interior of the ship, where it can be protected by armor plate. Branch compass stations can be placed in different parts of the ship, connected by an electric wire to the main compass. So far the reports on the new compass have been satisfactory.

In the report for September of the department of labor on industrial accidents Consul A. G. Seyfert of Owen Sound notes the statement that more persons were killed and injured in Canada on the farm than on the railroads. Twenty-two persons were killed and 35 seriously injured while engaged in farm work, while railroads only killed 15 and seriously injured 13 who were in the railway service. The main cause of the many fatalities on the farm was the deadly threshing machine. The total number of accidents to working people for the month was 272, of which 91 were fatal and 181 serious injuries.



MASSEUR THAT IS AUTOMATIC

Large Leather Knobs Turned by Revolving Wheel Knead Stomach in Way to Stimulate Blood.

There is no longer any necessity for paying an expensive Swedish rough house artist several dollars every time you want a massage. A machine has been invented which, it is claimed, will do the work just as well and cheaper in the long run. This machine is fastened to an upright, which in turn is fastened to a platform, so walls need not be marred. A wheel with large leather covered knobs on the ends of its spokes project a foot or so, and this is revolved by turning two handles. The patient, or subject, stands in front of the wheel with his abdomen just touching the wheel which, by the way, can be adjusted to a height to suit the user. He then turns the handles, and the wheel revolves, the balls passing over his stomach and kneading it

In a way to stimulate the circulation of the blood and impart a healthy action to the liver and other organs. Another use for this device is for the reduction of adipose tissue and the consequent reducing of a too generous waist-line.

Sex in Handwriting.

That it is possible to determine sex from handwriting in perhaps eighty out of one hundred is a conclusion reached by Miss June E. Downey from an examination of the writing of 200 persons. The specimens were submitted to two "professional graphologists," as well as to fifteen persons ignorant of their art. The so-called sex signs are found to be largely influenced by the amount of writing done, by age and to a certain extent by practise, and by professional requirements, as in the conventional writing of teachers and the rapid hand of bookkeepers.

Famous English Clock.

The famous clock of Hampton Court palace, England, is said by many superstitious people to stop when a person long a resident in the castle dies. The first instance recorded is that of Anne of Denmark, queen of James I. The clock, which was striking four at the moment, immediately stopped. Other instances are cited.

New Fly Trap.

A Californian has taken advantage of the fact that flies always walk up a window by inventing a trap to be fastened to a pane in such a manner that a fly will enter it without being aware that it has left the surface of the glass.

ODD FACTS OF NORTH POLE

All Meridians Meet and Every Direction is South—It is Always Noon as Time Vanishes.

At the north pole all meridians meet and every direction is south. So the fixed meridian upon which the determination of longitude and time depends is lacking, and it is necessary to assume an arbitrary direction as the meridian. A parallel of latitude is reduced to a single point and longitude entirely vanishes. Time also vanishes, for it is always local noon. All winds blowing over the pole blow from the south and also toward the south at the same time. The magnetic needle points due south. The stars do not rise and set, but describe a circle around the horizon.

The north star is not directly overhead, but describes a circle four and one half times as broad as the sun's face. If a man should walk westward on a parallel of latitude three and one-half miles from the pole at the rate of one mile an hour, he would be traveling east at the same velocity with which that part of the earth is going west. So he would not be moving at all, but would be treading the earth under his feet in the same way that a dog walks on a rolling barrel.

The auroras shed their mysterious radiance over the long polar nights. The phenomena of auroras extend through a zone the center of which is near the magnetic pole, but the maximum effect is observed at a considerable distance from this pole. Inside this belt of maximum effect auroras are seen to radiate from points both north and south of the zenith, but at places outside the belt they stream only from the north.

There appears to be an intimate relation between the distribution of auroras and that of barometric pressure in the polar regions. To science the discovery of the pole is of great importance. A knowledge of the ocean depth, winds and temperature at the pole are of the greatest value in geography and meteorology.

PADDED SUIT FOR AVIATORS

Safety Jacket and Headpiece Among Latest Devices Invented for Protection of Airmen.

Among the many devices for the protection of aviators in case of fall exhibited at the recent international congress of Aerial leagues at Boulogne was a padded jacket and headpiece, says Popular Mechanics. The headpiece protects the head, neck and lower part of the face, only leaving the eyes and nose exposed.

In the tests, the inventor of the jacket hurled himself head first, against a rough stone in one of the

city's walls and suffered no harm from the impact. The outfit, however, is very cumbersome, as the padding of the jacket and headpiece is six inches thick.

Another interesting device brought forward was a parachute which will open fully after a fall of 30 feet. The old-style parachutes required a fall of several hundred feet before opening. The possibilities of the new parachute were personally demonstrated by the inventor, who dropped from an elevation 30 feet high with it.

FOOD VALUE OF MILK

CONTAINS MATERIALS WHICH CHILDREN NEED FOR GROWTH.

One Quart of Cow's Milk Supplies Practically as Much Protein and Energy as Three-Quarters of Pound of Beef.

It is a commonplace saying that milk, or, to be more specific, cow's milk, is a perfect food. This may be taken to mean that it contains, first, materials which children need for growth; second, material which young and old alike need for the repair of their bodily machinery; and, third, materials which both need for fuel, i. e., to provide with heat and with the energy necessary for work. It should not be understood, however, to mean that it has these ingredients in such proportions that it can serve satisfactorily as an exclusive food for a grown person or even for a child. Though it is the best substitute for mother's milk, it must be "modified" more or less before it can be used even for infant feeding with good results.

It is likewise a commonplace saying that milk is a cheap as well as a nutritious food. Just at present, with prices of all kinds of foods rapidly changing, it is not so easy as it once was to make the comparisons that are necessary to show which particular foods are really cheap, but while the prices of food materials vary, the composition of most of them remains unchanged, and it is always possible to compare their nutritive values. A quart of milk supplies practically as much of both protein and energy as three-quarters of a pound of beef of average composition or eight average eggs, and can generally be bought for less money. In case milk is eight cents a quart, beef 20 cents a pound, and eggs 24 cents a dozen, ten cents spent for milk will buy a little more protein and much more energy than ten cents spent for beef or ten cents spent for eggs. Thus, while other animal foods than milk (meat, eggs and cheese) are desirable to give variety to the diet it may be assumed that milk may be used as an economical substitute for any one of them.

Of the vegetable foods, many (flour, for example) are found to be much cheaper than milk, when both price and nutritive value are taken into consideration, and, as a matter of fact, they always form the greater part of the bulk of human food; but of the animal foods which are usually combined with the vegetable foods, milk is one of the cheapest.

In spite of the fact that milk is recognized as a nutritious and a cheap food, there seems to be a general tendency to think of it not as a possible substitute for other more expensive foods, but rather as an addition to the bill of fare. To illustrate, milk is frequently used as a beverage without the reduction of the amount of meat or other proteid foods served. From the point of view of the need of the body, this may be considered extravagant and the serving of a glass of milk or of a bowlful of soup or of such desserts as custards and baked milk, or the use of generous quantities of milk or white sauce on vegetables, offers an opportunity to cut down the allowance of meats and eggs.—Caroline L. Hunt.

Genesee Chocolates.

As the college girls are doing it: Boil for five minutes a cupful and a half of granulated sugar, half a cupful of milk, a teaspoonful of butter and two squares of chocolate. Then take from the fire, flavor with vanilla, stand the pan containing the syrup in a pan of cold water and work in four or five tablespoonfuls of confectioners' sugar, molding the mass with the hands into balls. When the balls are cold dip them one by one into melted chocolate and drain on wax paper. The mixture should be of as creamy a consistency as will allow it to be molded.

WHEN ARE WE TO GET STATEHOOD?

The people of New Mexico adopted a constitution almost a month ago, and yet we are more at sea as to the date we are actually to reach that goal than when the constitution was adopted. Many believed that, when the constitution was adopted, statehood would immediately follow, and that belief, which was preached from every housetop, had the effect of producing a very heavy vote for the constitution. That we would be admitted in the spring and that we would have an election in the early summer was announced from every public forum in the territory. There were others who warned the enthusiasts that our admission at this session of congress was very doubtful; in fact, out of the question, unless congress, by joint resolution, upon the recommendation of the president, took affirmative action. We make no claim to membership in the latter class—our opposition to the instrument was simply because it didn't meet the requirements.

Now practically everybody, including those who asserted that we would be admitted at this session, confess that there is no hope at this session without a joint resolution by congress. This statement is merely made for information, not that it is in accord with the eternal fitness of things. For, when the will of the people, overwhelmingly expressed as it was on the 21st of January, demanded a state government, it is not just that a long delay should ensue; and the interval between the adoption of the constitution and the complete enjoyment of statehood should be as short as possible.

There are a number of snags in the way of immediate admission, however, and chief among them is that congress will adjourn on the 4th of March—just fifteen days from this date. Our national body is busy with what it considers weightier matters and the members are also engaged in playing a little politics; and the chances are that congress will devote little time to the consideration of New Mexico's case. Still another serious impediment is that Arizona has just adopted a constitution, also, and the question is can she get before congress ere that body adjourns? If she does not, and it hardly seems

likely that she will, there are many members who will insist that both territories should come in at the same time.

So, without some extraordinary action, with ginger as the principal element in it, there is little reason to expect statehood in the near future.

Bernalillo county is to the fore with a full-sized war in the republican ranks. The committee of the county met, so they claim, fired the old chairman and elected a new one, the latter bearing the Hubbell brand. The old chairman called the remainder of the committee together, denied the authority of the other portion of the committee to oust him, called for a vindication and got it—in a set of resolutions bitterly denouncing the Hubbell wing. The old chairman was, or is, Colonel Gillenwater, and the new chairman is Judge E. A. Mann, formerly judge of this district.

President Taft is trying to convince congress that a reciprocity treaty with Canada is the proper thing at this session. While there is very bitter opposition to the plan from the old line leaders of the republican party in both houses, it is believed the proposition will go through. The threat of an extra session, which those same leaders fear will have a salutary effect in bringing about an agreement. The people demand a reduction in the high cost of living and the president believes a reciprocity treaty with Canada will produce the desired results.

The people of Arizona, on the 9th, adopted their constitution by a tremendous majority—about three to one. The principal opposition came from those who were opposed to direct legislation, and yet those features were more heartily supported than anything in the constitution. Many assert that the president and congress will turn the instrument down, but that remains to be seen. At any rate, the people of Arizona voiced their sentiments in the preparation and adoption of their constitution and as they are the ones to live under it, they are the best judges of what they want.





IT'S FOR REMOVING BUTTONS

Grooved Guard Guides Scissors and Protects the Cloth from the Blades.

A unique pair of scissors, designed expressly for the removal of buttons, has been invented by an Indiana man. Its chief feature is a guard device which, besides guiding the button, protects the cloth from being cut. In appearance the implement resembles an ordinary pair of scissors except that attached to one end of the blades is the grooved guard. The operation



is apparent at a glance. The groove receives the button and sliding between it and the garment it is attached to, protects the latter while the threads are snipped through, at the same time raising the button to facilitate this. With this implement all the buttons can be removed from a coat without any danger to the latter in the same time it would take to remove one by the old method, which required a careful cutting of the threads to avoid getting a piece of the cloth between the scissors' blades. Tailors and seamstresses will appreciate the time thus saved.

DAINTY CHAFING DISH LUNCH

Menu by Inventive College Girls Gives Hint for Impromptu Meal.

Here is the simple but delicious menu served by a party of seven girls in a New England college recently, as a relief from the monotonous Sunday night supper. It was cooked in a chafing dish and might well be used as an impromptu luncheon.

First came little pork sausages, cooked until they fell to pieces for very toothsome. With these went dried beef and peanut butter, both served as sandwiches, between two crackers, little sweet pickles and pickled onions.

Then appeared large apples, scraped out till only a thin shell remained, filled with chopped apple and walnuts, and covered with salad dressing.

Finally, chocolate, with two marshmallows dropped in each cup, and home—or rather college—made cakes and fudge completed the meal.

Some of the dishes are, of course, out of season, but substitutes are easily found. For the sausage one might have eggs baked or shirred, both of which are easily prepared in a chafing dish. For the apples a good substitute is tomatoes prepared in the same fashion, chopped with green peppers, topped with an olive and served in a lettuce leaf.

Rose Petal Pillows.

One lady says that she makes rose petal pillows successfully by simply placing the rose petals in the sun and air for a few hours with common salt. When they are quite dry she places them in the pillow of thin swiss or silk and they remain fragrant indefinitely. 

DISHES THAT WILL APPEAL TO JADED APPETITES.

Corn Oysters is New Dish That Makes an Agreeable Change—Chicken Souffle and Potato Croquettes in Latest Style.

Corn Oysters.—Half of a can of corn put through a chopper and mixed with two beaten eggs, two tablespoonfuls of milk, one tablespoonful of melted butter, a high seasoning of salt and pepper, one teaspoonful of baking powder, and sufficient flour to make a thick batter. This is dropped by small spoonfuls in a pan containing a little hot fat, and fried brown; from the flavor the little fritters are frequently called corn oysters.

Chicken Souffle.—One cup cold cooked chicken, three eggs, one tablespoon chopped parsley, three tablespoons each butter and flour, one and one-half cups stock or milk, salt, pepper, and grated lemon rind. Make a foundation sauce by blending the butter and flour, then adding the stock or milk and stirring until the mixture boils. Cook two minutes, season and cool. Add yolks of eggs, meat, parsley, and lemon rind, and last of all the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Bake in a steady oven forty minutes, and serve with a mushroom sauce.

Potato Croquettes.—Two cups of cold mashed potatoes, two eggs beaten to a froth, two tablespoons of cream, one tablespoon of chopped parsley, one teaspoon of onion juice, two teaspoons of melted butter, one teaspoon of salt, a grating of nutmeg and a dash of cayenne. Beat the eggs lightly and add them to the potatoes, then add all the other ingredients, mix and turn into a small saucepan, stir over the fire until the mixture leaves the sides of the pan; take from the fire and when the mixture is cool form into croquettes shaped like cylinders. Roll in beaten egg and then in bread crumbs, fry in hot fat until of a light golden brown color.

TO RETAIN FLAVOR IN MEAT

Escape of Extractives May Be Hindered by Searing Surface of Meat Quickly.

The amount of the extractives which will be brought out into the water when meat is boiled depends upon the size of the pieces into which the meat is cut and on the length of time they are soaked in cold water before being heated. A good way to hinder the escape of the flavoring matter is to sear the surface of the meat quickly by heating it in fat, or the same end may be attained by plunging it into boiling water. Such facts are known to all cooks and have recently been studied systematically at the Illinois experiment station in relation to the amounts removed and the losses which may be involved in different methods of cookery. Such solubility is taken advantage of in making beef tea at home and in the manufacture of meat extract, the extracted material being finally concentrated by evaporating the water.

Salmon Salad.

One pint of cooked salmon, one head of crisp lettuce, one small spoonful of lemon juice, one tablespoonful and a half of vinegar, two of capers, one teaspoonful of salt, a seasoning of pepper, one cupful of French dressing. Break up the salmon with two silver forks, add to it the salt, pepper, vinegar and lemon juice; put in the refrigerator for two or three hours. Break the lettuce leaves apart and throw them into a pan of cold water, rinse; lay them in a salad bowl, the largest leaves first; put the next size upon them; then lay the small white ones; on top heap the salmon; lightly cover with the capers.

Safford, Traveling Auditor of the Territory of New Mexico, do hereby certify, that the County Treasurer of Lincoln County, in said territory, during the year ending December 31st. 1910, collected and remitted to the Territorial Treasurer the sum of \$26,880.69, same being the proceeds of the Territorial Levy of Eleven Mills for said year, and as provided in section 1, Chapter 60 laws of 1905, extended on a 15-1/2 mill basis, would amount to \$37,877.19.

I therefore declare said county to be a county of Class "A" for the purpose of fixing salaries of County Commissioners, Probate Judges and Probate Clerks for the year 1911.
