## Greer and Two Officers Killed.

The body of Johnnie Greer, who was killed by the sheriff of Luna county and posse last week, arrived here Wednesday night, and was conveyed to the old hom on the Bonito for interment. Greer and two others were surrounded by the sheriff and his posse in a ranch house owned by the V cross T outfit, known as the adobe building, located near the Mogollon mountains in Socorro county. The three, finding they were surrounded, left the house, mounted their horses and, according to the dispatches, the battle began, in which Greer and two of the posse were killed. Substitute the name of Johnnie Greer for that of the one mentioned as unknown, but who was afterwards identified as Greer and his body shipped home, and the following thrilling story by the press furnishes interesting reading:

Engle, N. M., Nov. 21. - Sheriff Stephens, of Luna county, with one of his posse, W. C. Simpson, arrived in this city early this morning with the dead bodies of Tom Hall and Al Smithers, both members of the posse, and the dead body of one of the outlaws whose name is unknown, but who Sheriff Stephens recognized as the leader of the men, and who, on the night of November 7th, in Deming, held up Sheriff Stephens and the jailer, and liberated from the jail John Gates.

Sheriff Stevens, with his posse, have been in pursuit of the outlaws day and night since the 8th. While riding close to the VXT ranch, 85 miles from Engle, and near a house known as Adobe house on the VXT ranch, the posse discovered the three outlaws in the house eating.

The posse surrounded the house and as soon as they were discovered by the outlaws, the outlaws mounted their horses and rode directly toward the posse. The posse told them to surrender. The outlaws suddenly fell from their horses and opened fire upon the posse. Only a few shots were fired before Tom Hall and Smithers fell, dead. Hall was shot through the head and Smithers was shot through the body.

Sheriff Stephens, who was on the other side of the house, came running toward the men and opened fire on the outlaws, killing the leader whose name so far is unknown.

The posse's as well as the outlaws' horses stampeded and left all in the open, fighting to the death. Gates and his confederate managed to get into a water

trench and kept up the firing. It was about four hundred yards up this trench that Posseman Simpson opened fire on him, and he was seen to fall into the ditch.

Only three of the posse in the fight were left; Stephens, Simpson and Johnnie James. They were unable to follow the two remaining outlaws on account of darkness, so they gathered up their dead.

Early Saturday morning the three remaining possemen started out again after the two outlaws and went to where Gates was seen to fall and found where he had dragged himself some three or four hundred yards. There they lost his trail and the outlaws got into the mountains.

While the posse was gathering up the dead, one outlaw fired at them from the mountain and came within a few inches of killing Simpson. The posse was unable to locate where the shot was from.

Sheriff Stephens is satisfied that both outlaws are wounded. The dead outlaw had in his possession the pistol and keys for the Deming jail that he took from the jailer. The outlaws were riding horses from the VXT ranch and had entered the ranch house and appropriated everything they wanted.

Deputy Simpson, accompanied by another posse, are now hot on the trail of the two escaping outlaws, and it is thought they will be easily overtaken, as one of them appeared to be mortally wounded.

In addition to the above vivid description, the press has been full of the exploits of Greer and his associates, crediting them with numerous deeds of violence.

In fact, nearly every deed of violence, having taken place in four counties during the past year is placed at Greer's door. As to the truth of these charges we are unable to say; but it has been currently reported, and generally that Greer had been on the dodge in and out of this county for a number of months, and officers were on his trail.

Be all that as it may, the deceased came from a respectable family in this county, and married a daughter of an equally good family. His father and mother Mr. and Mrs. G. B. Greer, reside on the Bonito, and have long been residents of Lincoln county. His wife is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Corn, also of Bonito. By blood and marriage the dead man was related to many of the best people of the county, and the nature of his death is a distinctive shock.

## WORK NOW A SCIENCE

HOUSEKEEPING TODAY A VERY DEFINITE OCCUPATION.

Sanitary Conditions and the Care of the Home Must Be Thoroughly Understood—Systematic Cleaning Up Most Desirable.

When a woman enters into the housekeeping business she takes upon herself grave responsibilities, and it becomes her duty to inform herself on all subjects that pertain to her chosen work. We must understand sanitary conditions both in and outside of the house. We must know how to keep everything, from family to premises, in the best condition, with the least work and worry possible. We must keep pace with household improvements and inventions, and be able to select the best for our own special use. It is our business to see that all leaks, which lead to extravagance and loss of health are closed permanently, for "sanitation and economy are twin sisters." Our protection from dirt, disease and insects is a hygienic matter that science demands today, and this is afforded more through a study of little than large things.

Cleanliness should be scattered through the year, instead of making a mountain of it at stated seasons. Even if a neighbor does sniff suspiciously when we say we clean every week instead of twice a year, we should have the courage not to yield our position, nor feel conscience stricken, if our home is tranquil and serene during the upheaval that affects others. Frequent cleaning is economical, in that one expends less strength and expense than if the dirt has accumulated and less hard rubbing and digging into house and furniture is required. It helps us to repair a break when found at once, and a cent spent in time saves dollars.

Let there be daily inspection, ventilation and sun bathing of every room. Do not tolerate cracks in floors, baseboards, walls or any place where pests may lodge. Old newspapers, soaked in a tub of water for a few days, boiled to a soft pulp, mixed with half a pound of glue to a gallon of pulp, squeezed dry while hot, then applied to the cracks, will easily and neatly fill them. After this has hardened a good paint filler, and a coat or two of stain, paint or varnish, will give you utmost satisfaction.

When sweeping keep the dust "down," and let a current of air blow through the room. Sweep with the draught, and broom and air will soon rid the room of dust. Wipe the furniture with an oiled cloth. Be sure on part of the house is damp. A dry cellar is an absolute necessity. If the building stands in a low place, have a ditch a few feet from the foundation, slope and fill with broken stone and gravel; top with dirt. Apply waterproof preparation or paint to the inside, that the dampness may not ascend.

Let the housekeeper, when planning the running of her establishment, consider, first, the house healthful; second, the house comfortable; third, the house convenient; the rest will take care of itself. Nothing, positively nothing, should be planned for display, the predominant thought being to outstrip one's friends, for an attitude of this kind is unsanitation of the mind.—Alta Heath.

### Hot Water Gingerbread.

Eaten warm, with whipped cream, is makes a nice dessert for a change. One-half cup lard, 2/3 cup with hot water, one-third cup sugar, fill cup with molasses, one teaspoon ginger, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, one-quarter teaspoon cloves, one teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoon salt, sifted with two cups flour. Last of all add one unbeaten egg to the mixture. Beat all together and bake until cake leaves side of pan.

### Maine Blueberries.

Washington county's blueberry crop has netted this year a revenue of more than \$1,000,000, according to State Horticulturist Albert K. Gardner of Rockland. This industry was started but a few years ago in that county and the yield this year is the largest yet obtained there. One grower realized \$75 from a few bushels which he set out in his orchard as a "side issue." A man near Cherryfield is said to have raked blueberries from the vines just as cranberries are gathered. It is stated that fabulous prices are paid for rental of blueberry lands and blueberry factories and the canning factories are still running.—Kennebec Journal.



CHENILLE POPULAR FOR FALL HAT TRIMMING.

Plumes, Pompons, Tassels and Rosettes Fashioned by the Clever Trimmer—"Rat-Tail" is the Prettiest and Best.

Fringes of all descriptions, and especially those of chenille, appear on the new fall hats as a trimming. The cleverness of trimmers has fashioned them into plumes, pompons, cockades, tassels and rosettes, and they are used about the crowns as a finish. The "rat-tail" fringe of chenille, like that shown in the pictures, is the prettiest and best liked. Narrow, flat, silk fringes are used to cover crowns (and sometimes entire shapes), laid row after row over a silk foundation. Rat-tail fringes are shown in silver and gilt fabrics, and merit a better name than that given them, for they are elegant, giving a hint of splendor in millinery. The tinsel fringes are more sparingly used than those of silk or chenille.

The conical crown is made on a rice-net foundation and is therefore shapely but not hard, or rigid in outline. A band of white chenille fringe finished with a plume of the fringe made on a wire stem complete the model. ### Customary Congratulations Lacking.

It has been almost three weeks since the election, and yet the public press has published nothing of a congratulatory nature from H. O. Bursum, the defeated candidate for governor, to his successful rival, W. C. McDonald. Many have wondered why such a message had not been sent from the vanquished to the victor; or if the victor had received such a message, why it had not been given to the general public.

Therefore, in order to secure the facts, we, yesterday, called up Governor-elect McDonald and asked him if he had received the congratulations of Mr. Bursum, his late opponent. Mr. McDonald replied in the negative, stating that he had received neither a telegram nor a letter of congratulations; and added that he would gladly have given it to the public if it had been received. We felt confident that Governor-elect McDonald would not have been so far lacking in common courtesy as to withhold congratulations from his late rival; but desired to get a statement from him to give the public.

### Bossism Doomed.

Bossism is doomed in whatever party, in whatever state it shows its head; and this was never more clearly indicated than in the election of the 7th. New Mexico furnishes the most striking example; for, in no section of the Union were the bosses more firmly entrenched than here; and yet the independent voter routed them bag and baggage. The Rocky Mountain News puts it tersely in one sentence: "If the people can win in New Mexico they can win anywhere."

The returns from all sections, thinks the New York World (Ind. Dem.), should go far toward opening the eyes of the bosses and political leaders to the fact that "blind partizanship is going out of fashion at the polls." The most important lesson of the elections, declares the Washington Herald (Ind.), "is that the people will not be dominated by political bosses" and "taken all around," says the Wall Street Journal (Fin.), "the results prove once more that there is a solid basis of good sense under the deceptive surface qualities of the American character."



### Taft—if He Wants It.

For months, we have been hammering at local republicans and assuring them—an assurance they little appreciate, however—that they will have Taft for their nominee for president in 1912, with or without their consent. It is a bitter pill, it must be confessed, for they realize and openly assert that Taft is as weak as skimmed milk. The astute political writer in the Saturday evening Post, Samuel G. Blythe, confirms this view, and in a strong article in this week's Post shows quite conclusively that Taft has a cinch on the nomination—if he wants it. We quote slightly from the article, which is equally interesting to democrats:

Now Mr. Taft may refuse to run. It isn't likely; but he can if he wants to. If he does not—if he demands his renomination—he can get it. That is arranged already. The pins have been set up for months. He will have the southern delegates. He will have Pennsylvania, probably most, if not all, of Ohio, New York and New England; and that is more than enough.

Taft's problem is simpler than the problem of the man who will get the democratic nomination. A republican national convention nominates by a majority of delegates. A democratic national convention nominates only by two thirds of the delegates. Taft has more than a majority of the delegates already in his hands—if he wants them. And he says he does.

Notwithstanding all reports to the contrary, Theodore Roosevelt is just as strong in the west—in the west to which I am referring—as he ever was. If Mr. Roosevelt could be induced to be a candidate he could get the delegates in many of the states referred to. However, Mr. Roosevelt is not a candidate. He has impressed that on his friends out there in every possible way. He has written to them and told them, and insisted they shall write and tell others. Mr. Roosevelt may be a candidate in 1916, but he is not a candidate for 1912—and he wants the entire world to know it. It may be he thinks he couldn't be elected—that no republican can be elected, which is a reasonable wise thought if the democrats have any sense—and does not want to be defeated; or it may be for any other reason. Be it thus or so, the fact is Mr. Roosevelt does not want the nomination and will not take it.

### SOIL CONSERVATION.

In the last decade covered by census reports the average acre devoted to wheat in the United States produced 13.5 bushels a year. Austria, in the same period, produced 17 bushels per acre, France, 19.8, Germany 27.6 and the United Kingdom 32.2. In the same decade our average yield of oats was less than 30 bushels per acre, while Great Britain's was 42 and Germany's 46. For barley the figures are 25 bushels per acre, as compared with 33 for Germany and 34.6 for Great Britain. Comparisons similarly unfavorable to our agricultural progress might be presented at wearisome length, says the Ohio State Journal. Nearly all show that our boasted soil is giving poorer results than the hard-worked farm lands of European countries. It is not the soil's fault. It is because we have neglected the conservation of our soil, just as we have neglected the conservation of our forests and our other natural resources. We have been forever taking something out and putting nothing back. As James J. Hill, who is heart and soul for better farming because he wishes his great granger railroad interests to pay better, says our agriculture is in the condition of a bank whose depositors are steadily drawing out more than they put in.

A dispatch from Carlsbad to the New York World states that American women, as usual, are the queens of fashion at that famous watering place, and proceeds to name a number who are particularly noted for their stylish dresses. The West figures in the list quite as conspicuously as the East. The dispatch states that Carlsbad has been very gay this season and more crowded than it has been in 40 years. Back in 1878 the place was packed to overflowing by 14,000 visitors. Already this season the number of arrivals has exceeded 70,000. Of course accommodations are increased year by year, but they do not keep pace with the rush. From these statistics there is an opportunity to measure the extent to which the wealth of Germany as well as the habit of foreign travel among Americans has grown.

We have a Fourth of July for the purpose of giving the prize fighters an opportunity to demonstrate their usefulness and a Labor day so that the wrestlers may contend upon the field of glory. Memorial day is devoted to automobile and motorcycle races, and Thanksgiving day is sacred to football. The sporting fraternity appears to have overlooked Christmas.

One may get a dispatch around the world now in 16 minutes, and one may make the entire circuit of this little ball in a few hours less than 40 days. One may travel through the air from St. Louis to New York, only making occasional stops for gasoline and repairs. The nineteenth century was wonderful, but the twentieth is young yet, and is already breaking records.

It is said there will be a revolution in woman's styles the coming season. And the rest of the world, which has to look at the fashions as they are displayed in public, will rise in unison and make the welkin ring with the cry: "For this relief, much thanks."



### REAL PRODUCT OF THE COW

Statement as to Amount of Butter Fat Produced Made Instead of Quantity of Butter.

A correspondent asks why we say a cow produced a certain quantity of butter fat instead of butter. He says he wants to know how much butter the cow gave and not how much fat. The amount of butter fat is given because it is the real product of the cow and because it can be accurately determined, whereas the amount of





butter made from a cow's milk is not always an accurate indicator of her production. If the butter-maker leaves 20 per cent. of water in his butter the cow's record will show up much better than if he keeps the water down to 15 per cent. If we give cow's records in terms of butter the amount of moisture in the butter must also be stated, whereas if given in terms of butter fat the record is absolute, and no analysis to determine moisture in butter is necessary. The cow produces butter fat; man makes butter out of it. It is the cow's product and not what somebody makes out of it that should be credited to the cow. But our correspondent wants to know how much butter a cow gives. If the butter is properly made the amount of fat will be about five-sixths of the quantity of butter. Some calculate that the fat is four-fifths of the butter, but butter only 80 per cent. fat cannot be legally sold.—National Stockman and Farmer.

### MILK STOOL WITH A HANDLE

Not So Liable to Be Thrown in Corner or Dropped Behind Cow to Accumulate Dirt.

If a milk stool has no handle on it, one is liable to throw it in the corner or drop it behind the cow, and with this careless treatment it soon gets

very dirty, and from it the dirt is carried on the hands to the teats, from whence it drops into the pail, says a writer in the Farm and Home. The illustration shows how I make my milk stools with a handle on them. It is easy to grab this handle and one is generally careful to set the stool down upon its legs.

### Cooling Milk.

Cooling the milk as soon as it is drawn from the cow will improve its quality and it must be remembered that first class price can be demanded only by a product of high quality.

### NEW TREATMENT OF SCOURS

Mysterious Disease Among Calves Successfully Treated by Prof. Wilson of Canadian College.

A somewhat important step in veterinary medicine has been made by Professor Wilson of the Harper-Adams Agricultural college, says the Canadian Farm. Some farmers in Salop had suffered heavy loss by a mysterious disease among their calves which was so deadly that not one escaped. They showed signs of illness at about two days old and got worse until they died about a week later. The farmer who appealed to the college for assistance had never been able to rear a single calf of his own breeding. Those bought at a fortnight old did quite well. Professor Wilson after post-mortem examinations diagnosed it as a form of septicæmia or blood poisoning, and after an ineffectual attempt to shut out the malignant germs by ligation and disinfection of the naval cords, hit upon the idea of giving lactic acid bacilli in skimmed milk during the first day and gradually introducing the dam's milk but still continuing the lactic acid bacilli until the ninth day, when ordinary rations were reached. This treatment has been singularly successful and not a single calf has been lost since. What is of more general importance, however, is that this treatment is proving effective in the much more prevalent disease, white scours in calves, and the principle may not stop here. Setting bacilli to kill bacilli may yet prove a fundamental principle in animal medicine and it is possible that great developments may arise out of investigations along these lines.

### LIKES GUERNSEY COW BEST

Choice Calves Secured and They Grow Large at Early Age—Corn Silage is Indispensable.

My chief attention in the cattle line is with the Guernsey. The calves run with their mothers until perfectly normal. This gives me choice calves, and they grow large at an early age. The calves are allowed to eat what they

will on sight. After they have reached the proper age they are fed whole corn and wheat bran and all the good hay they will eat. Even on grass I give the calves some grain. I prefer to keep the cattle tied in separate stalls except the cow that calved. These are placed in box stalls. The cows are turned out daily in the winter time. An open shed has been provided, however, so that in rough weather they have good shelter. The cows are fed twice each day, says a writer in an exchange.

I am planning to build a silo very shortly, so as to have silage for future years. I am satisfied that corn silage is indispensable in feeding beef cattle, and that it is one of the most economical means of providing roughage food yet devised.

### Best Way to Sell Butter.

Much the best way to sell butter is to work up a regular route and sell direct to the consumer. This method is now largely followed by a number of our enterprising dairymen. The consumer gets a good article, and the dairyman gets the full value for what he has to sell, and that in cash. The butter milk can nearly always be sold for enough to pay for delivering of the butter. The products from the poultry yard can be sold from the same wagon.





## FOR THOSE FOND OF SALSIFY

Old Recipe That Has Been Popular With European Housewives for Many Years.

Wash and scrape the salsify roots, cut off the extreme joints, stand them up and grate them. Beat three eggs light and stir them gradually into a pint of milk, with sufficient flour to make a stiff batter. Instead of grating the salsify you may cut it into pieces and boil it till quite soft, so that you can mash it easily. Add a little pepper and have ready over the fire a deep frying pan or skillet with plenty of boiling lard. Put in a large spoonful of the batter, and into the middle of each drop a spoonful of the mashed salsify. Fry these fritters to a light brown on both sides and take them out with a perforated skimmer. You may fry the mashed salsify without the batter, taking large spoonfuls and dipping each in beaten egg first, and afterward twice over in grated bread crumbs, so as to resemble fried oysters. Or you may first boil the roots and merely split them in two before frying them in fresh butter, or baking them brown in the oven.

### Beefsteak Pie.

Flank steak or a slice from chuck or upper round can be utilized for the meat pie. Cut it in fingers, dredge each piece with salt and pepper. Should the amount be scant, pare, quarter and parboil a few potatoes. A few ounces of raw ham cut fine and added serve to improve the flavor. Make a rich biscuit crust and roll out almost a half-inch thick. With this line a deep baking dish and fill with the prepared meat, etc. Add a half cupful of rich stock. Sit on the top covering and bake in a moderate oven for an hour and a half, covering at first that the crust may not become too brown. Have ready a quart of rich gravy. When the pie is taken from the oven pour carefully in as much as it will hold, serving the remainder separately.

### Eclair Cakes.

Two cups of flour, pinch of salt, one heaping spoonful baking powder, three-fourths cup of lard. Mix together and add water enough to make it as stiff as pie crust. Divide into eight pieces. Take each piece and roll out just a little, spread with butter, a few seeded raisins and a little sugar. Fold the raisins in, then roll in a round shape about one-quarter inch thick. Spread top with butter and sugar. Bake in hot oven. Very good.

### Probasco Pickles.

Twelve large cucumbers, peel and take out seeds. Three dozen small cucumbers, one-half dozen sweet mangoes, one-half dozen hot mangoes, four little red peppers, one quart onions, put all through the coarsest meat grinder, then add two handfuls of salt, one quart of cider vinegar, one pint of granulated sugar, boil all together for one-half hour, then seal.



Boiled water poured through a tea stain will remove the discoloration.

To keep the larder sweet place a pan of charcoal in it, for this helps greatly to keep everything sweet and wholesome.

Grease stains on leather may be removed by carefully applying benzine or perfectly pure turpentine. Wash the spots afterward with a well beaten white of an egg or a good leather reviver.

To economize on cost of lard, buy suet from your butcher, fry out at home and mix the two in equal quantities. The result serves admirably for frying purposes, for making biscuit and for ordinary pastry.

## For Cramps.

A piece of old-fashioned candlewick worn around the leg in the garter place, next to the skin, will prevent, or, cure, cramp in the calf of the leg or in the foot. I have proved this by personal experience; I believe this would prove effectual in preventing swimmers' cramp; those liable to cramp while in the water would be wise to try it. Cottonbatting, wrapped round the body from the arm-pits downward, saved the life of a man suffering agony from painters' cramp; it gave almost instant relief.—National Magazine.

### Socialism Defined.

MR. EDITOR,

Dear Sir:—As a considerable number of people in Lincoln Co., as well as elsewhere, are curious to know something about the Socialist party, and especially as to its party organization and methods of nominating its officers and managing its party affairs.

I would like to have the privilege of answering a few of the more important questions through your paper. I am sure some of the readers of your paper will appreciate the same.

To begin with, I wish to say that the Socialist party is the biggest thing in the world in the way of a political party.

Being an international organization, bound together by an international congress; it casts over ten million votes. In the United States its membership has increased from 50,000 in 1910, to over 100,000 in 1911.

Each member on joining the party, signs the party pledge, which in part, is as follows:

"I have severed my relations with all other parties . . . and endorse the constitution and the platform of the Socialist party, and hereby apply for admission to said party."

The Initiative, Referendum and Recall are the supreme law of the party.

When a man is nominated for any public office he is required to sign his resignation to the office for which he is nominated, leaving blank, the date to be filled out at any time the members believe he is not serving the party as he should.

No man is allowed to announce himself a candidate for any office. Nominations are made by the locals, which serves as a party primary.

No one is permitted to make a nominating speech in either a local or convention.

A candidate is not allowed to make a canvass in the sense that other party candidates do.

All campaigns must be made in the interest of the party.

Any candidate found guilty of treating with whiskey, secures or anything else, obviously intended to win votes, is subject to the recall.

One other point I wish to make plain, and that is why members of the socialist party, refuse to place the name of party candidates of their tickets, when there is no socialist candidate for that particular office.

The answer is this; all candidates on the socialist ticket have a recall behind them, and to place the name of some one on the ticket without the recall is to discriminate against the regular party candidates. A reason, it seems to me, sufficient in itself, without taking into consideration the pledge one signs on becoming a member of the party.

I have never asked a man to vote the socialist ticket, and never will; but I do recommend the careful study of the subject of socialism to all those who are sick and disgusted with the old party methods.
