The democrats of New Mexico, in state convention assembled at Clovis Tuesday of this week, declared for the Hon. Champ Clark, of Missouri, as their choice for president—and the choice was made in no uncertain terms. The vote on the instructions for the Missouri statesman was two and a half for to one against. The membership of the convention was made up of former Missourians, nearly all were from the Ozarks and every mother's son of them had a hound, colors and length of ears varying, but each with a coon record that created a very lively spirit of rivalry. Therefore, the members of the convention who had never had the pleasure of listening to the music of a coon chase in the Ozarks, jealously had to quit kickin' their dawg aroun'.

Before the convention had gotten to business in earnest, the proceedings were enlivened by an encounter between the members of one of the county delegations. A motion to eject the member who had struck a fellow member was tabled and the matter left to the discretion of the credentials committee. However, before the noon recess the offending member rose to a question of personal privilege, apologized to the convention and also a personal apology to the gentleman whom he had assaulted; which was accepted by the gentleman upon whom the assault was committed and by the convention as well. It was a most regrettable incident.

A temporary organization was effected by the election of J. H. Paxon, Las Cruces, chairman and A. C. Torres, Socorro, secretary. The regular committees were appointed and a recess was taken until 2 o'clock in the afternoon, at which time Granville A. Richardson, Roswell, was made permanent chairman and John L. Zimmerman, Las Vegas, permanent secretary.

Upon reconvening, the report of the committee on credentials was adopted without dissent. The committee on permanent organization and order of business made a majority and a minority report; the point of difference being that the majority desired a reorganization of the state committee, the majority for reorganization, in the committee, being one. On the floor of the convention, after a vigorous discussion, the minority report was overwhelmingly adopted, and no reorganization, therefore, was made.

The committee on resolutions did not report until 4 o'clock. The delay in making the report was not occasioned by a difference over a declaration of principles, but was over instructions for a candidate for president. Finally, the platform was presented by unanimous action of the committee, and a separate resolution was introduced by the Clark men, which was adopted by a vote of 13 to 11. The motion to substitute the minority report was lost in convention by a vote of 225 to 86. The resolutions are as follows:

We, the democrats of New Mexico, in convention assembled, reaffirm our belief in and allegiance to the time-honored principles of the democratic party.

We endorse the able and efficient administration of Governor McDonald and the other democratic state officials.

We endorse the patriotic course of Congressman Ferguson, and congratulate the new state on having such a man on guard at Washington, who is ever alert to the interest of our people.

We believe the government, both state and national, should be controlled by the people, and for that reason we endorse the direct primary for the nomination of candidates for every office in the gift of the people, and, therefore, we urge the passage of such a bill and also a corrupt practices act.

Believing a healthy, vigorous people to be the greatest asset of a nation, we commend the efforts of Senator Owen to secure greater efficiency in our national health agencies. We believe these public health agencies should be organized into single national departments of public health, and we favor such legislation as will effect this purpose.

We endorse the able and patriotic efforts of the democratic minority of the legislature to secure a senatorial preference primary; and we urge that the present legislature approve the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United

DOINGS AT THE CAPITAL.

(From our Special Correspondent)

Santa Fe, N. M., May—T. J. Guilfoill, assistant traveling auditor, has filed with Governor McDonald, his report on the investigation of the books of Dona Ana county. The report is very lengthy, and contains information regarding alleged irregularities in several different instances. The biggest shortage, and the only one which is admitted, with one exception, is that of \$19,140.26. This amount it is said is admitted short, but it is alleged that it is tied up in the estate of the brother of the treasurer. It appears that Lohman as treasurer, kept considerable of the county funds on deposit with his brother, in the Lohman Mercantile company. The brother died and at about the same time, W. W. Cox was elected to succeed Lohman, the treasurer. The books showed the above amount on deposit with the mercantile company, and while it is not lost to the taxpayers, the estate will probably have to be settled before the amount can be turned over to the new treasurer, who has refused anything but the cash in this transaction. Information from Dona Ana is that this shortage will shortly be repaid.

Guilfoill's report also shows alleged shortages amounting \$5,127.17, which with the exception of one item of \$108.00 is not admitted by the outgoing treasurer. This alleged shortage is made up of several items, one \$108.00 being money paid treasurer Lohman for office expenses, but it appears that credit for this amount was taken twice on the books. The other discrepancies include \$1,765.00 which it is alleged Mr. Lohman overpaid himself as treasurer, his salary in a county of the class of Dona Ana being fixed at \$4000 a year, yet the books show it is said, that in three years, instead of drawing \$12,000.00 as his compensation, he drew \$13,765.00 or \$1,765 too much. Other shortages given in the report are uncollected penalties on delinquent taxes. The law requires that delinquent taxes when collected shall also include penalties, but the report alleges that Mr. Lohman had been using his own discretion in the matter, and in the many cases where taxes had become delinquent, he had collected only the amount of tax, without insisting on the payment of the penalty. Guilfoill in his report insists that this amount belongs to the county, and inasmuch as Lohman did not collect it, he should be required to make good the amount.

These last mentioned shortages, if such they may be called, will have to be settled by a suit in court, and it is understood the county commissioners are now figuring on straightening the matter out and arranging some sort of a settlement.

The delinquent tax roll in Dona Ana reached the high figure of \$238,000 according to the report, and among those delinquent are said to be a number of persons who draw their pay from the county notwithstanding the fact that the law says that the amount of any taxes due from any person drawing salary from any person drawing from the county, shall be deducted from his warrant at the time he is paid.

Reed Holleman of Tucumcari, Quay county, who was a candidate against T. D. Leib, for the

judgeship in the 8th judicial district, and who was defeated on the face of the returns by about 50 votes, has filed a contest against Judge Leib in the supreme court. Holleman alleges irregularities in Clayton precinct and a number of other places, and claims his election instead of Leib's. The case will very probably be bitterly contested.

Just four more weeks of the legislature remain, and as yet but one of the really big bills of the session has been passed by either house. The land bill has passed the senate, and is now in a house committee. The medical bill is now in the senate having passed the house. Other bills which have passed the house or senate are as follows: Passed the senate: Defining the qualifications of appointive officers, which makes a two years residence mandatory although it specifically exempts all persons holding office at the time it becomes effective. Mullens bee bill has also passed the senate with amendments but must go back to the house for action on the amendments. A bill fixing the time for holding court in the sixth district; a bill giving district courts jurisdiction in town-site disputes; conferring jurisdiction on justices of the peace in cases not involving more than \$20; and Pankey's bill abolishing the common drinking cup. This last bill has now been passed by the senate twice. The first time it was killed in the house, but now it is said there is a better understanding of the case, and it will probably pass.

The house has passed the following bills: A bill creating a Summer county, establishing a Normal school at Clovis; a bill repealing Chapter 13 of the 38th legislative assembly which repeal deprives water companies of a lien on the property where the water rent has been paid; and a memorial favoring the creation of another U. S. Circuit court district.

The senate has tabled Evans' anti trust act, and also Evans' bill defining slander of a female person.

The senate committee on public institutions were the guests of Supt. McManus at the penitentiary Thursday evening and found the institutions in splendid shape, barring a few necessary improvements.

Public hearings have been held on the medical bill, the full crew bill, and the bill prohibiting floating timber and ties on the streams of the state.

Governor McDonald was in Albuquerque Thursday evening the guest of the Retailers association at a banquet.

The indications now are that neither house of the legislature will adjourn in order to allow the democratic members to attend the state convention at Clovis. Several members in each house however have arranged a pair with someone of the opposite political faith and will attend anyway.

No additional appointments were sent to the senate last week by the governor, but neither has any report been received from the executive communications committee of the senate on the nominations already made.

The house committee on temperance has before it the local option bill, the prohibition and high license bills and all other bills on the subject and when it does report will probably recom-

mend a bill drafted by the committee containing some of the features asked for by the prohibitionists but not as drastic as the Llewellyn bill.

Grand Jury Report.

To the Honorable District Court, sitting in the town of Carrizozo, Lincoln county, New Mexico.

The grand jurors, after being in session ten days and having examined all offenders of the law, wish to render a report as follows:

During our deliberations we have examined 167 witnesses and have found 42 true bills and 24 no bills. The following witnesses were recognized and failed to appear: W. S. Bourne, N. B. Brown and Telesero Silva. In the case of State vs. Jas. P. Walker, the prosecuting witnesses, W. S. Bourne failed to appear, hence no action was taken. The witnesses in the case of State vs. Lucio Najar failed to appear, although recognized. We returned a no bill on the testimony introduced in the justice court.

We find the building now being used as a temporary county jail in very good condition; but unsafe for holding prisoners for any length of time. The calaboose used as holdover in Carrizozo is in an unsanitary, filthy condition. The reason for this, as we believe, is that the keys to same are not in the possession of the proper party. We recommend that the keys be delivered to the constable of this precinct, who will be held responsible for the condition of this calaboose, and who will be the custodian of same. The parties who have a right to the use of the said calaboose can procure the keys from the custodian. We also recommend that the county commissioners have the said calaboose cleaned, repaired and put in first class condition.

We also wish to report that the various justices in the county have bound over many cases to be heard by this body that should have been settled by the justices of the peace. This sending of cases to the grand jury, that could be settled by the justices of the peace is a needless expense to the county and we recommend that they be instructed to discontinue this practice.

We have one case before us where the complaining witness is unable to appear. We have a letter and a doctor's certificate to this effect. We therefore pass this case up to the next term of the grand jury.

We also wish to call the county commissioners attention to the bad condition of the plumbing in the county jail at Lincoln, New Mexico, and recommend that they have it repaired.

How the Egg, Natural Accompaniment of Spring and Summer Dishes, Should Be Prepared and Arranged—To Shred Lettuce.

Hard Boiled Eggs.—Egg salads will be in demand soon and they afford an opportunity for the cook to display her skill in arranging and garnishing. The eggs must be hard boiled and this is accomplished best by putting them into cold water, bringing it to the boiling point and allowing it to simmer for 25 minutes. Drop the eggs into cold water, then remove the shells and cut in fancy shapes.

Daisy Egg Salad.—One way to make an attractive salad is to cut the eggs in halves lengthwise, take out the yolks and cut the whites into eighth in long strips. Lay round on a bed of shredded lettuce like the petals of a daisy and sift the yolk through a gravy strainer into a heap in the center. A second method is to cut in halves across, the smaller part and use each half of the yolk for a center. Cut the half of the white into eighth which will have one pointed end and form into petals around the center; each egg will make two "daisies."

Water Lily Egg Salad.—For a cup use lettuce leaves on a plate and lay the long strips cut by the first plan in so that they will curve upward and fill the center with sifted yolk; this closely resembles a water lily.

Notched Egg Cup Salad.—For a change cut the smaller diameter of the egg round in a zigzag line with a small pointed kitchen knife and separate the halves. Cut a tiny slice from the small end and set upright among the lettuce leaves.

To Shred Lettuce.—To shred lettuce use only the coarser leaves, reserving the cup-shaped for the edge of the salad. Roll these large leaves tightly, then slice from one end with a sharp knife and shape up loosely. It is an economical and appetizing way to use the outer leaves, which are fresh and green and yet not as delicate as the heart leaves.—Alice E. Whitaker.

Deviled Eggs.—Cut hard boiled eggs in two; mash yolks with paprika, mustard, celery salt, butter and Worcestershire sauce until it has become a thick, moist paste; fill this mixture in the egg white, press the two firmly together and set in a cool place until wanted. Nice for the lunch basket.

Baked Omelet.—One tablespoon flour, one tablespoon hot butter, one cup hot milk, half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon pepper, six beaten eggs, one teaspoon baking powder. Stir the flour into the butter and add gradually the milk, salt, pepper. Cool slightly and add the well beaten yolks of the eggs, then the beaten whites and one teaspoon baking powder. Bake in moderate oven.

Rye Muffins.—Measure two cups of rye meal which has been sifted and one cup of sifted pastry flour. Sift the flour and meal with five level teaspoons of sugar and one level teaspoon of salt. Beat one egg, add one and one-quarter cups of milk. Mix with the dry materials and pour into a buttered pan and bake in a sheet. Cut with a hot knife into squares, or bake in buttered hot gem pans. Use rye meal and not rye flour, which is different, and always sift the meal before measuring.

Bread Soup. Take stale bread (rye, white or any kind of stale bread will do); cover the bread with boiling water, let boil a few minutes; then put through a coarse sieve. If the mixture is too thick add more boiling water, put back on stove; add a slice of cinnamon, let all simmer for about 15 minutes; add sugar to taste. Now allow the yolks of three eggs to a quart of soup, and pour over them gradually the boiling soup, stirring all the time; add the grated rind and juice of a lemon. Try it for the children and I am sure they will like it. Good for all, old and young.

Washing Glass. Have a wooden bowl for washing glass if possible, and keep it specially for the purpose, for it is impossible to polish glass if there be any trace of grease in the water used for it, says the Minneapolis Tribune. Some people like to use hot water and some use cold for washing glass. Good effects may be obtained with either if the polishing be done carefully with nice, dry, soft towels.

Splendid Chocolate. Put into a saucepan two cups of brown sugar, one-half cup of grated chocolate, a half cup of water, a teaspoonful of butter and cinnamon to taste. Cook until brittle when dropped into cold water, then pour into buttered pans.

Harmony Sandwiches. Twenty-four olives, chopped fine, one teaspoon tomato catsup, a pinch of mustard, one-half cup finely chopped celery, one-half cup salad dressing. This is a favorite sandwich filling.

Cold Horseradish Sauce. Take some grated horseradish, add a like quantity of bread crumbs, a little sour cream and a few drops of vinegar. Season with a little salt and pepper and a pinch of sugar.



Hearing on Injunction Rendered.

Judge John Y. Hewitt received the decision in the injunction case in the county seat case from Judge Abbott, at Santa Fe, this morning. The decision continues the injunction in force, pending a decision of the Supreme Court of the United States of the cases now before that tribunal. The court, however, requires the complainant, the Lincoln people, to furnish an additional bond of \$10,000; the bond to be filed on or before June 15th and to be approved by Judge Abbott. This with the original bond of \$15,000 will make a total bond of \$25,000 and, if given and approved, will be a sufficient sum to cover all damages.

La Follette Turns Down Roosevelt.

Sacramento, Cal., May 11.—Senator Robert M. La Follette was offered, and refused, assurance that if he would throw his support to Colonel Roosevelt in the campaign for republican presidential nomination, Roosevelt in turn would name La Follette as his successor, according to Gilbert K. Roe, of New York, La Follette's former law partner, who spoke here tonight on "The True Story of the Desertion of La Follette."

Mr. Roe did not mention Colonel Roosevelt in his account of the affair. Mr. Roe said in part:

"The men who had acquired a sudden prominence as progressives because La Follette had made it possible for them to do so and who thought he was the same clay as were they made him the infamous proposal that if he would abandon his fight and turn his support to Roosevelt at the end of his term Roosevelt would do for him what he had done for Taft—make him his successor. This is true. I was there. If it becomes necessary I can give names and produce in writing—part of it at least."

"I cannot give you the exact words of reply made by Senator La Follette but in substance they were these:

"I may never be president of the United States but, by the eternal, if ever I am I will owe it to the votes of my fellow citizens and not to the appointment of any one man."

States for the direct election of United States senators, which has passed both houses of congress.

We denounce in unmeasured terms the outrage perpetrated by the republican senate in unjustly removing, without a hearing, the Hon. Abelino Romero from his seat in the state senate, an outrage by which the people of Socorro county were deprived of the services of their duly elected choice for that office, and we commend the courageous stand of Senator McCoy in aligning himself with the democratic senators in an effort to prevent the despoliation of the franchise.

We declare in favor of rigid economy in public expenditures, and insist that the salaries of public officials shall be on a basis commensurate only with the duties performed by them and consistent with the efficient administration of public affairs.

We commend the New Mexico house of representatives which unanimously passed the resolution for the submission to the voters of New Mexico of an amendment to the constitution striking from it the clause which so unjustly discriminates against our Spanish-American citizens in the matter of holding state office and we most vigorously condemn the republican majority in the state senate which has referred that proposed amendment to the committee on constitutional amendments of the senate, which committee has failed to make a report thereon.

Recognizing the present speaker of the national house of representatives, who occupies the second position of honor in the nation, and which is the first man to occupy that position as the unanimous choice of his party and with the universal approval of his position and in appreciation of his long and continued efforts to secure statehood for New Mexico and for her right to self government, and believing that he, with his large acquaintance with public men and public affairs, and with his practical experience, knowledge, honesty, integrity and great ability, is best able to satisfactorily guide the welfare of the nation at this trying period of its experience as a republic; Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That we hereby endorse the Hon. Champ Clark, of Missouri, as candidate for president of the United States; and,

We hereby instruct our delegation to the Baltimore convention to use all their influence and every effort in their power to secure the nomination of Hon. Champ Clark for president on every ballot on which his name is before said convention, or until, in the opinion of a majority of said delegation, his nomination can no longer be reasonably hoped for.



Appetizing Dish.
Put two heaping tablespoons of sugar in a bowl, add the grated rind of two large oranges, yolks of four eggs and whites of two and beat them together for a few minutes. Heat one cupful of milk, pour it gradually into the bowl, stirring all the time. Turn into the sauce pan, stirring carefully over the fire until it thickens, but do not let it boil. Strain into the bowl, add the strained juice of the oranges and one heaping tablespoon of powdered gelatine dissolved in three tablespoons of water; stir occasionally and then pour into a wet mold and put away until set. Turn out onto a glass dish and decorate with a few sections of orange.

Novel Breadpan.
When I want to bake bread in round loaves, which are especially nice for fancy sandwiches, I take an empty tomato or corn can, melt off the top, and then fasten a piece of heavy wire around the outside, about half way up, writes a contributor to the Woman's Home Companion. Where the ends meet, I twist the one over or around the other, for a distance of two or three inches from the can, thus forming a convenient handle. This is as good as a store tin.—Kansas City Star.

Spanish Meat Balls.
Get 15 or 20 cents worth of Hamburg steak; mix with it one egg, four or five slices of stale bread soaked and well drained and then add to it the pulp of five or six prepared chilies. Mix all well together with the hands; then add a couple cloves of garlic finely cut. Now salt and make into patties and fry in good hot lard. When all are cooked sift a little flour in your pan and make a thick gravy to go over them.

Beans Spanish.
Boil about a pint of pink beans in plenty of water without salt until done. When done put some lard in a frying pan, add an onion, a couple of tomatoes and a couple of green peppers (or prepared Mexican chilies) and the beans, with water to cover well; season with salt and cook until the gravy on them thickens. It hurries them to mash a few of the beans, as this thickens the gravy quickly.

Tilden Cake.
Two cups sugar, one-half cup butter, four eggs, one cup sweet milk, three cups flour, one-half cup corn starch, two teaspoonfuls baking powder. Beat whites of eggs to a froth and add last two teaspoonfuls flavoring.
