ART IN SERVING FOOD

HALF PLEASURE OF EATING IS THROUGH THE EYE.

Molds Play Large Part in Artistic Service—Everything From Fish to Dessert Can Be Molded—Hollow Ring Is Favorite.

Half the pleasure of eating is through the eye. If food is well served and cooked, a meal is a success, though the quantity and variety of the food may be limited.

Molds play a large part in this artistic service. Everything from fish to dessert can be molded.

Probably the favorite mold for most purposes is a hollow ring, round or oval.

Mashed potatoes may be quickly formed into a hollow ring with one of these molds.

For salads and desserts the ring mold is invaluable.

An attractive salad is made by using two sizes of oval or round molds that fit into each other.

A separate dish of mayonnaise should be passed with most molded salads.

Another appetizing effect is had by using a round ring mold and filling the center with a fancy mold.

This arrangement is equally attractive for dessert.

Nothing is prettier than a round or oval ring mold of French vanilla ice cream.

Prepare a thick white sauce as follows: One tablespoonful of butter.

Soaked Radishes. Cut off the top and root of red and white radishes.

Butter Milk Pie. One cup of sugar, yolk of two eggs, four tablespoonfuls of flour.

Making Eggs. When packing eggs, place two material over a can of white wax.

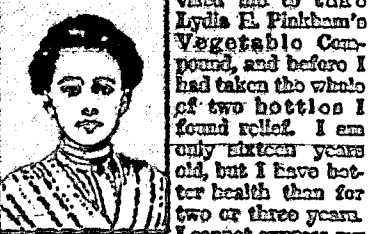

THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE

There are 48 states to engage in the presidential contest this year, and of this number Woodrow Wilson, the democratic nominee, seems certain to win in 27, is reasonably certain in 9 others, and has an even break in 5 more. This would leave Taft only seven states upon which he may rely with any degree of certainty. Of course, in this calculation, Roosevelt's candidacy is not taken into consideration; for no one can estimate what effect his candidacy will have on that of the two leading candidates. The following is presented, figuring on the two regular nominees:

Should Taft, by some miracle, secure the votes of the five states herewith listed as doubtful, he would have only 178 votes. And then, were he to get the nine states reasonably sure for Wilson, and classed semi-doubtful, which would be still more miraculous, he would have 263 votes, and yet be three votes short of election.

Suppose the "semi-doubtful" states, Connecticut, Delaware, Kansas, Maine, Massachusetts, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon and Washington give Taft 52 electoral votes, made up from Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts and Ohio, and he should secure the three big doubtful states of Illinois, New York and Pennsylvania, with 112 electoral votes, he would have 204 votes in the electoral college, and be a very badly defeated candidate.

In other words, Governor Wilson can win easily and lose the three biggest states in the union, viz: New York, Pennsylvania and Illinois. Should he be successful in one, or more, of the big trio, which all agree he has an even chance so to do, his majority over Taft will be greater in 1912 than was Taft's over Bryan in 1908.

Why This Calm?

If Mr. Roosevelt could focus his powerful mind upon something besides himself for an instant he would learn why it is that his new-party movement grows more flabby and clammy with every passing day.

There is no great popular demand for a new party, for Mr. Roosevelt or for a third term. There are no loud calls for Henty or Bonaparte or Mansey or Perkins.

Interest in the pending campaign was at fever heat a month ago. Today it has largely disappeared and for a good reason. The people got what they wanted

When Baltimore pledged itself to carry out the repeatedly expressed will of the people and named as leaders men who could be depended upon, the contest was practically ended. We shall have speeches and music and parades, but politics will not interfere much with business this year.

The calm that has spread over the country is not due to the heat or to weariness. It springs from satisfaction and content. It rests upon confidence. A great peace pervades the public mind. There are to be no more "betrayals" of the people either by Mr. Roosevelt or Mr. Taft. The "power of the crooked political bosses and of the privileged classes behind them" is to be broken without taking any of the risks of third termism or New Nationalism.

If Mr. Roosevelt were as smart a politician as he used to be he would perceive that Democracy removed the discontent to which he has been appealing and that there is nothing in it for him any more.—New York World.

The greater portion of the time of the convention will be taken up by denunciations hurled at a convention that created a slight stir and was said to have been held in the same city along in June.

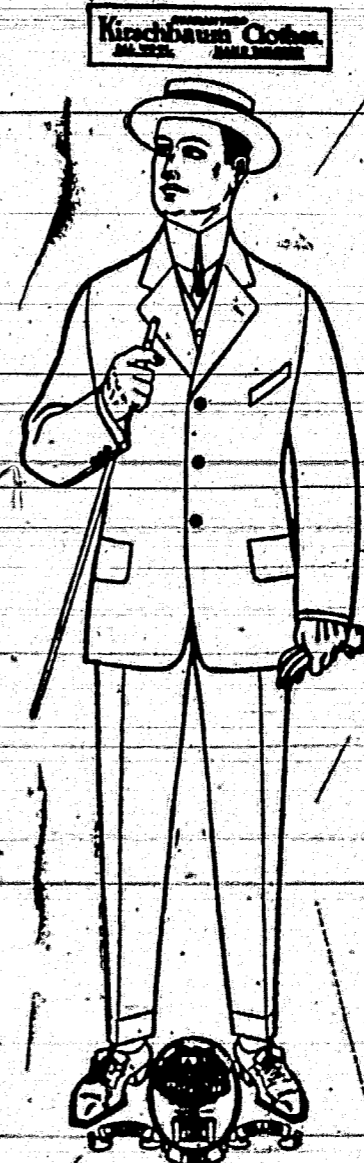

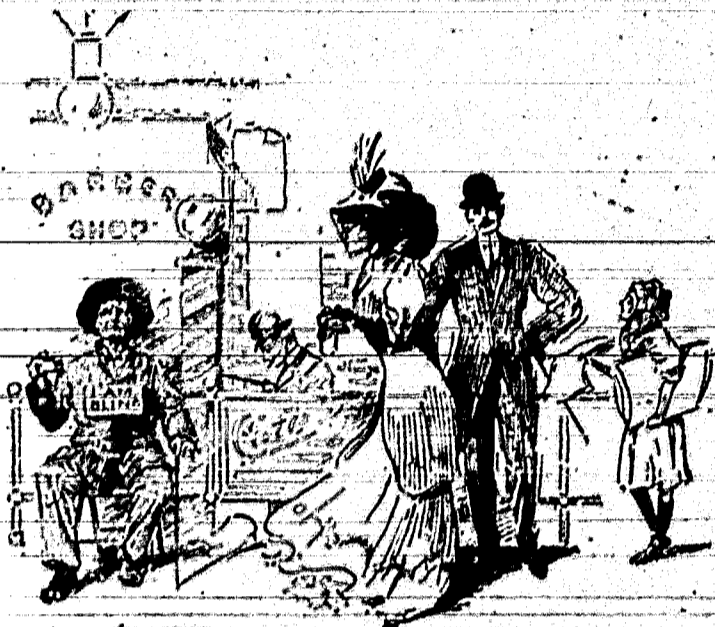

The Tax Rate.
The tax rate in Lincoln county this year, exclusive of special levies, will be \$3.60 on the \$100. Tax payers owning cattle will pay on that class of property two special levies, one as a cattle indemnity fund, the other an infection. Sheep men will also pay a special levy, known as the sheep sanitary fund. There is also a special levy in every school district, ranging from 3 mills to 15 mills, owing to the need of the various districts. The average rate on all classes of property in the county will be something under 4 per cent.
