COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

The meeting convened with Hon. Marvin Franks chairman, W. M. Ferguson and R. A. Deane, members, A. H. Harvey clerk and A. C. Roberts deputy sheriff.

Commissioner Duran offers suggestion that the agreement with the Merchants' Bank of Carrizozo be renewed and after a discussion of the subject the board orders that approval of minutes of former meeting be held over until later in the meeting.

The following wild animal bounty claims were approved: H. H. Deas \$25.00, Luis Tenorio \$19.00, Tom Hance \$9.00, etc.

The following bills were examined and allowed for the present county: J. B. Dumas, justice court reporting, \$120.00; J. H. Hahn, constable fees, \$22.50; W. E. Kimbrell, constable fees, \$22.50; etc.

The following bills were approved from general county 1912 fund, no funds at this time available: Dr. T. W. Watson, witness fees justice of peace court \$4.50; Clement Hightower, justice of peace costs, \$26.00; Fred Gehrie, witness fees justice of peace court \$24.00; etc.

The Board orders that there be deposited \$50.00 from the general county fund 1911, to court house and jail fund.

Adjourned at 2:30 p. m. April 2nd, 1912. Board met pursuant to adjournment.

The bill of Jno. A. Haley, for amount of \$2.75 which was omitted from bill approved Jan. 3rd, 1912, allowed from general school fund.

The board orders the treasurer to transfer \$600 from the general road and bridge fund to road district No. 1.

The monthly report of the treasurer and collector, Dr. T. Watson, examined by Board and approved and all warrants, bonds and coupons cancelled.

The action of the Board taken at the last regular meeting of same, relating to the contract with the Exchange Bank of Carrizozo is hereby rescinded.

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The Board orders that there be deposited \$50.00 from the general county fund 1911, to court house and jail fund.

Adjourned until 1:30 p. m. April 3rd. Met pursuant to adjournment.

In view of the fact that District court for the county of Lincoln has been called to convene at Carrizozo, Lincoln county, New Mexico, on the sixth day of May, 1912, and in view of the fact that the court house at Carrizozo is unsuitable for the purpose of holding court, the District Judge having selected the People's building for a court room, the Latin building for jury room and the first engine house for all the said buildings having been offered free for the purpose stated, the Board hereby accepts these offers and officially designates the said buildings for the purpose and uses of said court for the term commencing May 6th, 1912, and the Board orders deputy sheriff A. Hoberis to look after preparing these buildings for court purposes.

The constant travel to me was how a person could do the amount of work and endure the fatigue and hardship as I did, on so small an amount of food.

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

Keeps Dinner Pail Hot.


and this lamp supplies heat to the contents of all the various compartments. These compartments consist of a number of nested pans of different shapes and sizes and adapted to hold all sorts of food.

How doth the little busy bee know where to go? Gaston Bonnier of Paris claims to have proved that bees possess a special directive sense like carrier pigeons.


Others, with Dadaot, believe that bees are guided by a sense of smell, and that they can smell flowers at a distance of one and a half miles.

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**President Taft is to Win.**  
 The Roosevelt sweep in Illinois and Pennsylvania last week has led the opponents of the president to believe that he can not be renominated. However, a reference to the result of 1908 gives little encouragement for this hope. Through the efforts of Mr. Roosevelt in 1908, Mr. Taft was given the solid delegations from the south, and he has them now, despite the opposition of Mr. Roosevelt. But with all of Mr. Roosevelt's power in 1908, he could not deliver to Mr. Taft the delegations from the states of Illinois, Indiana, New York, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin; and yet Mr. Taft was easily nominated.

These five states in 1908 had a total representation in convention of 256 delegates. These same states have in the 1912 convention 280 delegates, based upon the new apportionment. Of this number the president has 136 delegates, leaving the combined opposition with 144 as compared with 256 four years ago. Therefore, with these votes, added to those of the south, Mr. Taft practically needs only the delegation from Ohio to make his nomination sure.

All the big states, with the exception of Ohio, have been heard from, and Mr. Taft has fared much better in them in 1912 than he did in 1908, as has been shown. He has captured Colorado, Michigan and Nevada, and most of Iowa, too; has a part of Missouri and New Mexico; has a portion of the delegates from New England; will get the fourteen from Alaska, Hawaii, Porto Rico and the Philippines, which will give him more than 540—the number required to nominate—of the 1,078 votes in the Chicago convention. There can be no other result, then, except Mr. Taft's renomination; unless the supporters of the president decide that his election is impossible, and in that event both the president and the ex-president may be invited to step down and out.

Clark won in the Illinois primaries 54 delegates; Wilson won in the Pennsylvania primaries 76 delegates. It's a neck and neck race so far between these two aspirants for the democratic nomination.

We take off our hats to Roosevelt, he smashed the Penrose machine in Pennsylvania. Quay bequeathed this smooth-running, well-oiled machine to Penrose, and it remained for the rank and file of the republican party to repudiate it for the first time in a generation.

President Taft is now within less than fifty votes of the nomination. Does any one believe that Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Jersey, Ohio, Rhode Island and West Virginia will fail to furnish them? Then, too, the president may have additional aid from the western states—he has already captured three of them.

The tariff bills that have been passed by the house have some slight show of passage by the senate, although a compromise in the rates will be necessary. Senator Cummins, the acknowledged leader of the progressives in the senate, during Senator La Follette's absence, has signified a willingness to aid in pushing through bills for lower duties. Wool, chemicals, sugar, steel and possibly other house bills will be given consideration.

Providence is certainly doing its share in paving a way for boundless prosperity in Lincoln county this year. Rains are falling on hill and plain; grass will soon be abundant; the man with the hoe will take a new hitch on his suspenders and plant in the confidence of a rich harvest.

The Lincoln county democratic convention has been called to meet at Capitan, Saturday, May 4. The convention, as called by chairman Doering, calls for eighty-one delegates. Eight delegates and eight alternates are to be selected to represent Lincoln county in the state democratic convention, which meets at Clovis, May 14th.

The continued cold weather it is feared will seriously injure the fruit crop of this county. Some damage has already been experienced, with early fruit, and warm weather must follow, or worse losses appear certain.

A run-away team caused some excitement on El Paso avenue Tuesday evening. They were attached to the White Oaks stage, and the driver had left them for a moment—and in that moment they were gone. They started to trot toward the stable; the trot increased to a lope, and instead of stopping at the stable, circled around, returned to the avenue on a run and left the vehicle up against the fence at the home of H. S. Fairbanks.



**The Telephone in Emergencies.**  
"It is a peculiar fact," said a prominent representative of The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company the other day, "that while the telephone enters so largely into the commercial and social life of the people, its real value is rarely recognized until some emergency arises. But once having played its part in an emergency, the little instrument is immediately given a high place in the regard of the people interested."

"Let me give you some illustrations," continued the speaker. "One morning a traveling salesman left his home in the Middle West for a trip on the road. Several hours afterward his wife discovered to her horror, that he had taken a bottle of poison from a cabinet by mistake, leaving behind his bottle of medicine, of similar size and shape. She was unable to say where her husband might be found, not knowing even the state he was in, but noted the telephone company to find him at all costs. The telephone operator called his employer, got a list of twenty towns in which he might be located, and began calling these one after another, asking for the salesman. In a short time he was run down, and talked directly to his wife, saying that he had discovered the error and had written to have his medicine sent on. It had not occurred to him that his wife would be alarmed."

"A wife left home to visit friends in a town fifteen miles away. After she had gone, some guests came unexpectedly. Her husband telephoned to a town midway between their home and the house his wife was bound for, stating that she would change cars there and giving her description. A telephone messenger waited at the junction point, intercepted the woman, brought her to the nearest telephone, and started her back home."

"A physician was called in the night to the home of a patient twenty miles away. After he had departed, news came that a visit was unnecessary, as the patient was better. The doctor's wife asked the toll operator at the telephone exchange to intercept her husband, giving the direction in which he had gone. Within fifteen minutes he was found and turned back home, saving a long, useless journey."

"A serious emergency arose in a country home several miles from the railroad. The head of the family was off on an automobile trip, and his wife, with her sister, had gone to visit a friend. The latter's name was not known, nor anything except that she lived in a certain indefinite locality. It was most important to find one or both parties immediately. The telephone operators went to work on the case. Railroad stations along the line most likely to be taken by the two women were called up, and the agents given their description. Presently a station agent was found who had seen them get off the last train and take a carriage. Livery staples in that town were then called and within ten minutes the women were found and accompanied by telephone. Simultaneously, hotels along the route taken by the father in his automobile were called. Finally it was learned that he had just left a certain town, taking the road leading to a neighboring place. The telephone exchange at the latter point was notified, a messenger stationed in the road, and the father stopped when he came along. Both parties were located in less than two hours."

"In a case of serious illness at night a trained nurse was wanted at a country home. Arrangements had been made for the services of a nurse near by, but she could not be found. In this dilemma the telephone located another nurse in a neighboring town and sent her to the subscriber's home in a little more than an hour. These incidents are typical."

"These people have learned that the telephone is far more than a convenience for ordering groceries. To them its value cannot be weighed on a money scale. They have found it to be invaluable."

**FROM REMNANT OF CARPET**  
This Extremely Serviceable Haccock May Be Evolved by Following Directions.  
This serviceable haccock may be very easily made with any remnant of stair carpet from three-quarters of a yard to a yard in length. The carpet is bent round and sewn together at the edges so that a cylinder of material is thus obtained. Circular pieces of carpet are cut to fit each end, and after one piece has been securely sewn in its place the interior must be well stuffed with shavings, and to complete the haccock the second circular piece of carpet is fastened on.  
A haccock of this shape can be more easily moved about the floor than the ordinary shape, as it can be rolled to any particular spot without lifting it from the ground.  
If the end pieces are cut oval in shape instead of circular, a haccock of a rather different form can be made in precisely the same way as that described, and will be equally useful, but cannot of course be rolled along the floor. For inclosing purposes the oval haccock will perhaps be found more comfortable than a circular one, though after it has been such it will not move or lead like the shape and become somewhat oval.

**To Clean Waterproofs.**  
Never use hot water to clean a macintosh. Dip the coat in soft water, then spread it on a table, and scrub all over with a small scrubbing brush with a plentiful supply of good yellow soap. When all the stains and dirt have been removed dip the garment in several fresh waters to rid it of all the soap.  
If possible, dry the coat in the open air; in any case, do not wring it, and take care not to hang it near the fire unless you wish to ruin the waterproof. If you have a coat treat as usual, hang the garment on that while it is drying.
