## SOME THINGS THAT IMPRESSED ME

Leaving Carrizozo May 3th. for Indianapolis, to attend the National Convention of the Socialist party which met on the 12th of May, and going by the way of Ft. Scott, Kans., to be present at the trial of Fred D. Warren, Editor of the Appeal to Reason, which was set for May 7th. The prosecution side track the main trial by springing a preliminary case of contempt of court against Warren, Wayland and their attorney J. I. Sheppard the charge fell flat and the original charge was postponed until the November term of court.

After a short interview with Warren and Wayland and expressing to them my disappointment in not getting to witness a trial in which individuals are lost sight of and the right of free speech and free and free press are tried for their life, I left for Indianapolis by the way of St. Louis and arrived May 10, where I was met by a delegation of "Reds" who had been appointed to see after the delegates, and in company with some others went to the hotel English where I met several comrades whom I had met in Chicago two years ago. However that was too "awful" a place for my pocket-book I soon started out to find a place more in keeping with my financial rating as well as my accustomed way of living. On South Ave. about one mile from the main part of town I found a well-furnished room for one dollar per week and a restaurant close by where meals could be had for 15 cents, after closing the deal I returned to headquarters and found a number of other comrades who were inquiring for something like I had found so I helped to land several of them. As I was two days early I decided to see all that I could and all I saw would fill a book. After a weeks strenuous work the Convention succeeded in marking out a complete route to the Co-operative Common-wealth, marking all of the old party by-paths as forbidden ways and placed a danger signal at the entrance of each one to the end that laboring men and women need not be misled by them. All of which was given to the world in brief form under the title of "Socialist platform and demands". After selecting Eugene V. Debs and Emil Seidel as Standard bearers in the coming campaign the convention adjourned amid songs and cheers, followed by hand-claps and words of courage to each other as they separated for their respective homes.

On leaving Indianapolis I went to Chicago where I spent two days visiting friends and sight-seeing. From there to Kansas City, Pittsburg, Kans., Joplin and Carthage Mo. and after spending a week with relatives in Kansas I returned to the land of Sunshine. But in all my rounds, the greatest paradox to my mind was the fact that where the fact that where the greatest opportunity for plenty existed the greater was the poverty and want, and where wealth abounded poverty did much more abound. I saw great machines doing the work of hundreds of men, while hundreds of men stood around with out work and their families were living in rented houses, poorly clothed and worse fed.

I watched men building houses and in the evening I saw them

## going home and not a single one of them entered a house of his own. Then the words of the old prophet Isaiah, when he said "And ye shall not build houses and another dwell in them, ye shall not plant vineyards and another eat the fruit thereof, but ye shall build houses and dwell in them, ye shall plant vineyards and eat the fruit thereof," came to my mind, and I thought, how long will the laboring man be in developing as much spunk as the ant who will fight for possession of the hole he digs in the ground, even when the ground proves to be patented land. But maybe the ants have not learned the value of paper titles. As I stood between the broad drive-way called the Boulevard, and lake Michigan and watched the rich people drive by in their automobiles I asked myself the childish question, who gave them all their wealth? I then understood what the socialist meant by the "Privileged Class" who have paper titles stored away in fire proof vaults which enable them to spend their time in that way. On my way from Chicago to Kansas City, it being night and nothing to be seen out-side, I was getting some what lonesome when a traveling salesman for some New York firm, on seeing my Socialist button sprung the question of socialism by asking me what the socialist party stood for to which I replied, "We stand for the collective ownership and Democratic management of the means of production," which gave rise to the following questions and answers. Question. How do you expect to accomplish this? Answer. By educating the laboring men and women to work and vote for socialism. Question. But if all of the laboring men and women in the United States were converted to socialism that would not give them possession of the means of production he insisted. Answer. But the laboring men and women are already in possession of them and all the socialist party has to do is to teach them how to use them in their own interest. Question. What about the titles? Answer. Titles I said can't run machinery. They are only the idols of the 20th century, differing only in form and material from the idols of ancient times. The idols of the ancients was made of wood and stone while those of the present day are made of paper and ink. Sometimes the idols of the ancients were broken with the ax and hammer, but the idolatry would build new ones, until the preaching of christianity destroyed idolatry in the minds of the people and then the idols were destroyed by their own worshippers or left in their temples as roosts for the owls and bats. As Paul taught, there be no Gods that are made with hands, so the socialist teach, there be no titles which are made of paper and ink. And when the present day idolatry is destroyed in the minds of the laboring men and women by the teaching of socialism, the paper title idols will be put to a less honorable use than were those of the ancients. Question. Do you socialist not believe in titles? Answer. We believe in ownership as much as the Christians

## believe in a God, but as a Christian can find plenty of evidence of a God without making an image of him, so socialist can find ample evidence of ownership without having it printed on paper. And as socialist declare that all titles shall consist in occupancy and use, what use have they for paper titles. Why should I carry a paper in my pocket saying these breeches belong to me, or what need would there be of a man having a deed to land he was living on and using. Or what use would there be in the citizens of a county having paper titles to the court house, school houses or public roads. Question. What kind of a settlement do you propose to make the holders of the present titles? Answer. All settlements will no doubt be made on what the majority consider justice and not in the claims of any paper titles. After a prolonged yawn my interrogator asked, "how long do you suppose it will require to convert the majority of people to the socialist way of thinking?" This was the first question that I failed to have an answer ready for, but after a short pause I said, arrangements are now being made to install a party owned printing press to cost \$50,000 and we expect to turn out socialist literature at 4cts a pound, and that one pound of it when taken according to directions will start any ordinary laboring man to thinking, and that done he will pay his own way into the land of promise and that four years more with the publicity the old parties will give us by putting our political demands in their platforms, ought to land us safe in the socialist co-operative commonwealth. By this time my friend was showing marked signs of sleepiness, and I concluded that he either did not have much fears of socialism springing suddenly into popular favor or he was not overloaded with paper titles. Leaning back in my seat I was soon in dreamland where I was seeing armies of laboring men going forth, not to kill and destroy property, but to create wealth and educate the rising generations to respect the rights of his fellow man regardless of the color of his skin or the country he was born in. When I was awakened by the colored porter who said, "gardon-moi, but what song is that you was singing?" I said, that is the song of "The Sower and Reaper." "You sure do make a H-I of a noise, trying to sing both songs at once," was comment. C. B. LANN.

**TAFT CONTROLS CONVENTION.**

One continuous wrangle has resulted at the Chicago national republican convention since it was called to order Tuesday morning, but the Taft men have control. The Taft forces organized the convention by the election of Elihu Root as temporary chairman, by a majority of 56. The Roosevelt forces contested every inch of the ground, and the roll call was not completed until seven hours had been used in a ceaseless battle--an epoch-making seven hours. The Rough Rider, however, had been unhorsed, and talks of a bolt were frequent.

The Roosevelt forces were there with the big noise, and used every expedient to stampede the convention, but the Taft adherents had the votes. Speech after speech, full of venom and vitriol, was made by partisans of both the leading candidates, while the Cummins and LaFollette men made common cause with the Roosevelt crowd. Pandemonium reigned throughout the first day's session, and the proceedings were characterized by declamations bitter and denunciatory.

The second day's fight was even more bitter than the first. While the contest was fought over the same battleground, practically, as the day before, the result was a little more decisive Taft victory than the first day's battle, an evidence that Taft's friends had a firm grasp of the situation. The second vote came on a resolution to overturn the decision of the national committee, which had seated 92 Taft delegates claimed by the Roosevelt managers. On the roll the Taft men again led, the motion being defeated by a majority slightly larger than that by which Senator Root was elected temporary chairman.

Thursday, the third day, was devoid of any exciting scenes on the convention floor, the battle having been shifted to the committees, the hottest part centering around the credentials committee, and from this committee Roosevelt men bolted but later returned. The convention was called to order twice yesterday, only to adjourn, the last adjournment being to 9 o'clock this morning. It is possible that nominations will be reached tonight, but probably not until tomorrow.

In the meantime, the Rough Rider and his followers are talking bolt. The Rough Rider met his Waterloo, and such how it hurt! Notwithstanding his defeat, Roosevelt is defiant, and still maintains that he is the choice of the majority of the republican party for president. He asserts that he will not abide by the decision of a convention that is controlled by stolen votes. A large part of his followers agree with him, although some of his managers counsel another course. What

the day will bring forth, no man can tell--it may mean the shelving of both Taft and Roosevelt and the substitution of a dark horse.

Buster Brown and Tige his dog will appear in Carrizozo under the direction of Ziegler Bros. The exact date of his arrival will be announced later. Watch for it.



## The Largest Bell.

## WORTH KEEPING IN MEMORY

Garnered Wisdom That Has Been Handed Down Through Generations of Housewives.

When making sweet croquettes add a little sugar to the crumbs in which the croquettes are to be rolled.

Cold water is preferable to warm for scrubbing doors because it does not sink into the wood and so dries quickly.

Holding tomatoes over the gas flame will cause skin to burst and come off easier than when scalded, and the tomato will be less mushy than when scalded.

Neglected brass may be polished with a paste of powdered bath brick and oil. Take two pieces of the brick and rub together. This makes a finer powder than if scraped with a knife.

Cut hams may be kept from molding if the cut end is wet with vinegar each time after cutting. Vinegar will also keep beef fresh for a time when you happen to be without ice temporarily.

To frost over a window without darkening the room, dissolve Epsom salts in hot water and paint over the window while the water is hot, then allow to dry. This is easily removed and is entirely opaque while on.

Fringed cloths are often quite ruined in appearance at the laundry. They may be made to look like new for an indefinite period if, when they are starched, a little care be taken not to stretch the fringe. Fold each cloth in four like a handkerchief and then gather the fringe of each part into the hand and hold it firmly while you dip the middle only into the starch. When the cloth is dry shake the fringe well and comb it with a specially kept toilet comb, and it will fall as softly and prettily as when new.

## BROUGHT OVER FROM SPAIN

Three Recipes That Have Found Favor Because of Their Really Excellent Qualities.

Chicken Spanish.—Chicken cut into small pieces and fried brown in its own fat and half cup olive oil; add clove garlic, medium sized onion, half can tomatoes, pepper, salt, five cloves, two dozen allspice, one bayleaf. Stew slowly one hour, adding a little water if necessary. Thicken with flour and water just before serving.

Spanish Summer Squash.—Fry in butter an onion and three green peppers chopped fine; add three ripe tomatoes and stew well, seasoning with salt and teaspoon of sugar. Add summer squash, sliced, and fry until soft.

Spanish Shrimps.—Large onion, six green peppers chopped fine and fried in butter; add two large tomatoes and cook well; then add a pinch of soda and cup of cream; then can of chopped shrimps.

## Kitchen Line.

A convenient clothesline for the kitchen or other place where a clothes drying line is sometimes needed, is rolled into an oxidized copper reel case about five inches in diameter. This reel screws to a wall or ceiling and a hook is put up in a ceiling on another wall. When the line is wanted it is stretched across the space between the two and is fastened by a ring over the hook, the reel meanwhile catching it automatically and keeping it from slipping. When the line is not in use it is out of the reel in the reel casing. The line is 24 feet long. It would be a convenience for the kitchen veranda or porch of the summer cottage.

## Making Nut Muffins.

Two cups of flour, half a teaspoonful of salt, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one cupful of milk, half a cupful of chopped nut meats, two eggs, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, three tablespoonfuls of melted butter and half a teaspoonful of vanilla extract. Mix and sift the dry ingredients, then add the beaten yolks of eggs, butter and milk. Beat well, add the vanilla extract and the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Divide into buttered and floured gem pans, bake in a hot oven for twenty minutes.

## Oil While Ironing.

There is an old-fashioned prejudice against sitting down while ironing. Our grandmothers would probably have condemned the woman caught in this practice as hopelessly lazy—but why not do so, especially when standing at the ironing-board means tired, blistered feet and a frazzled temper? It might not be practicable to sit while ironing a dress skirt or anything requiring a long reach of the arm, but handkerchiefs and such small pieces can easily be managed while sitting.

## Outguard Against Moths.

Gather wild yarrow, commonly called tansy; sprinkle freely among fur garments of any sort, as well as woolen material. Lock your wardrobe; feel perfectly safe that when opened next fall your furs are unharmed by moths. Equally good for the buffalo bug; never fails.

## Nut Loaf.

Mix one cup bread crumbs with one cup of ground nuts. Wet with one cup sweet milk and one beaten egg; season with salt, pepper, sage; grate in some onion; bake 35 minutes; slice for lunch.

## To Clean Clothing.

Take light bread and rub where there is a grease spot and it will remove it without leaving a mark, from men's hats or any kind of elastic.
