A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to you All!

A Lot of Good Things This Week

WELL, WELL, WELL! Little Old New Mexico and Little Old Lincoln county and Little Old Carrizozo are goin' some, ain't it? Just too perfectly lovely, the way things is a-movin'! Monday came C. M. Farnsworth, president, general manager, and high-muck-smuckum of the Roswell Auto Company, and his hip-pocket bulged out a feet or more with a twelve-thousand-seven-hundred-and-seventy-five-dollar daily automobile mail service contract—and one little tear—glittering like a dew-drop—in his left eye! It was great! The weep was for the loss, forever and ever, of the old Roswell-Vaughn auto mail line. "We were informed by telegram from Mr. Curry that the contract would be awarded for the Roswell-Carrizozo line, provided we were willing to consent to the discontinuance of the Roswell-Vaughn line," said he to Tim News. "And we did," he added.

WHICH was sad, sad, indeed! But the Honorable William M. Atkinson, Mayor of Roswell, Chairman of the Chaves County Board of Commissioners, Member of the Chaves County Road Commission, Generalissimo of the Roswell Boosters and General Good Fellow, came also—in the same car with Mr. Farnsworth. He, too, gave one little weep over the loss of the Roswell-Vaughn route, but insisted that the "big bunch" of the Roswell boosters were satisfied to let that go to get something better! And then, gradually, it all came out!

AND, after all, it was the fine Italian hand of Little Old Bull Mooser-Honorable George "W." Curry, whom a large number of excellent and well informed citizens dreamed was smoked out, that ran through it all! Funny? Not a bit of it—just a fact! Along about the front end of March Mr. Curry will be a private citizen—no longer a congressman with a pull! Little Old George "W." has a long head, also a deep think tank! The Santa Fe road was losing out on the Vaughn-Roswell mail contract. All Ripley's mighty combination was "agin" it. It had to go. As a private citizen with a public taste, George Curry desired above all things a monument—with something in it to appeal to.

THE daily auto mail route between Carrizozo and Roswell had meat in it. It would serve some 20,000 good people, eighteen postoffices, directly and indirectly. It meant an outlet for the Pecos boosters to El Paso and the whole southwest—without going two days around mountains and other things. Back of it was real argument. The real argument was that if Roswell and Carrizozo people got it, why sure, they couldn't kick a little bit on George "W." pulling out a plum for Tularosa folks in the shape of another daily auto mail service, branching off at Hondo and running through the Mesquero Agency to Tularosa. Don't you see? Anyhow, George "W." can—and the Post Office Department learned to see—through George Curry's eyes—and the next thing you hear will be about that Hondo-Tularosa mail route.

WHICH will be a good thing. Nobody objects. All satisfied. The more daily auto mail routes anywhere in Little Old New Mexico the better for everybody. So we're all willing to hand it to Little Old George "W." He sure deserves it—and he'll get it. Watch him. Then a little later on he'll "point with pride" and get something else. Which shows he's not "smoked out," by a jugful.

BUT the real big thing of the week for Little Old New Mexico is what we've been looking for and hoping for—a united movement on the part of the state for a real, live get-there-Bill state wide go-to-it publicity proposition. And last Friday night the Chamber of Commerce fellows at Santa Fe touched off the fireworks. It is a great scheme. When the State Press Association meets up at the oldest, but by no means most dilapidated, Capital City of Santa Fe on January 14 next they propose to have come with the quill-shavers delegates from every boost organization in the state and among them start the ball rolling for a state-wide, county-wide Advertise New Mexico Movement. And it looks as if it would work out. It is just what is needed to put the state on the map.

AND, also, it is mighty timely. When the Legislature meets next month such a movement, backed by all the boost organizations and all the newspapers ought to put backbone enough in the august Solons to secure an appropriation of at least a hundred and fifty thousand for immigration bureau work. Little Old New Mexico has the goods to be something more than a passing-through place. It can put up more good propositions than half the states west of it as a stopping place. It can offer today better opportunities than any of them for home-builders, for investors, for tourists—not alone because it has the goods to deliver in all these lines, but because it has not been exploited to a frazzle like most of the others. It is fresh ground.

BUT to get back. "I confidently expect an increase of at least 30 per cent in passenger traffic on the Carrizozo auto mail route over that of the Vaughn route," admitted President Farnsworth. "We made a low bid for the contract with the belief that the passenger traffic would let us out whole. We will be running by the first of January. A road machine and men were started out this morning to do temporary repair work on the road. They will be kept at work regularly. We expect to have to spend a good deal of money to keep up the road. I believe the establishment of the mail route will mean that it will be officially placed on the map as a link in the cross continent Borderland Route."

SPEAKING of what that amounts to Mayor Atkinson said the Roswell records show an average of two tourists daily

for the past year. It is admitted that Carrizozo's position on the map means a night stopping place. Two cars daily means 730 yearly. They will average four passengers—probably better. With hotel bills, car repairs and incidentals the cash they will leave right here in little old Carrizozo will average at least \$25.00 per car or a yearly total of \$18,250.00—which reduces the proposition to what you might term the real thing. With the San Francisco and San Diego Panama expositions coming the travel should double. So the business men of Carrizozo can figure out the situation and get ready for it.

ALREADY Charles A. Stevens is talking of working up side trips to the Mal Pais, Water Cañon, Gran Quivira and a dozen other points of scenic interest right here in the neighborhood—just to show the tourists while they wait for repairs, etc. And they will want curios and views and odds-and-ends-of-supplies, etc. Of course we'll take care of them—they expect to be taken care of. Some of you may get on a pessimistic grin at Mr. Stevens' plan of entertaining 'em, but he's ordered extra gasoline just to be ready—and it'll sure work out. We predict that he'll be running half a dozen big cars before the next summer wanes.

AND here's the big local event of the week. The Lincoln County Road Commissioners met Monday afternoon at the County School Superintendent's office. It was a perfectly bully meeting and the road commissioners are all right. The job is new—but they're getting on to it in fine shape. At an earlier meeting they organized with Dr. J. W. Laws, chairman and Paul Mayer, secretary and Jose M. Vega just plain commissioner. Monday they began laying plans for getting down to business. And they sure mean business and it looks as if they were going to work together and really do things. Everybody knows Dr. Laws is a good roads enthusiast with a level head for ballast. Secretary Mayer, hard-headed, practical detail business man, went into the work with his sleeves rolled up and Señor Vega took a hearty and intelligent interest in it all.

THE Commissioners made some small appropriations for repairs—one much needed on the White Oaks road—listened to some corking good talk from Mayor Atkinson, who told them of Chaves county's road work and plans; County Surveyor Frank E. Theurer displayed a road detail map of the county he is preparing and offered some practical suggestions; Editor Chase brought up the matter of doing something on the roads in the Oscuro district to permit an outlet and passable connections with the Alamogordo roads so there will be an outlet in that direction. Forest Supervisor James H. Kinney was present and told the board there was \$1,000.00 of Forest service money available at once for work on the roads in the Forest limits. The board decided to have this expended on a seven- or eight mile stretch of the Nogal-Capitan road—and this work—badly needed, will start at once.

DURING Mayor Atkinson's talk, founded on sixteen years as a Chaves county commissioner, he said they were getting big results over in that county with grading and the use of the King drag. They have long stretches of roads where the farmers are actually hauling three tons of hay per load over them and the autos can make 30 to 40 miles an hour—which is going some. "It has not been our policy to spend a single dollar for specially built auto roads," said he. "We have some 400 autos in the county, but we figure that if we make good, passable all-the-year round roads for our people they will answer for the autos, too, and everybody gets

the benefit." He made a mighty interesting and sensible talk.

THE Engineer of the State Board has given it out that rules and suggestions for the general guidance of the various county boards are to be formulated soon and sent to the boards; and Chairman Laws said he recently had a talk with Governor McDonald to the same effect. So it was decided that before definite lines of action for county road work were laid out the board would wait for these instructions. There was in evidence the right spirit and a general determination to get real results in real roads and to test out on practical lines the new road laws.

THE NEWS does not hesitate to predict that Lincoln county's new road commissioners will get results, and those results will be along the line of systematic good road building. The citizens of the county must realize that it will take time to get the new system into working order. But they can, we believe, rest assured that every dollar expended will be put out along practical business lines; that we have honest, capable and willing men on the board, and that they will work in harmony for the best interests of every section of the county. A little patience will be needed, and above all the board should have the hearty and united support of all citizens. Without the support of public sentiment back of it, we have no right to expect these busy men to give their time and effort to this work—getting no other reward for it than the consciousness of a good work well done.

AT the adjournment, subject to call of the chairman, who said he would probably call the next meeting early in January at Lincoln, it was decided to notify all the road supervisors of the various road districts of the county to be present, and to bring their detailed reports, for a general and complete discussion of the situation. It is proposed, as fast as possible, to arrange a regular system of weekly and monthly reports from the road supervisors, and also gradually to secure topographical surveys along all the main lines of county roads, showing drainage areas, etc. This will enable the board to decide on definite plans for permanent road construction.

WELL, there's one more point, while we're talking of road matters. The board asked Mr. Farnsworth if he had any special proposition. He made a bully practical talk. Said his repair gang would be stationed with an auto and tools at a halfway point ready at all times for emergency work; that he wanted at all times to work in harmony with the board, etc., and made some suggestions as to the quick and effective service obtainable by using autos for road work. He believed the auto mail route would become the regular official Borderland Route and mean much to the county in actual cash returns from this source, as well as prove a big factor in the development of the county.

IN another place will be found a call for a public meeting of the boosters, signed by President A. J. Rolland and Secretary W. J. Doering of the Carrizozo Commercial Club. The committee appointed at the former meeting to report details of the organization, a constitution, etc., is ready with its work. There is a lot of important work to do. The meeting will be held Monday evening, Dec. 30, and every member and every business man should make it a point to be there. A delegate ought to be sent to the Santa Fe boost meeting. BIG DREDGE ON YUKON RIVER


One of Greatest Machines Ever Built Has Been Installed in That Inaccessible Country.

The old miner who went into the Klondike fifteen years ago to bring out gold with no more elaborate outfit than a tin pan would have scoffed at the suggestion that in a comparatively few years one of the greatest river dredges in the world would be taken into that inaccessible country to scour the river bottoms for the settlements of the ages.

CHECK UP TELEPHONE CALLS

Registering Device Invented by Arkansas Man Especially Adapted for Use on Toll Lines.

The Scientific American describes a registering device for telephone systems, invented by E. M. Northrup of Stephens, Ark., as follows: This invention has for an object the facilitating of posting books and the checking up of telephone calls, especially those calls received on toll lines.

Another object is to provide a device in which the registering of the call is not only made, but the notification of such record may be transmitted to a distant operator, such as a messenger. Finally, an object is to provide a device comprising a dial having two hands thereon, one of which may be in use during the day and another during the night, these hands being shown in a new view herewith of the registering device, a portion of latter in section.

PICTURES SENT THROUGH AIR

Only by Prolonged Attention to Minute Detail Has System Been Brought to Perfection.

The announcement that it will soon be possible to transmit pictures by wireless has been received with doubt in some scientific organs. Nevertheless the sending of pictures by air is a legitimate development of the transmission of pictures by the telegraph wire, according to London Engineering.


A photograph to be sent by wire on what is called the telegraph is first printed upon a thin sheet of lead. By means of a "screen" and camera such as are in general use in photo-engraving, the image is resolved into a series of lines. These lines are formed in the lead foil by a pigment of glue, which is not a conductor of electricity. Eventually they are pressed down into the foil. This foil, with its image, is then wrapped around a revolving cylinder similar in principle to that of the phonograph.

CURRENT FOR MEDICAL USE

Small Electric Transformer Arranged to Fit Any Light Socket and Easily Regulated.

A small electric transformer which may be attached to any light socket just like a lamp, is made for use with direct or alternating current. This makes a very handy device for transforming the commercial current for medical purposes.

The illustration shows the outfit with the different electrodes furnished. The current may be regulated in very small variations by the simple movement up or down of the small knob shown in the center of cylindrical part. There are no shocks connected with the use of the device.

from thirty to forty calls. With alternating current it gives as much current as the large and expensive outfit. The device will give on direct current from one to twenty-five milliamperes of current either through the metal handles or through the sponges. For ordinary medical treatment only ten to fifteen milliamperes are usually required.

As the device is less than five inches long and weighs but ten ounces it can readily be carried in the pocket or traveling bag. It is made of the best grade materials and the case is heavily nickel plated.

ELECTRICAL NOTES

An expert's recent estimate placed the mileage of the world's telephone wires at 23,500,000.

Telephone operators in Egypt are required to speak English, French, Italian, Greek, and Arabic.

The British post office has adopted the night-telegram service for telegraph lines in the British Isles.

The busiest time in all the year in the telephone exchange is the tenth or eleventh day before Christmas.

A wireless station is being built at London which is expected to provide direct communication with New York. Electric lamps for use in mines were first designed for rescue work, but now they are extensively used by the miners.

Storm warnings are now sent to sea by wireless so that vessels may be prepared for violent changes in the weather.

An electric process will detect accurately minute particles of bacteria in a solution. It is of value in chemistry and was discovered by a Parisian.

All business houses and dwellings in the city of Stavanger, Norway, will be heated by electricity derived from a nearby waterfall if present plans are carried out.

A new electric truck of unusual length is equipped with eight wheels, each with a separate motor, and so arranged that the rear four turn substantially with the forward four in steering.





There are also a considerable number of local public matters to be brought up for consideration. A letter from President R. B. Twitchell of the State Good Roads Association says it has been necessary to postpone the Eldredge good roads stereopticon lecture until early in January, but that it will come here surely then. Interest in this event should be aroused.

The News has also been informed of the possibility of a move looking toward the incorporation of the village—or at least of ascertaining the sentiment of the citizens with regard to such a plan.

There are numerous important committees to be selected at the meeting and there should be a full attendance that all these matters may have careful consideration.

Already outsiders are coming here to look over the field with a view of becoming interested. As it is now there is no one with authority to look after such visitors and endeavor to convince them that there is room for them here and that we need their help, and all these matters should have attention at the coming meeting.
