To Push Experiment Farm

Some have thought the experiment farm project was dead. Not on your life! It has only been sleeping, and even then it made a fuss in its slumbers. The Committee has not been idle, although the evidence of its accomplishments was not visible to all. The water problem was solved to the satisfaction of the committee, after thoroughly testing the well. The sinking of the well and the tests made, under most adverse conditions, entailed an outlay of money quite a little in excess of the original estimate. However, this did not feaze the Committee nor the citizens who had put their money into the project, but it did bring the affair face to face with an unpleasant situation--lack of money for present needs to immediately carry on the work.

Nothing daunted, the Committee, at a called meeting of the club, outlined what had been done and what it hoped to do, but announced that the experiment had reached a stage where only ready cash could prevent a failure. It was acknowledged that the amount of the subscription and the amount that could reasonably be expected from other sources, would be sufficient to carry the project through; but the difficulty facing the committee was the crying demand for \$800 or a \$1,000. NOW, to buy machinery, break and fence the land and to employ a man to look after the farm; whereas the payments of the subscription list were being made monthly and scattered over a period of eight or nine months.

The only manner proposed to secure this amount immediately was for the citizens interested in the success of the project to sign a joint note at the bank, the protection to the signers to be the subscription list. Most men shy at signing a joint note and this case was no exception. But here was a proposition in which an entire community had evinced an interest and the feeling was general that some heroic steps should be taken to save the project from failure. Finally, after meeting with more or less discouragement from sources least expected, the committee secured the signatures of twelve men to a note for \$1,000.00 and the loan was negotiated.

Since the assurance that sufficient funds were in sight the committee has not allowed the grass to grow under its feet. It hopes to have the land broken this week--all of it that will be used for farming purposes, both the section that is to be irrigated and the portion to be tested out as dry farming--has sent a man acquainted with machinery to examine pumps, engine, etc., and hopes to have the tract fenced at an early date.

The liberality of the men who have made this proposition possible meets the heartiest commendation of the committee and all interested in achieving success; and if success is to crown the effort everybody--even those who only expressed a desire to see it succeed--will rejoice over its consummation--a consummation that means more to Carrizozo and surrounding country than any one thing proposed in the line of progress. And to those who have shouldered the "White Man's Burden," dual success will be sufficient return for the obligations they have assumed.

Bonito Fruit Prospects

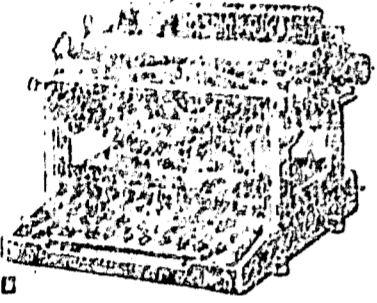
