RUSSIA'S ROYALNUN

Strangely Tragic Life of the Beautiful Widow of the Assassinated Grand Duke Serge, Who Has Buried Her Grief in a Convent Outside Moscow and Ministers to the Poor and Afflicted.

As the political black clouds weighed down more and more threateningly on the governor of Moscow the exer in St. Petersburg was advised to abolish the office. This was decided on; and one February morning Serge was driving out in a single horse closed carriage to pay a final "poor prendre conge" call on one of the successors to part of his authority when the young student, Kelaisff, thraw the bomb that killed master and coachman together. In a few minutes the Grand Duchess, bareheaded and wrap-ped in a pelisse, darted across the snow and knelt by what remained in a blood-drenched close of her husband. A day later, again bareheaded, she walked through the snow-clad streets at the simple funeral of the coachman, taking her place side by side with his peasant wife and the family of poor people. She went to see Kalaler in prison and begged in a simple, pitiful way to be told why the young man killed her husband. Kalaleff remained unmoved by this appeal, but her own distress brought tears to bis eyes. He would not ask for pardon, although she said to him, stretching out her hands, that she herself as a Christian woman pardoned him, and would pray for him to God.

It is from that tragic day that the Grand Duchess put this world behind her and fixed her whole being on the consolations of religion. For many months she lived in complete seclusion. Then Trepoll, who had been transferred to St.-Petersburg as govnor and had beaten down the angry population, had himself fallen in disgrace and died of sheer exhaustion and an overwrought heart. The crar and his family were cruising at the time, and none of them, nor of the magnates at the court, would return to stand by Tropost's grave. The czar even signified that the occasion need not be recognized, but the Grand Duchess Elisabeth defied his will She left her retirement in Moscow came to St. Petersburg and attended every one of the elaborate services for the dead held beside Trepoff's coffins and stood by while it was put in its grave.

When she returned to Moscow she gave her mind to organizing her religious life into a system. At first she took the regular vows of a nun of poverty, chastity and obedience. Then in a large, bare house outside the Kremlin gates she started on the beginnings of a Convent of Mary and Muria. At first ton ladies of high Russian families worked under her-Their day began at 7 in the morning with prayer. Later they occupied themselves with needlework for the aged poor and for the sick in hospitals, and they were taught the disponsing of simple medicines. Since then the numbers in the convent have grown to about thirty. Some of them go out reading to the bedrid-den; and the Grand Duchese herself sometimes performs the duty of washing the dead. There are no servants whatever in the convent. All the work is done by the aristocratic sis-

ters themselves.



Mushrooms With Eggs Always Appea clated-Salmi of Lamb a General Favorite-Stewed Pluma Excellent Descert.

Mushrooms With Eggs—Break a dozen fresh mushrooms and put them into a stewpen with a tablespoonful of butter, one-quarter of a teaspoonful of salt, pepper to taste and a few drops of lemon juice. Cover the pan and simmer slowly for ten minutes. Then add one cupful of cream and a little chicken or veal stock, and cook slowly until the mixture begins to thicken little. Then stir in six eggs well beaten and stir until the whole is of the consistency of scrambled eggs.

SELECTED RECIPES THAT ARE OF MERIT.

Serve on well-prowned toast; Salmi of Lamb—Cook one table spoonful of butter with one-half table spoonful of finely chopped onlon five minutes. Add 1½ tablespoonfuls of flour and cook until well browned. Pour on gradually one cupful of stock and season with one-fourth of a teaspoonful of pepper and one teaspoonful of walnut catchup. Reheat alloss of cold roast lamb in sauco, arrange on a hot platter, having slices overlap one another, and pour sauce over mest.

Union Cake-Two cups sugar, one cup of sweet milk, one cup of butter, three cups of flour, one-half cup of cornstarch, four eggs, three level teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-hall teaspoonful of ground mace. Rub but ter, sugar and eggs together, rubbing one ogg in at a time; sift in the cornstarch and one cup of flour and the milk alternately. Lastly the two cups of flour and the baking powder. Bake in a large pan in a moderate oven with a paper cap over the top till it's half done.

Stewed Plums-Wipe each plum with a soft, damp cloth and prick it with a fork to prevent burnting. Have the water in the preserving kettle a little more than lukewarm and gently lay the fruit in it. Bring to a gentle boil; cook just long enough for the plums to become tender, but not long enough for the skins to crack. They must be watched carefully. Remove to a deep dish, add a cup of granulated sugar to every quart of liquor, boil to a syrup and pour over the plums.

Venison Steaks and Hash.

Baked Onlone in Ramekins. Peel and parboil 12 medium-sized onions; drain; chop. Melt two tablespoons butter; add two tablespoons flour, one-quarter teaspoon sait, one and one-quarter cups cream, four tablespoons soft bread crumbs, one tablespool chopped parsley. Boil five minutes, add one egg slightly beaten and the chopped onions. Cool slightly, add whites of two eggs, beaten stiff-more seasoning if needed. Bake in buttered rameking 20 minutes. Serve immediately.

How to Cook Dried Pess. Place a lump of roda the size of s valuat in a saucepan of cold water, add the peas to this and bring to the boll: allow them to boll for 40 minutes They will then be beautifully soft and well cooked. If for soup, add to the stock, otherwise they should be drained in a colander, buttered and pep pered, and set aside for a few sec onds for the butter to melt well into them.

Fine-Grained Cake.

I use it for Washington ple of whipped cream ple. One cup nugar, one-half cup butter, one egg, one and one-half cups flour, one-half cup milk, one and one-half teaspoon baking powder, flavor. Bake in round tine, put together with felly. Frost with one tablespoon of butter, one cap powdered sugar, little milk and flavor.-Exchange.

Jellled Ment.

One cup of beef which has been cooked and put through food chopper. half cup bread crumbs, salt and pepper to taste, mix well. Sile into this two thirds cup of bolling water which has had one-half an envelope of golatin dissolved in it. Pack in a tin and set in a cool place, after which it can be silced. _

How to Cook Beets. Fill a pail as large as will hold as many as you want to cook. Don't cut them, as that makes them bleed. Coyer with cold water, cover up tight, put in hot oven and let bake. This time of the year I gut them in early so at to have them done for dinner. They are no more trouble till done.






