## Special Session of Congress Called

PRESIDENT WILSON has issued the formal proclamation convening Congress in extra session at noon Monday, April 7th. The call did not go into details, but everybody understands the purpose of the call to be a revision of the tariff—a revision downward. The Ways and Means committee of the House, where all revenue bills must originate, has already drafted a bill that will materially reduce tariff duties. Particularly with reference to sugar, clothing, farming implements and all necessities of life will the cut in the tariff be radical? On the other hand additional revenue will be raised from an income tax—a tax upon the wealthy where it can be borne without discomfort.

There is no question as to what action the house will take in the matter—it will pass it. There is, however, some speculation as to how the bill will fare in the senate. The senate is only slightly democratic and part of that majority is opposed to a reduction of tariff wherein the constituents in certain sections desire special protection. The old theory that the tariff is a "local issue" holds good—and some difficulty is anticipated with the sugar, lumber and other senators, who for selfish reasons are protectionists along certain lines. Then, too, the progressives in the senate, though avowed advocates of a reduction in the tariff, are not willing to go as far as the president and the house in lowering the duties. It is, therefore, quite possible that some concessions will have to be made to this element in order that some tariff legislation may be enacted, but it is not believed that the opposition to a lower rate of duties will seriously affect the bill.

Of course, the special interests will be on hand—they are always there. The sheep man and his more prosperous brother, the manufacturer, will be there; the sugar man and his colleague who takes the principal profit, the refiner, will be there; the harvester trust, the lumber trust, the oil trust, the steel trust that have profited by special privilege will be there—and the cattlemar, ah yes, he'll be there, too. But the indications are that, while these special interests will be given a respectful hearing, there is another class that has been conspicuous by its absence in legislation in the past—the people—the great mass of our population—will be given a most respectful hearing. The new tariff will be drawn in the interest of the masses and while the democratic party has no desire to harm property interests and deny to capital a just return on its investment, the interests will be told to be content with legitimate profits and the extortion of the past must cease. Some legislation is due the great mass of American people and this administration will give it. The interests have had their inning.

## NEW ANTI-GAMBLING LAW

Approved March 13, 1913

BE it enacted by the Legislature of New Mexico:

SECTION 1. That any person who shall play for money or other thing of value, any game of chance, by whatsoever name known, or howsoever played, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not to exceed three months or both.

SECTION 2. That any person who conducts or operates any such game, or who knowingly permits any such game to be played upon premises of which he is the owner, lessee or occupant, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not more than five hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than six months or both.

SECTION 3. That any officer charged with the enforcement of this act who shall knowingly and willfully fail to prosecute violations hereof, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not to exceed three months, or both.

SECTION 4. That it is necessary for the preservation of the public peace and safety of the inhabitants of the State of New Mexico that this act become effective at the earliest possible time, and, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this act shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

As Sheriff of Lincoln County, New Mexico, it is my duty to enforce the provisions of the above law.

## Character Sketches

### THE APACHES ARE COMING

DESPITE the protest of the New Mexico legislature, the fight of Senators Fall and Catron and Congressman Ferguson, the Apaches—the Geronimo band—are to be quartered on the Mescalero-Indian reservation just south of us. These are not our original Apaches—they are the White Mountain Apaches, the Chiricahui, the bloodiest branch of the bloodiest tribe of Indians ever known in the southwest. Their old leader, Geronimo, has been dead a number of years and the tribe—about 600 in number—has been held as prisoners on the Fort Sill, Oklahoma reservation, for a great many years. They have no doubt acquired the arts of peace and we doubt if any serious consequences will attend their return to this section. We are not inclined, however, to belittle the efforts of those who endeavored to prevent the return of the Apaches; for the older inhabitants of New Mexico and Arizona have a very vivid recollection of the inhuman atrocities perpetrated by this band, and their ire is not difficult to appreciate.

But, getting down to local conditions, and our sketch, we merely use the foregoing as an introduction. For the Mescalero reservation now holds a band of Apaches—Mescaleros—but once supported an additional branch of the Apache family—the Jicarillas. The Jicarilla Apaches were considered excessively devilish and mean and the early settlers memorialized the department, plead and petitioned it to remove the Jicarillas. To all these appeals, however, the department turned a deaf ear.

Finally, the burden became unbearable, and about that time—1884—Grover Cleveland was elected president for the first time. Soon after his inauguration the following year, a celebrated local character—Loomis by name—took it upon himself to visit Washington and see the President himself about the removal of the Jicarillas. Loomis gave out the purpose of his visit

before leaving, asserting that Grover, his old college companion, would listen to his appeal, as indeed, he would be compelled to do so.

So, Loomis made the trip, and his return was awaited with a good deal of expectancy—not that any special results would be attained, but with a curiosity as to how he would approach the president and what he would say. If he succeeded in gaining an audience. Their patience was rewarded—in more ways than one—upon the return of Loomis. His friends gathered around him, and eagerly sought the desired information.

The self-appointed representative of the people reared back on his heels and began to relate his conference with the president. Some skeptical listener irreverently inquired how it was possible for him to dodge all the guards, get past the doorkeepers and reach the holy of holies and stand in the presence of the Chief Magistrate.

"Huh!" replied Loomis, "No trouble at all; I just told them who I was and that the president was expecting me. It was easy sailing. I walked right up to the private desk of the president, slapped him on the shoulder and said, 'hello, old fellow!' He turned round, with a frown, but when he saw who it was jumped up and wrung my hand just as he did in our old school boy days and exclaimed 'If it ain't Loomis!' and inquired what he could do for me. I started to tell him, but he told the men sitting around his desk to retire; that he had some important business to transact with an old friend, and he would call them again when he wanted them. I learned afterward that these men were some of his cabinet members, but that didn't make any difference—they went out."

"When the president and I were alone and had talked a long while over old times he again said, 'Loomis, what can I do for you?'"

"Cleveland," I said, "them G-d-d Jicarilla Apaches have got to be moved?"

"He turned away a moment, then faced me, slapped me on

the knee and said: 'By God, she pops, Loomis!'"

"And, By God, she did," concluded Loomis; which was true. The Mescalero reservation knew the Jicarillas no longer.

### Arbor Day Proclamation

WHEREAS, the laws of the State provide that the Governor shall designate a day to be set apart and known as Arbor Day, but that the actual planting of trees may be done at a time which may best suit local climatic conditions, such time to be designated by the county school superintendents of the respective counties:

Now, Therefore, I, William C. McDonald, Governor of the State of New Mexico, by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby designate and proclaim, Friday, the 11th day of April, 1913 as Arbor Day.

I recommend that this day be observed as a holiday in all the public schools of the State; that the County School Superintendents give proper notice of the day that may be selected in the respective counties for the actual planting of trees.

All intelligent citizens know the importance of tree culture and forestry in our state. Arbor Day, if properly observed, will stimulate a statewide interest in this cause. The great lesson of conservation should be taught as well as that of the propagation and culture of tree life.



WARMER FOR DIPPING CANDY

Manufacture of Chocolates Expedited by Use of Electric Apparatus—Clean and Safe.

In the making of chocolate candies it is very necessary to keep the chocolate for dipping in the proper fluid state, so as to permit of uninterrupted work and insure getting pieces of uniform size with uniform coatings of chocolate.

The electric chocolate warmer permits of keeping the chocolate coating at the proper temperature and consistency—a small snap switch placed within reach of the "dipper" providing a low heat, medium heat and a high heat for regulating the temperature as desired. Whether the work is done

in a refrigerated room or not the easy control of the heat and of the consistency of the chocolate insures the best results.

These warmers are used in any candy factory, large or small. They are safe, clean, can be installed anywhere, and are ready to operate at a moment's notice. There is absolutely no danger from fire or explosion.

The heating element is entirely inclosed in a metal casing the same shape as the inner chocolate pan, which latter can be lifted out for washing etc., by handles provided for the purpose.

FLASHING SIGN ON A TRUCK

Letters Are Brought Out in One Color and Then Another as Vehicle Moves in Dark.


Using the sides of the body of a motor delivery truck as a "flashing" electric sign, the letters of which are brought out in succession, first in one color and then another, as the truck runs through the streets after dark, is a new idea in electric sign practice.

NOVEL DYNAMOS ARE FOUND

English Electrician Discovers Electricity in Fruits, Nuts and Vegetables—Of Low Power.


Fruits, nuts and vegetables as electric dynamos is the burden of an English electrician's discoveries. The degree of electric potentiality is slight and it varies with the nature of the fruit or vegetable, or nut, but, nevertheless, the galvanometer can always detect the presence of the electricity. Negative electricity is supplied by the earth to the soil, and the extent of such conductivity varies with the degree of moisture in the soil. Dry earth is a nonconductor, a fact strongly evident from the fact that unless the roots of the plant secure certain percentages of moisture the plant dies.

The moisture in the soil provides the sap, which spreading upward, flows to the uttermost extremities of the plant through the various arteries existing for such circulation. The electrolyte is represented by the sap and is in constant circulation so long as the soil conducts, and the cells of the plant become converted into small low powered accumulators, there being at least one cell so charged by the earth and air in all representatives of the plant kingdom. So perfect is the insulation provided by nature that the charge is retained until it is broken down by man or by decay.

LAMP WITH MAGNETIC LOCK

Curious and Ignorant Miner Cannot Ignite Gases by Drawing Spark From Storage Battery.

The incandescent electric lamp, being entirely enclosed, meets the requirements of an ideal mine lamp admirably, as it has neither an open flame nor a hot surface on which gases might be ignited, says the Popular Electricity. The only risk encountered is this: Where storage batteries are used to insure long burning hours for a lamp, some ignorant minor might open the casing out of curiosity, draw a spark from the battery while tinkering with it and touch off the gases with this spark. While such

tampering with the lamp is uncalled for in ordinary practice, the cautious mine owner guards against even the possibility of such a mishap by fitting each lamp either with a seal placed on it by the foreman, or with a lock to which only the foreman has keys. As a further variation of the locking scheme, one firm has put on the market a lamp that is locked or unlocked when the current is turned on or off.



TAKE PLACE OF MUSHROOMS

When Succulent Relish is Unobtainable, Fried Radishes, Properly Prepared, Are a Good Substitute.

Mushrooms are fast becoming a necessity in the household of epicures, but there always comes a time when fresh ones are not obtainable and when a spice of a little extra elegance is needed for the larder, or to add a flavor to a grilled steak or a succulent chop, a good substitute for the champignon is found in fried radishes, peeled, and browned in plenty of butter. When brown and tender, arrange around the meat and send into the table, and wait for the exclamations of surprise as the similarity of flavor is noted. Oftentimes if the guests are not apprised, the substitution will pass unnoticed.

Comptes of winter fruits properly prepared help over that interval after the departure of the grape and other fresh fruits, when the palate craves the pleasant tart of nature's tonic to the system. The French housewife makes an intricate study of the preparation of her preserves and marmalades, and her attractive dishes of jams made from peaches, plums and pineapple, flavored oranges and apples, prunes and gooseberries are a revelation to the American housekeeper who has, perhaps, taken less time to devote to the study of her table at this season. Many Americans who prepare and stew their fruit daintily enough fall completely in one of the most important points of serving through which an otherwise alluring dish is often spoiled. Comptes should be served either hot or thoroughly chilled, and not as occasionally with us, lukewarm. Serve even the matutinal dish of stewed prunes from the ice chest with one or two green grape leaves under their glass dish, and see how much the flavor of this plebeian dish is improved.

HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS

Blankets, after being washed and dried thoroughly, should be well beaten with a carpet beater. Wood alcohol will take varnish stains from wash goods. Soak them a few minutes in the alcohol. Kerosene is not so explosive as it is inflammable, but it should never be brought in contact with fire.

If you have a jacket which is troublesome to iron, bathe the plate before it is washed, then iron and remove the threads. Use fine thread. Towels should not be put in the guest room when they are brand new. Use them until they have been laundered several times and lose their stiffness.

To wind a curtain, remove it from the brackets, wind it up by hand and then put it into the brackets and pull it out full length. Repeat if necessary.

If you rinse a plate with cold water before breaking the eggs on it, add to them a pinch of salt and then stand where there is a current of air, and you will have no difficulty in beating them to a froth.

Danger in a Dark Kitchen. No man has a right to expect a woman to keep a sweet heart and a cheerful mind and live in a house bare of comfort and beauty and work in a dark kitchen. Too many farmers when building a house never consult their wives, take no thought of their comfort or convenience, and leave the kitchen the last thing to be considered if it is considered at all. And if asked to spend money on decorating the home would actually feel abused! A woman's life in the country is often necessarily lonely and she ought to have the very sunniest, most pleasant rooms in the house for her sitting-room and kitchen. Most farm wives spend two-thirds of their waking hours in the kitchen, and no money spent in making this place one of convenience and comfort can ever be wasted.

Hot Cross Buns. Sift together one quart flour, half teaspoon salt, one cup sugar, three scant teaspoons baking powder. Rub in half cup butter, add half pound cleaned raisins or currants, half teaspoon nutmeg, half teaspoon allspice, quarter pound cut citron. Beat two eggs and add half cup milk and stir into dry mixture, adding enough milk to mix to a firm dough, mold into round buns, lay two inches apart on greased pans, brush with milk, cut cross on each, sprinkle, cut with granulated sugar and bake in hot oven.

New Asparagus Dish. A delicious variation for asparagus is to bake it in a cream sauce. Cook in salted water until tender, drain, put in a butter baking dish and pour enough cream sauce over to cover. Sprinkle with grated Swiss or Parmesan cheese and a few bits of butter, and brown in the oven.

Makes Wool Light. After your blankets have been washed and dried thoroughly beat them vigorously with a carpet beater. This makes the wool light and soft and gives the blankets a new, fresh appearance.


Minutes Misset. One pint of sour buttermilk, one teaspoon soda, two teaspoons melted butter, four to make a soft dough just stiff enough to handle. Mix, roll and cut out rapidly with a little handling as may be. Bake in a quick oven.

## Court to Adjourn Today

THE entire past week has been consumed in the hearing of the Ascarete murder, for the trial of which a jury was secured last Saturday, after the exhaustion of the regular panel and the issuance of two special venires. The testimony was concluded Tuesday, the arguments made that afternoon and evening, and at 10 o'clock that night the case went to the jury at the close of Judge Medler's charge. The jury has been out since that hour and is still out at 9 o'clock this (Friday) morning. After the jury had been out about 18 hours Judge Medler called it in and gave it additional instructions. The report is that the jury stands 10 to 2 for conviction, but there appears to be little hope of a verdict; and in the event the jury reports a disagreement this morning it will likely be discharged.

With the discharge of the jury in the present case, it is the announced purpose of the court to take a recess until about the middle of May, at which time the regular petit jury panel will be recalled and cases now remaining on the docket will be heard. The court will set a date for the trial of these cases before adjourning today. The court has conducted a very active term, but owing to the length and gravity of some of the cases, particularly this change of venue murder case, in which more than ten days have been consumed, and the lengthy deliberations of the juries, the number of criminal cases has not been disposed of as the efforts put forth would indicate. Hence the May term, which will hold until the docket will be cleared. It is a source of gratification that the special term is to be held it will be a saving to the taxpayers. It is also an additional proof of the disposition of the court and of the court officials to dispatch all public matters as speedily as possible, which meets the hearty commendation of our people.

## The Big Water Suit

THE UNITED STATES, through the reclamation service, has instituted one of the biggest suits against Lincoln county citizens of which there is any record. Its bigness does not only involve a vast interest but names as defendants four hundred and twenty of our people. Every individual or corporation using water from the Hondo Stream System - Bonito, Little Creek, Eagle Creek, Ruidoso and Hondo is involved in this litigation. At the instigation of the reclamation service, all these people are called upon to go to Santa Fe in answer to the complaint of the government or to employ attorneys to represent them.

Before this case is completed untold injury may befall many of our citizens who have enjoyed water rights along these streams. In the first place each and every one must secure the services of an attorney, failing to do so and failing to make an appearance will jeopardize every interest they possess and the difficulty is and that is where the tragedy will come in many of the defendants may not appreciate the gravity of the situation may upon their right and thus lose their property.

Of course, each of these individuals cannot afford to employ a separate attorney, should they do so it would be a fiasco but what can and should be done is to have lawyers and firms of lawyers, and the defense may be mounted and strong so that there will not be so many men working in different channels and thus secure better results for a smaller aggregate fee. It will cost several thousand dollars, at least, to contest this case with the government and when many have lost their money the burden will be lightened. The railroad company, as one of the defendants will, as a matter of course, be prepared to protect its rights, but the other defendants must look after their own interests. Few of the defendants are able, singly, to pay for the services of a good attorney, but all of them can combine and employ a number of good attorneys and relieve themselves of a heavy load. There may not be much to the case, but whether there is or not a failure to answer the complaint of the government will jeopardize every individual interest failing so to do.

## Balkan War Continues

WAR with all its dread consequences continues in the Balkan peninsula. The Turks have been hemmed in a small territory surrounding Constantinople. Adrianople, the Holy City of the Turks, was assaulted and captured by the Bulgarians after a prolonged siege. Scutari, in Albania, is surrounded by the Montenegrin and Serbian armies, bombarded constantly, and its fall is momentarily expected. Greece has also captured some important fortresses and much territory. It seems that Turkey in Europe is doomed, unless the powers come to her assistance. It would be a shame and a disgrace upon civilization for the big powers to step in now and deprive those four plucky little nations of the fruits of their well earned victory. However, the indications are that the ruling powers are becoming restless and that they may force the victors to allow the Turk to live. If they should do this the so-called Christian powers will place themselves in a category

worse than the unspeakable Turk. For centuries the Turk has been permitted, through the concert of the powers, to maintain a government that has shamed civilization and has been one of the blackest pages of history.

Our principal rain the past week has been a reign of dust; yet we have no desire to exchange places with the people of Ohio and Indiana. Too much delightful weather makes us indifferent to the woes of others.



# NEWS and GOSSIP OF WASHINGTON



## An Old-Fashioned Car on Pennsylvania Avenue



WASHINGTON—The electric car, or better, the electrified car, that runs back and forth across the Pennsylvania avenue bridge and for some distance up Pennsylvania avenue extended, is a relic.

When you enter this car you note that it is only half as large, or a fourth as large, as the average run of the heavy and noisy cars on the main lines. There are only six windows on each side of this little car, and a low bench or side seat runs along each side of the car. This seat is covered with red carpet. That looks old-fashioned and homelike. But you note also that a group of incandescent lamps glow in the low ceiling of the car, that electric push buttons are in the window frames and that the usual electric traction devices are on the platform.

Finally your glance hits an opening

in the middle of each door. In this opening works a brass slide. As you have it, through that opening in cold or in rainy weather you would hand a quarter to the driver, and putting your lips close to the opening would say, "Tickets" or "Change." The driver would open a long tin box attached either to the dash of the car or to his belt and would pass back to you through the opening a little envelope on which was printed either "Tickets" or "25 Cents." You would tear the end off the little envelope and, taking out a ticket or a nickel, would drop it in a tall box of wood and glass on the right-hand side of the door. The driver—from the outside of course—would look into the box, and seeing that you had deposited your fare, would pull a string and the nickel or the ticket would drop out of sight into the base of the box.

You know now that you are on board one of the old horse cars. Having the ticket slot in the door at both ends, shows that it was of a later period than the bob-tailed car with the rounded dash in front and the funny little step behind—the car that was turned round on a turntable at the end of the route. Still you know that that old car has made many trips in this town.

## "Biscuits Is Biscuits" Is the Impression Abroad

WHAT is a biscuit? There has been an impression abroad that "biscuits is biscuits," and that that lot them out, but German customs officials have found a biscuit is:

"A fine baker's product, sweetened and flavored, and should, therefore, come under a particular heading for import duty."

And, in consequence of this epicurean definition, importers of American biscuits in the Fatherland are forced to pay a prohibitive duty. So high has this duty been set that one importer has made a protest to Ambassador G. A. Leishman at Berlin that the matter be taken up by the state department.

Many weighty problems have left their indent on the massive brows of the shippers of our ship of state. But the latest problem is one that will force them to get down on their knees and scrub out the cellars of their intellects. "What is beer?" "What is a Democrat?" "What is whiskey?"—they have all been answered. But now comes a proposition of preponderant porosity, and it is up to the state department officials either to substantiate the good old Century dictionary, or to agree in the German version. The Century dictionary gives this press notice on biscuits:



"A kind of hard, dry bread, consisting of flour, water, or milk, and salt, and baked in thin, flat cakes. The name is also extended to similar articles very variously made and flavored. See cracker."

The German importers of American biscuits say that our biscuits ought to be classed as "Einfaches backwerk," and taxed accordingly.

The state department hasn't heard from Ambassador Leishman yet, but expects to get an answer, and officials are getting ready for an international tussle over the dictionary. They may ask a counter-question: "What is a protest?"

## White House Housekeeper Wins Name and Fame



WINNERS and diners at the capital who are fond of good things to eat and have palates hard to please, are beaming because Mrs. Woodrow Wilson has retained Mrs. A. J. Jaffray, the Canadian woman who for the past four years has served as housekeeper at the White House.

Few if any of Mrs. Jaffray's admirers know her personally. It's her works that have won her name and fame. The presiding genius of the interminable series of feasts which marked the progress of the Taft administration, Mrs. Jaffray has earned a place in history. The cuisine of the Taft regime has become famous for

its excellence and the manner of feasting at the White House is the envy of the smartest hosts at the capital.
