

# INDUSTRY AND MECHANICS

## FINDING USE FOR AILANTHUS


Great Quantities of Tree in Ohio and Mississippi Valleys—Forest Service is Experimenting.

Excelsior can be made from any or all kinds of woods. According to the popular notion, it is a product of wood waste, but this is not usually the case. But the forest service, which has been experimenting to discover uses for ailanthus, sometimes known as paradiap tree or tree of heaven, finds that it probably will not make good excelsior. There are great quantities of ailanthus in the Ohio and Mississippi valleys, where it has been naturalized from specimens introduced from China, until it is now more abundant than some of the native species. Its wood has been used in small quantities for boxes and crates, but no other use has been reported. The Indiana state board of forestry and the forest service co-operated in obtaining a small consignment for an excelsior factory, where it was found that ailanthus does not work up into good excelsior because strands tended to break and crumble under pressure. This may have been due in some measure to the fact that the wood had been kiln dried, and further experiments will be undertaken to see whether air dried material, after a six months seasoning, will be more satisfactory.

## FOR PUNCHING HEAVY BELTS

Machine Perforates or Cuts Heavy Belting Quickly—Modeled on Principle of a Typewriter

It is no easy task to punch holes in the heavy leather belting used on machinery, or it was no easy task before a North Carolina man designed the machine shown here. This is a punching and cutting apparatus mounted on a stand that can easily be moved from one part of a factory to another. There is an opening at the top to receive the belt and both punching and cutting means within




For Punching Belts

By the moving of a lever the knives or punches are operated. The whole affair is modeled somewhat on the principle of a typewriter. The belt is thrust through the machine as paper is pushed through a typewriter carriage and is cut in the same manner as the keys of a typewriter strike the paper. A belt can be covered or perforated for splicing in a few seconds.

## ADJUSTMENT IS MADE EASY

Plane Gauge, Invented by Indiana Man, is Readily Set at Any Angle—How It is Done.

The gauge consists of a hardwood board, A, 1/2 inch thick, the length and width being determined by the plane on which it is to be used; a thumb nut, B, a sheet metal butt hinge, C, and some well steel. If the plane is made of iron, two holes are drilled through the side of the body, to correspond with the holes in the hinge. A semi-circular piece, D, is cut from the sheet steel, so that its center will co-

incide with that of the hinge pin when it is bolted to the board A with the hinge, the other wing of the hinge being fastened to the plane. Another piece of sheet steel is cut and fastened on the plane, with the hinge, extending up high through to hold the end of the bolt carrying the thumb nut, B, as shown, writes John V. Loeffler of Evansville, Ind., in the Popular Mechanic. With this arrangement the gauge is readily set at any angle, and if a scale of the various degrees is marked on the semi-circular piece, the adjustment is quickly made without the use of a protractor.


**Find Value of Cotton.** A French federation of cotton spinners has established a laboratory for determining the percentage of moisture or any abnormal dryness in cotton, staple that is too dry being regarded as defective.

## CHIMNEY CAP MADE USEFUL

Means Afforded for Allowing Escape of Smoke and Gases, While Preventing Wind From Entering.

In illustrating and describing a chimney cap, invented by J. E. McCall of Montgomery, Ala., the Scientific American says:

The particular purpose here is to provide a cap having a comparatively simple form and provided with means for facilitating the escape of smoke and hot gases, while preventing the wind from blowing downwardly into the chimney, and yet allowing the escape of water falling in the form of rain upon the top of the cap. Provision is made for arresting and returning a portion of the soot, sparks, and analogous matter, so that such matter is, as far as possible, prevented from escaping from the chimney.

Also means are provided for trapping and holding such materials as are carried upward with smoke and hot gases passing through the chimney for further combustion.

## WORLD'S SUPPLY OF RUBBER

Little Republic of Brazil to Engage Intelligently in Manufacture of That Commodity.

A large part of the world's supply of crude rubber comes from the republic of Brazil, which has hitherto paid little attention to the manufacture of that commodity. Another day is coming. Brazil is about to engage intelligently in the manufacture of rubber, an enterprise which, in the course of time, may affect the manufacture of that material in the United States and in Europe, by bringing in a new and formidable competitor. The Brazilian Economique of Rio de Janeiro says that under favorable conditions offered by the government refineries of caoutchouc (rubber) will be established in a number of states and factories for the manufacture of rubber articles in the cities of Manaus, Belem in Para, Recife and Bahia. There will be special exemptions in the way of duties upon articles imported for the carrying forward of this enterprise.

**Revolutionize Varnish Industry.** Five million gallons of wood oil (also known as tung oil), made from the seeds of the wood oil tree, were imported from China last year, and the product is said to have had a revolutionary effect on the varnish industry of the United States. It has largely taken the place of kauri gum and has made possible the manufacture of a quicker drying varnish, which is less liable to crack than that made from kauri gum, and has been found of special value in waterproof printing for cement. The tree is climatically adapted for cultivation in the southern states, and the department of agriculture is distributing one-year-old specimens to bona fide experimenters.

Tasmania boasts the richest tin mines in the world.

Mexico's first button factory has been started at Mexico City.

Missouri in 1913 produced 24,530 tons of barytes, valued at \$117,035.

The highest speed at which elevators at present are operated is about eight miles an hour.

Metal shavings and cuttings are now pressed into brick form and made use of in iron smelting.

That whooping cough is caused by a bacillus has been discovered by two European physicians.

In Belgium boys under sixteen years of age can still be employed in brick yards up to 12 hours daily.

The advantage derived from machinery in the United States is about twice as great as that of Europe.

Designed for use in heavy winds without injury, a new windmill has been invented that can be turned partly or completely out of the wind when necessary.

A mixture of one gallon of kerosene to five of gasoline is said to work as well in automobiles as the motor fuel alone and to keep the motor much cleaner.

Water that issues from a California artesian well is accompanied by enough natural gas to supply power to pump it over a considerable area for irrigation.

**India Comfit.** Sift together one cup cornmeal, one cup cornstarch, two teaspoons cream tartar, one teaspoon soda, one-half teaspoon salt. Beat two eggs very light, add one cup freshly boiled and cooled rice, one-half cup molasses, one tablespoon melted butter and one cup milk. Combine the mixtures. The batter must be very thin and if necessary add more milk. Pour into a deep buttered pan and bake in a quick oven. Serve the moment it is taken from the oven, with sauce or whipped cream.

**Sea Foam Rolls.** Scald a pint of sweet milk and add one tablespoon of sugar, one teaspoon salt and butter size of an egg. When lukewarm add one-half yeast cake dissolved in a little warm water and two cups of bread flour. Set to rise three hours, then add flour to knead. Let rise again and then shape into rolls by rolling each one oblong and brush with butter and fold over. Let rise until very light and bake 30 minutes. If wanted at six p. m. mix them about 10:30 a. m.

**Stuffed Shoulder Dinner.** Buy a fresh shoulder of pork, have the butcher bone it, stuff it, sew it up tight, roll it in cloth, boil it two hours, take it out of cloth, put it in an iron spider and bake it two hours. ## DESSERT DISHES OF MERIT

Sure to Be Acceptable Whether the Dinner Be a Formal or Family One.

**Green Apples Charlotte.**—Pare, core and stew in a very little water six or eight good cooking apples. Press the pulp through a sieve and add enough sugar to make it very sweet. While still hot, stir in an ounce of gelatin soaked in about six tablespoons of cold water. Stir until thoroughly dissolved. Then place in another dish containing cold water and stir until the mixture thickens. Then cut and fold in, a large cup of cream, whipped stiff and dry. Turn into a mold, plain or lined with stale sponge cake or lady fingers.

**Quince Puff.**—Pare six goose-sized tart apples and a ripe quince. Slice them into a saucepan and cover with half a cup of water. Put the lid on the saucepan and cover with half a cup of water. Put the lid on the saucepan and cook for half an hour. Press through a sieve and return to the fire. Add yolks of three eggs beaten with half a cup of sugar. Take from the fire and let cool slightly; then fold in the whites of the eggs and turn into a pretty glass dish and place in refrigerator.

**Plum Pudding.**—Stew a quart of plums; remove the pits; sweeten to taste and add a little grated orange peel or nutmeg, and pour into an earthen cup, well buttered. Cover with a spoonful of rich biscuit dough made soft enough to drop from a spoon or with the following batter: a cup of sweet cream or rich milk, one egg, a teaspoon of baking powder and enough flour to make a drop batter. Steam or bake for half an hour and turn out on a heated dish with the fruit on top. Serve with hard sauce.

## MAKE DISH WASHING EASIER

By Simplifying It This Never Pleasant Household Task May Be Made Lighter.

Simplify your dish washing thus: With careful handling the dishes may safely be washed in the sink, doing away with the care of a dishwasher. To lessen danger of breakage place in the bottom of the sink a wooden protector made of stints. If the sink is not provided with an automatic stopper, a rubber sink stopper can be procured at a small price. A wooden dish rack, the kind that opens like an old-fashioned paperholder, will hold plates and saucers upright. The rack may be lifted out of the sink on a tray, and its contents, that have previously been scalded, allowed to dry there. A three-cornered enamel strainer, on feet, occupies a corner of the sink. Into this, which costs a few cents, plates can be scraped before the dish washing begins. That dish towels may be close at hand, have fastened to the wall close to the sink a wooden arrangement with arms which open out or close on which to hang the towels after they have been washed and boiled.

**Sea Foam Rolls.** Scald a pint of sweet milk and add one tablespoon of sugar, one teaspoon salt and butter size of an egg. **Tutti Frutti Shortcake.** Bake one ordinary sponge cake mixture in two oblong pans. Spread one layer with a combination of sliced bananas, shredded pineapple and chopped cherries (either fresh or maraschino), sprinkle over this layer pulverized sugar. Put on the second layer of cake. Spread with sweetened whipped cream and cut in squares for serving. This is entirely original and delicious, as one trial will prove.

**Sausages With Tomatoes.** Fry sausages a nice brown and arrange in dish in front of fire. Cut the tomatoes into slices with some onions thinly sliced. Fry them, season with pepper and salt. Place them among the sausages and serve hot.

**Buttons in Towels.** When making towels that are to hang on nails or hooks, work a buttonhole in each of two opposite corners, then a "hanger" is always ready, whichever end of the towel is taken up.



## News Notes from Outside Points

Continued from Page One

of this annual festival. It was the Dutch who coined the occasion, which was brought over by the Pilgrims from the little city of Leyden, that had opened her arms and hearts to the persecuted pilgrims through one of the most dramatic sieges ever recorded. Philip the second of Spain having declared he would no longer put up with such "heretics," issued an edict for death to all the Dutch heretics, (i. e. those who through Martin Luther had denounced the Catholic faith and were worshipping according to the new light of the world.) Food being withheld, they crouched behind the houses and walls of Leyden and fought day after day, until nothing was left but a scanty daily allowance. Then when nothing else remained the short-grass on the street border was gathered and bruised for a pitiful excuse for food. Then when pestilence broke out and death stalked from door to door, the first break in the awful experience came at last. William of Orange, who lay in camp at Delft only a short distance from Leyden, with Admiral Boisot with a flotilla of fishing boats which were made into fighting crafts. Fortune favored the frail barques with a flood from the ocean and they were enabled to ride on the crest of the inundation into within speaking distance of the Spaniards, who fled in the darkness and Admiral Boisot was thus enabled to sail into Leyden with an abundance of meat and bread for the Pilgrims. So from that day to this they celebrate a thanksgiving on the third of October, the date of their timely deliverance. They were truly thankful, though the simple fare was only meat and bread. Could we, who are so often and regularly seated to sumptuous fare, in comparison, just be thankful for one day for bountiful supply of just plain food we all receive as descendants of

that sturdy stock? Will we not as descendants of that band of heroes, be thankful that since that first harvest of the new world we have been enabled to supply from our bounty, food for half the civilized world?

### Fourth Class Postmasters' Examination




