# SCIENCE and INVENTION

## ODD FACT ABOUT LIGHTNING

Observer of Electrical Phenomena Unable to Tell Direction Blinding Flash Comes From.

Sitting in a dark room at night with a lightning storm coming on, the observer of the electrical phenomena will be unable to tell from which of the compass points a blinding flash comes, even if the room have four windows to the four points of the compass. This, of course, provided the shades be lowered sufficiently for the possible bolt to escape the eye. The roll of thunder following the flash will be the first intimation the observer has of the storm direction.


Especially is this fact marked after the rain is falling heavily and when the rain drops become reflectors of the light, giving the effect of sheet lightning. At such times when the skies seem sheets of flame, one may observe how this reflected light penetrates to every corner of a room with a brilliance not equaled by summer sunlight. The sunlight, coming in direct rays into a room, leaves its shadow spots. The reflected light of the lightning stroke leaves the ceiling and the floor equally illumined. Even the smallest object may be picked up from under a bed or other furniture a little raised above the floor.

## BURNER FOR ALCOHOL LAMP

Particularly Adapted to Consume, and Facilitate Formation and Distribution of Vapor.

A burner for an alcohol vapor lamp, invented by B. Iglesias of Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, is described by the Scientific American as follows:

The invention relates particularly to burners adapted to consume alcohol




Burner for Alcohol Vapor Lamp.

vapor, and is arranged to facilitate the formation and distribution of the vapor. The burner is lighted by igniting alcohol contained in a small annular pan. Centrally disposed within the mantle is a rod which is heated by the burner, and which serves to vaporize the alcohol coming from the main source of supply when that in the pan has been exhausted.

## TACKLE IS MADE TWISTLESS

Devices Especially Useful in Lowering Lifebots From Ship Has Been Invented by New Yorker.

A device that prevents the tackle from twisting while a lifebot is being lowered down the side of a ship has been invented by a New Yorker. The anti-twisting device consists in fitting to each lower block of the tackle a cap having, on each side, three holes through which is

passed the rope, as well as through the sheave holes of each lower block—an arrangement which is intended to keep the blocks from twisting, says the Popular Mechanics. A wooden scantling of proper length is also passed from one lower block to the other through each tackle, thus preventing both tackles from twisting.

Modern War Aeroplanes. So successful a machine for war purposes has the aeroplane proved that the French army has attached expert mechanists to its aerial corps and has equipped a huge motor truck as a complete machine-shop for making repairs in the field.

For Peeling Potatoes. For peeling potatoes in large quantities a carbonated steel cylinder has been invented, against the inside of which the tubers are whirled by a revolving bottom plate.

## TELLS CAPACITY OF LUNGS

Apparatus Designed by California Man Indicates Expansion of Chest as the Wearer Breathes.

An apparatus for determining a person's lung capacity has been designed by a man in California—a state where lung conditions are an important topic. An elastic band that fits around the chest and passes under the armpits is strapped on the person to be tested. In the center of this band is a drum with figures on its face and a spring dial finger that is operated by

the stretching of the elastic and that points to the various figures. One set of numbers denotes lung capacity. As the wearer of the apparatus inhales, his or her chest expands, stretches the elastic and moves the needle. As the person exhales, the elastic contracts and the needle automatically returns to zero. As the physical expansion of the chest is a good indication of the capacity of the lungs, this device is a great help to physicians.

## DEVICE TO ASSIST AERONAUT

Inclinometer Intended to Indicate at Glance How Much Plane is Tilted, Elevated or Deflected.

Already a number of aeroplane fittings in kind such as have the automobile enthusiast have been invented and are offered for sale upon the field. Chief among these is the inclinometer invented by a Californian in no way connected with the aeronaut of that name. This inclinometer caused some excitement among the fliers around New York city recently. There arose a difference of opinion among them as to whether the instrument was too sensitive or not sensitive enough. It is a device for telling at a glance three things that a flier needs to know—that is, the direction and inclination forward and back and the inclination

downward. It consists of a spherical glass case in the center of which is mounted a compass. A weight is pivoted in two planes and the instrument is graduated so that the aviator can read directly in degrees how much his plane is tilted out of the horizontal or how much the nose is elevated or deflected. It is said to be difficult now to determine the position of a machine in thick weather when lost in clouds with the earth hidden.

How many, or rather how few women know that the tongue carries disease germs to the teeth. Foreign particles frequently adhere to the rough or upper side of the tongue, and beside it is often coated with what is called "dental fur." This fur is a yellowish white substance and is found on the teeth and tongue of every one who does not clean his or her teeth and mouth at least twice a day. This deposit usually forms so quickly that even the most fastidious have sometimes to be careful lest it settle on the teeth.

If the teeth cannot be brushed frequently during the day, then it is advisable to brush them the first thing in the morning and the last thing before retiring at night. These two acts alone, if the teeth and mouth and tongue are properly cleaned, will do much toward preserving the teeth.

So many women brush the teeth in a haphazard fashion. They brush vigorously enough, but they are not particular enough to see that the brushing is carried on properly. The brush is wet and then sprinkled with powder, the teeth set a quick brushing of the outer surface, very little attention given to the inside, and usually the brushing consists of the crosswise stroke. Of course this is a little better than nothing, as it removes surface accumulations, and not always that.

## FOR HEALTH AND BEAUTY

Matter of Diet Is Highly Important, if One Would Acquire and Preserve Good Looks.

All of the fresh fruits add their quota of usefulness to the diet, and eaten plentifully will help to keep you well and pretty. There is a legend that one famous French beauty lived exclusively on oranges, but common sense tells us that she occasionally slipped in a meal of things more substantial. The thin girl will do well to eat largely of raisins, for they contain a rich proportion of sugars that are so fattening. Train yourself to eat a variety of foods. Many a girl with a bad complexion owes it to the habit of eating only a few favorite dishes. The different fruits and vegetables contain a variety of salts, all valuable to the body, and the natural appetite demands a change, even from the best and most nutritious fare. Eat generously of the fruits and vegetables of the season affords, but—just one word of caution—see to it that they are fresh. A single helping of tomatoes that have begun to spoil, a bit of delectable made of overripe or stale berries, a glass of milk that has been exposed to the summer dust, any of these things may give rise to one of those little ailments known as "summer complaint." — Chicago Record-Herald.


## Upturned Home.



## ODD FACT ABOUT LIGHTNING

Observer of Electrical Phenomena Unable to Tell Direction Blinding Flash Comes From.

Sitting in a dark room at night with a lightning lit storm coming on, the observer of the electrical phenomena will be unable to tell from which of the compass points a blinding flash comes, even if the room has four windows to the four points of the compass. This, of course, provided the shades be lowered sufficiently for the possible bolt to escape the eye. The roll of thunder following the flash will be the first intimation the observer has of the storm direction.


Especially is this fact marked after the rain is falling heavily and when the rain drops become reflectors of the light, giving the effect of sheet lightning. At such times when the skies seem sheets of flame, one may observe how this reflected light penetrates to every corner of a room with a brilliance not equaled by summer sunlight. The sunlight, coming in direct rays into a room, leaves its shadow spots. The reflected light of the lightning stroke leaves the ceiling and the floor equally illumined. Even the smallest object may be picked up from under a bed or other furniture a little raised above the floor.

## BURNER FOR ALCOHOL LAMP

Particularly Adapted to Consume, and Facilitate Formation and Distribution of Vapor.

A burner for an alcohol vapor lamp, invented by B. Iglesias of Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, is described by the Scientific American as follows:

The invention relates particularly to burners adapted to consume alcohol




Burner for Alcohol Vapor Lamp.





CONGRESS convened in regular session Monday, and President Wilson read his first annual message to the combined membership of both houses. Important authorities pronounce it one of the ablest state papers issued from the White House in many years, and in addition to its strength it had also the merit of brevity. The president was emphatic in dealing with Mexico and firmly asserted that peace could not exist with Huerta as provisional president.

THE entire state of Chihuahua is now in the hands of the constitutionalists, or rebels. The federalists evacuated the city of Chihuahua, the capital of the state, without the formality of a fight, and are trying to avoid the victorious Villa forces. It is only an additional blow to the tottering Huerta administration, and may mean that the United States can yet avoid intervention.

Available Men Limited

ETHER good men in Lincoln county are not as plentiful as reported or the jury commissioners were over-particular in the conclusion that must be reached from the action of the commission. Judge Edward L. Medier appointed W. O. Norman, of Lincoln, Charles D. Mayer, of White Oaks, and J. Baril French, of Carrizozo, a jury commission, with instructions to select 500 names. The commission met sometime last week. At the session this week the commission had reached a total selection of 327 names, and, desiring of finding 173 more good men and true, delegated one

of their number, Mr. Norman, to see the judge and ask for a modification. The modification asked was given, and we are gratified that we have 327 men who can face a defendant and boldly confess to the world that each and everyone is his peer something of which every county can not boast.

Arrested for Stealing Saddle

THE desire to possess a good saddle got a young man by the name of Samuel D. Edwards into trouble this week. He appropriated the saddle of M. H. Cook, of Three Rivers, who was here Tuesday night and had left his saddle in the Stevens livery. The officers were notified the following morning, the saddle located and the man also, later, and when arrested and brought before Justice Massie plead guilty to the charge, and, as a result, languishes in the county jail, awaiting the action of the next grand jury.

Another Ranchman Locates

O. Z. FINLEY, a Chaves county cattle man, has purchased holdings near here and will improve a ranch and stock it. Mr. Finley secured the Double Diamond ranch from Governor McDonald, the Clark Hunt patent and lease that was held by Seward Bros., the relinquishments of Samuel Kealey, O. C. Hinton and Mrs. Ira A. Greer. He has made application to lease additional state lands and has filed on a 320-acre homestead. Altogether he will have something like 2,500 acres of land adjoining the Forest Reserve, which gives him an excellent range.

# An Open Letter to the Telephone Using Public

Denver, Colorado November 30, 1913.

The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, in the consideration of its future development, recognizes that its highest interests as a public utility lie in establishing the closest and most friendly relationship with the public generally, and with its patrons in particular; therefore, it is the purpose of The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, through this announcement, to inaugurate what may be termed an advertising educational series of articles, both in the newspapers and in the form of letters to its customers. It is our hope that this campaign may mark a new era in the relation of public utility corporations to the public they serve. We want this education to work both ways, that the public may learn the truth about us, and that we may learn how the public regard us, and how we may fairly and efficiently serve the public—in other words, what is just and right to us and to the people, and to convince the public that we will voluntarily remedy any wrongs we are doing, if pointed out to us.

We shall show you our financial affairs, frankly and freely. It so happens that our financing has been of such a nature that it is easy for us to clearly show you this side of our affairs. What we mean by this is, that we have absolutely no water in our stock, we have no bonds, nor any preferred stock, and no mortgage of any kind upon which to pay fixed charges. We have more invested in our plant at its present replacement value than our issue of common stock, and we have no other stock issued than the common stock. There are no wheels within wheels, nor companies within companies, to absorb profits. We finance ourselves from year to year by selling our common stock to the people, at not less than par, in the states in which we operate.

When we tell you the story of our financing, we will prove to you that there never have been any fortunes, large or small, made out of the manipulation of our stock—in other words, no high financing has ever been done in connection with the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, or its predecessors. The stock never has had any speculative value. It has been, and is now, simply a safe investment.

There is a great misunderstanding upon the part of the public as to this side of our business. for every share they hold, and they have simply come into our company because they believed it to be a safe investment.

There is, too, upon the part of the public, a belief that the company is largely engaged in politics. We imagine this feeling is caused by the fact that in the past, simply from the standpoint of self-preservation, certain corporations were almost compelled to be in politics; but in these days, when the tendency is to place all corporations and trust affairs into the hands of a central body, such as the Interstate Commerce Commission and local state commissions, etc., to deal with the conduct of business such as ours, being in politics, as believed by the public, would be a foolish thing and entirely unnecessary. This is, therefore, to state emphatically that we are not, either directly or indirectly, in politics, in any way, shape or manner, and shall not be.

We are going to attempt to give you the entire story as to our rates. We have been told, when starting to compile the public that we proposed starting a campaign like this, that our efforts would be futile; that our subscribers would turn out to be selfish and only look toward the end of getting as cheap telephone rates as possible. We do not believe this. We believe that the great majority of the public are inclined to be fair, and that it is not so much the question of what our telephone rates are as it is that when we make a statement regarding them, and show our true financing, that we shall be honest, and that the public shall know that we are honest. That when we make a statement as to our profits and earnings, showing just where the dollar that our subscriber pays us goes, the public may know that we are not trying to deceive them or keep anything back that should be shown. When we honestly do this and our position seems to be just and right, we believe that the fairness of the public will sustain us.

We are going to set forth the inherent difficulties of giving universal telephone service. Those articles and letters are not to be a piece of special pleading or adroit use of words, but a clear, business-like setting forth of facts. We hope, before we get through, both ourselves and the public will understand each other better. There is at least no harm to be done in trying to accomplish this desired result.

It is our aim to educate, please and satisfy the public and to be educated ourselves. It seems to me that every corporation has the right of self-defense, the same as an individual. The public has the same right. Listen to our defense and we will listen to yours. No problem has ever been harder for us than just how we were going to let the public know truly about us, but we believe that no problem was ever more important to both. If we really can make you feel that you are a partner in our business, we shall have accomplished much. A large part of the problem will be solved, if we can only bring the public, through education, to a full understanding that there is a mutual dependence between the public service corporations and the public, and that public prosperity depends largely upon the utilities that bring them in contact with each other, and that the more nearly perfect in efficiency and sufficiency the utilities serv-

ing the public are, the more prosperity, comforts and conveniences the public will enjoy.

We believe our story is an interesting one, and we hope that everyone will read it.

*Note*—As an instance of the kind of startling news which newspapers sometimes publish, we want to call attention to recent articles in the newspapers headed, "Call of States Government Calls Upon Two Girl Stenographers to Tell Where They Got Two Million Dollars to Form the Corporation Securities and Investment Company." Then the articles went on to say that this Corporation Securities and Investment Company was a scheme of the Telephone Company to further its purpose of monopolizing telephone companies, etc.

The truth is that our company has been met with a strong feeling in the State of Montana—well-nigh universal—that something should be done to relieve the citizens of that state of two telephone systems. Public meetings have been held, and votes taken, that the telephones of one or the other of the systems should be thrown out. Resolutions and letters have been submitted to us, and we have started out to see what we could do to relieve the citizens of that state of this burden.

We found that the independent interests operating there also operated in Spokane, in the state of Washington, and in northern Idaho, and that the independent interests doing business in Montana could not be bought, or sold, as to give cover for the property in the states of Idaho and Washington. # KING HAUNTED BY DEAD WIFE

Sofia.—There is a room in the Konak at Sofia of which King Ferdinand alone has the key. It contains no precious documents, no costly jewelry, no bullion chest, but only the full-length portrait of a princess long since departed. The gentle Marie Louise gazes sadly out of her gilded frame, and though Ferdinand in moments of exhilaration passes by the room with head averted, in days of stress and trouble he seeks to hide his misery in the silence of the locked and secret chamber.


During the last ten months mysterious rustlings have been heard in the National Museum and the horrid-stricken palace as of some one wandering unhappily from room to room, seeking something that could never be found. On these occasions, when King Ferdinand bethought himself of leaving the chapel door open, his dead wife's shadow has been seen to pass the portals, and he has himself knelt at the altar there, his face buried in his hands, as though awaiting a supernatural visitant. No allusion to these vigils has ever passed his lips, for Ferdinand confides in no one.

Over her children the spirit of Marie Louise also broods as fondly as in her lifetime, and the people believe she visits their bedside whenever they are ill. The nurses who cared for Princess Eudoxia during her long illness last year attributed her almost miraculous recovery to the prayers of the dead mother, who was seen in spirit form in the chapel nightly, always kneeling in the same place slowly lingering her diamond rosary beads.

Owes Success to Wife. King Ferdinand, who has had an extraordinary career, owes his most solid successes to the dead lady who even now watches over him, as he believes, to restrain the impulses against which she vainly warned him when alive, and concerning which even from the other world she has given signs of sorrow and disapproval. He was the pet son of his mother, the cleverest daughter of the late Louis Philippe, king of the French. She never ceased to plot for the restoration of the Bourbons to the throne of France, but in the meantime did not disdain to pick up any possible crown for her sons. Her plans were mostly foiled, as in the case of Philippe, older than Ferdinand, who married Princess Louise of Belgium in the hope of succeeding the late King Leopold. But the marriage was so ill-assorted, and Princess Louise showed such violent antipathy to her husband, that a speedy separation was the result.

With Ferdinand, Princess Clementine had no such trouble. He was the most docile and obedient of her sons, inheriting her own subtle disposition and tenacity of purpose. When Prince Battenberg of Bulgaria had displaced the Russian emperor by his independent attitude, and was consequently forced to leave the country in the dead of night, with only time to throw a coat over his sleeping attire, the palace at Sofia remained vacant. As soon as Battenberg's friends recovered from the shock of his being kidnapped they set off on a tour of Europe to search for a princeling who would undertake the difficult job of governing Bulgaria. Quietly becomes Sovereign. This quest came to the ears of Clementine, who, learning that a favorite habit of these big game hunters when in Vienna was a fourth-rate restaurant, sent her son to make their acquaintance. After some friendly conversation, during which they did not suspect that he was anything but what his uniform proclaimed him to be—a simple lieutenant in an Austrian regiment—he declared himself their man. Without further preamble he took them round to his mother's palace and thus proved to them the reality of his claim to high birth and his connection with two great royal houses. There was no reason why he should not start a dynasty of his own, and the bargain was quickly concluded. In a few days the citizens of Sofia were greatly astonished to see the flag flying once more over the royal palace, and a young man with a prominent nose and a serious face driving through the town in collared stables. There was no equestrian display, no acclamation, no rejoicing. People were still asking themselves, "How long will Russia allow him to stay?"

Royal Wife Finally Secured. As soon as Ferdinand felt his throne to be a little more steady, Princess Clementine began to cast matrimonial nets on her son's behalf. But there were few applicants. Royalists held aloof, and nothing but blue blood would satisfy Ferdinand and his mother. It was by working on the strong religious sentiments of the Duke of Parma that the prize was at last secured in the person of an eldest daughter, the illustrious Marie Louise, to whom was entrusted the mission of furthering Catholicity in schismatic Bulgaria. This was the gentle, fragile idealist, tender offspring of the pious House of Parma, mated to an ambitious adventurer, of her own rank indeed, but of a temperament



and character entirely foreign to her. The personal inclinations of Marie Louise were all for the cloister, where, indeed, several of her sisters have since found a home, but in deference to her father's wishes she gave her hand to Ferdinand and set off with him to work for the advancement of Bulgaria.

Almost every educational and charitable institution in the country owes its origin to her initiative. In a short time she achieved what he had vainly attempted—the reconciliation of his subjects to a foreign ruler. Legends of her bounty and devotedness still survive among the people today. When an heir to the throne was born, nothing seemed wanting to the happy outlook. But this very child, who should have set the seal on her happiness, became the cause of discord and ultimately led to the untimely death of his mother. Maria, who had viewed with disfavor the consolidation of Bulgaria under a prince about whose election she had not even been consulted, now came forward with her inexorable demand that the future ruler of Bulgaria should belong to the orthodox creed or forfeit recognition by the powers.

Refuses to Be Apostate. Ferdinand's mind was soon made up, but it remained to him to persuade Marie Louise. Thunderstruck at the alternative, she at once refused to consider what her conscience told her was an act of apostasy. During two whole years she succeeded in getting the baptism deferred, but as Russia grew more insistent, and Ferdinand more anxious for his crown, she was forced to face the inevitable. Resistance availed no longer, and as a last protest she left the country.

The baptism of Prince Boris according to orthodox rites was carried out with great pomp in the presence of Russian envoys, and Ferdinand's position was henceforth secure. Strange to say, his own subjects revolted against the breach of faith which weighed so heavily on their beloved princess, and even Russia's approval did not mend matters. A wave of criticism and contempt which found expression in the Bulgarian press proved the general indignation. Many seized the opportunity to vent their private spleen against a prince whose affected superiority wounded their democratic pride.

Returns to Her Husband. Nevertheless, Ferdinand, having accomplished his purpose of ingratiating himself with Russia, now began to put things straight with the rest of the world, and for this to succeed it was necessary that his wife should return. But Marie Louise desired nothing more than oblivion. Her maternal instinct, however, strengthened by the insistence of the Pope, and Ferdinand's expectations and excuses, finally prevailed. She returned to her old duties, resuming her good works, but with the joy of life extinguished for ever within her. It is said that no reproach ever passed her lips and she gave no outward sign that her husband had forfeited her respect. To the last she remained his faithful, devoted partner, and her careful advice saved him from many pitfalls such as those into which his pitfalls has sunk. With terror she sounded the depths of the dark soul that could instigate the assassination of his premier, Stambouloff, when he dared to oppose him. Vainly did she plead with him to bridge his ambition and devote himself to the real progress and solid development of the country rather than to his own personal aggrandizement. While she lived he made a pretense of disassociating himself from the work of the Contadins in Macedonia, whose outrages filled Europe with horror.

"God will never bless crime," was her constant warning. "And one day Macedonia will be lost to us through the evil deeds of our wild propagandists." Saw Impending Disaster. She was probably the only person who knew whither Ferdinand's secret hopes tended, and she foretold that disaster would come at the moment when his star seemed most in the ascendant. When in the recent war luck turned against him, the soldiers murmured among themselves: "Surely this is what our princess foretold. Every sin demands its punishment." After her death, King Ferdinand, desirous of restoring the great state functions which were a vital feature of his court, looked around for a hostess who would share the throne, which from being princely had now been raised to the status of royalty. But it was not easy for him to find a mate. No Catholic princess would give her hand; he made several overtures at the Russian court, but there was no Grand Duchess forthcoming. Finally, however, a Protestant princess of the House of Reuss consented to abandon her spinsterhood and occupy the place left vacant nine years ago by Marie Louise.

### LEARNED HIS GOOD POINTS

Man No Doubt Had Often Seen Unfavorably Compared With Dead Man He Described.

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
