INDUSTRY AND MECHANICS

MANTLES THAT WON'T BREAK

English Article That Can Be Tossed About Like Ordinary Rubber Ball—Big Gas Saver.

As astonished gathering at the Hotel Cecil saw incandescent gas mantles thrown about the room, caught by the skillful and afterward thrown back again to the platform, writes the London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian. Then the ill-used mantles were put on gas burners and gave a brilliant light, as if nothing had happened to them. Then the demonstrator, while the gas was still burning, pushed the mantle up with a rod until it bulged and let it fall back again. And still it continued to give a brilliant light. An ordinary gas mantle burning alongside it collapsed at a touch, as, of course, any ordinary gas mantle would. The reason why the ordinary gas mantle gets crippled so easily is that in structure it is a network of woven fabric, so that when you break two or three vertical threads at the neck or collar all the dependent horizontal threads give way, too.


The new mantle is made of exactly the same materials as the old, but it consists entirely of vertical threads, so that destruction of the threads does not alter the hang of the mantle and destroy it wholly. You must destroy every single thread, since each thread (there are 500 of them in a mantle) hangs by itself. The new mantle, in fact, looks like an inverted tassel. It is made entirely by machinery and it is stated that one unskilled worker can turn out a dozen times as many in a day as a skilled worker of the old mantle. It is further stated that the new mantle saves one-third of the gas consumption, because it can be used at a low gas pressure.

SCAFFOLD LADDER IS HANDY

Adapted to Be Various Adjusted and Rearranged for Accomplishment of Various Purposes.

The Scientific American, in describing a scaffold ladder, the invention of C. G. Bishop of Southampton, N. Y., says:

An object here is to arrange improved means adapted to be variously adjusted and rearranged for accomplishing a plurality of purposes, all of which relate to the use of scaffolding of various kinds. Further, to provide a scaffolding device formed of




Scaffold Ladder.

two members connected by a pivotal link and carrying braces for holding the supporting members a proper distance apart and locking the same in that position. The scaffolding ladder is associated with intermediate supports designed to support scaffolding bars. The ladder proper may be used in various capacities as a support for scaffolding, as an ordinary ladder, and as a scaffolding support for use on roofs of various shapes.

MANY TOOLS ARE COMBINED

French Novelty, Contains Among Other Things, Small Anvil to Be Used Together With Vise.

A whole cabinet of tools, including vise, cutting pliers, wrench and hammer, along with the numerous small tools usually included in combination tool sets all part of the hammer, or nested in the hammer handle—is a novelty from France, says the Popular Mechanics. The hammer head may be used as either a vise, a cutting plier or a wrench. The cleave, which holds

the end of the hammer handle and the other leg of the tong together when the tool is being used as a hammer, serves, when removed, as a handle for the small tools. A small anvil is also provided with the outfit, for use in connection with the vise.

Artificial Marble. Artificial marble invented by a Bohemian is said to closely imitate the natural marble and to be stronger, more substantial and less liable to damage than the genuine.

BRUSH HOLDER MADE USEFUL

Most Convenient Article, Invented by Illinois Man, Enables Painter to Reach Long Distance.

Painters, janitors, porters, housemaids and heads of families who like to do the painting themselves will find the extension brush holder invented by an Illinois man a most convenient article. It will enable them to reach points that otherwise could be reached only by means of a ladder or by more or less dangerous climbing, and will thus not only save the user trouble, but will eliminate an element of danger. A metal head is made to fit over the end of a pole, which can

be as long as is needed for the work to be done. The upper part of the head has a hinged holding device in which the handle of the brush is placed and held firm by a thumb screw. This holding portion is also hinged to the lower part of the head and adjustable upon it, so that it may be turned at any angle at which it is desired to use the brush and held there by a screw.

NEW TRADES ARE TAKEN UP

Advent of Steel Sleeping Cars Throws Many Wood Workers Out of Jobs at Pullman Shops.

An apt illustration of reduction in the premium on skill required of the industrial worker is found at Pullman by Graham Romeyn Taylor, who writes in the Survey:

"The advent of the steel car threw wood carving, cabinetmaking and many other skilled crafts on the scrap heap and substituted metal work, demanding distinctly shorter training. Steel sleepers were first made about 1907. This year not a single one of wood is being manufactured. Of the ordinary coaches built on contract for railroads about 75 per cent, are steel body and wooden interior finish, 15 per cent, are all steel and only 10 per cent are of wood. More wood probably be made entirely of steel but for the difficulty experienced in heating them.

"When the steel construction began all the older and skilled employees were encouraged to learn the newer trades, and officials say that many of the cabinetmakers readily adapted themselves to the changed conditions, utilizing much of their old skill in the steel cabinet work. But they frankly admit that the great amount of semi-skilled work, such as the assembling, erecting and riveting of the steel cars, has borne hard on the older employees, who cannot 'stand the racket.' Slava, who 'don't seem to have any nerves,' take these jobs. What this means for the older employees was vividly pointed out by a Dutch tradesman in Rose land, who said that when the steel car work came in about 200 members of the Dutch church he attended left, saying that the change of trades was too much for them."

WASHINGTON GOSSIP

Nothing Beyond the Milky Way but Empty Space



WASHINGTON.—The boundaries of the universe have been discovered, according to a report received at the National Observatory from Prof. R. T. A. Innes, director of the Union Observatory at Johannesburg, South Africa. The announcement is regarded with interest by astronomers all over the world.

The universe, Prof. Innes asserts, is contained within the space girdled by the Milky Way, and he figures that the most distant star in that wonderful girdle is 540 light years distant from the earth. Inasmuch as the planetary system, of which the earth is a member, is commonly supposed by astronomers to be close to the centers of the arena embraced within the Milky Way, and inasmuch as light travels 186,000 miles a second, or over five and three-quarters quadrillion miles a year, the diameter of the universe, by Prof. Innes's calculation is 6,334,951,000,000 miles. This is the distance light would travel in 1,080 years. A ray of light takes sixteen minutes and thirty-six seconds to traverse the diameter of the earth's orbit.

The so-called "helium stars," the Johannesburg astronomer avers, are the most distant of all stars from the earth. The helium stars are peculiar to the Milky Way.

Is there anything outside the universe? On this point Prof. Innes does not venture a positive opinion, but he says that the most powerful telescopes penetrate far into space, beyond the boundaries of the universe—revealing nothing. In particular, he says, there is absolutely no sign of other universes of similarly constituted systems.

He looked out beyond the universe—the air in South Africa is very clear—but his telescope discovered in those far-away clouds called "nebulae," which some astronomers suppose to be star-systems in process of formation. Many of these nebulae are spiral-looking, and the conjecture is that they are whirling around and around, condensing themselves into solid globes, on which life may later appear.

The number of stars, according to Prof. Innes, is limited, falling far short of the number of people on the earth. He estimates the mass of the universe as equal to 441,000 times the mass of the sun. That is to say, the combined mass of all the globes, big and little, in the universe is as heavy as 441,000 suns. Of stars 100 times as massive as the sun there are 300; of stars ten times as massive as the sun there are 5,000; of stars equal in mass to the sun there are 200,000; and of stars smaller than the sun there are 16,000,000.

Popcorn Can Be Profitably Raised on the Farm

THIRTY dollars' worth of popped corn in the form of 5-cent packages for the market represents an outlay of only about \$1 or \$1.50 for raw material, according to a farmers' bulletin (No. 553) just issued by the department of agriculture, entitled "Popcorn for the Home." Sufficient popcorn to make \$30 worth of 5-cent packages can be grown on a piece of land 40 feet long and 20 feet wide.

The specialists in corn investigations who write this bulletin say that popcorn has considerable value as a food and when properly prepared for the table it is superior to many of the breakfast foods now on the market.

If it is desired to grow popcorn as a field crop, the surplus stock not wanted for home use can usually be sold to local merchants at a fair price, or it can be profitably sold directly to consumers.

Dealers who put up popcorn in 10-cent packages for the retail trade usually have a number of good recipes printed on the outside of the package. Some recipes for popcorn confections that have given good results are the following:

Chocolate Popcorn—Two teaspoonfuls of white sugar, two ounces of chocolate, one-half cup of corn sirup, one cup of water.

Put these ingredients into a kettle and cook them until the sirup hard-

ons, when put in cold water. Pour over four quarts of crisp, freshly popped corn and stir well to insure the uniform coating of the kernels.

Sugared Popcorn—Make a sirup by boiling together two teaspoonfuls of granulated sugar and one teaspoonful of water. Boil until the sirup strings from the spoon or hardens when dropped into cold water. Pour over six quarts of freshly popped corn and stir well.

Popcorn Balls—One pint of sirup, one pint of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one teaspoonful of vinegar.

Cook till the sirup hardens when dropped into cold water. Remove to back of stove and add one-half teaspoonful of soda dissolved in a tablespoonful of hot water and then pour the hot sirup over four quarts of freshly popped corn, stirring till each kernel is well coated, when it can be molded into balls or into any desired form.

THE gilded horse that once trotted, galloped, pranced and dashed on the weather vane above many of the stables of Washington has become rare, but he is not extinct. He may be tarnished, but he still holds up his head and tail. He is not so forlorn looking as most of his brother and sister horses in the streets. The writer early in the spring wrote an honorable mention of a gilt horse on a weather vane on a stable converted into a garage on Columbia road near 18th street. That horse is still there and he still seems unconcerned that his neighing, nickerings and champing

mates below have gone and that a machine creaks and snorts where they lived.

If you are walking along G street toward 6th and 7th and will look toward the northern sky you may see high up, always heading into the wind, another gilded horse with flowing mane and uplifted tail, and probably distended nostrils, though his position is too far up in the air to determine that point without field glasses.

He is trotting on a gilt horizontal bar and seems to be striking at least a 2:20 gait. He is well extended. He seems to be about to win. No other horse is near him. He wears no harness. No sulky or driver is behind him.

He is a bold, proud-looking horse and it is refreshing for horsemen to look up and see one of their four-footed friends who has not the dejected mien which so many horses in the streets wear. It is a pleasure to them to contemplate this horse, even if he is a gilt horse.



ardice at Tierra Blanca and at Chihuahua, was the initial movement in the new revolt and that the movement of nearly 4,000 men out of Ojinaga under command of Orozco and Caraveo was a part and parcel of the plot.

A commission, consisting of General Roque Gomez, Colonel Felipe Cazares and Major Sylvester Quevedo, former officers in the federal volunteers, who escaped to El Paso after the capture of Juarez by General Villa, are in Chingua, and it is believed they arranged the details of the transfer of the volunteer commands from support of Huerta to that of the newest revolt.

authority for the new movement. It says:

An entirely new revolution in Mexico with Emilio Vasquez Gomez as its chief and which involves General Felix Diaz, and others who have been prominent in Mexican politics and who have at one time or another been allied with either or both federals and constitutionalists, is in the process of organization in El Paso. A regularly formed junta with many Emilio Vasquez Gomez followers and several ex-Huertistas, Orozco revolutionists, and former constitutionalists has been meeting here regularly and have planned to begin the newest Mexican revolt in the state of Chihuahua where, immediate success is expected because of the conflict for supremacy now being waged between federal and constitutional forces.

The plan of the local junta was to bring Generals Hascual Orozco, Jose Ynez Salazar, Marcelo Caraveo and Antonio Rojas and their entire volunteer federal force into the new revolution and a committee is now at Ojinaga conferring with these commanders and arranging to have them join the revolt.

It is believed that the defiance of General Mercado by Generals Orozco, Salazar, Caraveo and Rojas on Tuesday, when they refused him admission to their councils and threatened him death, charging him with cow-

dissatisfied with the Huerta government because of the failures of the last few weeks and see the possible crumbling of the movement and are said to be willing to join the new revolt.

In case the Orozco forces decide to follow the Vasquista banner, Orozco is to be made commander in chief of the northern division of Mexico.

The El Paso junta has been in communication with General Felix Diaz, who is now in Havana, and he has declared himself as anxious to join the new revolt and may possibly come to El Paso to enter the field if Orozco turns over his forces to the Vasquista movement.

General Emiliano Zapata, the commander of the rebel forces of Morelos, and who is now threatening the Mexican capital, has embraced the Vasquista-Diaz revolt and in a manifesto which he has forwarded to the El Paso junta he has declared that he will never accept any one but Emilio Vasquez Gomez as leader in Mexico.



Villa Confiscates Millions

THAT the aristocracy of Mexico are beginning to "get theirs" wherever the constitutionalists control has been confirmed by dispatches from Chihuahua. Reports of acts of cruelty by Villa evidently have been exaggerated, but that the property of "undesirable" citizens has been confiscated is acknowledged by Villa himself, and he has issued a message explaining his reasons therefor. The following dispatch from Chihuahua tells of the confiscation and also gives Villa's message in defense of the action: Chihuahua, Chih., Mex., Dec. 19--8 P. M. By formal decree General Francisco Villa, commander of the constitutionalist army of the north, has declared the vast estates of General Luis Terrazas and all members of his family forfeited to the constitutionalist cause.

This means that the untold millions of the Terrazas family have been seized in the name of the constitutionalist government, as the decree of confiscation specifies that all real estate, and all personal property, including cattle, stocks and bonds, money and household effects, including "documents," of General Luis Terrazas, and all members of his family, Enrique C. Creel, Juan Creel, "and all other accomplices" who have been enemies of the cause of the constitutionalists, who fomented the treacherous rebellions of Pascual Orozco and of Victoriano Huerta, and who have paid no taxes from the vast properties, shall be taken. Claiming that his action in expelling the Spaniards from Mexico and confiscating the Mexican possessions was simply carrying out the orders of Gen. Venustiano Carranza, commander-in-chief of the constitutionalists, General Villa, commander at Chihuahua, has issued a public statement regarding his action.

He said that it was merely a precautionary measure, as the Spaniards had taken part in the Orozco revolution and supported Huerta, and he was forced to drive them from the country. His message which was telegraphed to Juarez yesterday follows:

"In view of the exaggerated information that the press has published recently in regard to the expulsion of the Spaniards, I wish to make clear the fact that it is not an 'expulsion' in the true sense of the word, but a precautionary measure to avoid greater troubles. The majority of the Spanish citizens residing in the state have been constantly active in political affairs in Mexico, especially during the time Francisco I. Madero, Jr., was president. They morally and materially aided the traitor Orozco, and after the assassination of President Madero gave their support to the usurper of our government, Huerta, to such an extent that I have been compelled to take this measure in order to guarantee to protect the lives of these people. On account of lack of communication with the first chief of the constitutionalists government, it behooved me to dictate a measure to avoid any trouble regarding the Spaniards, as they were in danger in Chihuahua as a consequence of the part they took in our political troubles. This was dictated subject to the

first chief of the constitutionalists, Gen. Venustiano Carranza, which resolution I will respect in every shape, form and manner. "In regard to the mercantile establishments that we seized and which are the properties of the Spaniards, I beg to state that any persons proving at the appropriate time that they have not participated in the internal affairs of our country, will be reimbursed. Any person who has been mixed up in our political affairs will be considered as a Mexican citizen, and will have to suffer the consequences for their part alone.

"Persons and properties of all other foreigners will have a protection and guarantees possible and any assistance we can render them in order to continue their regular work, provided they are absolutely neutral in the struggle that embroils our unfortunate country. (Signed) FRANCISCO VILLA, General-in-chief-command of the Northern Division of the Constitutional Army."

A FIRE that, for a few minutes, looked like it might be serious was extinguished in Harvey & Chase's office Tuesday morning. The janitor was building a fire and used gasoline from a small can in the office, presumably thinking it kerosene. Upon attaching a match to the saturated kindling in the stove an explosion occurred and the janitor attempted to throw the can out at the rear door, but missed his mark, scattering gasoline pro-

miscuously and all of which was instantaneously ignited. Passers by responded to the alarm of the janitor; S. L. Squier appeared with an extinguisher and the blaze was subdued. A number of books and papers and some of the furniture were badly charred; but the losers feel lucky that it was not worse.

The Princess Who died of a Broken Heart

At exactly five o'clock the maid knocked at the door of the Princess Sophia. It was a loud knock, for her highness had warned the girl she would sleep deeply. The servant made another noise, then crept away in the early dawn.

"I'll let her sleep till six," she whispered to herself. "Why should a royal princess get up at five? Perhaps I misunderstood the hour."

Then she went below to the kitchen, where the half-dozen poorly paid servants of the impoverished prince of Saxe-Weimar were waiting to tell her the gossip of the household. She was a new maid, and poorly informed.

The Princess Sophia, it seemed, locked herself in her room every night with a tragedy. The tragedy concerned the ultimate necessity of royal houses—money; and that ultimate luxury of royal princesses—love. A handsome lieutenant had shot himself for the sake of the Princess Sophia in Athens five years before. He was so poor that the father of the infatuated girl, an impetuous fourth cousin of the Saxon monarch, refused to consider an alliance. And in Heidelberg that very day a young baron was lodged whose proposal had been rejected as decisively. The baron's father was the most influential banker in Germany; his contribution to the sinking fortunes of Prince Wilhelm of Saxe-Weimar would look like open barter; the grand duke himself had forbidden it. The second lover of the Princess Sophia was, in short, too rich.

Her Heart Broken.

The kitchen gossips added many details about the royal girl whose heart had been broken under the iron discipline of her caste. She had looked rebellious of late. Five years before she had broken an alliance with a middle-aged, disipated cousin, decreed by her relatives as worthy of her hand. At twenty-seven, she was nervous, embittered. Heidelberg society saw her rarely. Only her personal servants realized her natural warmth of heart nowadays. Housed in the same castle with her family, she had estranged herself.

The new maid pondered. It crossed her mind that the fettered, beautiful princess of Saxony might be glad to exchange her lot in life with that of her maid.

Suddenly she remembered that upstairs the Princess Sophia still slept. The little servant battered her thumbs black and blue against the chamber door before she gave up. No one stirred inside. As a last resort she peered through the keyhole. Then the peasant girl saw the Princess Sophia's answer to the imperial decree that had separated her tortured heart from her first lover because he was too poor and from her second because he was too rich.

The Princess Sophia had killed herself. Just beyond the door was stretched a white hand clutching a pistol.

Born to Life of sorrow.

Thus runs the most modern of fairy stories. For the sorrows of the Princess Sophia were as real as her suicide in Heidelberg on September 17, 1913. They were as real as the bullet which Lieut. Hans Edler zu Puttitz sent through his brain in Athens in 1908 for love of her, and as real as the grief which the young Baron von Bleichroeder carried to Prince Wilhelm's door on the day of his daughter's funeral—a door from which the baron was turned away. For Hans von Bleichroeder was not merely rich; he was a Jew; recently ennobled, who refused to renounce his faith. The house of Saxe-Weimar will not even acknowledge, at this date, that the match with the baron was considered.

Departures from royal dignity have been frequent in the house of Saxe-Weimar for nearly a century, ever since the family became a mere collateral branch of the royal house of Saxony, unsupported by wealth or real power. Two of the men—Sophia's uncle, Duke Bernard, and her brother, Prince Hermann—have escaped from the empty court life into happy private marriages. Another, Prince Wilhelm himself, father of the unhappy Princess Sophia, fled to America in his youth, served as a riding master, clerk, book agent and even as a restaurant waiter in New York, but was finally persuaded to return to Germany, marry his second cousin, and live on a small pension from the head of the house. The women of the family have remained in the velvet prison which the kaiser provides for all his connections, however remote. There have been no marriages of the Saxe-Weimar women out of the limited and dreary royal circle, no outward rebellion. Only excepting the Princess Sophia, who answered the inescapable rules of her rank with suicide.

Lovers Separated.

Sophia was only twenty when she met Edler zu Puttitz, a young man whose family was old enough to be allied to the fourth cousin of a grand duke—possibly; but who was as poor as Prince Wilhelm himself. The prince was staying with his family at a hotel in Rome, being too poor to afford a palazzo or even a retinue. The introduction occurred at a hotel entertainment. The attachment between the dashing young dragon and the romantic princess was no sooner ac-

quainted than Sophia was whisked off to the Riviera by her parents and the long arm of the kaiser reached out to assign zu Puttitz to a minor post at the embassy in Athens.

The pair never saw each other again. The betrothal of Sophia to a princely cousin, rich and recently widowed, was announced forthwith. Years passed in her effort to escape that match—years during which there was a steady flow of love letters between Athens and Heidelberg. Sophia succeeded in getting the engagement annulled early in 1908, after a personal visit to the grand duke of Saxony and many letters to the kaiser. The previous night Edler zu Puttitz had put a bullet through his brain, leaving a letter of farewell to the Princess Sophia.

Had Royal Mourner.

One distinguished mourner followed the body of the young lieutenant to the grave, it was the crown princess of Greece, sister to the kaiser; and on that occasion royalty was seen to weep in public. For the crown princess had just heard from Berlin that the emperor would place no further barriers in the way of the young couple's marriage!

The little semi-royal court at Heidelberg, with its meager income and its ancient dignities, gave no outward sign. But the Princess Sophia was fading visibly. Two years later, among the routine of visitors, Hans von Bleichroeder appeared. He was the youngest member of the great Jewish banking house which, it is said, made possible the Prussian victory over France in 1870. His title of baron has been in the possession of the family a much shorter time than the millions. Every one knew, in fact, that it had been conferred on his father because of them. Hans von Bleichroeder was ardent, handsome and intelligent. He had a vigor that even Edler zu Puttitz lacked. Sophia fell in love with him straightway.

Again the ponderous wheels of German statecraft whirred. The Bleichroeder millions would place the troublesome Saxe-Weimar family in a position which the male members would be less likely to desert—as private citizens. The match was sanctioned by the shrewd kaiser, pending the consent of the grand duke of Saxony, head of the house. The Bleichroeder clan, elated and breathless, sent impetuous Hans to New York, where he passed two years in Wall Street as an employe of Messrs. Kissel, Klincut & Co., international bankers.

A year passed, then two. The young Baron von Bleichroeder returned from foreign parts—and was not received by Prince Wilhelm of Saxe-Weimar.

Estranged From Family.

The estrangement from her family of the Princess Sophia began from that moment. On September 10 Prince Wilhelm was startled by an ugly rumor from Paris, whence the princess and her mother had gone on a shopping trip. A gypsy's child had been killed in the forest of Fontainebleau by a motor car belonging to Baron von Bleichroeder. The car had been driven not by the baron, however, who sat with the princess of Saxe-Weimar in a rear seat, but by the Princess Sophia herself!

There is no record of the interview that took place between Prince Wilhelm, his wife and his daughter, when the royal ladies returned from France. The household observed, merely, that the Princess Sophia kept to her room.

On September 17 the timid little servant saw through a keyhole the answer of the Princess Sophia to her father, to the grand duke of Saxony and to the hard compulsions of her rank. She had ended the long struggle with a bullet.

Hans von Bleichroeder still remains in Heidelberg. He has sought an interview with Prince Wilhelm, desiring the return of his love letters. Prince Wilhelm declines to receive him, refuses even to reply. From the standpoint of the house of Saxe-Weimar there were no love letters.—New York World.

HAMBURG IS GREATEST PORT

Figures Show City to Have Made Wonderful Strides in Comparatively Few Years.

With a record of 14,000,000 tons of freight unloaded from 18,400 vessels in 1912, Hamburg, Germany, is rightfully called the greatest commercial port in continental Europe. Because of her location on the Elbe river, at the junction of the Alster and the Bille, her river frontage and docks are measured in miles. Over 120,000 linear feet, almost 25 miles of dockage furnishes an area of 5,000,000 square feet, which is reserved for handling package freight alone, and an extension of 40,000 linear feet is now being built.

Other quays are provided for bulk cargoes that are unloaded directly into cars, lighters, or warehouses, and an unloading crane has been installed for every 65 feet of quay. Among others there are 650 three-ton ship cranes, operated by steam or electricity from a municipal power plant, 100 electric traveling cranes, a number of huge double cranes, and several 75-ton Hamer-type cranes which pick up cars and empty them bodily into ships' holds. The quay sheds are 200 feet wide, and their switch tracks connect them with railways, running to every part of Europe.

From the harbor to the open sea, 50 miles away, the old 15-foot channel of the Elbe has been deepened to 37 feet, and 12 dredges are now at work lowering the bottom to 40 feet. Traffic across the river is carried by several bridges and a tunnel for pedestrians and teams. The tunnel consists of two 20-foot wrought iron tubes with elevators at each end.—Popular Mechanics.
