

### French Demand Is For Heavy Horses

Got a heavy horse? Here's a chance to sell.

"Not on account of ze weather, but for the too much lightness" the many horses gathered in Carrizozo for the inspection of Messieurs A. L. Lafore and Captain Suratt, inspectors of horse purchases for the French army, guests at Carrizozo Eating House from Saturday to Tuesday, will pasture their Christmas appetites in the fields of O. Z. Finley, who has taken over the stock gathered by Warden Brothers, Cooper and Cominery Brothers in anticipation of a sale of horse flesh for later killing in France, or such territory as their graves might be assigned by the militant Allies.

Much preparation had been made to meet the urgent demands of the war in Europe, and Carrizozo has been alive—and then some—with the activities of brand owners and brand followers, bent on gathering in some of the coin of the battling nations. But it has come to naught—to date; only one horse sold. Dragging guns, and carrying troopers, are two different-weight propositions; the messieurs were more anxious for gun-pullers than soldier-packers; pullers for ze big guns; ze soldiers can walk; ze guns zey must be pulled; ze horse he too steeple-chasse; no bottom. one horse that could pull a gun. Awful! We must change our methods, and raise gun-pullers, not soldier-mounts, if this war is to go on—to our profit.

But there is one ray of hope. The inspectors of horse-flesh will return in two weeks, and look us over for mounting purposes. And, in the meantime, the too-light-weighters may gather enough weight in the Finley pasture to possibly pull a gun. What's the sense in making guns so heavy, anyway?

In the meantime the French buyers are in Phoenix, Arizona, or thereabouts, where it is understood they have the prospect of securing 1800 horses for their needs. The original requirement was 2000 animals, for which prices from \$40 to \$125 were to

be paid; depending, of course.

The horses that were inspected in Carrizozo by the French buyers ranged in weight from 800 to 1000 pounds. These, it is believed, will meet the requirements for filling out the necessary number for cavalry use that may not be picked up by the inspectors during their Arizona trip. For artillery work much heavier animals are required, from 1200 pounds, up.

Contractor Connelly, of El Paso, has had general supervision of gathering animals to meet this demand of the French government; and others who have been prominently active in carrying out the plans have been O. Z. Finley and M. U. Finley, with ranches on the Nogal road, Mr. Prude, located near there, and William N. Reilly of Carrizozo.

## MILEAGE OF CONCRETE ROADS

Growth in Popularity Indicated by Rapid Increase in Recent Years in United States.

The mileage of concrete pavements in the United States has increased rapidly, and it is likely to continue to increase, according to a new bulletin of the United States department of agriculture. This bulletin gives the estimated amount of concrete pavement in the United States in 1914 as 19,200,000 square yards; in 1909 it was only 364,000 square yards.

The principal advantages of concrete pavements which have led to this increase in popularity are said to be:

1. Durability under ordinary traffic conditions.
2. A smooth, even surface offering little resistance.
3. Absence of dust and ease with which it may be cleaned.
4. Comparatively small cost of maintenance until renewals are necessary.
5. Availability as a base for another type of surface if desirable.
6. Attractive appearance.

In commenting upon these advantages the bulletin states that the durability of concrete roads has not yet been proved by actual practice, because there are no very old pavements as yet in existence, but from the condition of those which have undergone several years' service it seems probable that they will be found to wear well.

The disadvantages of concrete as a road surface are:

1. Its noise under horse traffic.
2. The wearing of the necessary joints in the pavement, and the tendency to crack, with its consequent rapid deterioration.
3. The difficulty of repairs when these become necessary.

In the past efforts have frequently been made to overcome these objections to a certain degree by covering the concrete pavement with a bituminous wearing surface. At the present time, the specialists in the department hold that this cannot be economically

Justified, although it is possible that future investigation may change the situation in this respect. In the present state of road science, however, it seems that where traffic conditions are such that a bituminous surface on a concrete road is practicable a bituminous-surface macadam road would be equally practicable and certainly cheaper. Where traffic is too heavy for macadam road the bituminous surface is likely to give way and the uneven manner in which it falls tends to produce excessive wear on portions of the concrete.

For a successful concrete road, hardness, toughness and uniformity are the most essential qualities. These can be secured to a great extent by care in the selection of the constituent materials and the proportions in which they are mixed. Sample specifications are included in the bulletin, No. 249, "Portland Cement Concrete Pavements for Country Roads." These specifications are believed to typify the best engineering practice as it has been developed up to this time. They cover such points as materials, grading, subgrade and construction.

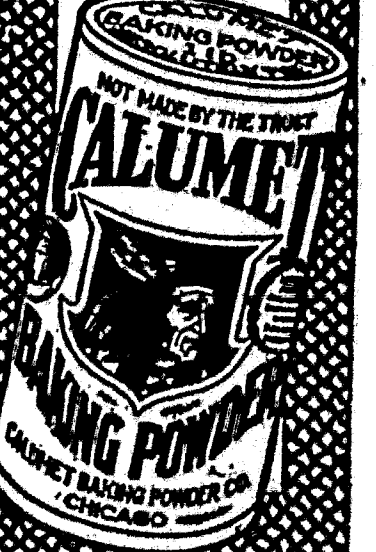

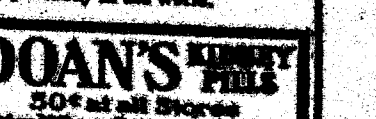
