IN DAYS OF GOLD

Increase Output Follows Discovery of Metal in California.

For Eleven Years, From 1850 to 1861, the Yield Was Prodigious, Amounting in 1850, to Over \$50,000,000.

Washington. The historically important discovery of gold in California was made in January 1848 at John Sutter's mill on South Fork of American river near Coloma, a point only ten or fifteen miles southwest of the town of Auburn.

From 1849 to 1854 the greatest yield was derived from the gravel and the greatest annual output for the entire country was more than \$5,000,000,000. There was some reaction in 1855 to prevent wild speculation.

From 1855 to 1861 the great majority of the gold was won chiefly from the gravel, and the present methods of mining have not been developed.

The gold pan, the rocker, the tom, the sluice and the hydraulic, giant or monitor, named in the order of increasing efficiency, were the tools successively used by the miners.

In sluicing, the gravel was shoveled into a similar but much longer box through which a stream of water was allowed to run.

MAKING MEAT SAFE

Sixty Per Cent Killed Under Federal Inspection.

Hundred Million Meat Animals Slaughtered Each Year in United States—Tuberculosis Is Chief Cause of Condemnation.

Washington.—More than 58,000,000 meat animals were slaughtered in establishments under federal inspection during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1916.

Tuberculosis was the chief cause of the condemnations. More than 32,644 carcasses of cattle and 66,000 carcasses of swine were entirely rejected on account of this disease.

The annual appropriation for the federal meat inspection service is now about \$3,375,000, so that the cost to the people would be between 5 and 6 cents per animal and carcasses.

In the course of its work, the bureau of animal industry, which is in charge of the meat inspection service, has discovered a new method of destroying trichinae in pork.

Refrigeration at a temperature of 5 degrees, F., or lower, for a period of 20 days, will destroy these parasites which occasionally give rise to human beings to the serious disease known as trichinosis.

In this connection it is interesting to note that more swine were slaughtered in the past year in establishments under federal inspection than ever before.

President David Ross Boyd of the University of New Mexico was in Washington on New Year's day attending the Pan-American Scientific congress. He sent a message of greeting to the university students which was read at an assembly, and which carries a message which perhaps has value to many of us who have done our school days and have entered into the sterner school of every day life. He said:

"Get all the education from life of each of the 366 days you possibly can. Strain every nerve, endure all poverty and even suffer, if it be a condition of securing the best possible training for meeting the great problems of the coming years in which you will be privileged to live. Take time, work, save and spend your savings in getting this schooling—go on through college, if you can, not for a special calling, but for any calling that undoubtedly will be addressed to you. Count no hour or year wasted that is spent in helping you to get possession of yourself and your faculties. Deeply realize that what you will need to win success in any kind of work is a trained mind—the ability to think quickly, steadily, accurately and broadly.

"With all this your life will be inadequate and incomplete, even disastrous, unless you with alertness attend to the things of the spirit—grow in love of truth, peace, temperance, home, neighbor, in love of your country and thus to the love of God."

The Mexican problem is a vexing one—has been throughout the present administration and was also for a large part of the preceding one. Just what should be done is hard to say—and in saying it be reasonably certain of satisfactory results. It is not at all difficult to criticize—and much of the criticism may be absolutely sincere—but criticism, without a definite plan of remedying, leads nowhere.

Lively times are ahead, if for no other reason than the one that this is a campaign year. There'll be a sufficient number of candidates to make it lively for all aspirants and for the people, too. All of us enjoy a little scrap occasionally, and Americans are offered a battle royal this year without a heavy flow of blood.

The German Kaiser is said to be a sick man. Even if true, it must be admitted that there are others, all like the Kaiser, crowned heads of Europe.

Congress is long on talk concerning matters Mexican. It has power—and possesses the only power; why don't it act?

A part of our boundless prosperity is due to the great European war, but should that conflict end at early date there is no reason to be frightened over the results that are to follow. The immense destruction of property and the terrible loss of life are elements that will keep remaining Europeans at home for years, perhaps a half a century. There is, therefore, no danger of a heavy European inflow of labor to this country. Europe will have no surplus labor to send to this or any other country.

The senate and house at the national capital are full of members who truly criticize the administration's Mexican policy, but seem unwilling to take action on any definite proposition. They are quite willing for something to be done, but they want the other fellow to do it, not understanding the intricacies of the congress. It is the old story of the man who says the other fellow should do it.

The various labor unions in this section in El Paso this week have minds in its recuperation, and are looking for a way to do it. That stock and their interests may be protected. There can be no serious harm done to this proposition, and the whole object should be to get the recognition of the national government in their favor.

There is every reason to believe that the economic prosperity we now enjoy is a permanent basis, except as it is related by the European war. Railroads are dividing their dividends, factories are working overtime, and farm and ranch products were never so high. A man who asks for better conditions, Mark Twain would say, is a shameless beggar.

That dream of some nations in Australia, and others, of overtaking this country, with no domination in the world, is a pipe dream, and will never be realized.

The present administration is still so young, and is just beginning to stand the test of a campaign, now being held.

Mr. Ely

Chairman Russell C. Lee of the state republican central committee, in a letter to various republicans in various parts of the state, asks for information about the general republican sentiment. From portions of his letter, published yesterday, it may easily be inferred that Mr. Ely, among other things, would like to get a line on how his own candidacy for the governorship would strike the rank and file of the republicans.

It is possible that the idea might be received with favor by a good many of the rank and file. It is, however, hardly likely that Mr. Ely will be nominated by the republicans for governor. It isn't the rank and file who do these things. Mr. Ely is something else again from the men who are running the republican party in this state. His nomination would mean a new deal in the party; and it is unnecessary to state that the present kind of a deal is vastly satisfactory to the G. O. P. general managers. Mr. Ely is entirely too advanced in his ideas as to education, development, political methods and so forth to be considered safe and sane. Mr. Ely isn't going to be nominated.

In which case, if we were Mr.

Ely we should conclude that it was time for a well organized effort to do a little house cleaning with the republican party: either with a vacuum cleaner from the inside or with a fire hose from the outside. We don't know what his plans are; but we have a hunch he has a deep conviction that his brand of republicanism is just as good or better than that of Mr. Barsum, Mr. Springer, Mr. Spiess, Mr. Romero and others. If that conviction is strong enough there is a possibility that Mr. Ely may prove a most useful agent in remodeling the political situation in this state.

More Fuss Than Action

All that thinking it over, while the republicans in the United States senate have not had time to pass for many years in Mexico. The Associated Press says Senator Borah, who was leader in denunciation of the administration's Mexican policy, found no fault with the present administration's policy.

Interesting Happenings At State University

Varied and rapidly extending activities of the New Mexico State University are reflected in the current number of the University News, just from the press, and which is filled with news matter relating to the university and varying all the way from athletics to international conferences.

One of the most interesting features of this number is an apparent disapproval of the generally accepted theory that fraternity men do not do as good college work as non-fraternity students.

For the first time the University of New Mexico will figure this spring in interstate debating contests. Dates have been arranged for contests in Albuquerque March 25 with the University of Redlands, California.

Dates of this year's annual inter-collegiate track and field meet at the University of New Mexico have been fixed for April 28-29, as a result of a referendum vote in which every high school in the state voted.

Much Game Secured In National Forests

Six hundred and fifty-six deer killed in New Mexico forests in 1915; 47 bruins also meet their Waterloo.

Reports submitted by forest officers in charge of the national forests of New Mexico show a total of 656 deer, 580 turkeys, 47 bears, 445 coyotes, 57 wolves and 16 lions as killed by hunters during the season of 1915.

Forest officers point out that are two weeks earlier than in the past and the change was favored because it does not so much interfere with final examinations and graduation exercises in the latter part of May.

Roscoe R. Hill, professor of history in the State University, is the author of the chapter on Mexico and Mexico City in volume 15 of the New International Encyclopedia just from the Appleton press.

Conditions are said to be especially deplorable in the Carson forest in northern New Mexico, where on a million acres of fine deer range, deer are so scarce that only eight were killed.

The Albuquerque Game Protective association, in commenting on these figures, stated that unless the people of New Mexico give their prompt support to the Chamberlain-Hayden Game Refuge bill now before congress, thus insuring the prompt creation of a system of game refuges, that a long closed season is the only remaining alternative for saving the deer from virtual extermination.
