Official Changes

Changes in the personnel of the county officials occurred this week, and business is proceeding smoothly at the court house, as though no change had been made.

The old board of commissioners came in Monday, met and adjourned until the following morning. The bonds of John L. Bryan, 1st district, and A. J. Gilmore, 3rd district did not arrive at that time, so the old board proceeded with the transaction of the last quarter's business. Mr. Bryan's bond arrived yesterday noon, and he immediately took his seat as a member, relieving R. A. Duran. Mr. Gilmore is ill at his Ruidoso home and could not get here to qualify, so W. M. Ferguson holds over awaiting the qualification of his successor. Melvin Franks succeeds himself, and the board is still in session today with a full membership.

A. J. Rolland assumed the duties of treasurer, relieving Dr. T. W. Watson. Harry G. Norman was made deputy by Mr. Rolland.

C. W. Hyde took over the sheriff's office, Porfirio Chavez stepping down and out. The deputies are Jake Caldwell, John B. Baird and Ben West, and the jailer is George Hughes.

Alfredo Gonzalez relieved Henry M. Corn as assessor and appointed as his deputy William M. Barnett.

O. T. Nye was inducted into the county clerk's office, retiring A. H. Harvey. His deputies are Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Osborn.

J. E. Koonce succeeded Mrs. W. L. Gunn in the office of county superintendent of schools.

Elderdo Chavez qualified as probate judge, succeeding Doroteo Lucero, and immediately began a session of probate court.

Surveyor-elect E. E. Wright did not appear. His bond and oath of office will be filed later, no doubt.

To the outgoing officials the News desires to express its thanks for the many courtesies extended and to congratulate them upon the efficient manner they have conducted the county's affairs. To the new officers we extend best wishes and hope that their official actions will be such that they and the county will alike be honored and benefited.

Against Dividing Lincoln County

The move to divide Lincoln county should be dropped. It is against the interests even of those who live in the eastern part of the county. One-third of the county taxes are paid by the railway company. The proposed division of the county would leave the new county without a railway to help pay taxes, and the burden would be too great.

A better proposition would be to get behind the movement to bond the county and build better roads leading to the county seat. Distance is not a serious matter if the roads are good. By united action we now have an opportunity to supply the needed roads in the next year or eighteen months. The bond issue is intended to supply the money to put up dollar for dollar on the roads in the county that the federal government will help to build. There are other roads which must be built, and these should be cared for out of the county road fund. There are now four sources to draw from, the Federal Treasury, the State Highway Commission, the Bond Issue, if voted, and the County


