## People Asked to Assist in Taking Census

Washington, Dec. 14.—A proclamation by President Wilson, calling on all the people of the country to give aid to the taking of the fourteenth decennial census, which is to begin January 2, was made public today by the census bureau. The proclamation states that the main purpose of the census is to obtain accurate statistics on which to base the representation in congress. It calls attention to the fact that all persons are required to give full information applying to himself and the family to which he belongs.

Census of the population will be accompanied by a farm census with a questionnaire to be filled out by each farmer, he said. The questionnaire will include seventy-five questions with from two to ten sub-questions. Special agents will also take a mining census.

## Goldman and Berkman To Be Deported

New York, Dec. 13.—Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, who are awaiting deportation at Ellis Island, expect to be on their way to Russia in about a week. Officials at the island professed today to have received no orders from the department of labor as to when, how and where to send them. Byron A. Uhl, acting commissioner of immigration at the island, has intimated that the government has "something up its sleeve" in this connection.

## 551 Americans Slain in Mexico

Catalogue of Crimes Against United States Citizens

Washington, Dec. 13.—The National Association for the Protection of American Rights in Mexico has sent out for publication tomorrow in newspapers throughout the country a map and statement showing that 551 Americans have been killed in Mexico, since November 20, 1910.

Of this number, the association states, 423 were civilians and 123 soldiers and sailors. One hundred and sixty-seven Americans were slain during the Madero and Huerta regimes, while 383 lost their lives since Carranza took control of the Mexican government, according to the statement.

In the list accompanying the map a number is assigned to each American killed and his or her name, date, place and manner of death and the source of information concerning the individual case are given. The manner of death ranges from "killed by a stray bullet" to wanton murder and includes instances of alleged torture and mutilation.

The association gives as the sources of its information in preparing this map and statement three lists of Americans killed in Mexico or along the border prepared by the state department; Casualty lists of the war department; a list of Americans killed in Mexico prepared by Thomas E. Gibson, author of "Mexico Under Carranza;" information submitted to the senate by Senator Albert E. Fall, of New Mexico; newspaper articles giving the names, date and locations of murders; and information in the possession of the National Association for the Protection of American Rights in Mexico.

In summing up the association says: "Bandits were responsible for 188 of the murders listed on the map, according to the authorities cited. Officials, officers, soldiers or followers of Carranza are charged with seventy-six of the murders, according to the map. Villa and his band killed eighty-one of the Americans listed. Huertistas account for forty-one, Maderistas for thirteen and Zapatistas for five, miscellaneous outlaws listed by the authorities cited as 'rebels,' 'revolutionists,' 'cattle thieves,' smugglers and similar marauders were responsible for seventy murders and twenty-three Americans were killed by bullets which crossed the border. Yaqui and Mayo Indians killed eighteen Americans during the period covered by the map and casual rebels murdered six. In twenty-five of the cases listed the authorities were unable to determine who did the killing."

## Iron Furnace in Prospect

Reference was made last week to the presence of representatives

from Tucumcari and their presentation of a proposition to build and operate a furnace at Carrizozo. The company they represented is the Hematite Mining and Transportation Co., headquarters Tucumcari, and holding a large acreage of iron land in Lincoln county.

A committee of five was appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to confer with the company representatives and to present its findings to the chamber. The work of going over details, procuring data and securing certain guarantees has, necessarily, been slow. The committee is not yet ready to submit its report, but this much may be said: The proposition made by the Tucumcari company is regarded quite favorably by the committee and when all details are worked out it is believed the committee will make a favorable recommendation to the Chamber and that the Chamber and all citizens interested in the development of our resources and the upbuilding of our town will likewise regard the proposition in a favorable light and lend full support. More cannot be said at this time, but it is hoped that by next week plans will be complete for a definite announcement of this important proposition.

## John Barleycorn is Dying Slowly

Washington, Dec. 16.—Permission to institute original proceedings to have the national prohibition amendment declared unconstitutional and New Jersey and federal authorities enjoined from enforcing it, was asked of the supreme court today by the Retail Liquor Dealers' association of New Jersey.

This was first question as to the validity of the constitutional amendment to reach the supreme court. George W. Tucker of New York presented the motion together with a printed brief prepared by the association, and the court will announce later whether permission to institute the suit will be granted.

In addition to enjoining enforcement of the eighteenth amendment, the association also would ask an injunction against enforcement of the Volstead prohibition enforcement.

## State Tax Commission

The State Tax Commission will hold a three days conference at Santa Fe this week, at which the assessors and commissioners of the several counties are invited to participate. The meeting is for the purpose of equalizing values. Most of the counties of the state, it is believed, will be represented at the conference.

Lincoln county will be represented by Commissioners Taylor and Sevier, and Assessor Miller, who left here Tuesday morning for Santa Fe.

As a proof that Roswell and Chavez county are prosperous, another bank was incorporated there last week, making five banks in the metropolis of the Pecos Valley. The new bank will start with a capital of \$50,000, and expects to begin business about the middle of January.

## New Mexico the Coming Oil Field

According to the opinion of some of the most experienced oil operators in the United States, New Mexico will be the next big oil field. This also seems to be the general opinion of the hundreds of geologists who are at the present time in the employ of the different oil companies. Some idea of the work being done in the state in the oil fields may be had from the fact that there are at present in the state 52 rigs drilling wells, five of which are over 2,000 feet deep and two over 3,000 feet deep. There are approximately 107 wells under contract and it is estimated that there are at least 200 geologists in the state working for the different oil companies.

Not a county in the state but has at least three locations for drilling. Oil has already been found in four counties, McKinley, San Juan, Chavez and Eddy. In no place is there a well producing in paying quantities.

Practically all state owned lands have been leased to oil companies except some in the mountains of Taos and Rio Arriba counties.

Leases in unproven districts are selling for 25 cents an acre and up. Some leases in Quay county, around the McGee well, have change hands at \$165 an acre. —Albuquerque Journal.

## Court Dismisses Suit

The suit for damages wherein Blanchard Bros. were plaintiffs and George L. Ulrick and C. L. Stimmel were defendants was heard at Roswell this week and was dismissed at cost of plaintiffs. The suit involved damages in the sum of \$47,500, and grew out of the sale of a flock of sheep by Blanchard Bros., the sale having taken place last February. Quite a number of witnesses were in attendance from Carrizozo, few of whom were used, however, the court sustaining a motion for dismissal before the conclusion of the testimony; all of whom, including the defendants, have returned home.

## A Dry Christmas

Contrary to all expectations, the United States supreme court did not hand down a decision yesterday on the constitutionality of the war-time prohibition act. Thus the hopes of the thirsty for a "wet" Christmas have been blasted. It means now that the nation will remain dry until January 15, when the prohibition amendment to the federal constitution becomes effective, forever banishing the manufacture of liquor in this country.

## A "League of Planets"

Some astrologist in the east some time ago made the direful prediction, that owing to several of the mightiest planets being in conjunction on Dec. 17, 1919, that this little planet of ours, the earth, would be swept by the most terrific weather since human history began, accompanied by a gigantic explosion of flaming gases. A mighty hole would be punched in the sun by the magnetic currents, and that it would take many weeks for this old world of ours to recover from the shock. The 17th has come and gone without anything out of the usual occurring, the weather conditions being of the kind experienced as a rule at this season. These predictions have been passing and re-passing for billions of years, and this old world of ours has been joggling along at the same old gait, notwithstanding what the astrologists say is sure to happen when Mars, Mercury, Venus, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune, etc., get their heads together.

## War Time Prohibition Held to be Constitutional

Washington, Dec. 15. War time prohibition was held constitutional today by the supreme court in a unanimous decision. Thus vanished the hopes of many for a "wet" holiday time. No decision was rendered on the cases involving the constitutionality of the Volstead law, the prohibition enforcement act, framed to carry out the intent of the prohibition amendment to the constitution.

In passing, however, Associate Justice Brandies did hold that the prohibition amendment was binding on the states as well as the federal government.

The court entirely reversed the contention of the "wets" that war time prohibition was outside the war time powers of congress and pointed out that war time control of food and railroads still were in effect.

The decision added one of the final mile stones to the long fight to make the country dry.

The court will render opinions again next Monday at which time the beer cases are expected to be decided, after which the court will recess until January 6.

The prohibition constitutional amendment will become effective January 16. Upon the court's decision on the prohibition enforcement law, will depend whether the federal government has at hand any legal means for making the amendment effective. The constitution-

will keep the country dry until the amendment is carried into effect by law of its own.

Unions Shy of a New Party

Washington, Dec. 13.—No effort to disturb the present political party alignment for next election will be made by the conference of international union presidents and railroad brotherhood heads, delegates said today as the conference opened at American Federation of Labor headquarters.

Preliminary speeches at the conference, the sessions of which are executive, were said to have indicated that political redress demanded by organized labor would be sought through the election of members of the two major parties who would be favorably disposed toward union labor.

When the session was called to order, no representatives of farmer organizations were present. Leaders, however, still had hope that some would attend the conference which may last through next week.

Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, who was understood to be acting for the followers of Samuel Gompers, president of the federation, and machinists and miners went on the floor with the same plan. EX-SERVICE MEN'S COLUMN

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS. I have requested my Government insurance changed to an endowment maturing at age of 62. Am still in the service but have since become a tubercular patient. Does this form give me as much chance to collect a disability as before conversion? Can this form be changed back to an ordinary life insurance? I have not as yet received any notice of the change from Washington. If I should later be discharged from the hospital and could collect a disability, would the endowment still go on or what would be done about the extra money I pay for that form.—A. S., Hospital No. 21.

Answer.—Your Endowment Policy gives exactly the same privilege of your receiving payment in case of total and permanent disability as your term insurance, or any other of the peace time policies. If the policy change has been made in Washington, you will not be able to convert it back to the ordinary life. Once the policy has been converted to a peace time form it cannot be changed subsequently to a cheaper form of policy. It may be changed, however, from a cheaper to a more expensive form of policy as for example from an ordinary life to endowment. Better write in immediately stating you wish the policy converted to ordinary life instead of endowment and maybe you can stop the matter before it is changed. If at any time you collect payments on the policy on account of total and permanent disability, your endowment feature would, of course, cease and you would have no more premiums to pay so long

as your disability remained total and permanent. You would have no refund on the extra money paid for your endowment. This for the reason you would have had the benefit of the premiums in that the Government took the chance of having to pay your endowment in a lump sum at the age of 62. But after total and permanent disability benefits accrue, your policy payments to yourself would be the same in any form of insurance.
