Coal Areas of Lincoln County

The Capitan mines have produced several millions of tons of coal from a small area. The El Paso & Northeastern Railroad, as it was called when built; now the eastern end of the El Paso & Southwestern R. R., was constructed from El Paso to the Capitan mines, a distance of about 125 miles, and for several years Capitan was the terminus; later it was extended from Carrizozo to connect with and give the Rock Island Railroad entrance to El Paso, and Southern Pacific R. R. connection to the Pacific. It is a peculiar commentary upon the speculative business methods of the day, that no person has considered building a 12-mile branch railroad from Carrizozo to an area of coal at White Oaks, which is much larger in extent than the Capitan coal fields, to which 125 miles of railroad was built for the sole purpose of operating the coal mines; nor would the engineering features of the 12-mile railroad be near so difficult as was the Capitan branch beyond Carrizozo, where two switchbacks were necessary to cross the mountains to Capitan. This rather conservative and safe business opportunity has been overlooked while more precarious speculative ventures were embraced.

The Lincoln County Light and Power Company, it is said, has secured control of 1,200 acres of coal lands formerly owned by the Southern Pacific R. R. There is a rumor that this company may become active and extend its business functions to the production of coal for market. As the territory is tributary to El Paso, at the mines and smelters and cities and towns of Arizona, as also the same class of consumers in Old Mexico, constitute the principal market for New Mexico coal, the White Oaks coal field has a big advantage in the item of freight on account of the short haul to El Paso and market mentioned as tributary thereto.

There are three coal seams in the field, but only one has been developed. This seam as developed in the Old Abe mine was from 3 to 4 feet in thickness; and where developed in the mine of the Lincoln County Light and Power company has a uniform thickness of 4 feet or over. The coal is a first class bituminous

variety very good for steaming or domestic purposes. Aside from the White Oaks field there are isolated areas of coal in several places in the county. The McIvers mine six miles south of Carrizozo was worked upon one of those pieces of coal land some years ago but operations were suspended and the mine neglected and the slope caved in.

While Lincoln county has not the vast area of coal land found in some other counties of the state, yet its closeness to market renders it a more than ordinary favorable coal mining proposition, and prospects are bright for the future success of the coal industry in this county, although it is dormant at present.—Jo Sheridan, late inspector of mines.

Every Bullet has a Billet

Unloaded guns are generally believed to be the ones that go off and kill or maim somebody. But loaded guns, in the hands of thoughtless people, men or boys, are considered equally dangerous to life and limb. On Tuesday afternoon a certain man, passing by the Taylor furniture store, heard the ping of a bullet, and turning around noticed the large plate glass window of the furniture perforated where the bullet had passed through. It must have passed within two feet of his head. It was a 22-caliber and was found on the floor of the store later. Who fired the shot is not known, but it evidently came from a distance, as its force was spent after passing through the glass. The bullet only put out a window light, however, which can be replaced for about \$40, but it might have put out somebody's daylight, which could not be replaced.

The Consumer Pays the Freight

That the increase in freight rates will be paid by the ultimate consumer, and that the totals will be distributed among the various commodities of life, is admitted by all railroad men, states J. R. Koontz, assistant traffic manager of the Santa Fe railway, who stopped in this city to confer with W. A. Cameron, traveling freight agent for this territory.

"Whether this increase will be properly and fairly divided among producers, middlemen, retailers and consumers, is a question," says Mr. Koontz, "which every one should reckon with and deal with as the facts in the case may warrant."

Mr. Koontz went to show that the increased freight rate on raw materials must become a factor in the price of the finished commodity and will also tend to increase the cost of producing such materials. One can question the statement that increased rates should materially raise the cost of a pair of shoes or of a dress on which the rate is so little as to be almost negligible.

The Interstate Commerce Commission and the U. S. labor board have voiced themselves at almost the same time, and with the approval, apparently of the public, which is so used these days to talking of billions, states Mr. Koontz, that it loses sight of cents, and what cents mean to them.

With this in view Mr. Koontz and Mr. Cameron made computations to show how the freight increase will affect twenty-two different commodities which are in general use in this city. They are as follows:

- Pair of shoes from St. Louis, 2.6 cents.
- Pair of shoes from Boston, 4.2 cents.
- Men's suit of clothes from Chicago, 4.8 cents.
- Men's suit of clothes from New York, 7 cents.

One hundred pound sack of flour from Minneapolis, 28 cents. One bushel of potatoes from Red River district, 19.8 cents. One box of apples from Oregon and Washington, 21 cent.

One pound of sugar from Colorado, two-tenths of a cent. One pound can of canned goods from Baltimore, five-tenths of a cent.

The new rates, however, enable the railroads to give the sort of service that the public is demanding, says Mr. Koontz, and will enable an expansion and development of the railroad which will open up country heretofore closed and suffering from lack of transportation facilities.—Albuquerque Journal.

New Ancho School House

The new four-room school house at Ancho has been completed, the painters finishing their work last week. Seats and desks are being installed and the building will be ready for occupancy by teachers and pupils when school begins September 6.

The building, which was constructed by Contractor English, is of Ancho brick and is a very substantial and creditable building. The large lecture room contains an elevated stage which will be used for plays, lectures and entertainments of various kinds.

Poles Rout Reds

The battle before Warsaw, which for a period took a decided Red tinge, took a distinct turn toward Poles last week, and since that date the Reds have been driven from almost every part of Poland. Besides capturing and killing thousands of the invaders great quantities of supplies, guns, ammunition, etc., have fallen into the hands of the Poles. The rout of the Reds seems complete and irretrievable and peace is expected to follow the debacle.

Habeas Corpus Hearing

A habeas corpus plea was argued before Judge Edwin Mechem in Alamogordo Monday, relating to the killing of J. M. Gillespie at Corona on July 24. Attorneys Geo. W. Prichard and W. C. Merchant represented the accused, Pascual Luttrell. The state was represented by District attorney Hamilton and attorney Whately. Brief talks were made by the lawyers. Judge Mechem was given a transcript of the evidence taken at the preliminary hearing, and stated he would decide the question of bail for the accused as soon as he reviewed the transcript of the evidence. He is expected to be in Carrizozo the first of the week, when he will render his decision.

Needlessly Alarmed

A rumor was circulated Tuesday evening that three yegg men, or safe blowers, were seen in town. The sheriff and his deputies got busy and were on the qui vive for the cracksmen. The rumor, however, was without foundation. One thing, however, is certain, three "tourists," or "rainbow chasers," having missed freight connections at this point, were stranded here for a couple of days, through no fault of theirs. They caught a freight going north Tuesday evening. Seeing three suspicious-looking strangers hovering around for a couple of days, without any visible vocation, gave rise to the rumor.

State Has 20,000 acres of Cotton

The cotton industry has taken hold of New Mexico, according to Guy A. Reed, attorney of Carlsbad. Upwards of twenty thousand acres have been planted and he estimates that three-quarters of a bale per acre will be the yield. The variety grown is known as the Durango and is well adapted for the lower Pecos valley soil. A few gins have been erected, Mr. Reed stated, and the industry has come to stay, he believed.

Cox is Progressive—Harding Reactionary

Washington, D. C.—Following a conference with Chairman George H. White, of the Democratic National Committee, at Washington, Senator Robert L. Owen of Oklahoma, one of the candidates for the presidential nomination before the San Francisco convention, issued the following statement:
"The best evidence the public could possibly ask with regard to the progressive character of the pending campaign are the progressive acts which characterize the past service of Governor Cox. He is not a new convert.

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School Notes

Does an education pay? is a question sometimes asked by the careless people. Such a question is just as foolish as the following suggestive series: Does it pay an acorn to become an oak? Does it pay the chrysalis to become the butterfly? Does it pay to add power to the lens of the microscope or the telescope? Does it pay a rosebud to open its petals and fling out its beauty to the world?

The best advice that can be given to young people who are yet of school age is to stay in school and train for the future. Reports from all over the country indicate that an increasing number of boys and girls are leaving school for work; although the work usually offers no training and slight prospects of advancement and better pay. The young people are attracted by the unusually high wages. They fail to realize that the present wage standards are the result of an abnormal condition and that in a few years the untrained worker will have a minimum industrial value. Then, as never before in its history, the United States will need trained and intelligent men and women to grasp the opportunities of the future.

To those who say that an abundant supply of cheap juvenile labor is necessary to industry, we say: "Hands off the children; they are the nation's future." Many children have dropped out of school on the pretense that their labor is needed for the support of the family. The earnings of a child who goes to work will, in the long run, be a loss rather than a gain. Premature work means a sacrifice of education, of health, and, as a result, of future earning capacity.

TUBERCULOUS SOLDIERS NEED SPECIAL NURSING
Seal Sale of December 1st to 10th Will Furnish Special Nurse for Work Among Discharged Soldiers.

Figures compiled by the American Red Cross show that 1,417 New Mexico boys were discharged from the army and navy because of physical defects, and that of this number 408 were tuberculous. This is in addition to the men who were rejected by the draft boards. The figures given only include men discharged after they entered the service.

That 408 New Mexicans should have been discharged because of tuberculosis is astonishing. This is nearly twice the proportion for Indiana, Illinois and similar states. It shows clearly that tuberculosis is on the increase among the native people of this state. Those afflicted were not easterners nor the children of people who came here for lung trouble. Over 50 per cent are Spanish-American names. Not a single county escaped. The percentage was especially large in Taos and Rio Arriba counties, which have been shielded from healthseekers coming into New Mexico from other states.

To stop this spread of the white plague, the New Mexico Public Health Association hopes to receive through the sale of Red Cross seals enough money to hire a specially trained tuberculosis nurse who will take up each one of the 408 cases among the soldiers and see that these boys are not becoming a menace to their community and that they are receiving the care which will enable them to regain the health they sacrificed in the defense of their country.

SEALS ARE ALWAYS SIGNS OF HAPPINESS
Other Emblems Bring Thoughts of Battles, Carnage and Suffering.

Red Cross Christmas seals have one characteristic which no other emblem can claim. They have always been associated with happiness and victory. The flags of many nations have been lowered in defeat. They bring memories of battle and carnage. Even the flaming symbol of the American Red Cross is associated with suffering and privation. But the Christmas seal, which bears both the American Red Cross emblem and the double barrel Red Cross of the National Tuberculosis Association, has always been the sign of cheer, of Christmas joy, of success in the fight against tuberculosis and other preventable disease.

The Christmas seal is a peculiarly appropriate holiday greeting. It bears a message of "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men," but also carries the emblems which mean an end to disease. The two crosses it bears remind those who see it that in the midst of holiday cheer it is well to remember those unfortunates who are suffering from tuberculosis and those whose ignorance of health matters may make them early victims of the disease.

The seals will make possible a strong campaign against tuberculosis in New Mexico since 91 per cent of the money received from their sale will remain in the state for health work.

HEALTH BONDS ARE STRONGLY ENDORSED
Larrazolo, Pankey, Bursum and Jaffa Are Signers of Bond Payable Only in Public Health Effort.

Health Bonds issued in the coming Red Cross Christmas-seal campaign to large contributors to the fund will bear the endorsement of Governor O. A. Larrazolo, Lieutenant Governor J. F. Pankey, Holm O. Bursum of Socorro and Nathan Jaffa of Roswell. Governor Pankey is state chairman of the seal sale, while the other three men are officers of the New Mexico Public Health Association, which will supervise the expenditure of the money raised by the campaign of December 1st to 10th.

Governor Larrazolo strongly supported the campaign for the creation of a state department of health and is deeply interested in health matters. He has voiced his approval of the seal sale since the money raised will be expended within the state and will furnish help to the state department of health in the work it has outlined. Mr. Bursum is now president of the New Mexico Public Health Association, while Mr. Jaffa is treasurer and was the first president.
