## WASHINGTON SIDELIGHTS

### Uncle Sam Puts Santo Domingo in Order



WASHINGTON.—Apparently Uncle Sam has done a good house-cleaning job in Santo Domingo. It is stated that in four years of military occupation the United States has put the republic on its feet, restored order, rehabilitated finances, established public sanitation and compulsory education, and begun the training of Dominicans to carry on the government when the American navy shall be withdrawn. A report by Commander Reynolds Hayden, medical corps, U. S. N., a member of the staff of the military governor of Santo Domingo, says:

"The military government of Santo Domingo was established in November, 1916, because of the seriously disturbed conditions in the Dominican republic, dangerous to both Dominicans and foreigners, and because of the repeated failures of the Dominican

government to observe its treaty obligations with the United States. The military government was composed of United States naval and marine officers.

"At the time this temporary government was installed, the account of the Dominican government was overdrawn to the sum of \$14,234.33 and payment of salaries, supply bills, etc., was greatly in arrears. The military government had paid all the 1916 indebtedness, and has since then met all the expenses of the government, including bonded debt, and on August 1, 1920, had \$3,200,000 in the treasury.

"It is expected that the \$20,000,000 bonded debt of the country, inherited by the military government, and due in 1923, will be paid in 1925, 23 years before it is due.

"In addition to these financial reforms, the military government is extending general education and sanitation, creating communications, roads, mills, telegraphs throughout the country, and making many port improvements.

"Obligatory education has been established, and whereas there were only some 18,000 children attending school before the occupation, there are now 120,000."

### New Points for First Geography Class

DO YOU want some new geographical facts about your country? Well, the farthest east, west, north and south points on the United States mainland have been determined by the United States geographical survey which announces that the easternmost point is West Quoddy Head, near Eastport, Me., the westernmost point, Cape Alva, Wash.; the farthest north, a small detached land area of Northern Minnesota ending in latitude 40 degrees 28 minutes and longitude 95 degrees 9 minutes. The southernmost point is Cape Sable, Florida, while the Florida keys extend farther south.

Data determined and compiled by the geographical survey contain some interesting facts not generally known. Some of these facts are:

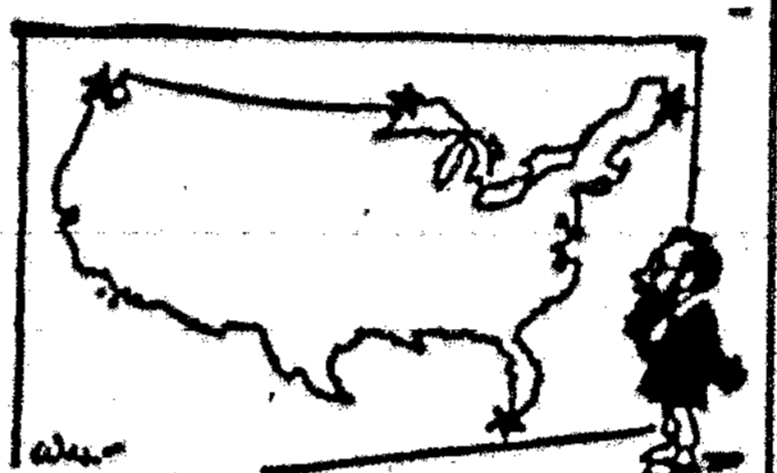
The gross area of the United States is 3,026,789 square miles.

The land area is 2,978,774 square miles.

The water area, exclusive of the Great Lakes, the Atlantic, the Pacific and the Gulf of Mexico, within the three-mile limit, is 68,015 square miles.

From the easternmost point, West Quoddy Head, due west to the Pacific ocean, the distance is 2,907 miles.

The shortest distance from Atlantic to Pacific, between points near Charleston, S. C., and San Diego, Cal., is 2,182 miles.



The Canadian boundary line is 8,866 miles in length.

The Mexican boundary line is 1,744 miles in length.

The Atlantic coast line is 5,500 miles long.

The Pacific coast line is 2,730 miles in length.

The Gulf of Mexico coast line is 3,840 miles long.

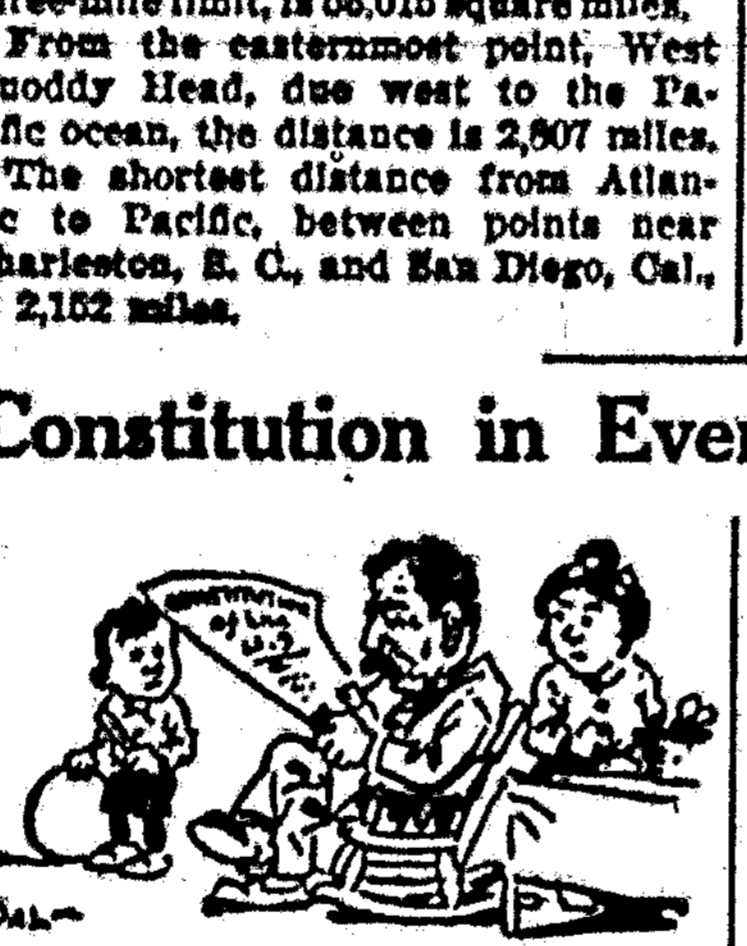
Cuba, if transposed directly north, would extend from New York city to Indiana, with Hawaii further west than Cleveland, O.

The Panama canal is due south of Pittsburgh, Pa.

Nome, Alaska, is farther west than Hawaii.

The survey, strangely enough, neglects to tell us that the Panama canal runs north and south, and that to the Americans of the Canal Zone the sun rises in the Pacific and sets in the Atlantic.

### Constitution in Every American Home



TO PUT the Constitution of the United States in every one of the 20,000,000 homes of America is the purpose of an Americanization campaign now under way all over the country. The work is being organized under the Constitutional League of America, which had its inception in New York several months ago. Its membership contains many of the most widely known men in America. Among these are the governors of 30 states. Such men as Franklin K. Lane, Charles E. Hughes, Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, Herbert C. Hoover, Gen. John J. Pershing and Cardinal Gibbons are members. The organization is affiliated with no political party, race or creed and has but one purpose.

The entire campaign will be based on the fact that if the people of America read and understood the Con-

stitution of the United States, there would be no question of any other form of government for America.

The campaign will be conducted by the utilization of every possible medium for the accomplishing of this. In addition to the placing of the Constitution in every home, the content of the document will be explained verbally in every public forum. It will be translated into at least 16 foreign languages, so as to meet the most immediate need of the foreigner, and it will be explained by means of motion picture slides and films in the 16,200 motion picture houses of America.

The schools will be used as far as possible. Believing that the habits of life and the attitude toward one's environment are begun in early childhood, and that the boy or girl who is taught the full meaning and value of our government never will be able as a man or woman to tolerate destructive, Bolshevistic ideas of government, an attempt will be made to found a "school republic" in many public schools.

The school republic idea has proven successful. To found one an entire school is organized as a national republic, and each school has its national officials and departments, as has the regular government.

### "Hard-Boiled" Smith and His Punishment

IT IS announced by the war department that former Lieut. Frank H. (Hard Boiled) Smith, who was convicted by court-martial in France for brutal treatment of soldier prisoners and sentenced to 18 months in prison, was paroled from Fort Jay, N. Y., March 30, and since that time his sentence, as reduced for good behavior, has expired. Smith began serving his sentence in France May 20, 1919, and was transferred to Fort Jay July 21, 1919. Because of his good behavior he was given a "home parole" after serving about ten months. He was required to report to the military authorities monthly. Meantime his sentence was reduced 14 months, and thus expired last July 29.

It is said that the order for Smith's release was issued by the adjutant general's office at Washington and was approved by the secretary of war.



was reduced to 18 months at hard labor at Fort Leavenworth.

Smith was brought overseas and confined at Fort Jay pending investigation by a congressional committee of the treatment of American prisoners in France. After this investigation had been completed, it was generally supposed Smith had been taken to Fort Leavenworth to serve out his sentence, which members of the committee had

### Mexico to pay for Slaying of Wm. S. Benton

Washington, Nov. 1.—Great Britain has agreed to a settlement of the claim against Mexico growing out of the killing of William S. Benton, a British subject, near Juarez on February 17, 1914. Mexico is to pay \$10,000 cash to Mrs. Benton and a pension of \$2.50 a day as long as Mrs. Benton remains unmarried.

Benton, whose wife is a native of Mexico, was killed when he went to Francisco Villa's headquarters to protest against outrages.

The American government was looking after British interest in Chihuahua state at the time and the British ambassador immediately asked the state department to investigate.

Carranza exonerated Villa, but American Consul Edwards at Juarez reported Benton was killed at Villa's headquarters. This later was confirmed by George C. Carothers, American consular agent.

It always has been understood here that the Benton case was one of the principal reasons for refusal of the British government to recognize the Carranza regime

A Nation of Hunters

There are 7,000,000 hunters in the United States, according to the chief, United States game warden, the Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture. This estimate was made from reports on the number of game licenses issued by the various States.

In 1919, 3,600,000 State licenses were issued, and in addition it is estimated that 3,500,000 hunters are exempted under various State provisions. The returns to the States from licenses was approximately \$4,500,000, all of which was expended by the States in administration of State laws for the protection of game. This sum permits the employment of approximately 2,000 salaried State game wardens and 600 fee wardens. The congressional appropriation for Federal game-warden service for protection of migratory birds is \$142,500, which permits the employment of only 29 salaried wardens.

Get That Wolf

"Get that wolf," is the sole order under which H. P. Williams, of Custer, one of the most experienced hunters in South Dakota, is working for the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture.

"That wolf" is a wicked veteran with the cunning of a criminal human and with an account of \$25,000 charged against him for cattle and sheep destroyed in the six or seven years of his depredations.

This big cattle thief has defied all efforts of the local hunters. One of the tactics credited to him is that after making a kill of a fat calf or steer and eating his fill he makes a long trail from his kill and back tracks on a parallel line a few rods away. He then lies in wait at a point convenient to the sheltering timber.

When the hunters trail him with dogs he watches them from his cover safety to leeward to avoid his scent being carried. As the pack passes on the scent he quietly slips into the woodland and makes his getaway.

Stock raisers had about decided that it would be necessary to board the old "varmint" for the rest of his natural life, or until he died from overeating; but the Biological Survey is determined not to be defeated by a wolf, and Williams promises to bring in the wanderer before another season is ended.

## French Fairs Drawing Cards

Those Held at Paris, Lyons and Bordeaux Grow to Proportions of Expositions.

### AMERICANS ARE TAKING PART

Everything Conceivable for Use in Foreign Lands is Exhibited—May Revert to Wanting—Extension of Foreign Trade Planned.

Paris.—French fairs of today have reached the proportion of expositions and have proved to be the best means of attracting buyers. The steady growth of the Lyons, Bordeaux and Paris fairs has not only created worldwide interest in them, but has added to the importance of international trade. Americans are participating in them more and more, and at the last Lyons fair there were about 100 American exhibitors. In striking contrast to the dozen that displayed merchandise at the first one. There has also been a corresponding increase in the number of American buyers.

Finished products that the French colonies require are not wanting in the United States, whose foreign trade under the new order of things can be said to be still in its infancy. "An announcement of one of the exhibitors at the Bordeaux fair, now in progress, is suggestive of many things in foreign trade. It reads: 'Sorghum Straw Brooms. This important manufacturing house makes a specialty of brooms called American and of Spanish mats and brushes. These are special articles for export. Representatives are sought for France and abroad.' The house exhibiting these exotic wares has its factory in the south of France. There are many streets of exhibits that are not limited to articles de Paris.

means of civilization in many countries are practically unobtainable owing to the disparity of exchange. As this situation may continue for an indefinite period, the world will probably be forced to revert to bartering, the method of primitive peoples. In that event these fairs will offer one of the most convenient places for such an exchange of merchandise.

**Concentrate Their Efforts.**  
"The first thing proposed is to get in touch with foreign expositions so as to inaugurate a reciprocal system of publicity and recruiting. Next they will attempt to remedy, by mutual agreement, certain defects which have been detected in the managements of the various fairs. It was also decided that each exhibitor must have his booth ready for the opening of the fair, and not several days later, as has frequently been the case. The booth, or exhibit, must be in charge of a responsible representative of the house owning the display; some one capable of furnishing all required information.

## Fur Mantle in Form of Cape

Judging by the fur wraps prepared for this winter, the good, old-fashioned fur coat has passed into the discard. To be really smart, observes a Paris fashion correspondent, our fur mantle must be in the form of a cape or closely resemble a dress or, if a coat at all, decidedly of the wrappy type. The fitted sleeve is seldom seen in the latter. When there is a sleeve it is cut as part of the garment, somewhat on the raglan style.

Some of the very newest fur garments for 1920-21 are being made in what is known in Paris as the robe-manteau style; that is, the coat is almost in the form of a dress. The leading furriers have taken this tip, as it were, from the big dressmakers of Paris, who are having remarkable success with these coat dresses.

From fur to organdie is a far cry, but in fashion vagaries the whole gamut is often sounded, and so the robe-manteau is found in organdie and in priceless fur. The last word in summer frocks, worn at the Trouville-Deauville races, was the robe-manteau in organdie, and the first fur novelty wrap for winter is in the robe-manteau style.

A charming wrap of this character is developed in moleskin as thin and fine as satin, with trimming bands of dark Hudson bay mink. There is a muff to match as beautifully tailored as if it were of cloth.

Another fur coat, in the form of a dress, is of moleskin, worked in bands which show horizontal, bias and chevron lines. The quaint, snug shoulder cape is new in its slanting lines.

**Development in Fur.**  
One of the most interesting developments in fashions is seen in the fur coat of the present day. A few years ago designers would not have thought of draping furs in the same way that they would chiffon. Very many of the new fur wraps of the mantle type show almost priceless pelts arranged in the form of draped capes. Following the great popularity of silk and serge mantles during the early autumn season, it is to be expected that furs made in these styles will be equally popular. Both capes and coats are made in tiers, one falling over the other. These do not ripple, but wrap or drape gracefully about the wearer.

All of the new mantles have a very striking hanging back, which gives a square appearance to the figure, although the front often crosses in a diagonal line and wraps the figure snugly. This is just the difference between the coats of last winter and those of 1919-1921—that indefinable something which makes all the difference between being in the fashion or out of fashion.

Caracul is a fur well suited to these square hanging designs. A lovely new wrap of natural caracul made in this

day. They are of gray galanth to blend with the soft coloring of the fur, and are pear-shaped, carved in beautiful design.

Another gray and caracul wrap, being shown among the newest models, is made in the form of a straight cape, but has bands of the fur placed around the waistline to give the effect of two tiers. There is a deep hanging kolinsky collar which really forms a little cape in itself.

**Hudson Seal is Favored.**  
Hudson seal is as popular as ever for general wear. There is much to recommend it. It is durable and inexpensive in comparison with many of the other furs as well as becoming.

A smartly tailored fur coat developed in Hudson seal has a big card

girdle, which pinches it in tightly at the waistline. The cuff bands, shoulder collar and skirt hem show the fur worked in bands.

For those who do not care for the all-black coat there is Hudson seal combined with other fur. A tightly girdled coat of Hudson seal, with a shoulder cape collar and cuff bands of kolinsky is another model that is shown.

The fur redingote is seen in a variety of forms and is being made in a great many combinations of furs. Among the more extravagant coats are lovely redingotes developed in unborn lamb, trimmed with sable. They are in fitted lines with the exception that the hips flare slightly just where the pocket openings fall.

In the choice of skins we have considerable latitude. Almost every sort of fur is used for the handsomest of wraps. It is several seasons since there has been such a lavish use of Siberian squirrel trimmed with skunk—a durable old-fashioned fur, which has been brought into the limelight again both as a trimming and for small furs. There are coats of caracul, beaver, nutria—in fact, almost every fur is used.

Among the almost priceless coats are those of chinchilla and Russian sable. Then there is mink—one of the most popular of this winter's furs. In addition to being fashionable it is durable—a most desirable quality considering the present prices of furs. The placing of the skins appears to be a very important matter, for in this way new and unusual effects are obtained. If the wrap is not made in tiers the skins frequently are placed to give the effect of tiers.

**Wrap Like Traveling Coat.**  
A wrap created by one of our American designers is of eastern mink in straight cape effect, with two bands of the fur set below the collar to give the effect of three capes graduating in size, the collar forming the first. The skins are arranged horizontally on either side of the front and around the collar to make a trimming band. There are no sleeves, merely slits through which the arms pass. It is lined with a beautiful black and gold brocaded silk.

Another mink wrap, in one-piece cape effect, has the skins placed to give the effect of stripes running around both in the collar and body portion. Trimming bands of the fur are on either side of the front and hang in wide loops, which are arranged at the waistline so that they may be used as a muff.

## DOUBT NEW VOLCANO

Recent Earthquakes Did Not Form Another Belcher.

Scientists Believe Escaping Gas Was Mistaken by Observers for New Crater.

Rome.—Scientists say they do not believe that a new volcano was created on Mount Pisanino, near Spezia, during the earthquakes which began Sept. 7 and continued until Sept. 9, causing the death of 500 lives. Tongues of flame and smoke at that time were seen to be emitted from what is possibly supposed to have been a new crater opened near the mountain top.

## OFFER HINDUS HOMES

Invited by Amir to Settle in Afghanistan.

First Time in History Such a Concession Has Been Made by Ruler of the Country.

New York.—The amir of Afghanistan, for the first time in history, according to Dr. N. S. Hardiker of the India Information Bureau here, has invited Hindus to settle in his country, to accomplish which he has announced the following royal concessions, said to indicate a movement for the unification of the peoples of Asia:

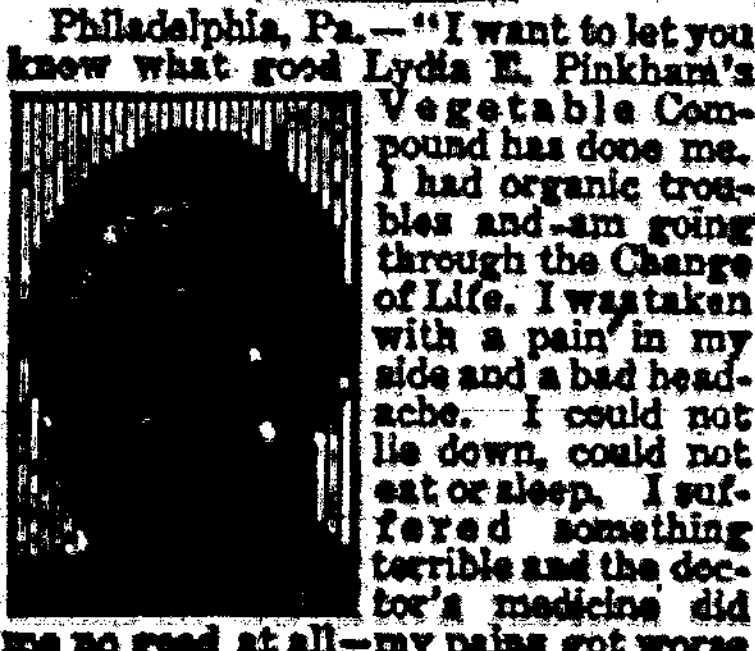
**Wife Lives in Jail, He Moved.**

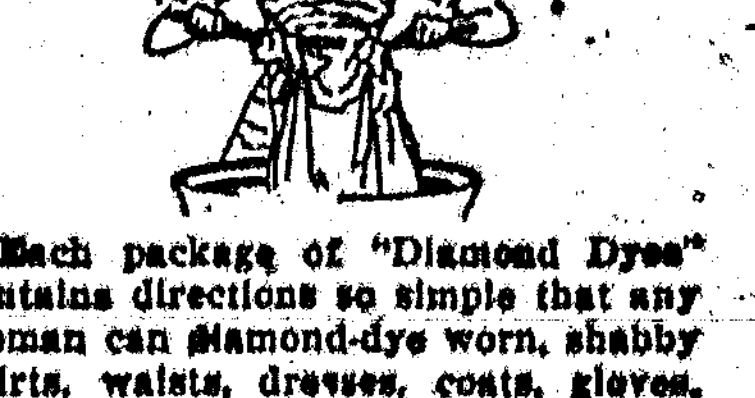

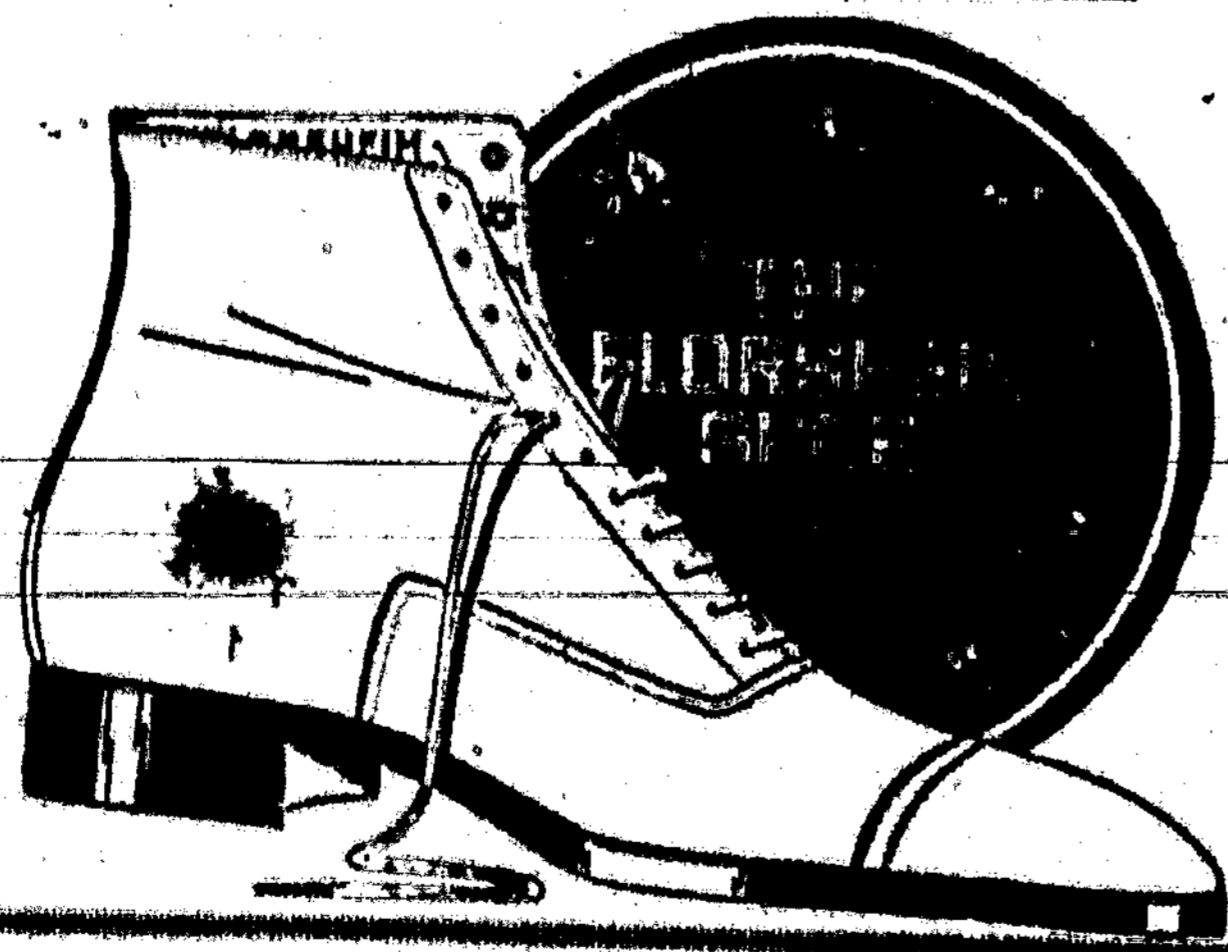
