

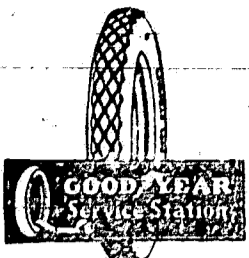

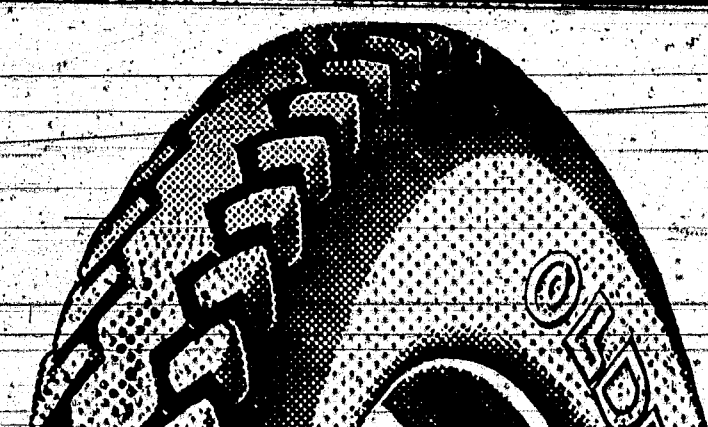

\$22,400,000,000—a reduction of considerably more than a billion dollars a year.—President Harding in his speech at Salt Lake City, June 26, 1923.

Yes, the public will be interested, for one thing, in knowing who are meant by "we." Mr. Harding permits the inference that this pronoun has for its antecedent the Republican administration. That is not quite ingenious, of course.

In order to understand the grammar of that "we" and to ascertain the truth concerning the reduction of the public debt, it will be sufficient to quote from official reports of the Secretary of the Treasury.

On August 11, 1919, the public debt aggregated \$26,894,000,000—the "peak." On February 18, 1921, four days before Mr. Harding became president, the total of this debt stood at \$24,051,000,000. In eighteen months, under a Democratic administration, the reduction of the debt was accomplished at the rate of \$1,700,000,000 a year. In the twenty-eight months between March 1, 1921, and June 30, 1923, the Harding administration diminished the debt at the rate of \$767,572,000 a year.

This is the identity of "we" disclosed. It refers to President Wilson, who reduced the debt by a total of \$2,543,000,000 in a year and a half, and President Harding, who has decreased it by \$1,651,000,000 in two years and four months.

During the past winter a powerful new geyser burst forth in the Norris geyser basin, Yellowstone National park, scalding scores of trees to death and tearing a great gap in the road. It is irregular in its activity and has so far been seen in eruption by park rangers only; but the results of its force are plainly evident.

Rain Expert Dissects Fog

Harvard Professor Explains That Precipitation Is Really Forced Draft.

Cambridge, Mass.—Now we have the truth about rain making! Prof. Alexander Mead, climatology expert and director of the Blue Hill observatory at Harvard, writes an article to this effect in the current issue of the Harvard Alumni Bulletin. Clouds can be taken into the laboratory and studied these days. It is the forced draft that brings the rain, the professor says, and that it would take considerable time to tell of natural rain makers. A great cause is the mountain.

Experiments now in progress by Bancroft and Warren under the auspices of the air service, the article says, "indicate the possibility of clarifying cloudy atmospheres by spraying with electrical sand from above. It seems feasible."

"Fog, whether in the streets of London, or on the banks of Newfoundland, or over flying fields, is essentially a wall built of ionized, nucleated, vapor varnished bricks."

Finds Fog Elements.

Quite a remarkable wall, too, for while it often rests on the ground it can spring into the air and float away. And this without the slightest noise or damage. It never stands still and is always falling and fading and yet at the same time rebuilding. A thousand of fog stuff contains about a thousand bricks; and all these squeezed tightly together will make only a small drop of rain.

"Fog wraps the clouds and makes rain by pushing moisture laden air upwards, or else sideways into another current decidedly colder. It is the forced draft which causes the thickest case of upward push in the shower of summer. The surface air and vapor is lifted a thousand meters and the expanded, cooling, radiating, and capturing of comparatively large dust particles produce a cumulus cloud, the cloud that makes one think of a colossal helping of colossal ice cream. The cream fat soon gives way to a dirty gray and this in turn dark-

ens into the brown black base of a cumulo-nimbus ready to split; lightning to another cloud or dart it earthward."

Bird Builds Nest Under Mail Coach

New York.—When "Wynken, Blynken and Nod" one night called out in a wooden shoe, their voyage was not one bit as adventurous as the daily journey of 75 miles taken by five of the oddest passengers that ever rode on the Philadelphia & Reading railway.

Every day at noon, standard time, a United States coach leaves New Hope, Pa. It gets to this city an hour and forty-seven minutes later, stays in the Reading terminal until 8:15, standard time, then starts again for New Hope.

For ten days now a mother robin sits at the other end of the line has written as anxiously for that train as all the people together in New Hope have for their mail. When the train reaches the New Hope station, Brakeman Leon Nugent, who lives at 1423 French street, Philadelphia, sends away all the curious onlookers. Then the robin hops down from a nearby tree and disappears under the mail coach.

There, on top of a warm steam valve, protected by a drip pan, is a nest. The little mother perches on the edge and looks inside to see if any damage has been done. For within the nest are five blue robin eggs warmed by the steam beneath, waiting

the day when their shells can be broken by five little mouths.

The steam valve has a little flat surface on top that makes the nest quite safe when fastened by a few restraining straws. If any of the straws have been jarred loose by the day's journeying Mrs. Robin has some more at hand to repair the damage.

When all has been fixed, she takes her place on the nest and through the night warms the eggs.

So far the plan has worked well, and the mother and the railroad have taken turns keeping the nest warm. But Brakeman Nugent is faced with a knotty problem. In not so long a time the nest will have five hungry mouths to feed, and catching worms is a precarious piece of business when a coach is riding the rails. Will mother robin keep her seat on the nest during the trip and start out in search of worms when the train goes to the terminal?

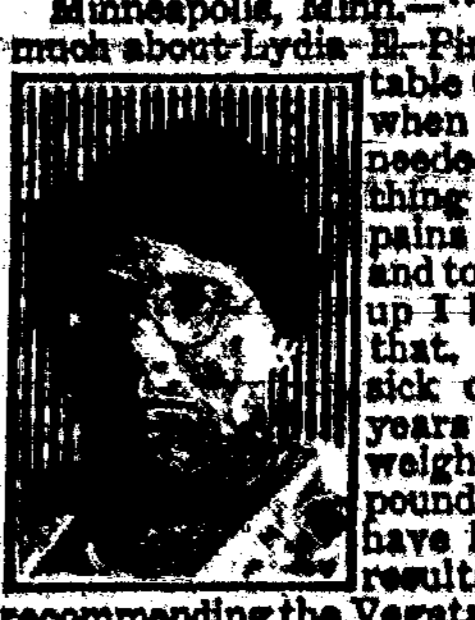

On the occasion of his grandfather and guardian, Mrs. Elizabeth King, who was Mrs. John Parker before her second marriage, Judge John Duthie of Honolulu has just increased the youngster's annual allowance from \$1,000 to \$15,000.

This sum is divided as follows: General maintenance, education, upkeep of automobile and employment of nurse, governess and chauffeur, \$12,000; provision for annual gifts to employees of the Parker ranch, \$1,500; special fund for his annual vacation in Hawaii, \$1,500.

Few American boys attaining their majority will control the wealth that

has in store and is piling up for young Smart. He will be a millionnaire, with an annual income of more than \$200,000, and the ownership of the ranch, one of the largest and finest in the world, which is estimated to be worth between \$100,000 and \$150,000,000.

The ranch that Richard inherited was one of the few that were left by the late Mrs. Parker in her will, which she left to her only son, Richard Smart. In the early days of the big estate, she was as rich and as wise as on any other ranch in the mainland west. The Hawaiian cowboys were considered of the class in the world and she gave them the best of the land, money and prizes at her annual rodeos.

Most of Richard's time is spent upon the mainland, chiefly on the Pacific coast, but his annual visit to the ranch is marked by a huge celebration, rodeo and barbecue in which the countryside participates. It is at this time that his gifts to his employees are distributed.

SCIENTIST SAYS MEN DO NOT USE ALL OF BRAIN

Changes Taking Place in Human World Very Rapidly.

London.—We do not use our brains to half their capacity, says Dr. Arthur Keith, British scientist, who has just returned from the African jungles, where he made a minute study of the brains of gorillas and apes.

"Most of us," declares Dr. Arthur, "have more brains than we know what to do with."

The famous anthropologist said that changes are now taking place in the human world more rapidly than at any former period, but that the time has not yet come for the production of superior. During the war, he explained, the average strength for a man grows 5 feet 3 inches, the arm as in the normal period. The average for men fighting professional men is 5 feet 3 inches.

This scientist must be surprised

that certain characteristics, which are easily recognized in the bodies of a large proportion of our modern population, are of recent origin. The most plastic bone in the human body, he said, is that under the jaw, in which the teeth are rooted, and it is here that the most marked changes are to be noted.

"In quite 50 per cent of the people this bone," continued Dr. Arthur, "instead of spreading outward and giving the foot of the mouth a wide and low vault, as in prehistoric races, grows in a vertical direction, giving the palate a narrow and high arch."

"In those contracted palates there is no longer room for the normal number of teeth. Such an appearance undoubtedly the wisdom tooth often fall to the side of the jaw."

"The structure of the teeth gives the different races and even the same individuals the tendency of all mouths
