## For Mineral Development

Henry Lutz, who has been working on a mineral development proposition for a number of months past, has succeeded in interesting eastern capitalists in a local proposition that gives promises of better things for Lincoln county. The parties joining Mr. Lutz in the project are Messrs. Grokins, Pratt and Hutton, of New York, Philadelphia and Pittsburg, respectively.

Messrs. Pratt and Hutton spent the early part of the week here, going over the proposition with Mr. Lutz, visiting surrounding mineral belts and drawing up agreements. The title of the organization is known as the Carrizozo Exploitation and Development Syndicate, and Mr. Lutz was made treasurer of the concern.

Messrs. Pratt and Hutton left Tuesday night for Santa Fe to complete the plans of the organization and to put everything in order to make it a going concern. Before leaving they engaged three suites in the Lutz building, where the offices will be located, and which will be occupied by a representative within two or three weeks, at which time the syndicate expects to begin active operations.

Mr. Lutz expects to spend the greater part of his time in the field, and will place a manager in charge of his mercantile business. Mr. Lutz is not only hopeful of the best results, for he says the syndicate proposes to expend \$240,000 on coal and other mineral properties in White Oaks and vicinity, and as that is already one of the best developed mineral fields in Lincoln county, there is much to warrant his enthusiasm. And it is needless to say that all Lincoln county most heartily wishes him success, and thoroughly appreciates his untiring efforts in interesting capital in the development of our resources. "The dawn of prosperity for Lincoln county is at hand," Mr. Lutz says; and his faith in Lincoln county is greater now than at any time during the long period of his residence.

## Money for Schools

Santa Fe, Oct. 4.—Because Justina Baca, Land Commissioner, turned over to the schools of the state more than three quarters of a million dollars and this has been apportioned to the county schools, every district will have cash with which to start the fall term and run them until the first taxes come in, according to information from the State Department of Education. In 23 of 31 counties during the last Republican administration, funds had to be borrowed to pay the first salaries in September.

## Road Building Record

Santa Fe, Oct. 6.—Under a Democratic administration more roads were built and maintained in 14 months than had been built in the five years previous of Republican rule in the Highway Department. Credit is given to the untiring and business-like efforts of A. T. Hansett, president of the Highway Commission and now Democratic candidate for governor.

Washington, D.C. Oct. 6.—Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the Interior and now living at his home at Three Rivers, N. M. is accused by Owen J. Roberts and Atlee Pomerene, special attorneys for the United States government, of receiving \$90,000 in Liberty Bonds from the Continental Trading Co., Ltd., of Canada, a corporation connected with the Sinclair oil interests of this country. Formal charges to this effect have been filed along with others arising out of the Tea Pot Dome scandal.

## Educational News

CHAS. L. BROWN, Secy.

The Lincoln County Teachers' Association will hold its annual meeting at Corona, Oct. 24-25. A special program is guaranteed and many State educators will be present. Dr. H. E. Kent, president, A. S. M. Galloway and Miss Isabelle E. Fikes, state superintendant, will be among the principal speakers. A copy of the complete program will be published later.

In an opinion of the Attorney General rendered in June, 1924, the following are given as legal holidays in the State of New Mexico: Armistice Day, Arbor Day, Columbus Day, Washington's Day, New Year's Day, Decoration Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Christmas Day and Thanksgiving Day.

The County Board of Education will meet Monday, October 13 to audit all school bills.

## Highway Statistics

Some interesting statistics are being compiled by the State Highway Department as a result of the traffic census which the department, in cooperation with the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads, has conducted during the past six weeks at approximately about 200 points throughout the state.

Final reports are not yet completed, but the figures already submitted give some enlightening information as to the number of out-of-state cars which traverse New Mexico's highways. For instance, on the Roswell-Clovis road, from August 14 to 19 inclusive, there were recorded a total of 427 passenger autos, of which 305 carried foreign licenses. On this same highway, of the 103 pneumatic tire trucks which passed, 73 were foreign; and of the solid tire trucks which give the hardest wear and tear to the roads, all bore foreign licenses.

On the Alamogordo-El Paso road, from August 16 to 20, a total of 515 passenger cars passed, of which 416 were foreign. Of the pneumatic tire trucks 37 per cent were foreign; and the solid tire trucks were all out-of-state cars.

In De Baca county, on the Fort Sumner-Polar highway, out of a total of 704 passenger cars, 56 per cent were foreign, and 44 per cent of the pneumatic tire trucks bore foreign licenses.

Add within the city limits of Roswell, of the 1273 passenger cars noted, 448, or 35 per cent, were foreign.

When the figures from this census are finally analyzed, there will be no question as to who uses New Mexico's roads.

## To Drill for Oil

### INITIALS ON TURTLES

DEMOCRATIC TAX REDUCTIONS

If all the voters who benefit by the tax reductions forced upon the Republican administration by the Democrats in Congress should vote the Democratic ticket it would be elected by a majority of millions.

The Mellon tax law was the work of the Republican Secretary of the Treasury; it had the active support of President Coolidge; it was a Republican party measure.

But the Democrats with the aid of some Republicans who would not stand for the Mellon plan forced changes which saved millions to the recipients of small incomes but likewise provided an equitable decrease in the taxes on large incomes.

Comparing the two measures, the Mellon plan which was defeated and the Garner-Simmons law which is now the law of the land, the first would have saved a great deal of money to the rich; the second saves money to all, especially the small income taxpayer.

Next year the recipient of a \$3,000 income will pay \$750 income tax; under the Mellon plan he would have to pay \$11.25. The Democrats save him \$375. The recipient of a \$500,000 income will pay \$199,617.50; under the Mellon plan he would have to pay only \$143,817.50. The Mellon plan would have saved him \$45,800.

The recipient of a \$4,000 income will pay \$225; under the Mellon plan he would have to pay \$33.75. The Democrats save him \$191.25. The recipient of a \$1,000,000 income will pay \$429,617.50; under the Mellon plan he would have to pay only \$298,817.50. The Mellon plan would have saved him \$130,800.

These figures are most significant. They illustrate and illustrate the two divergent theories of taxation held by the Democratic and Republican parties, as to upon whom taxation should fall; as to whose burden should most be lightened.

Paylag Old Debt

Santa Fe, Oct. 7.—The debt of \$70,000 contracted at the Agricultural College at Las Cruces during the presidency of Doctor Austin D. Crile, keynoter at the recent Republican state convention, has been entirely wiped out by the board of regents of the institution during Democratic rule of the past 18 months, according to figures secured from the State Department of Education.

The new board of regents is headed by Numa C. Frenger, of Las Cruces, Democratic candidate for the two-year term on the supreme bench, who gave up his large law practice for three months to get the institution back on its feet. There was a deficiency appropriation of \$20,000 given by the legislature. The task of clearing off the remaining \$50,000 of debt was accomplished in a year by strict measures of economy and common sense. It is only one of a dozen examples of what the present Democratic administration has done in bringing state departments and institutions back to normal. Like records were made at the Las Vegas Normal and at the penitentiary and the State Asylum at Las Vegas.

The speech of Dr. Crile as Republican keynoter when he accused the Democratic party of failing to make savings in state operation was met with wide smiles by people of the state who know the Democratic record and also know the business record of Dr. Crile.

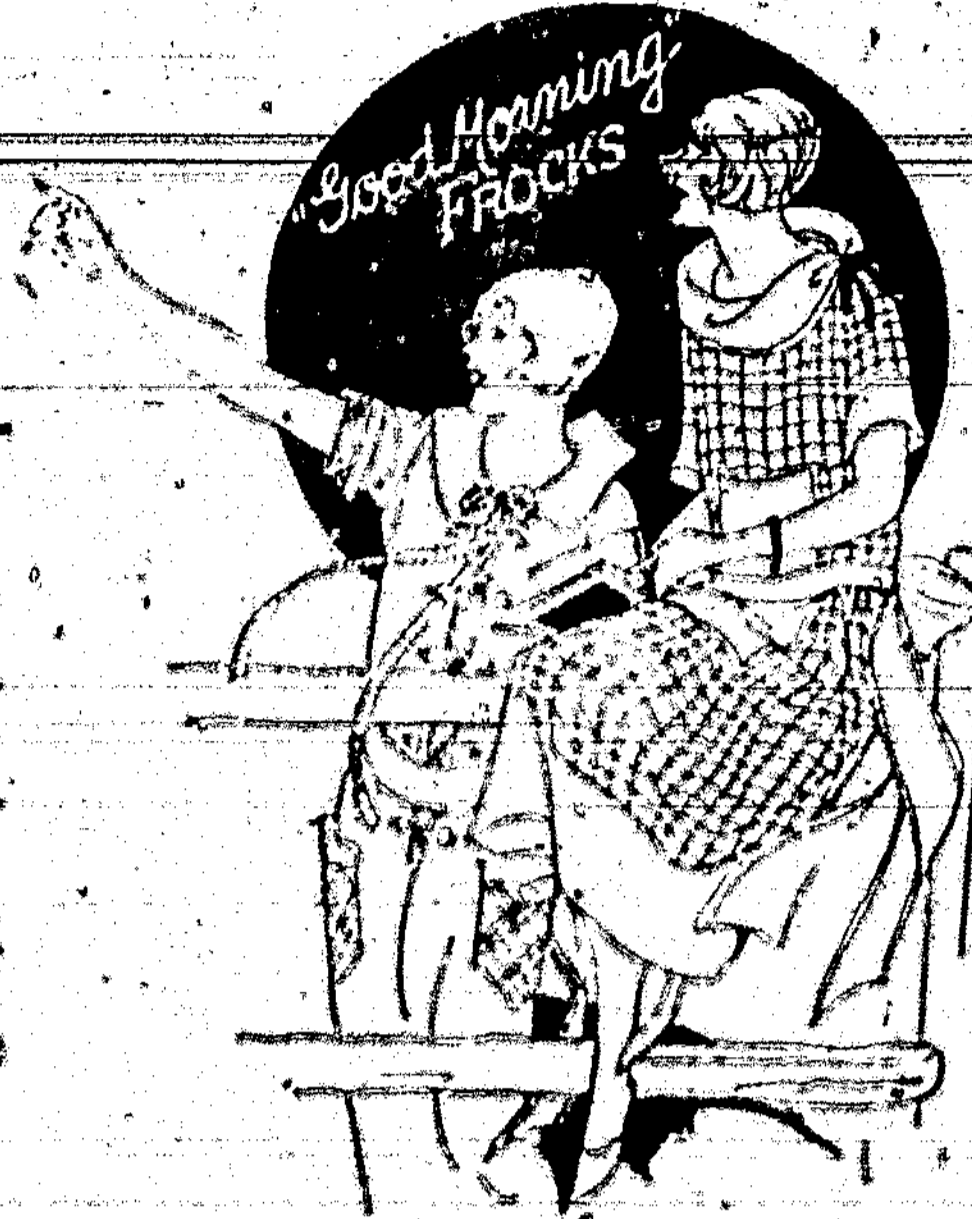
