Victim of Wreck

Among the unfortunates who were in the wreck of No. 30, last Sunday morning was Harley Spence, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Spence who are well known throughout this region. He was a young man just reaching his majority, and the greater portion of his life had been passed in this portion of New Mexico. For a number of years he had been engaged in the sheep business, with his father and uncles in the eastern part of this county and had become master of the business in all its details. He was a model young man and enjoyed the confidence of all who had any dealings with him. At the time of his death he had just completed arrangements to go and receive a herd of sheep that he and his uncle Joseph Spence of El Paso, were purchasing in company, and it was on this business that he boarded the train at Corona that morning.

Just how he came to be in the wreck will never be known, but it seems he sat down in one of the front seats when he entered the car and was buried in the wreckage which filled the front of the car.

The parents and relatives have the sympathy of all in their bereavement.

"I am supplied with colored plates showing the size, color and shape of the different varieties of fruits we send out, and when I began soliciting down there I would show these plates as I do in other localities, but it was no go, the Lincoln County ranchman would bring a basket of his home-grown apples that would put my pictures in the shade for both size and color, and the flavor of the Lincoln County apple is the best I ever saw."

Mr. Greer says, however, that he made many sales of both fruit and ornamental trees and that there will be a large amount of planting in this region this spring.

Good roads are more benefit to a community than almost any thing it can have. In the case of the prospective settler in a new country he is enabled to get out and see the country with ease and is favorably impressed with the comfort of traveling and will invest when, if he had to drag through the mud or jolt over rocks and stumps he would leave in disgust and never return. In many parts of the country good roads can only be had at great expense and a heavy tax is imposed on the people to keep them up. One of the beauties of the Carrizozo Valley is its fine natural roads, it is always a pleasure to drive out through the country and today, after the longest spell of wet weather we almost ever experienced in the winter time our streets are firm and smooth so that one has no need of rubbers.

On another page we tell of a change in the ownership of the Carrizozo Townsite, which should be good news to every citizen of the valley. There is no doubt this change will materially aid the rapid development of both town and country, as the new company will spare no expense in pushing this region to the front.

Two shipments of material have recently been received at this office; one from Denver and one from Chicago. The shipment from Chicago was made on December 22d and arrived here January 4, while the goods were billed out of Denver December 26th and arrived at Carrizozo on January 15th. The distance is much greater from Chicago yet freight was seven days longer in coming from Denver. If this was a single instance, or even an occasional occurrence, we would not have mentioned it, but it is a regular thing and the time our shipment was on the road is short compared to that frequently required by Denver shipments.

There is no question that there is an unjust discrimination on the part of the railroads against Denver shipping which works an injury alike to New Mexico merchants and Denver business interests. This is a matter that should be corrected and it seems to us that our merchants and the Denver wholesale people could combine and take the matter up with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The recent rains have put the soil of the valley in the finest of condition for plowing and the homestead settlers who are in a position to go to work on their land will be able to get ready for early planting. This will surely be a banner year for farming in the Southwest.

There has been some complaint of late about filth being thrown into the streets. This is a very bad practice as it not only renders the appearance of our town offensive, but actually endangers the health of the community, and it is hoped it will be stopped at once.

**HOME OF THE
APPLE.**

**Seen From the Top of a
Water Tank.**

As the man on the tank takes
up his pen today our entire divi-
sion is under a cloud of sorrow.
Again death by accident has come
upon us and, with scarcely a mo-
ment's warning, dashed three of
our beloved brothers into the
great and unknown future, and
we are again reminded of the un-
certainty of life.

Last Saturday seems to have
been a particularly ill-fated day,
as fatal accidents occurred to both
No. 29 and 30 on that date. The
first was in the afternoon when
Milton W. Morton, fireman on
No. 29 was struck by a water
crane near Tarquise and instantly
killed. Just how the accident
occurred is not known, but it is
thought that Morton was leaning
far out of the gang-way looking
at the ashpan and did not see the
crane. As soon as the accident
was noticed by the engineer the
train was backed up to where
Morton's lifeless body lay and it
was taken on to El Paso where
the funeral was held on Tuesday.
Following the above accident

No. 30 of the same day ran into
an open switch at the west end of
the passing track at Varney,
wrecking the engine and three of
the coaches and killing six persons
including the engineer and fireman
who were caught in the engine as
it turned over.

Engineer, Harry F. Ackley,
one of the oldest engineers on the
road was in charge of the engine
and his body was found standing
upright between the tender and
boiler, where he stood after ap-
plying the air brake and reversing
the engine, which was all he could

do to avert the terrible catastro-
phy. The remains were laid to

C. J. Redfield, fireman on the
train, was pinned under the wreck
and scalded so that he died in a
few hours. Mr. Redfield was one
of the oldest firemen on this divi-
sion and secretary of Lost River
Lodge No. 605, Brotherhood of
Locomotive Firemen, and was a
general favorite with both his
fellow workmen and the officials of
the road; he came here from Kan-
sas and the remains were taken to
the old home for burial.
