NEW MEXICO'S AGRICULTURAL POSSIBILITIES.

The delusion that New Mexico in the main is a desert and an arid country in which agriculture and horticulture can never have but a very limited space is becoming dispelled by actual occurences, by successful experiments, and by reclamation of thousands of acres by irrigation projects and by intense culture of the soil, in many sections where it was thought heretofore impracticable or impossible to raise agricultural crops. In addition to the great irrigation projects which have been constructed and will soon be constructed by the U. S. Reclamation service there are several great irrigation companies which will within a year or two have between 150,000 and 200,000 acres of fine farming land under irrigation and for disposal to farmers and settlers at very reasonable rates.

When it is considered what has been done in Colorado in the past three decades under much harder and adverse conditions it is not at all romancing to announce that within the next ten years New Mexico will outstrip its neighbors to the north in agricultural and horticultural products. What has been done for instance in and about Greely, Colorado, can and will be accomplished in this territory on acreage twenty times the acreage now contained in the Greely agricultural district. The story of the Greely section, its development and its present highly prosperous condition reads like a fairy tale but it is a fact never the less. Similar facts concerning agricultural devolepment will within the next five or ten years be the rule in New Mexico. The Greely story which is very intertesing is told editorially by the Denver Republican in a recent issue and the New Mexican hopes to be able to tell similar stories within the next few years concerning agricultural advance, progress and success in the sunshine State. Says the Republican:

"We have often spoken of wonderful devolopment of the farming region of North Colorado of part of which Greely is the center. The farmers there have no complaint to make of poor crops or low prices; and the evidence of their prosperity is seen in the fact that Greely is growing and improving in a way that gives no sign that a financial storm

struck any other part of the country. "Farming is the corner stone of our national prosper ity, and no better illustration of it can be found than in the country surrounding Greely.

Intelligence and industry have combined in that fortunate part of the

state to produce the best results, which are seen in carefully tilled fields beautiful homes and an aubudance of what may be called the luxuries of country life. The farmers are all rich, and it is no wonder, for their land rivals in fertility the far famed valley of the Nile, and irrigation is a guarantee against failure of crops.

"Greely is the local trading point of part of the region in question, and draws to itself the wealth of the farms. It is improving rapidly through the construction of many new builings, and there is every reason to believe the prosperity now enjoyed will grow constantly".—New Mexican.

New York is not near as big as it was even five years ago, but the country and its business interests outside of New York are growing constantly.

The people of New Mexico are showing a very laudble ambititon to make the holding of the Sixteenth National Irrigation Congress in Albuquerque next year the greatest public event of the kind not only in this territory but also in the great southwest that has ever occurred. No local jealousies of any kind, great or small, are existing and there will be nothing but the best of good will and the utmost of cooperation and help by the people for the project if the board of control confinues in the sensible and efficent manner in which it has commenced. This is very refreshing and greatly gratifying. There has been entirely too much jealously and sectional envy in New Mexico. This, seems to have disappeared and if its disappearance is real and permanent it will portend and bring about great good for all people of the territory.
