REPUBLICAN CONVENTION

Is Called to Meet in Silver City March 21—Will Nominate Delegates to National Convention

From The New Mexican. Albuquerque, N. M., Feb. 18. The Republican territorial central committee met here this afternoon according to call. Chairman H. O. Bursam presided and nearly all of the counties were represented by members or by proxies.

This afternoon a committee from the people's party from Bernalillo county called and presented a request that the county central committee of their organization of Bernalillo county be recognized as the regular Republican county organization. The request was referred to the committee which consisted of Chairman Bursam, Hon. Solomon Luna, Judge W. H. Newcomb, of Silver City, H. B. Holt, of Las Cruces, Charles A. Spiess, of Las Cruces, and Maliquias Martinez, of Taos. No definite action has yet been taken. The convention to nominate delegates to represent the Republicans of New Mexico at the Chicago National Convention will be held at Silver City on March 21st and the convention to nominate a Republican candidate for delegate to Congress will be held at Santa Fe, the date to be fixed by Chairman of the committee.

Resolutions endorsing the candidacy of Secretary of War Taft for the presidency were adopted.

FATAL ACCIDENT

Word came to F. E. Mudge of this city, on Tuesday, that little Granville, son of B. M. Crookshank, was scalded to death at the home of his grandparents in San Marcial that day. No particulars of the accident have been received. The many citizens of our town who remember the bright smiling face of the little fellow will extend heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved parents.

NEW LAW FIRM

A new law firm has just been formed by George Spence, of this place, and George W. Hall, formerly of Stillwater, Oklahoma. Mr. Hall has been very successful in the practice of his profession in Oklahoma, and comes highly recommended, as to his ability in legal matters and in his standing as a gentleman. Mr. Spence is too well known to need any introduction in Lincoln county. The new firm will begin business in the basement of the Exchange Bank building, as they believe in the old saying that it is better to begin at the bottom and work up to the top than to start at the top and fall.

TO RAISE FISH IN NEW MEXICO

The Penrose bill for a fish culture station in New Mexico has passed the senate. Andrew's bill to increase the pension of Frederick Wolfel to \$30 also to place Austin J. Chapman on the retired list of the army, passed the house. The bill by Smith, of Arizona, to enable the city of Phoenix to fund its indebtedness, was reported favorably from the committee on territories.

ROOSEVELT ON LABOR

President Roosevelt has sent a letter to the interstate commerce commission in which he indicates the importance of the commission's action with respect to the limitation of the hours of labor of railroad employees and points out the possibility of serious differences arising between railroad companies and their employees with respect to wages and hours of labor. The president strongly deprecates making any issue

between railroads and their employees in the matter of wages that can be avoided and instructs the commission to secure all possible information in advance so that the responsibility may be fairly placed and to hold itself in readiness to mediate.

NOVEL ENTERPRISE FOR WOMEN

Silver City has a unique business partnership, consisting of two women who have gone into the sidewalk building business. They are thorough artisans and understand fully the work of constructing cement walks. They not only superintend operations, but assist personally in the work itself. They have already built many blocks of splendid walks and have driven all competition from the field.

SMELTER TO RESUME

Arrangements have been perfected for the resumption of operations at the Silver City smelter. The smelter has been closed for several months owing to litigation. Settlements have been made and the district court will make formal disposition of the case early in March and the smelter will start immediately after.

EMPLOYEES FRATERNITY

The latest fraternal order to be organized in our town is the Railway Employees Fraternal Order, an insurance fraternity for the benefit of railway employees. P. J. Boren, organizer for the order, spent a few days in town the first of the week, and organized a lodge with a good working membership. The order includes both accident and life insurance, and is said to be very popular among railroad men wherever introduced.

MURDER AT LAS VEGAS

J. H. Teitelbaum, a pioneer of Las Vegas was found dead Monday morning, and there is but little doubt as to his having been murdered. Robbery was undoubtedly the motive of the crime. A post-mortem examination of the body showed that he had come to his death from a blow on the head from a blunt instrument the blow causing concussion of the brain. A knife wound was found in the side of the ear, and in addition the victim had been severely choked. There was a deep gash below the ear, the top of the head was crushed in as with a heavy blow and the trace of deep finger marks showed on the neck. The nose was cut off and the face was badly bruised. It is believed that the old man made a fierce fight for his life, as there were traces all around of a violent struggle. A considerable sum of money, which Mr. Teitelbaum is known to have carried is missing and there is no reason to doubt that robbery was the motive. No arrests have been made, but the sheriff is making a thorough investigation of the circumstances surrounding the tragedy, and it is not unlikely that the perpetrators will be speedily landed in prison.

COLONISTS FOR NEW MEXICO

20,000 Acres in Maxwell Grant to Be Cut Up Into Small Farms for Coming Colonists.

Hardly a day passes without the announcement of the launching of some new development project for colonization and cultivation of New Mexico lands. The latest of these is described as follows by the last issue of the Raton Range:

Dr. R. A. Morley, of Las Vegas, has purchased about 20,000 acres of land from the Maxwell Land Grant company, seven miles south of Raton, and will place it upon the market in farming tracts as soon as he returns from the east.

The land surrounds Hebron, located on the Santa Fe, and is under ditch from the Red River. In addition to being an excellent irrigating proposition, the land in question is in an area which has been for years successfully farmed by the Campbell process.

The development of this tract of farming land will be an important factor in the development of Raton. It is the beginning of the marketing of thousands of acres which lie to the south of the city. It is all under fair water prospects, and exceptionally good soil either for irrigation or scientific farming.

WANT THEIR MAIL

J. C. Jones, a ranchman of near Clouderoff, was in El Paso this week to see what the people of his community could do in the way of securing a better mail service. The railroad company forfeited the contract for carrying the mail when it closed down on the first and since that time according to Mr. Jones, the people have only been securing mail when they could secure the services of a private carrier. C. E. Smith, the Clouderoff livestockman, offered to carry the mail three times a week between Clouderoff and Alamogordo for \$75 a month, but the government turned it down as too high.

"I don't know what Uncle Sam wants unless he wants a man to pay for the privilege of carrying the mail," said Mr. Jones. "It is 20 miles to Alamogordo from Clouderoff and the condition of the roads make the trip equal to an ordinary forty mile drive. But \$75.00 a month is cheap for a tri-weekly service, and we are trying to convince the government that it is reasonable. We have only had one mail in a week and the people of Clouderoff made up a purse and paid Mr. Smith to go after it."

Mr. Jones consulted today with postmaster Smith and asked him to write to Washington and state the true conditions existing on the mail line between Clouderoff and Alamogordo and attempt to have the proposal of Mr. Smith accepted. Post office Inspector Clark, of San Antonio, was in the office at El Paso while Mr. Jones was there and was also consulted on the matter.

PRISONERS BREAK JAIL BUT AOE SPEEDILY RECAPTURED

Socorro, N. M., Feb. 17.—A sensational jail break took place here shortly after 6 o'clock last evening when Benjamin Roberts, an alleged horse thief, and Ercorro Elias, who is awaiting trial for felonious assault, overpowered the guards who had entered the jail to give them their supper, disarmed them and at the point of a revolver compelled one of the guards to unlock the jail door. They were observed by a passerby as they scaled the fence surrounding the jail yard, who gave the alarm and soon several armed citizens gave pursuit. Both men were overtaken a short distance from the jail, and although in possession of weapons, offered no resistance. They were returned to the jail and placed in irons and they will be given no chance to repeat their escapade.

BEAUTIFY THE TOWN

Arrangements have been made by the Carrizozo Townsite Company to secure the overflow from the big reservoir for the purpose of irrigating trees on the streets of the town, and a fine lot of trees are to be set out immediately on the principal streets. The water ran down the streets on Tuesday afternoon for the first time and may now be seen rippling along through the ditches daily. It is a most refreshing sight, a constant refutation to the statement so often made a few months ago that Carrizozo would never have water to supply the town.

BOX SUPPER

A box supper was given at the Baptist church Wednesday evening for the purpose of raising money for the building fund of the church. There was a good attendance, and everybody reported a good time. The proceeds amounted to about \$65.

In recent Washington dispatches it was announced that at the suggestion of Delegate Andrews and Chairman W. S. Hopewell, of the board of control of the National Irrigation Congress, Senator Penrose has offered a prize of \$500 for the best mineral exhibit gathered exclusively in the territory on the occasion of the meeting of the irrigation congress and interstate industrial exposition at Albuquerque. Dear Sir: As a matter of information we take great pleasure in advising you that during the year 1907 the total movement of emigrant outfits in carloads handled by our lines west of Higgins, was 2,333 cars, the same being an increase of 100 percent over the previous year. Out of this number, 1,301 cars were unforded at our towns in New Mexico, this being an increase of 549 cars over the previous year. These figures indicate a very healthy development, and we hope the percentage of increase will continue.

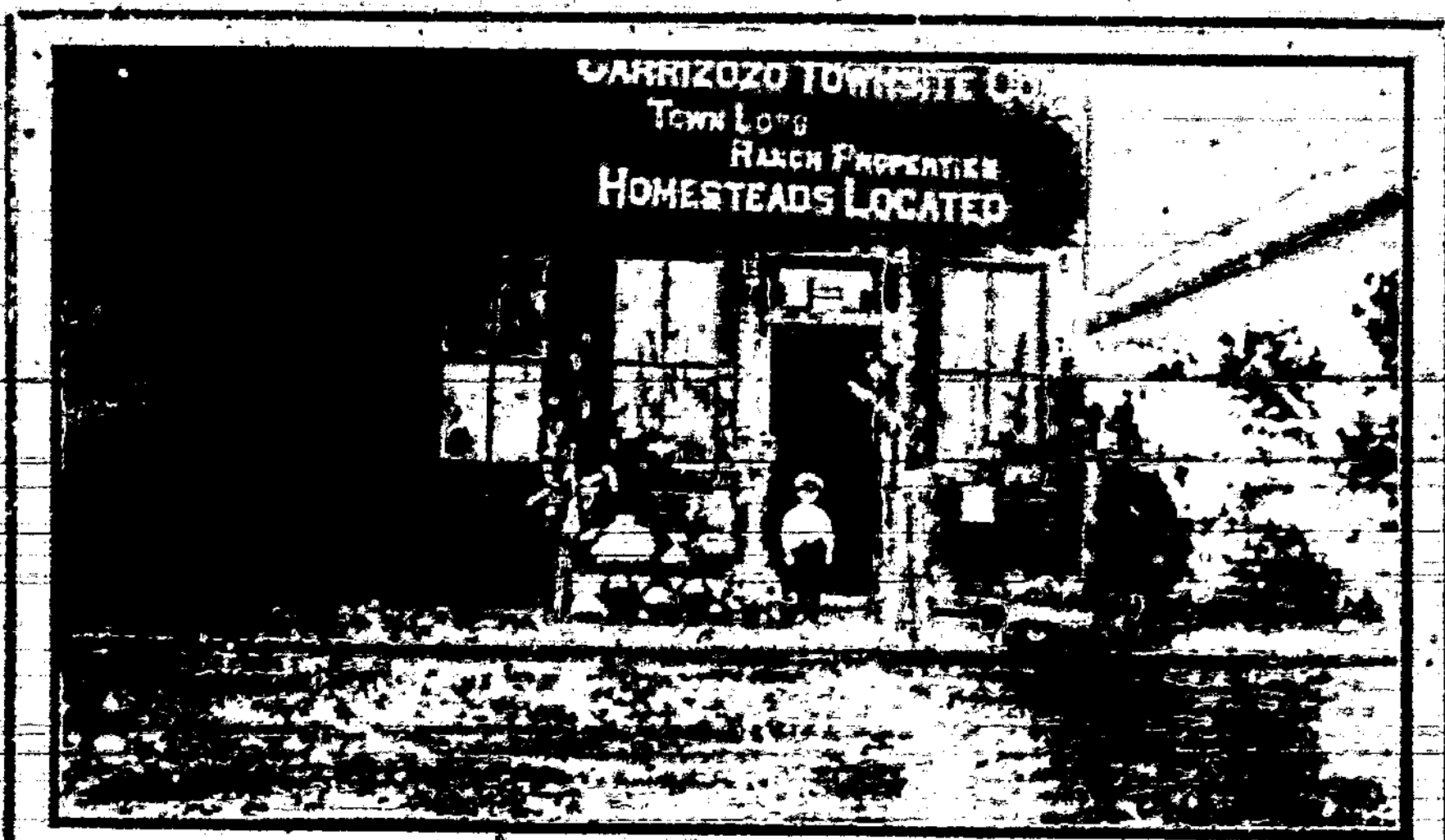

TIMBER FOR SPOOLS

Small things are not to be overlooked in considering the problem of the future timber supply. The matchmaker is having as much trouble in getting the grade of wood necessary for his business as the dealer in telegraph poles.

One of the industries which deal with small things, yet, which is one of the utmost importance to the country's commerce, is the manufacture and export of spool wood. This business is peculiar to the New England States, and is centered in Maine. Spool factories in this state are now turning out eight million spools annually, with a market value of nearly a million dollars.

The best quality of timber is used for the manufacture of spools. White birch is used almost exclusively for this industry, and reaches the factory in the form of bars from 1 to 2 inches square and from 2 1/2 to 4 feet long. These bars must be absolutely clear. The birch is cut in winter and saved in portable mills which operate near some railroad line, about 2 1/2 cords being required for 1,000 feet of bars. After sawing, the bars are piled crosswise, in order to facilitate thorough seasoning, and protected from the weather, are allowed to season until June. The spool bar mills in Maine turn out about 15,000,000 feet of bars during the year and approximately the same amount of material is manufactured into spools in the state. The machines for making spools are complicated and require skilled men for their operation.

Spoils drop from the lath at the rate of one a second and must be perfectly uniform and true. The finished spools are marketed in this country largely in Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York and New Jersey, while the spool bars are largely exported to Greenock and Glasgow, Scotland, and to Hull and to Fleetwood, England. Shipments to these points are made mostly from Bangor, as much as 8 million feet having been sent from that port in a season.

GARFIELD FAVORABLE
Washington, Feb. 6—Secretary James R. Garfield of the Department of the Interior has made a report to the House of Representatives favorably recommending the bill introduced by Delegate W. H. Andrews providing for a method of disposing of selling lands containing minerals to certain Indian reservations.

The secretary has also favorably recommended the passage of the Andrews' bill introduced in the House of Representatives yesterday providing for a compromise in the cases where the territory of New Mexico has sold certain timber lands to corporations during recent years, and in which suits on the part of the United States are now pending in several of the district courts of New Mexico in which requests that these sales be declared as void and under this compromise bill the suits are to be dismissed, the lands sold are to revert to the territory, but the timber bought by the purchasers is to be held as the property of the latter. It is believed that both bills will become law.

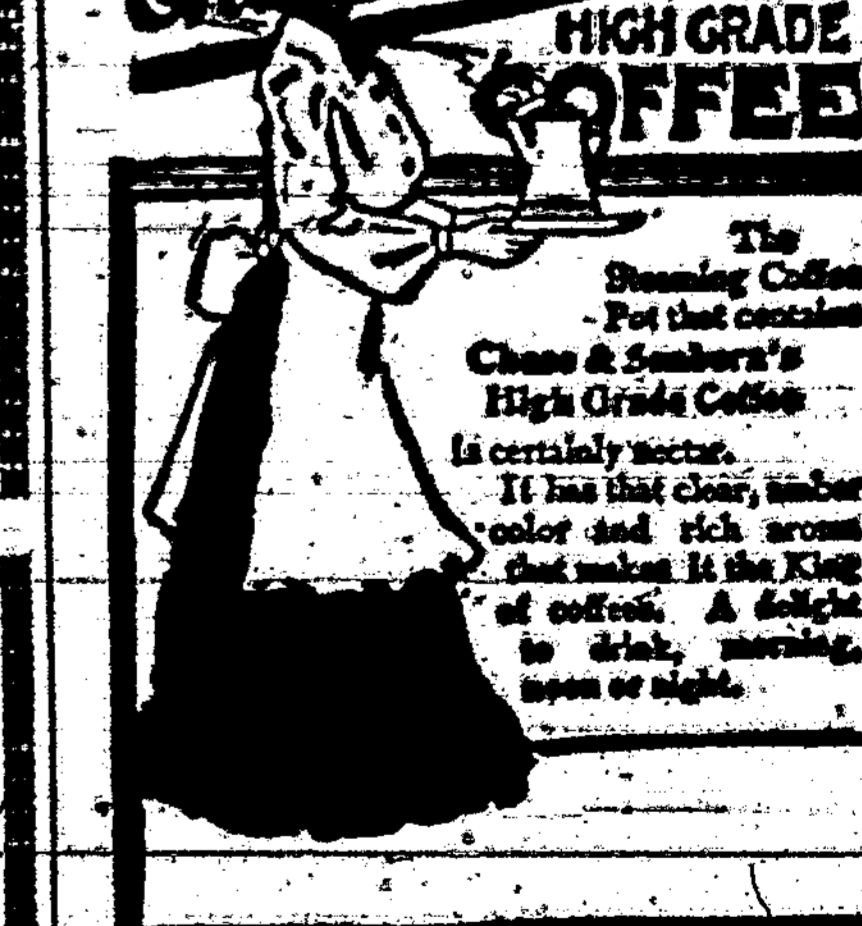
