BONITO MAKING PROGRESS

C. T. Hodge of Bonito was in town yesterday enroute home from El Paso. Mr. Hodge is enthusiastic over the prospects for his little town in the White Mountains. He reports building well under way, and many eastern people becoming interested in the new town. A hotel has just been completed with accommodations for 60 people and the camp is now well prepared for the comfortable accommodation of visitors.

The Eagle Mining & Development company's mines open for the season on the 10th. The complement of officers and men arrived this week from Chicago, and have established themselves for the season.

Bonito has a wealth of material with which to build a good town, with its timber mineral and agricultural resources, while in the way of scenery, water, location and other advantages it has no equal in the Southwest as a summer resort, and Carrizozo welcomes it as a contributory neighbor.

DRIVING LOGS

That the Rio Grande is capable of affording transportation facilities to commercial industries, will be proved within a week or ten days when the Santa Barbara Tie and Pole company of Albuquerque will commence the work of driving or floating 300,000 pieces of timber, mainly railway ties, down the river, a distance of nearly a hundred miles. The drive will start from the company's forests in Toas county, North of Embudo, and will end at Domingo a station on the Santa Fe thirty five miles North of Albuquerque. The timber will be placed on cars at Domingo and hauled to Albuquerque by rail. The ties will be turned over to the Santa Fe pickling plant at Albuquerque for treatment and the other timber will be planed and dressed at the American lumber company plant in that city.

The Santa Barbara Tie and Pole company owns large timber interests in the northern part of the territory. For a long time the timber was practically useless owing to the fact that transportation facilities were inadequate in that part of the country. Finally it was suggested that the Rio Grande be used as a means of transportation and the logs and timbers floated down stream as far as possible. In order to determine whether or not this plan would be feasible a test drive was made several months ago. This trial proved to be entirely satisfactory and the problem of moving the timber from the forest to a shipping point was solved.

The big drive will commence just as soon as the water commences to rise in the river, which will probably be within the next two weeks depending on the weather. The drive will be unique in as much as it is the first one attempted on a large scale in the southwest.

COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING

On Tuesday evening the Commercial Club met for the business with a very satisfactory attendance. A number of new members were placed on the roll and several questions of importance were discussed. Among the matters acted upon was the appointment of an executive committee to take charge of certain matters relative to the advancement of the town, which committee is composed of the following members:

J. H. Canning, Chairman; W. C. McDonald, Ira O. Wetmore, George L. Ulrich, A. H. Harvey and N. S. Rose. Following the appointment of the above committee a motion was made by Mr. Harvey and seconded by Mr. Ulrich that the Club authorize the purchase of one thousand

After a general discussion of the advisability of sending an exhibit to the Irrigation Congress at Albuquerque and other matters for the good of the community the meeting adjourned to meet at the Bank Hall April 21st, that being the next regular meeting night.

FATAL SHOOTING

Tucumcari, N. M., April 8.—In a quarrel over the contesting of a claim; L. B. Robertson shot and killed Wylie Edwards near Baranco, a small town in the central part of Quay county, 25 miles Southeast of Tucumcari.

Details of the shooting are meager, but from reports that have come drifting in, it seems that Edwards had contested Robertson's claim, and the two men quarreled over the affair, resulting in the shooting and Edwards death. Edwards was a married man and about thirty years old.

FACTORIES RE-OPEN

Plainfield, Conn., April 6.—The Layton cotton mills here, and the mills in other eastern Connecticut towns, employing 2500 persons were put on the full time today after a long period of curtailment.

At the Naugatuck the boot and shoe department of the good year company, the India rubber, glove and reclaiming department of the United States rubber company, resumed after being idle for some time about 2000 hands are affected. COAL DISCOVERY

Tucumcari, N. M., April 8.—There is considerable excitement in the San Jon valley, twenty miles south of Tucumcari, over the discovery of what promises to be a rich coal deposit.

The coal land lies about eight miles south of San Jon, Messrs. Burton and Miller have filed on 640 acres of the land and expect to test the resources of the coal field if it proves as good as it now promises, it will be a rich strike for these parties, and a great thing for the San Jon valley.

FOR GOOD SCHOOLS

The school election held on Monday of this week passed off in regular order and the voters came to the polls in larger numbers than is usual at these elections, showing that our people are in earnest about having the best educational facilities, as well as the best of everything else in this part of the territory.

The three men elected are well acquainted with the conditions in this district, have character and ability to handle the important work which falls upon them in the erection of the new ten thousand dollar school house successfully, and the people expressed their confidence in Messrs. Bourne, White and Boyd, by the rousing vote which was cast, at this, the first school election in our district.

LESS AUTOMOBILES

New York, April 7.—The woes of the poor rich are detailed in some dry statistics given out yesterday by Appraiser George W. Wamaker. During the month of March the total value of automobiles imported into this country through New York was only \$127,946.92, or a scant third of the value of automobiles importations in March of last year.

The most remarkable falling off is that of precious stones and jewelry. The total value for March was \$389,514.67, about \$3,000,000 below the value of diamonds and pearls imported in March 1907.

If the Americans have lost their appetite for luxuries they are, indeed, consolation in sweets. During the month the importation of sugar was 50 per cent more than in the same month last year.

The value of imports of groceries wines, tobacco, etc., reaches a total of some \$14,000,000, as against \$15,000,000 in March, 1907, so that even in our poverty we have almost a normal appetite.

Day by day the great daily papers of the country are becoming more acquainted with the fact that New Mexico is being developed into a land of progress and wealth that is worthy of mention in their columns. From a recent issue of the Los Angeles Times we take the following:

"The dispatches in yesterday's Times told a marvelous story of the still more marvelous growth of New Mexico. They told of how the oldest inhabited spot in the United States—a spot that had a government when Plymouth Rock was a stranger to the feet of the Pilgrim Fathers—is awakening from the slumbers of countless centuries of dreams into a new life of progress, commerce, and twentieth century activities. It is learned that New Mexico is leading every state in the Union in the establishment of new postoffices, which fact proves that population in the old land of sun and silence and mystery is advancing at a tremendous pace. The next federal census is certain to show that New Mexico has people and to spare to entitle her to pin her star on the flag and make her place among the immortal sisterhood of the States.

"It is only a few weeks ago that the Times took great delight in calling attention to the fact that Arizona had achieved the lead in the race for the copper supremacy of the world. And in the late Midwinter Number of this journal statistics were produced that showed the progress of both Arizona and New Mexico to be most astonishing. The peoples of these territories ever drawing into themselves more and still more people with every passing moon, rushing along the pathways of commercial and moral achievement with such strength and vigor and certainty as to challenge the imagination. Where but what seems like yesterday the traveler looking from the window of a railway car saw nothing but desolate waste of sand and lonely flame painted hills, he sees today green fields and valleys deep with clover and towns that spring into existence almost in a night. Tomorrow he shall see cities where today there are villages and the ancient pueblos of the gentle people of the past. In the hills, long silent, there shall be the roar of engines and the smoke of smelters turning into silver and copper and gold the hidden treasures of the earth. In addition to that, think of the unparalleled progress of California of the South, and you will behold the giant Southwest rise on the vision like the sunrise of destiny. Without the Southwest will ever remain the land of charm and beauty. It shall still attract to it the human heart with a fascination that neither time nor commerce can destroy. The same blue skies, faithful the whole year long, shall still bend above us and lure to themselves whoever seeks contentment, health, and wealth. Still as of old, shall the souls of wanderers elate with the joy of life stand on Glorieta's crest of glory and look down on the land of promise and of peace.

It would seem that the El Paso News has awakened to the fact there is something in the way of patronage in New Mexico, and that its competitor the Herald (the only news paper in the Pass City), is reaping a reward from its broad minded and liberal policy toward the territory, and is making an effort to secure a share of this patronage. Last Saturday a representative of the News visited our office and informed us he was preparing a writeup of Carrizozo and surroundings for his paper, and requested us to assist him with some cuts and such printed matter as we might have. This we gladly did, giving him several cuts and a copy of the little folder issued some months ago entitled "Carrizozo the home of the apple". In Tuesday's News the matter of the folder was used almost word for word and the cuts used, making a very good page of Carrizozo matter. The managers of the News have not yet come alive enough, however, to favor the country publisher who furnished the brains for their writeup and the cuts for its illustration free of charge a copy of their valuable(?) paper in exchange, and we would not have known the article appeared had it not have been for a stray copy which reached a news stand in this city.

Almost every town and community in the territory as well as many places out of the territory and even in the foreign lands will have exhibits of their products at the Irrigation Congress in Albuquerque this fall, and Lincoln county should be up and doing in order to make as good a showing as any county in the territory along that line. We can not afford to let this matter go to long, it takes time to get up such a thing and the opening of the congress will be at hand before we realize it. As good a way as we could adopt to accomplish the desired results would be to get up a good fair here at Carrizozo, and take the exhibits at that time and make into a monster exhibit for the congress at Albuquerque.

The good attendance and marked interest at the Commercial Club meeting Tuesday evening, was very encouraging and foretells an era of prosperity for our town which will help to place us in the lead of all towns in this region. There are several matters of great importance to this valley and to the town of Carrizozo, which must be looked after at once and have constant attention and there is no way in which they can be handled so carefully as by the Commercial Club, but it must have the support and assistance of the people in the community.

Hereford Texas has just had 660 trees planted in her city park, many of them by the school children who dug the holes and toted the water. — El Paso Herald.

That is a very good thing and the children of Hereford will some day be proud of the work they have done, but when you want to see trees set get two townsites companies to racing with each other to see which can do the most to beautify the landscape as the Carrizozo Townsite Company and W. C. McDonald have been doing in Carrizozo this spring and then there is something doing in the tree setting line. That 660 has been multiplied about ten times in Carrizozo this spring.

It pays to be the receiver of a trust company in Gotham. The three receivers of the Knickerbocker trust company, which closed its doors last October and resumed operations a few days ago, were allowed \$75,000 each by the New York court that placed them in position for their service. Seventy-five thousand dollars for four months work, no matter how important, is pretty good pay for any citizen of the United States. There are evidently many soft shaps in the Empire city of the country.

Let us not forget, it is well to mention that if this town and community are going to keep up with the live places in the Southwest, we will have to be doing things. The Fourth of July is near at hand, and a celebration is in order about that time; the Irrigation Congress and Territorial Fair will be upon us almost before we think of it and every progressive community in the territory will be represented with fine exhibits, and plenty of advertising matter. Will the Carrizozo Valley be classed as "progressive?"

NEW WOODS

The scientific study of the merits of many species of trees, one of which the pine has been a producer for a long time, is the object of the most important phase of the forest work of the government, from an economic standpoint and the same situation which have already been made have provided the lumber industry with much valuable information.

The latest discoveries of valuable qualities in a former neglected species resulted after an investigation of the tupelo gum which made its home in the Southern swamps. Experts say that the study has brought out an important data as the studies made on the loblolly pine, another species which was neglected for many years, but which is now put to valuable use for many purposes.

Tupelo, two years ago, at the time of the study was begun, was little known and seldom used even in the sections of the country where it is most plentiful. In the logging off of spruce in the Gulf States, where tupelo is found in large quantities, the trees were carelessly disregarded. It was found by a lack of knowledge of its properties and lack of care in handling the material. The investigations have been carried on by the United States Forest Service and have proved the value of wood for a number of uses. The result of these studies removed, very largely, the existing prejudices against the gum, and in a short time the demand for tupelo rapidly increased.

This wood is now widely used not only in the state where it grows but also in different sections of the country, in the manufacture of wooden pumps, sounding boards for violins and organs, mantles, and interior finishing, such as

moulding, door and window frame and door jams. It is Manufactured also into all kinds of lumber, including a good grade of edge grain flooring, Tupelo gum, in the form of flooring, was recently found competing successfully with Douglas fir in the Los Angeles market, even though bearing a freight rate of 85 cents per hundred weight from its source of production in Louisiana.

This is only one example of the studies carried on by the government for the purpose of creating markets and establishing uses for the kinds of wood whose properties are not understood. The reason for making these studies is that the scarcity in consequence of an excessive demand, the timber supply of the country is in effect increased, the most economical use of wood is promoted, and the evils of a general shortage in wood supply are to that degree lessened.
