BAND FOR CARRIZOZO

Wednesday evening a meeting was held at the Baptist church for the purpose of organizing a brass band. Several young men interested were in attendance and the prospect for a permanent musical organization in our town is very bright. Another meeting was set for tonight at the same place to complete arrangements and form a permanent organization, and any person who is interested or would be willing to assist the movement is invited to attend.

CLUB ELECTS OFFICERS

Tuesday evening of this week was the regular election of officers of the Carrizozo Commercial Club, the attendance was rather light, but much interest was exhibited by those present, and several new names were placed on the list. Taking everything into consideration, the present outlook for the Club is the brightest it has ever been, and there is certainly going to be something doing for the good of the community very soon.

The following is a list of the new officers: W. S. Perry, president; William Doering, vice president; A. H. Harvey, secretary; F. J. Sager, treasurer. Albert Ziegler and J. B. Baird were elected mem-

bers of the executive committee, of which the president of the Club is ex-officio chairman.

Among the matters discussed in an informal way were the preparing of an exhibit for the Irrigation Congress at Albuquerque, the investigation of a reservoir site situated near town, which it is said, could, with comparatively little cost for so important a matter be made to store water for irrigating a large portion of the valley, and H. W. Hall brought up the very important question of material for making Portland cement, of which there is an abundant supply in this region, which may be acted on in a more direct manner at some later date.

It was decided that certain portions of the constitution of the Club should be published, in order that people should know the objects of the organization, and that everyone is entitled to become a member. The purpose of the Club is to advance all business and financial interests of the valley, whether in or out of town, and to assist in the development of the resources of this region, and every person over 21 years old in this valley should become a member. The following is an extract from the constitution, which sets forth the objects of the organization and the requirements for membership.

Section 2.—The purpose of this organization is the advancement of the business interests of the Carri-

zozo Valley; the securing of settlers for the public lands, and inducing investment of capital for developing the resources of this region, and such other things as may from time to time seem best for the interests of the valley and Lincoln county.

Sec. 3.—The regular meetings of the Club shall be held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month, at such place as may be named by the president.

Sec. 4.—Any person over the age of 21 years shall be eligible to membership in this association.

HILL ON FARMING

It isn't often that we find a railroad man talking about farming but this is what James J. Hill, the railroad magnate, has to say in an issue of Farm and Fireside:

Agricultural, in the most intelligent meaning of the term, is almost unknown in the United States.

There are three essentials to any agriculture worthy of the name. The first is rotation of crops. The second is the more liberal use of fertilizing material. The third factor in improvement, better tillage, is most interesting of all. A population of forty-five million people in Japan is supported on nineteen thousand cultivated square miles, aided by sea food products. This is because cultivation in Japan is truly intensive—that is, it is no longer even highly developed farming, but general market gardening.

It is stated that the first year's output of the new cement plant at El Paso will be contracted for before the plant is completed. That certainly is a good showing, and should be encouraging to parties promoting other enterprises in the Southwest.

The Carrizozo Commercial Club is not an exclusive organization for merchants and bankers, but an organization of the people for the people and every person in town or valley who is interested in the advancement of our community should be a member and help the good work along.

The Freedland currency bill was too wise to admit of favorable congressional action. It merely sought to legalize and regulate the clearing house certificates, give them stability and legal standing, but enforce their immediate retirement when the emergency passed, and as such the bill had the germ of the most meritorious measure. Congress hasn't grown up to it yet. These legislators ought to take a turn over the country and how the financial flurry was met in the west and south, before they undertake to make laws. The eastern influence in financial legislation is quite dangerous.

And still they come. A new Republican newspaper has made its appearance in the town of Grady, about 30 miles northwest of Texico in Roosevelt county. This means that there are more Republicans in that county than our friends, the enemy, will like on election day next November. The following are the Republican papers now in the county: The Texico Trumpet, Portales Times, Clovis News, Melrose Enterprise and the Grady Record. Pretty good showing that for a county that up to now has been considered and declared a Democratic stronghold. New Mexican.

JUST THINK IT OVER.

Now that the selection of Delegate is so prominently before the people it is well to give the matter a little sober thought. This question is one of vital importance to the people of the territory, and this year of all years, we should take no long chances, but get right down to the root of the matter on business principles.

If a business firm is to send an agent to some distant trading center to look after some matter involving the future success of the business, which of two good men in the employ of the firm would they send, the one who had served them in the same capacity before, who had a thorough knowledge of the business in hand, and of the people he would have to deal with and who in the past had brought thousands of dollars worth of trade to the company, or the one who was faithful, honest and industrious, but had none of these requisites to his credit? If you were in this position, which would you select?

The Territory of New Mexico is in that very position now, and the people must decide which man to send to Washington to look after our interests. We have plenty of good men, able men, honest men who would exert every nerve to secure things for the territory, and would doubtless succeed to a very great extent. One man stands out in the foreground as the man who has met the conditions and come out victorious. W. H. Andrews, during the past two terms as Delegate, has brought more to the territory than any man who ever represented us in Washington. He is trained in the very line required, he has a stronger connection among the leaders in both houses of Congress than any man in New Mexico, and he has a record in the territory, both in and out of politics which should not be forgotten.

Six years ago the Great Estancia Plain was an open stock range, occupied by not to exceed 50 families or solitary ranchmen; today it is a thickly settled farming region with thousands of contented families. In that region beginning in the southern part of Santa Fe county and extending to the Lincoln county line, are no less than seven prosperous towns. This change is due to no other agency than the Santa Fe Central Railway, and the Santa Fe Central Railway would never have been built if it had not been for Hon. W. H. Andrews. The people of the Estancia Valley owe their present prosperous condition entirely to Andrews, but for his constructing the Santa Fe Central, the greater portion of them would never have known there was such a place.

As a representative in Congress his record is marked from start to finish with the passage of beneficial legislation for the territory, the appropriation of money for various public institutions that were needed, and the securing of assistance for individual citizens in the way of pensions etc. As a business proposition there should be no experiment attempted in the Republican party this fall in the nomination of a man for Delegate.

New York, April 25.—John Haye Hammond long connected with the Guggenheim interests as their chief mining expert, has taken offices at 71 Broadway on the same floor where he heretofore has been quartered, and has not removed to 151 Broadway, to which the Guggenheims and American Smelting & Refining company and affiliated concerns have removed. Wall street construes this as indicating that Hammond has terminated his connection with the Guggenheim interests.

Hammond is still in California, where he went six months ago, owing to ill health. Hammond's secretary recently contradicted a widely published report that Hammond received a salary of \$500,000 a year from the Guggenheims. The secretary said the salary was large but not even close to that sum.

In addition any soldier who has received an honorable discharge, and reenlists within three months thereafter shall receive pay for the time he was off duty before enlisting the second time.

A FAVORABLE REPORT

Washington, May 1.—Delegate W. H. Andrews has secured a favorable report from the House committee on private-land claims, on the Andrews bill amending the private land court bill which is generally known as the small holdings bill, with the following amendment:

Provided: That the extension herein granted shall not apply to lands within the limits of confirmed grants or embraced in any entry completed under the public land laws prior to filing of a claim hereunder; nor shall its provisions extend to persons holding under assignments made after March 3d, 1901.

The committee in its report says: The necessity for and advisability of legislation of this character is based upon representations by residents of New Mexico that in certain instances some of the poorer classes of people of New Mexico are residing

upon small tracts of unsurveyed land which at the time of the application of the law of 1901, were included in land grants which have since been declared invalid, and these people find their homes to be upon public domain, and they have no way by which to acquire title except by application of the homestead laws which, in most cases would involve a greater expense than would be justified by the small amount of land secured.

These people are usually hard-working and frugal citizens and their homes are humble, but they have come down to them by descent for generations, and as the law proposed to be enacted, provides that they must show continuous ownership by occupation for twenty years and as the title in the grant was not questioned at the time of the former application of this law it is believed that the extension of the provisions of this law for one year will be an act of justice to the beneficiaries.

This bill was referred to the secretary of the interior and he reported favorably on the legislation.

CEMENT PLANT FOR EL PASO

To commence work within the week, to spend at least \$800,000 and to have in operation within ten months, briefly tells the story of the meeting of the directors of the Southwestern Portland Cement company, which was held yesterday afternoon in the office of Felix Martinez.

Those present from out of the city were Carl Leonardt, who is president of the concern; Aman Moore, engineer and manager, both of Los Angeles, and Charles Boecher of Denver. All three of the above named are directors in the company the other directors being James D. Schuyler, A. Courchesne, Felix Martinez, J. F. Williams, Solomon Luna, Horace B. Stevens and Whitney Newton.

Contracts for the building will be let as soon as bids can be obtained and opened, and the work of building a spur track to the plant of the company will commence immediately.

The new plant is capitalized at \$2,000,000 of which \$1,000,000 is to be paid in at once to be used for the construction of the plant. The initial output of the plant will be 1500 barrels a day, and it will be so constructed that additional units can be added whenever the demand calls for such an addition.

Los Angeles, Denver, Belen, Albuquerque, and El Paso capitalists are interested in the movement, and the plant, when constructed, will be the largest in the Southwest.—El Paso Herald.

SERIOUS INJURY

On Monday of this week Mrs. William Reily of Capitan received an injury which it is feared will lay her up for some time. She was on the branch train coming to Carrizozo and the coach was cut off at a side track for the purpose of doing some switching when it ran back into some other cars throwing Mrs. Reily over the back of the seat with great force.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Reily here hope she will soon recover from the effects of the accident.

A big game of ball is announced for next Sunday at Capitan. The contesting teams will be Capitan and Ft. Stanton. The railroad people have promised to run an excursion train from here if 30 or more people buy tickets, and an effort is being made to secure the required number.
