Again the story, oft repeated, starts from somewhere that the division is to be moved from Carrizozo. This time it is to be moved to Three Rivers again. We have not kept count, but believe this is at least the twentieth time it has been changed to that particular point during the past year and a half, to say nothing of the hundreds of other places it has been moved.

Now as a matter of fact there is not, nor has there at any time been any foundation to these rumors, and no wise person should be affected by them in the least. To show that Carrizozo is not the only place that has had such rumors to contend with we quote the following from a recent editorial in the San Marcial Standard:

"Train loads of eastern population are finding homes in the land of 'Manana' and 'quinsabe'. Why should we not get our portion of the settler. The story that pops up about the division being moved is as old as the memories of the oldest inhabitant runs not to the contrary. But it has not been moved and in all probability never will be."

The above is given to show that the moving question is not new, nor is it peculiar to Carrizozo. The perverseness of human nature is such that such things will come up in any place, and when to that is added the interest of other places nearby, it is the most natural that the ones who cannot get the plum themselves would desire to see the one who has it loose out. The thing for the people of Carrizozo to do is to get together and work for the settlement of the valley and the beautifying of the town, so that when people come here from the east to look they will never want to leave. With the development of our mineral resources, the settlement of the valley with active progressive farmers, and the building of mills, smelters, and manufacturing establishments, we will have a city of ten thousand in five years or less, and the question of moving the division point may well be left to the railroad company.

The papers published in the Spanish language in the territory are uniting in support of Delegate W. H. Andrews for the nomination as the Republican candidate for delegate to the 61st Congress and will do yeoman work among the many thousands of Spanish speaking and reading voters. So far those papers that have come out for the delegate are: La Bandera Americana published at Albuquerque by Nestor Montoya; El Independiente Independiente published at Las Vegas, by E. H. Salazar; La Revista Taos published at Taos by Jose A. Montero; El Nuevo Estado published at Tierra Amarilla by Francisco Sosa; El Labrador published at Las Cruces by Jose Gonzalez; El Tiempo published at Las Cruces by Marcial Valdez; the Spanish American published at Roy, partly in the Spanish language, A. N. Bushkovitz and E. H. Bierbaum, editors. There are two other Spanish papers that are Republican and the editors of these have announced their intention of placing themselves in the Andrews column.—New Mexican.

Some time ago, when the industrial depression over the east was at its worst, the Pennsylvania railroad found itself without sidings or terminal tracks to take care of its thousands of unused freight cars. So it sent out the traveling cranes, lifted the cars bodily from the tracks, and swung them over on the rightofway, clear of the rails.

It was indeed a melancholy sight, appearing like the wreckage of train after train, miles long.

But the tide has turned. In the Pittsburg yards about 75 cars a day are being repaired and made ready for active service, having been swung back from the ditch onto the rails and sent to the shops to be overhauled.

Over 300 men who have been temporarily idle in the shops, have been put back to work, and everybody looks for the freight business to pick up steadily.—El Paso Herald.

Arrangements have been made whereby N. S. Rose, manager of the Carrizozo Publishing company, expects to spend the greater portion of the time for several weeks in the states of Iowa, Missouri, and Illinois, on an advertising tour for New Mexico. He goes equipped with a complete outfit for advertising this region and will make a specialty of organizing Homeowners parties for the Carrizozo and Estancia Valleys, and accompanying them on the trip out, showing them country and assisting them to locate.

Mr. E. D. Fred, who has been connected with the office for several months, will have charge of the business of the company during the absence of Manager Rose, and any courtesies extended him by our patrons will be appreciated by the directors.

Now that the matter of a celebration on the Fourth has been taken up by our people there is no reason why it should not be a rousing success. Last year with much less to work with than we have now, we made a decided hit with the people from all parts who attended our celebration, and we can set a place this year that will be a pattern for any town in the territory to go by. The committee will be around to see the business people with the subscription list this week and we look for a good report at the Commercial Club meeting next Tuesday evening, when the final arrangements are to be made and the committees on arrangement appointed. Let everybody get their shoulder to the wheel and help the matter along.

Inquiries regarding our mineral resources are coming from various parts of the country, some touching the matter of coal, some regarding the immense iron deposits and others about the other minerals are being received almost daily from various parts of the country. Why should we not make some provision for compiling this information and getting it in shape so that it can be sent out to inquirers by the Commercial Club? There is plenty of capital in the east waiting for investment in these lines and we should make an effort to bring it in touch with the resources of Lincoln county.

The following report of a long headed railroad official on his return from the west, as taken from a New York dispatch, is a very good expression of the condition in the west:
