ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF ANCHO BRICK AND TILE COMPANY

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we Grant A. Bush, of Ancho, New Mexico, Ira M. Earle, of Des Moines, Iowa, and Henry P. Scholte, of Pella, Iowa, for ourselves, our associates and successors, have associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, and to that end, we do hereby adopt and acknowledge the following Articles of Incorporation.

Article I.
The name of this corporation shall be the ANCHO BRICK AND TILE COMPANY and by that name shall have continuous existence for the term of fifty (50) years from this date, unless sooner dissolved according to law, and shall have the right by that name to sue and be sued.

Article II.
The purpose for which this Company is formed, and the general nature of the business to be transacted, is to purchase, lease, bond, locate or otherwise acquire, sell, mortgage and convey personal property, real estate, mines, mineral lands, mineral rights, mining claims, mining and water rights, in the Territory of New Mexico or elsewhere, and any interest therein, and to explore, work, exercise, develop, and turn to account the same, to quarry, mine, smelt, refine, dress, amalgamate and prepare for market, ore, metal and mineral substances of all kinds, and to sell the same, and especially to mine shale and clay and to manufacture the same into brick, tile and other clay products and to sell the same.

To produce, buy and sell building materials generally, and to that end, establish warehouses and distributing depots throughout the United States and the Republic of Mexico, to purchase, construct, own and operate mills, furnaces, manufacturing plants, crushing and reduction works, roads, ways, trams and other means of conveyance, with rolling stock therefor, and to operate the same; to purchase, construct, develop and own dams, reservoirs, wells and any other and all works and conveniences which may seem directly or indirectly conducive of any of the objects of the Company, to buy and sell general merchandise, live stock and other personal property, to own, handle and control notes, bonds and mortgages and the shares of capital stock of this or any other corporation; to borrow money and execute notes, bonds, mortgages, shares of capital stock, and other securities, and to exercise any and all rights, powers and privileges of individual owners thereof, including the right to vote any shares of stock held by it to the same extent that a natural person might or could do, and in general to do all things necessary to the proper conduct of the business of this corporation in the Territory and elsewhere, not inconsistent with the laws of the United States and the Territory of New Mexico.

Article III.
The amount of the capital stock of the Company shall be One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars, divided into One Thousand (1000) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, which shall be issued and delivered in full payment for the following described property, situated in Lincoln County, New Mexico: Sunset Placer Claim, containing 160 acres, location notice recorded in Book V, Page 116, Records of Lincoln County, New Mexico. Starlight Placer Claim, containing 160 acres, location notice recorded in Book X, Page 14, Records of Lincoln County, New Mexico.

With the approach of the possibility of New Mexico being granted statehood, the matter of the personal of our probable Senators arises. Who would be the men to have the honor of representing the new state as its first messengers to the highest law making body in the country? In speaking with one of the best informed Republicans in the county one day this week, the "Outlook" asked his opinion. For reply we got the following: "Well, New Mexico has some good material for United States Senators, and it would be hard to pick the probable winners on the Republican side. There is Gov. George Curry, who is, in my estimation, the most probable and likely successful man, Hon. H. O. Bursum is another, and is entitled to great consideration, Judge Spiess is a well-informed and altogether fitting man, and would, in all probability, be in the running. A. B. Fall, of Three Rivers, would be another man, and would doubtless develop quite a good deal of strength if he ever became an active candidate. Of the native element, who naturally would have out a man, Hon. Sol Luna looks to be the leader, and he would be a very satisfactory and worthy representative. However of the five I have just mentioned George Curry looks as good to me as any of them, and I don't say so simply because he is a Lincoln county man, or because he is a friend of mine, but because I believe he is as good a man as New Mexico can boast of, and because I believe he would be fair, honest, conscientious and preserving in all his efforts to do the right thing on all matters that came before a body of men he was a part of."

Various papers throughout the country have had much to say recently and the future make-up of the United States Senate and of the possibilities of both Roosevelt and W. J. Bryan being members of that body. If such a thing was to happen—these two fearless, staunch, capable and efficient men were to be so honored—the people of the country would soon witness a revolution in the ways of that body. Neither of these men care for political graft or political juggery, and neither would countenance or support a measure they did not believe in their own hearts to be for the best interests of the greater number of their constituents. The "Outlook" sees no better team of workers to be found, and predicts that if these gentlemen are ever seated in that assembly they will be found lived up side by side on more than one important measure. Though of different political faiths, they are both Americans, and true Americans. Political conniving and the waxy way of doing things are not their way of doing things, and they would certainly be a warm team to fight when some effort was being made to railroad some measure through senate when their approval to the said measure could not be had.

Just to prove that Taft is not like George Washington, the National Magazine credits him with the following: Justice Harlan told a story to Judge Taft of how he went out to play golf in a fog. He thought he would drive the ball, and sent it off at a "hazard." He came to the end of the hole and asked him to find it looking within a radius of 300 yards. The caddy's eyes stuck out. "I don't find that ball, Judge. It am in de hole, sure 'nough. It jest wiggled in, like." It was certainly remarkable that a drive through the fog should place a ball where the most earnest effort of two to twenty strokes may fail in broad daylight. Judge Taft responded with a fishing story, also about a fog. He went out one day in a wagon to fish and the fog came down thick. He drew up where he thought the stream ought to be, cast his line, felt a pull, and hauled in a fish trout—another bite, and another, until the wagon was filled. The fog lifted, and the was 300 yards from the river! There was a silence which might be felt when Judge Taft concluded, and Justice Harlan told no more fog stories.

After hibernating for some time Congressman Richmond Pearson Hobson bounces into the limelight again in doing his best to agitate a war between this country and Japan. He has written an open letter to the president, not merely asking, but demanding that the great battleship fleet be left in Pacific waters. The withdrawal of this fleet to home waters is likened by Mr. Hobson to a national and international calamity. The most rational and reasonable view of Hobson's infirmity is that the ordeal of promiscuous kissing to which this valiant warrior was once subjected by a battalion of hysterical old maids has left in his system the seeds of a disorder which always hurts him in bad weather like rheumatism and corns.

The following is clipped from the daily papers of early in the week and makes one feel "chesty." It looks good any way: "Senators Flint, Carter, of Montana, will lead the senators west of the Mississippi and Penrose and Knox the eastern senators in the fight for immediate statehood. Flint may introduce delegate Andrews's statehood bill in the senate. Gov. Curry today visited the white house, and the war and interior departments. He will visit Taft at Hot Springs, Va., this week. He says he is satisfied with the plans for statehood."
