Last week Carlos Padilla, a sheep herder, found the bones and dress of a little child about three miles from where the child was lost.

The familiar Indian head on the present penny piece will be used no more. In its stead will be substituted the head of Abraham Lincoln. The dies now in use will be destroyed in a few days, following out the order of the treasury department issued several days ago.

There will be a meeting in the armory next Saturday afternoon of all persons interested in the growing on a large scale of cantaloupes in the Rio Grande valley near Albuquerque. E. E. Cadwalader, field expert representing the large commission firm of Crutchfield and Woolfolk will be present at this meeting and will show the growers what can be done to make cantaloupe growing on a large scale profitable. Plans for the organization of a Growers' association will be submitted and discussed.

That the unusually heavy snows in the mountains of the Rio Grande watershed may cause an overflow in the streams in the spring is the prediction made by the section director of the weather bureau at Santa Fe. The report of the weather for January being supplemented by the report of the Colorado director, telling of an unusually stormy month and vast quantities of the beautiful packed around the Rio Grande headwaters in that state.

The dance at Wetmore's Hall on last Tuesday evening was a huge success and the young gentlemen who gave it are entitled to congratulations and praise. The crowd was a large one, the music was good and the lunch of cake and coffee, which were served in the adjoining room under the management of Mrs. W. M. Horton, was fine.

As its title implies the Booster Monthly, the clever monthly magazine published in Albuquerque by Ralph K. Noble, is boasting the territory of New Mexico and its towns. The February edition is about Belen, the largest town in Valencia county. A representative of the Booster visited Belen this month and secured considerable data about that enterprising little town, which Colonel W. M. Berger, editor of the Belen Tribune, says will be the leading city of New Mexico. Half tones of the John Becker store, Belen public school, Catholic church, and other imposing buildings add to the attractiveness of the article.

According to the present outlook Roswell will be able to put on metropolitan airs. Several additions

have already been laid out, with the names of the parties who own them and others of names representing the streets and places in which they are located. The latest addition to be laid out is the Hugh Lewis, Jr., addition. Mr. Lewis has bought ten acres of R. P. Rowe which is just west of Alameda Heights addition, and south of the Sparks addition. Mr. Lewis is going to plat this piece, which will be high and slightly put down all the sidewalks, and other improvements, before selling the lots.

Washington D. C., Feb 24 -- Will the act enabling New Mexico and Arizona to become states be strangled in committee or will it be reported to the Senate at the last minute and passed?

That is the question over which there is a division of opinion here but it must be frankly stated the chances for its passage are exceedingly small. The Senate committee considered the bill again today, and announced that it was not quite through and would have to consider it again Saturday. Some are predicting it will die a natural death while others say it will be reported and passed.

New Mexico will be well represented at the Transmissouri Dry Farming congress, to be held this week at Cheyenne, Wyo., and which will be one of the important conventions of the year in the west. Prof. J. D. Tinsley, soil expert at the New Mexico agricultural college experiment station will attend. Dry farming is a question in New Mexico second only in importance to irrigation, and it is believed that this territory in common with other districts in the west will derive great benefits from the coming meeting. Prof. Tinsley is down on the program for an address on progress of the Campbell cult in New Mexico.

### CAPTURED AT ALAMO

As given in another column of this issue an attempt was made on last Saturday night or Sunday morning to burglarize Peoples' store, and of the fact that the intruder was wounded. Sheriff Denny, of Alamogordo heard of the affair and kept his weather eye peeled for any lead-punctured individual coming his way.

On Thursday his vigilance was rewarded and he arrested a young man with a wounded arm. The officer brought his prisoner here and turned him over to Deputy Sheriff Leo Oswald. The preliminary hearing was held before Justice of the Peace Perry this morning. The accused first plead guilty but later withdrew that plea, waived examination, and was bound over to the grand jury under a \$500 bond. He was unable to give bond and will be taken to jail at Lincoln to await the action of the grand jury. The case has its pathetic side and the prisoner's maintenance gives evidence of the veracity of his statement. He gave his name as Joe Zygmunt Ostrowski, a Norwegian, and says he is 19 years old. He claims to have been in this country for seven months. He says he was breaking into the store because he was hungry and that he had no accomplice.

Know All Men By These Presents: That we, the undersigned, D. S. Bailey, of Rantoul, Illinois, S. C. Fenton, of Wheaton, Illinois, Ira R. Chase, of Chicago, Illinois, J. G. Sorenson, of Davenport, Iowa, and Leo B. Chase, of Ocuero, New Mexico, for ourselves, our executors and assigns, do hereby certify and declare as follows:

First: The name of this Corporation shall be and is "Stockholder's Mining Company".  
Second: The object for which this corporation is formed, and its purposes are as follows: viz: To purchase, lease, locate or otherwise acquire by grant, conveyance or otherwise, any and all kinds of real estate and personal property, mines, mineral lands, mining claims, rights, privileges, prospects, plants, machinery, tools, and other properties, and to work, mine, explore, operate and develop the same, and in general to do all things necessary to the proper conduct of the business of this Corporation in the Territory of New Mexico, and elsewhere in the United States, and to own, hold, mortgage, exchange, sell and convey, all such real and personal property and estate, both within and without the Territory of New Mexico, as the purposes of this Corporation shall require.

To smelt, refine, handle and deal in ores, metals and other minerals of all kinds; to buy, sell and deal in mining plants, mining machinery, tools, provisions, merchandises, and miner's supplies; and to carry on such other operations as may be for the best interests of the Corporation.

LARGER HOMESTEADS.

The bill providing that 320 acres can be taken as a homestead in certain states has passed Congress and is on its way to the President for his signature, according to a telegram received by the Citizen from Delegate Andrews. The message says: "The conference report on the enlarged homestead bill, allowing settlers to file on 320 acres in the following states and territories was passed today, (the 18th) in both houses and given to the president for his signature: Colorado, California, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington and the territories of New Mexico and Arizona." Albuquerque, Citizen.

It is quite probable that the gentlemen who comprise the congress and senate of these glorious old United States acted without a second thought last week, when then passed above. We reason this way because we feel confident that had these gentlemen have known that "we" disproved of such action the measure would have been defeated. But as they have "gone and done it," we are going to have our say anyway. Seriously we do not approve of the idea of Uncle Sam allowing one man to homestead 320 acres of land. The homestead laws were intended to benefit the poor man - the man who was unable to purchase an improved farm - they were intended to make it possible for anyone who chose to secure land enough to make a decent living on. They were intended to assist honest conscientious men and women to gain title to enough land to build respectable homes on. And if this was the intention of these laws, in our opinion, a good thing has been overdone. Our reason for believing as we do is one drawn from personal experience. If the above reasons are or were the incentive in the first place of originating such as the homestead laws it is not the man of moderate circumstances who is now really benefited.

Whenever a man files on one hundred and sixty acres of land, builds a house and the necessary out-buildings, fences it all in, digs a well, stocks the place and gets a reasonable amount of land under cultivation, he has done about all he has contracted for.

We believe it is unwise to try to have him improve more. The country will not only be benefitted with the smaller homesteads by reason of having a greater population and more compactly builded community, but the homesteader himself will be the better off. He will have more time and more money to devote to lesser acreage and will be enabled to centralize and focus his efforts.

A man who cannot make a decent living on one hundred and sixty acres of our land will starve to death on a section. Of course if the government wishes to make a stock raising country of this they are doing right, they could raise the limit to about ten sections, but if this is to be a farming community the quarter section is enough.

Naturally if one man is allowed to take a half section in another man will be, and naturally again will every man take his full allowance but even so this is no reason why we should have to suffer from a lesser population and more sparsely settled country or why only one half the people may be located that the country would support.

Of course there are thousands of acres of unsettled lands yet, but the population of this country is growing at such a pace that it will be but a few years until this will be all taken up and when this is gone we have no more to take its place. In our humble opinion it would have been far better to have let the old 160 acre law remain.

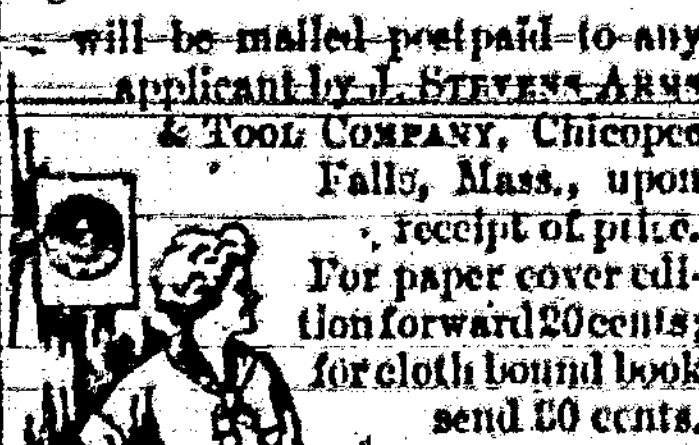

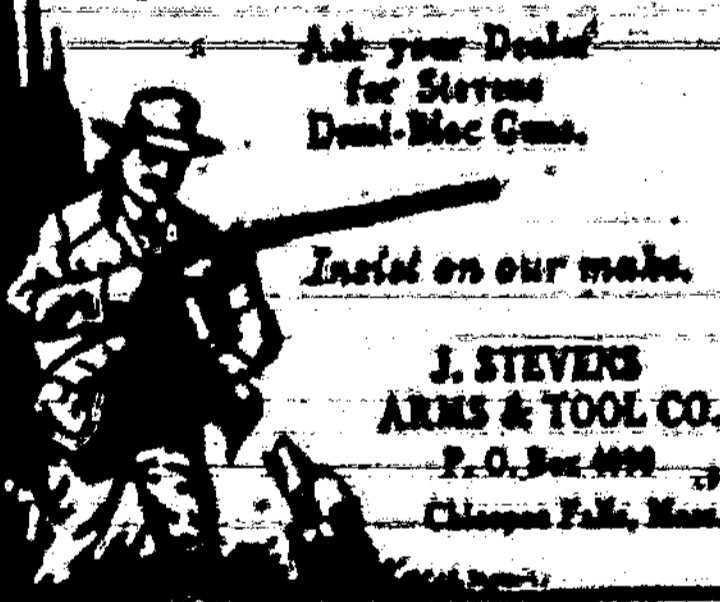
