Refreshments were served, and at a late hour the guests departed expressing their enjoyment of the evening and hoping that they might witness many more.

In some unexplainable manner the old tent building formerly occupied as a school room and for church purposes, near the home of F. E. Theurer, caught fire on Wednesday and only by prompt action was it saved from complete destruction. A volunteer fire department under Captain Doc Lacey and Lieut. Mrs. Theurer, without the assistance of a water tower or extension ladders, succeeded in stopping the fire before much damage was done.

At a meeting of the school board of Tuomeari, at which several architects were present, the plans for a new school house were adopted. The plans accepted were those submitted by Architect Rapp of Trinidad. The building is to be constructed of brown cut sand stone with all the modern and up-to-date finishings. The ventilation, light and heat are to be modern. The building will cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000.00 and as the boys say, it is simply all to the mustard.

At the second quarterly conference of the Tuomeari charge, Albuquerque district, of the Methodist Episcopal church south, last week the building of a new church in Tuomeari was thoroughly discussed. Dr. McMurry took a free part in the discussion and endorsed and encouraged the building of a \$15,000 church. He promised the assistance of the board of church extension. The building committee will proceed at once to secure plans for the church and it is hoped that within the next 60 days the building will be under way. The church is to be built out of brown cut stone and to be an up-to-date structure in every particular. It is estimated that this church when completed and furnished with a pipe organ and other furnishings will cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

Deputy Sheriff Leo Oswald was in Lincoln the latter part of last week with the man accused of having attempted to burglarize People's Bros. store.

Mrs. Harry Dawson has been in Alamogordo for the past several days with her mother, who is ill at her home in that city.

The board of commissioners of Lincoln county has granted a franchise to the Colorado Telephone company to do business in Lincoln county.

Mrs. E. R. Kelly was thrown from her buggy on Wednesday by reason of her horse becoming frightened and unmanageable. Mrs. Kelly was quite severely bruised up and possibly serious.

Mrs. A. H. Harvey returned on last Saturday night from a visit of several days to El Paso.

Ira Wetmore and William Riley have been in Santa Fe for the past week on matters of a business nature. Osuro now has a moist goods importium. Corn & Beatie are the proprietors.

The Anti-Saloon League and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union have been much in evidence, as have many other men and women of the territory fighting for prohibition. A prayer asking for statewide prohibition was yesterday read in all the churches of Albuquerque.

Hector De Chauncey Courts, but better known as the "Chicago News Kid," who is preambulating over the face of old mother earth for some cause or other or else without cause, came into Carrizozo Wednesday morning with his shining box. Hector claims to have "shined" the shoes of Pres. Roosevelt, King Edward, Pres. Faure and other notables, and added to this list while here by using the "T. M." on the underpinnings of J. H. Boyd and James Hurt. He left for the north late Wednesday.

The Denver & Rio Grande round house at Santa Fe was burned at an early hour Sunday morning. The building was entirely consumed and the locomotive which brought in the regular passenger train Saturday evening was also destroyed. The round house was a small frame building situated near the Denver & Rio Grande station. The origin of the fire is not known. The building was worth perhaps \$2,000; the locomotive, a Baldwin machine of vintage of 1881, was valued at about the same figure, and one freight car loaded with coal which was consumed will bring the total, perhaps to a loss of \$5,000.

Within the past three weeks the town of Portales has incorporated under the laws of the Territory, demanded that the saloons quit the town forever, determined to utilize the \$20,000 or more formerly spent annually for strong drink toward the erection of a Gymnasium and Recreation Resort for the young people of the town; entered into contract to erect a \$35,000 Bahist College which will open its doors September 1st 1909 begun, the erection of the Portales Sanitarium,

the only building of its kind within a radius of over a hundred miles of Portales; called an election to vote upon the question of issuing \$75,000 in bonds to cover the expense of installing a Water, Light and Sewer System. Can you beat that?

DEFIES THE OFFICERS

Tuomeari, N. M. Mar. 4.—Mayor Street, of this city, scored a hit yesterday among the towns people when he ordered A. S. Randolph, a hypnotist, who had put Miss Billings to sleep in the office window of the electric light company as an advertisement for a traveling company which is showing here this week, to wake her up.

The young man defied the officers and said he would put the women to sleep for 30 days. Thereupon he broke loose from chief of police Harry Benson and ran to the office window, passed his hand over the girl's face and declared that would hold her for a while. He was then chased through the streets, arrested and taken to the city jail.

Considerable excitement is reigning on the streets at present and threats are being made against the prisoner. The hypnotist is persistent and declares he will lie in jail before he will awaken her. The citizens of the city are up in arms and the officers fear mob violence. The girl was removed to a hotel. A guard has been placed around the jail.—El Paso Herald.

TAFT INAUGURATED

With a blinding snowstorm raging on the outside and the weather so cold that the people were almost frozen as they stood upon the streets waiting for the inaugural parade, William Howard Taft, Thursday took the oath of office as twenty-sixth president of the United States in the senate chamber in the capitol, and the waiting crowd on the outside was disappointed.

President-elect Taft insisted up to almost the last moment that his inauguration should be held in front of the capitol building as had been announced by the committee on arrangements, but the committee decided that the ceremonies should be held in the senate chamber. Mr. Taft said he did not mind the wind and snow in the least, but senator Knox, in charge of the program declared it would be unwise to subject the aged chief justice and the older members of the senate to the adverse weather conditions.

NEW POSTMASTER

What came as a complete surprise to most of our people on Saturday of last week was the news of the appointment of Mr. Wm. Reiley as postmaster at Carrizozo.

This appointment came before but very few knew of the resignation of postmaster Wetmore, which had been tendered a short time ago. Mr. Reiley will qualify and enter upon his new duties at an early date, and there is little if any doubt that he will prove to be a courteous, efficient and accomodating official. The location of the office will remain unchanged, insofar as it was but quite recently that a ten-year lease was made upon it.

GRAZING LANDS

The rich grazing land of the West are being seriously damaged by excessive and unrestrained use. A band of sheep in grazing destroys much more grass by trampling than it eats, and constant overgrazing has ruined thousands of acres of the grass lands. The effect of unrestricted or ill-directed grazing not only lessen production of forage for one or two seasons, but the carrying of the range permanently impaired. Worn-out acres quickly spring up to worthless or noxious growths which spread and supersede the natural range cover. Large areas are sometimes bared by destructive over grazing that they become practically barren wastes.

The Forest Service and the Bureau of Plant Industry, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, have cooperated in a series of experiments looking toward the artificial reseeding of portions of grazing lands with cultivated grasses, and studies are being carried on to find out how overgrazed areas can be reseeded naturally, and how the carrying capacity of the range can be increased through modifications of the present methods of handling stock. Much of the grazing land included in the National Forest was comparatively unproductive as a result of unrestricted grazing before it came under Forest Service control. Since that time it is estimated that the efficiency of these lands has been increased 30 per cent merely by the prevention of misuse. This represents but the beginning of the good which will result from the experiments and studies already started.

The Wallowa (formerly the Ingham) National Forest in eastern Oregon, was chosen for the first experiments, because it afforded the best conditions and was in need of early attention. This Forest contains about 747,000 acres of which approximately 500,000 acres, because of its irregular, hilly surface, are given over to sheep grazing. The balance is used for the grazing of cattle. Owing to the wide range of altitude and of topography, the grazing areas are naturally divided into a number of rather distinct zones of vegetation, and presents problems of its own. Because of these conditions the results of this experimental work should prove extremely valuable to stock men in many sections, practicing as they do solutions, so far as the work has progressed at this time, of many range problems.

The objects of the initial experiments has been to bring about the natural reseeding of range areas without drawing them, except temporarily, from use. This involves studies of the flowering and maturity of range plants, the germination of seeds, and the destructive effect of trampling by stock.

The results of the first of these studies, and experiments are contained in a preliminary report entitled "The Revegetation of Overgrazed Range Areas," issued by the Forest Service as Circular 158. Copies may be had by persons interested on application to the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

In addition to the above preliminary report, there has previously been issued by the Forest Service a progress report on another phase of these investigations, namely, an experiment in coyote proof pastures, published as Circular 156, which may also be obtained on application to the Forest Service.

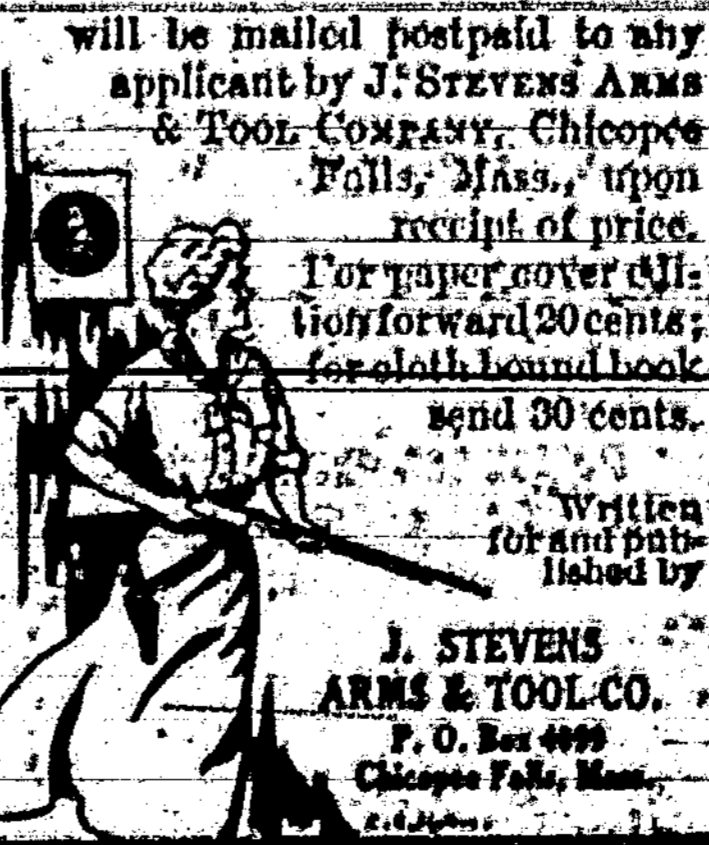
