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## THREE MEN INJURED IN SNOW-PLOW ACCIDENT

H. Chanley, a fireman; H. N. Yancy, a carpenter and G. W. Howard, a brakeman were all severely injured in jumping from an engine while driving a snow plow through a cut two miles this side of Duran.

Engines No. 176 and 66 were out with a snow plow to open the cuts on the main line between here and Tucumcari, and were entering a deep cut just this side of Duran when the men on engine 176 which carried the snow plow saw what they supposed was an engine on the main line, which was on a side track. Yancy, Howard and Chanley jumped all being injured, while those staying on the engine escaped without injury. Mr. Yancy had an arm broken in two places and fireman Chanley and brakeman Howard were unconscious when picked up. All three men were taken to the hospital at Alamogordo where they will be cared for until able to resume work.

## STORM-SWEEPS-OVER NEW MEXICO

### RAILROAD TRAFFIC HELD UP

A severe snow storm swept over New Mexico and western Texas Wednesday night and Thursday causing a hold up of several hours in railroad traffic. Trains were held up along the line between Carrizozo and Tucumcari. No. 3, due here at 12:45 p. m. on Wednesday did not arrive until about 4 p. m. Thursday. No. 4 and 2 were held here for several hours waiting for the snow plows to clear the cuts near Duran and Corona where the snow was the heaviest. The line was cleared about 4 p. m. Thursday but it is feared that it will be tied up again by to-night on account of the high wind near Corona drifting the snow in the cuts.

Traffic in western Texas is also held up, there being one foot of snow on the level and still falling.

There is no question but what we can meet the qualifications of statehood, but it is a question whether we can satisfy the whims of some of the dominating powers at Washington or not. What ever their reasons were, if they had any, for not granting New Mexico statehood is more than we are able to say, but we do know that it is not our fault that we did not get it. Let us all boost for our community and our territory so that we may make a better showing at our next attempt, and we shall secure our wants and needs much sooner and easier.

**MESCALERO INDIAN RESERVATION OPENED**  
(Tularosa Valley Tribune)

Among the last of President Roosevelt's acts, as the executive was the creation of a national park out of the Mescalero reservation throwing open the land to mineral location. A strip on the north and some near the agency has been reserved.

Word reached Tularosa Thursday noon and the usually stirring place became as deserted as some of our neighbors. Every horse in town available has had a chance to learn the Mescalero road which, because of the immense amount of travel that will be done on it, should receive the attention of our county road supervisor at once. Even the fruit trees the pride of Tularosa were forgotten in the race across the miles to the new gold fields.

The Tribune office has worked steadily to supply the demand for location notices. A number of those who were sharp enough to get in on the ground floor are again in town after making their locations, and all tell seemingly stories of the treasure just opened for the public. Were it not that men of mining experience far above the ordinary are not only getting choice claims for themselves, but also bringing in their friends from the states, we would hesitate to talk mining to those who "know there's nuthin' thar."

A number of Tularosa citizens have obtained more than a modest fortune as a result of prompt action following the opening. Receiving private messages from Washington as soon as the proclamation was issued these men drifted out of Tularosa and the run to the reservation was begun. A large amount of the famous sand stone deposit, a remarkably rich gold and some promising copper claims were secured.

We deem it hardly necessary to point out to our citizens the possibilities in store for Tularosa as a result of this action by our former President.

**ALAMOGORDO IS TO HAVE A MILITIA COMPANY**

If the territory adds any companies to the militia in New Mexico at the present session of congress it is almost an assured fact that Alamogordo will be given the additional company. Prof. Schiferl is in receipt of a letter from Governor Ford and letters from several members of the legislature and they all favor the new company and the location at Alamogordo.

St. Louis, Mo., March 9--A special to the Post-Dispatch from Brinkley, Ark, says 30 persons were killed and 15 to 20 injured and more than \$1,000,000 in property damage caused by the tornado which swept this city of 3900 population last night. The city is a total loss. The tornado passed over the city last night at 7 o'clock, and when daylight revealed its work this morning it was found that the business section was in ruins and nine out of ten of the residences had been destroyed.
