### WHAT TELEPHONE USERS

#### CAN DO TO HELP ALONG THE SERVICE.

There are three parties to a telephone call—the person making the call, the telephone company and the person called. It is not sufficient that one or two of the parties do their work properly. The co-operation of all three is necessary.

Telephone users may help the service—By consulting the telephone directory before making calls, thus obviating the many errors due to calling numbers from memory.

By speaking directly into the transmitter in a clear, distinct voice.

By separating the figures of a telephone number when making a call; for example, 234, two-three-four.

By correcting the operator if she repeats the number incorrectly.

By holding the telephone receiver to the ear until the called party answers or some report is given from the central office.

By being ready to talk when the called party answers. As a matter of courtesy, the person making the telephone call should not oblige the called party to wait his convenience.

By answering the telephone calls promptly. If there is unusual delay in answering the telephone the operator may report "dont answer" to the party calling.

In telephone operating the human element must be considered. The public is human. Telephone operators are human. The hastily spoken word and its inflection conveys what ever impression each gets of the other. Under such conditions courtesy both on the part of the operating force and the public is like oil to machinery—necessary to prevent friction.

The people in the Pecos valley seem rather discouraged about the prospects for the future of New Mexico, and they would like to be annexed to Texas. They think they could obtain more and better laws by being a part of Texas than they can from New Mexico. In Artesia they have even gone so far as to suggest circulating a petition to that effect. Well Texas is a good state but it is not what New Mexico will be. Texas is large enough now, but even if it was the smallest state in the Union instead of the largest, it is not New Mexico's place to annex a portion along its eastern border and enlarge and thus aid in the development of the adjoining state. If the people of our territory will stay together and to their part we will soon see our star planted on the flag of our nation and share with the others the honor of being a state in the greatest nation in the world's history.

**FULL TEXT OF THE NEW 320 ACRE HOMESTEAD LAW**

Owing to the numerous inquiries and requests, we will print the full text of the 320 acre homestead law:

The following is the 320-acre homestead law as it was passed by the house and senate at the last session of congress. The land offices have not yet received any official notice of the law and will not allow persons to file under it until it is acted on by the secretary of the interior:

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled: That any person who is a qualified entryman under the homestead laws of the United States may enter, by legal subdivisions, under the provisions of this act, in the states of Colorado, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming, and the territories of Arizona and New Mexico, 320 acres, or less, of non-mineral, non-irrigable, unreserved and unappropriated surveyed public lands which do not contain merchantable timber, located in a reasonably compact body, and not over one and one-half miles in extreme length: provided, that shall subject entry under the provisions of this act until such lands have been designated by the secretary of the interior as not being, in his opinion, susceptible of irrigation at a reasonable source of water supply

Sec. 2. That any person applying to enter land under the provisions of this act shall make and subscribe before the proper office an affidavit, as required by section 2200 of the revised statutes and in addition thereto shall make affidavit that the land sought to be entered is of the character described in section 1 of this act, and shall pay the fees now required to be paid under the homestead laws.

Sec. 3. That any homestead entryman of lands of the character herein described, upon which final proof has not been made, shall have the right to enter public lands subject to the provisions of this act, contiguous to his former entry which shall not, together with the original entry, exceed 320 acres, and residence upon and cultivation of the original entry shall be deemed as residence upon and cultivation of the additional entry.

Sec. 4. That at the time of making final proofs, as provided in section 2201 of the revised statutes, the entryman under this act shall, in addition to the proofs affidavits required under the said section, prove by two credible witnesses that at least one-eighth of the area embraced in his entry, was continuously cultivated to agricultural crops other than native grasses, beginning with the second year of the entry, and that at least one-fourth of the area embraced in the entry was so continuously cultivated, beginning with the third year of the entry.

Sec. 5. That nothing herein contained shall be held to affect the right of a qualified entryman to make homestead entry in the states named in section 1 of this act, under the provisions of section 2280 of the revised statutes, but no person who has made entry under this act shall be entitled to make homestead entry under the provisions of said section and no entry under this act shall be committed.

Sec. 6. That whenever the secretary of the interior shall find that any tracts of land, in the state of Utah, subject to entry under this act, do not have upon them such a sufficient supply of water suitable for domestic purposes as would make continuous residence upon the
