### DESTROYED BY FIRE

THE RESIDENCE OF I. I. CAVENDER TOTALLY BURNED

The home of I. I. Cavender was totally destroyed by fire last Tuesday forenoon. The fire originated from some unknown source in the kitchen and although Mrs. Cavender and her mother were in the house, the fire was not noticed until the blaze was well under way. A sewing machine, cot, chair and some bedding was all that was saved. There was \$600.00 insurance on the house. About \$50.00 in silver belonging to Mrs. Cavender's mother was lost in the destruction.

### RAPID CONSTRUCTION ON NEW TUCUMCARI ROAD

Tucumcari N. M. March 23, The construction work on the grade of the Tucumcari and Memphis railroad is now in progress all along the line. The entire line has been sub-let by the Ware Construction company.

Contractors King and Pittman were the first to begin shoveling dirt and a large portion of their contract has been filled. They in turn sub-let a great deal of the work and many men are now employed by them. Their section of the grade begins at this city and extends for nine miles east.

Contractor O'Connor took the field last week with three carloads of equipment. He has the next five miles east and his portion, together with that of King and Pittman, is contracted to be completed in the near future. The rails will be laid out the 14 miles of the grade in the course of a few weeks, so that bridge timbers and other heavy material can be transported to where it is needed.

Contractor Vaughn, who has a strip of 26 miles east of O'Connor's began work to day. Vaughn's equipment is composed of 14 carloads of scrapers and other grading material. He has already employed several hundred men. The entire grade is to be completed by the first of November.

Contractor Dennison is still to come. His section of the grade lies in the Cap Rock district and the most of his work will have to be done through stone beds. It has been estimated that 25 carloads of dynamite and gaint powder will be used by him in the proposed cuts.

### IRRIGATION CONGRESS

(Compliments of August Wolf, 214 Hutton Building, Spokane Wash.)

Spokane, Wash., March 23, W. L. Hopewell of Albuquerque, N. M., second vice president and general manager of the Albuquerque Eastern Railway company, writes to C. Insinger, chairman of the local board of control of the National Irrigation Congress, that he expects to be present at the seventeenth sessions in Spokane the second week in August, adding:

"I want to congratulate you on the position you are holding and I have no doubt but what you will make a great success. I believe that the people from New Mexico going to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle will go on to attend the irrigation congress.

"Conditions there are so different from conditions here that it is difficult to offer even a suggestion, and the only thing I can say is to keep on working and boosting and boosting and working, and by all means make the congress as international in character as possible. You ought to have delegates from all the South American republics, as well as from Europe.

L. Bradford Prince of Santa Fe, N. M., a member of the executive committee, writes that the questions to be discussed now relate more to methods of administration and the best way to take advantage of what has been achieved. He advocates simplicity with the view to keeping the congress confined to its proper business, rather than have it made a center around which a lot of exhibitions and entertainments revolve.

The sort of education which bullfighting confers on children is illustrated by a frightful story which appears in a Mexico City paper. Refugio Fuentes, a 10 year-old child, and Luis Buendia, a boy of 11 years, were playing bullfight, and all stages of the fight had been passed up to the killing of the bull. This Luis, who was playing matador, set about to do with the aid of a knife that the realistic effect of the spectacle might be enhanced. After dodging the charges of the younger boy, as is customary, he executed the death thrust by driving the carving knife into the smaller boy's side. Frightened at the blood he called some adults, and the little fellow was removed to the hospital, where he died. Luis is in the hands of the authorities. But what about the brutes who taught him the game and whose bloody example was always before him with the sanction of the government and of "society"?

The New Mexico School of Mines at Socorro, and the New Mexico Military School at Roswell occupy rather unique and enviable positions among the territorial institutions. Not only have they run along without creating deficits, but they have made many permanent improvements without special appropriations. The Military Institute has just finished a fine, modern barracks costing \$60,000 out of an appropriation of only \$45,000, earning and saving the balance of the needed sum by good management. Other buildings have been erected on the campus without special aid from the territory. The School of Mines has built a splendid new dormitory staying within its appropriation of \$5,000 and within late years has paid a deficit out of its current income that had been incurred by an earlier management. The example is one recommended for emulation to other institutions.

The city of Tucumcari feels as proud as a young lady with a new Easter hat and gown, over the fact that it is to have another railroad in the near future. Still we can not blame them for that is enough to make any town feel proud. People are always ready to condemn a railroad company by cutting rates, accusing it of graft and robbery but they always feel very much elated when there is any talk of a road in their community and especially when they are sure of getting one. A railroad is one of the most important things needed in the development of a country and any town which it has a road is not always ready to welcome one and still after they get it there is a constant complaint about the road and its operation.

Hon. Theodore Roosevelt sailed on March 23, on the steamer Hamburg for Africa where he expects to remain for several months in search of big game. Mr. Roosevelt's departure was witnessed by large throngs who bid farewell to the Ex President and wished him safely through his expedition. It is feared by some of the American scientists that Mr. Roosevelt will never return as he is going to hunt in some parts of the black continent where few have withstood the hardships and counteracted the horrible diseases of those regions. They think he is not of a temperament to withstand such difficulties. At his departure he was asked if he would be the next president. His reply was only to raise his hands and say good-bye.

The Texas Legislature is still killing time quite frequently on account of hard feeling between some of its members which has been showing its self for some time. Yet all the members are willing to put aside all narrow mindedness and attend the big reception to be given by the Governor and his wife. We wonder how those people who wanted to be annexed to Texas feel toward the legislature of that state.

Gov. Curry showed his make-up when he tendered his resignation as Governor of the Territory of New Mexico. He was not long in convincing the administrators in Washington that he was just the man who people need and he was asked by them to withdraw his resignation and assured that he possessed the full confidence of the administration.

**THE IMPORTANCE OF PLANTING GOOD SEED**

PRESS BULLETIN NO. 150

New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts and Agricultural Experiment Station, Mesilla Park.

Success in gardening depends upon many factors; one of the most important being the planting of good seed. By the term good seed we mean seed that when planted in good soil and given the proper care and attention will germinate well and produce strong and hardy plants. Very often a whole season's labor, as well as a crop, is lost by planting poor seed. It is hardly necessary to define poor seed, but it will suffice to say that seeds are poor when they fail to germinate under conditions.

This failure to germinate may be due to the seed being too old or not fully matured. Old seed may be detected by their musty appearance and lack of bright color that usually characterize good seed. Seeds that are not fully matured have more or less a dull color and are not plump.

As most of the seed that is planted by gardeners is purchased from dealers it is well to know something of the reliability of the firm and where the seed was put up and grown. A reliable seed house soon establishes a reputation for putting out good seed, consequently it is always better to purchase from such houses.

After the gardener has purchased his seeds he can be doubly sure of their quality by testing the different kinds. This testing can be done as follows: Take an ordinary china plate with a flat bottom, cut out from soft cloth two circular pieces the size of the plate. Thoroughly wet both, spread one over the bottom of the plate, and place on this one hundred seed of the kind that is desired to test and then put the other cloth over the seed. Cover the plate with a pane of glass and set where the temperature will be from 60 to 70 degrees. In a few days the seed in the tester will sprout and can be counted. By counting those that fail to sprout and subtracting from the whole number put in, the per cent of good seed can be determined.

If the results from any of the lots tested show a low per cent of germination it will be to the interest of the gardener not to plant that lot, but purchase new seed from a reliable source for his garden. In case it is inconvenient to buy new seed the old may be planted; but in doing this the seed should be sowed thickly so as to insure a good stand and allow for the number that will not germinate.

In connection with the above it is very important that the gardener plant his seed right. Before planting, the seed bed should be put into good condition and properly prepared. After doing this the seed may be planted, but do not plant them too deep. Many failures to secure a good stand can be attributed to this cause.

Small delicate seeds as the lettuce and celery, should be only slightly covered, while the stronger seed, as peas and beans, can be planted deeper, say from one to three inches. After planting the seed if it is necessary to apply water to the soil, be sure to put on enough, and often enough to insure good germination.

A little forethought along these lines mentioned will greatly enhance the gardener's chances to secure a good stand of plants and reap a good crop.
