Seattle, Washington—If it were not for the warm waters that flow this way with the Japan current, Seattle would grow as cold in the winter as Minnesota, and if it were not so far north it would be as warm in summer as a whole lot of other places. As it is if the thermometer so far forgets itself as to hit twenty above zero in winter, the local newspapers print a column about it and the Associated Press sends a story on a cold day, or a hot day in the northwest, which ever the season way be.

Climate, as a matter of fact, is to be one of the greatest attractions that will attach to the Alaska-Yucon Pacific Exposition which opens on June 1st. Seattle's summers are like the "Indian summers" of the east: brilliantly clear, and always comfortable and with days that run well into nights for the city is so far north that it comes strongly under the Arctic influence and at nine o'clock in midsummer, there is still the banner of the sun in the sky.

With the climatic advantages of Puget Sound during the summer months, it posses in addition, more attractive features for side trips and outings, than is offered by any other country in the world. The waters of Puget Sound, the Straits of Juan de Fuca, Hoods Canal and the thousand and one delightful bays and inlets comprise the finest yachting opportunities in existence. Steamer service is adequate and every point may be easily reached and, this with small expense.

The entire mountain country is rich in lakes and streams, and there is none of these in which trout and salmon are not plentiful and easily taken. The fishing season is open during the exposition season, and at this time of the year, offers the finest sport to be had. Within the city confines of Seattle there are two large fresh water lakes, and excellent sport with rod and fly is to be had in the waters surrounding the Exposition grounds.

Mountain climbing is at every hand, and the peaks of the rugged Olympics and Cascades offer facilities for this venturesome sport not excelled by the Swiss Alps, or ranges of Asia. Summer resorts are to be found at every point of vantage, and all of these are noted for some special feature or desirable advantage.

The voyage through the San Juan Islands surpasses for grandure and scenic effect the far famed inland sea of Japan; the foreign trip to the city of Victoria can be made in one day and is not to be overlooked. The far north is at the very doors of the "midnight sun" may be seen under its very best conditions, one week is required to make the return voyage by way of the inside passage and the voyager is carried through narrow passages and intricate windings, under the very shadows of towering snow capped peaks, and close by the faces of mammoth glaciers whose disintegrating ice supplies the northern seas with floating icebergs.

There are no sun strokes in Puget Sound during the summer months. White clothing of thin material can be worn, but it is neither required, or even comfortable, except in the middle of the day. For a mid-summer outing where pleasure, comfort, scenery, sport and in fact everything necessary are sought, Seattle has more to offer that can be found in any other place.
