The party of county seat boosters left last Monday afternoon for Lincoln in two autos, the first arriving the same day, the second arriving the day following. Carrizozo's petition for the removal of the county seat was presented by the Hon. John Y. Hewitt of White Oaks, who also argued our case in a creditable manner. The other side was represented by B. Barner, who presented a protest on behalf of the Lincoln citizens for various reasons too numerous to mention. After several hours of deliberation as to whether or not Carrizozo had complied with all the provisions of the law passed by the last legislature the result was announced Tuesday morning. Commissioners Taylor & Winfield voting Aye and Commissioner Duran voting nay. The election will be called within sixty days from the day it was ordered and the judges of election appointed at once. Ira O. Wetmore presented a deed to block 5 of Carrizozo, the ground agreed upon for a court house site at the Harmony meeting last spring and same was accepted by board. The party consisted of Ira O. Wetmore, Wm. O. McDonald, Geo. L. Hirsch, Wm. F. A. Clerks, Hon. John Y. Hewitt, David W. Glass, John A. Haley and John H. Caniney.  
A great many typographical errors occur and words are often misspelled in the Outlook and there is no one to blame but the editor-masters the type. But there is a great deal to do and proof reading is often neglected and—wont you, at least, give us credit for having common sense.

### The County Seat Question

In considering the removal of the county seat to Carrizozo we are confronted with several questions. The most weighty of these are:  
First the convenience of the people and second, the financial interests of the tax payers of the county.  
The old saying, "Touch a man's pocket-book and you touch his heart," is very true in a public as well as a private sense. The enormous sum paid for the unsightly pile of adobe and mud, called the Lincoln County Court House, has always been an eyesore to our people. I think that \$27,000-00 was the sum, and a tax of one thousand dollars per year for repairs for twenty years makes the cost to date \$47,000.00 for a house that never was worth more than \$1,500.  
I am not prepared to say how much the jail cost the county, notwithstanding I was a member of the Board of County Commissioners when the Parley Jail Company of St. Louis, Mo., was paid for the steel cells or cage which has been saved in so many places as to be unsafe for dangerous criminals.  
The cattle lands of the county will soon be a thing of the past and our next source for a revenue, is the railroad of the county. At the present valuation of \$7,500 per mile (every mile of which is in the middle west of the county) we will derive half of our taxes from this source alone. If New Mexico taxed the railroad as high as Texas they would pay two thirds of all the county tax.  
In a free country like ours every man has the right to vote as his judgment dictates. If he is wrong show him his error in a mild and enlightened manner. Bickerings or grousches dont accomplish any good, but works always to our disadvantage. In conclusion I must say that we want the County Seat to be at Carrizozo, first, because it is on the railroad; and, secondly, because it suits the largest amount of taxable property, and third because we are tired of paying out so much money every year to repair a building that is now a toing of the past, and a shame and disgrace to the people of Lincoln County.  
Why not all pull together and build a court house and jail in Carrizozo, on the railroad where people can get to or from court in a decent manner. The old ox-cart is out of fashion.

**BEAUTIES OF DESERTS.**  
Our deserts are to give us some of the surprises of the near future, as Dr. C. H. Keys points out. The arid regions, with an inch to a foot of rain a year, are by no means repulsive, but even scientific men are only just becoming acquainted with their beauties and possibilities. The landscape is striking. The deserts are mountainous, yet the broad plains are the dominant feature, and the mountains though bold and lofty rise sharply from the level expanse. The earth as we see it has been scathed by water. The deserts, as has been lately been discerned, have been sculptured and leveled by the wind, and the rocks, free from chemical action, are unweathered, bright and fresh.  
**NEW ZEALAND VOLCANO.**  
The volcano Ngaruaho is in active eruption. Loud reports began at two o'clock on the morning of March 9, and the mountain burst out at eight o'clock, throwing out thick volumes of smoke, and it has been continually in eruption since. Lava is running down the mountain and smoke and steam are rising to a height of between 200 and 300 feet, obscuring Ruapehu. Now geysers appear to have broken out at the foot of Ruapehu. All the country round for many miles is covered with a thin layer of dust, and in some places the people cannot see for smoke and ash.—British Ass. tradesman.

He endured all the hardships of pioneer days, when, as he says it was necessary to go 40 or 60 miles through a hostile desert country to procure provisions for his family. Now we have prosperous towns and miles of railroad, and the country is being settled. Development in the past 35 years has been all that could be expected and owing to changing conditions and the facilities with which modern industrial problems are met, development in the next five years will meet our fondest expectations.  
**Cacti as Stock Food**  
This short article is written to call the attention of those stockmen who have already availed themselves of the supply, and more especially men who are losing stock, to the fact that they probably have upon their ranges a forage which may be available to their stock by a little work. Spineless cacti will not grow in the open range of New Mexico. In fact their thorns and spines together are one of the characters that make it possible for any kind to live on the open ranges. And even this defensive armor is insufficient to protect them from a number of enemies. But the spines do protect them from stock, and before they can be made into stock feed the spines must be destroyed.  
Fortunately the spines burn readily, hence it is possible to singe them off without affecting the stems and so come to the forage. Two ways of burning the spines have been shown to be practicable. One is to cut the stalks with a hatchet or a sharp spade and hold them in the blaze of a brush fire with a pitchfork. The other is to singe them on the plants as they stand with a gasoline torch specially made for that work. This torch is made on the principle of an ordinary plumbers torch with a rather long pipe for the reservoir, and one that may be turned in different directions. Gasoline is a fuel and is mixed with air and used under pressure, so it is essential that all joints be gas tight and be kept free of gasoline otherwise serious explosions may occur. The torch method is much more rapid and less laborious.  
The easy way of planting cacti is to scatter the separate joints over the ground. They will take root without covering. The work may be done at any season of the year, though the best time is during the rainy season.
