## COUNTY ROAD BOARD MET MONDAY

J. B. French, New Member, is Sworn in. Many Bills Paid. H. B. Dawson Selected as Clerk of Board

## NEW BRIDGE NORTH OF TOWN ASSURED

The Road Board met Monday at Clerk's office. J. B. French the newly appointed member to succeed Jose Vega, resigned, was sworn in. Harry B. Dawson was appointed Clerk.

Many bills were paid for labor and material for the roads. Payments reached the sum of \$3724.22 Besides an appropriation of \$1300 was made to the State Highway Commission to be used in the construction of Road No. 17, the Otero Lincoln county road. Said warrant to be used jointly with an equal amount from the state Highway Commission. The warrant is to be delivered by the Clerk of the Board to the proper party when actual work on this road is commenced.

The Board also authorizes the expenditure of \$600.00 for a bridge across Carrizozo canon north of Carrizozo with the understanding that the Highway Commission expend an equal amount for the purpose of constructing the said bridge.

Each member of the Board has been requested to make a list of places where road signs are necessary and report same to Board, and Clerk is authorized to ascertain cost of various kinds of signs. Board adjourns subject to call of the Chairman.

The work at the Experimental Farm is progressing nicely and one has only to look at the fine crops of vegetables of all kinds and the various grains that are now growing there to be convinced that the lands around Carrizozo will raise anything adapted to our climate, given the proper attention.

The supply of water in the well seems inexhaustible and the large tank is kept full at all times.

The Commercial Club and the citizens of Carrizozo can feel that the money invested in this farm has done much toward encouraging the land owners to invest in irrigation plants of sufficient size to irrigate 5 and 10 acre tracts, and several new plants are being constructed at present on the showing made at the experimental farm last year.

We have the land and the water and all that is needed to make this one of the most productive valleys in New Mexico is simply to convince the people that we can raise the crops, and the experimental farm will do it if we give it the financial support that is needed.

**OF INTEREST TO READERS**

The Federal laws regarding newspaper subscriptions have recently been quoted to us by the Postoffice authorities, and it becomes necessary for us to immediately comply with their requirements in each case. Following are quotations from some of the decisions and statutes.

"Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to renew their subscriptions."

"If the subscribers order a discontinuance of their publication the publisher may continue to send them until all dues are paid."

"If the subscriber refuses to take periodicals from the postoffice to which they are directed, he is responsible until he has settled his bill and ordered the paper discontinued."

"If subscribers move to other places without informing the publisher and the papers are sent to the former address, the subscriber is held responsible."

"The courts have held that refusing to take periodicals from the postoffice, or removing and leaving them unclaimed for is prima facie evidence of intent to defraud."

"If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice at the end of the time if they do not wish to continue taking it, otherwise the subscriber is responsible until express notice with payment of all arrears is sent to the publisher."

"Subscriptions are regarded as expiring with the period for which they are obtained--publications will be accepted for mailing for a period of one year after expiration, but if continued after that time publisher subject to penalty."

**TIME TO GET BUSY—NOW**

As outlined in a recent edition of the Outlook, the Eagle Mining Company is beginning extensive operations in the Negal and Parsons field.

The American Mining Co. property south of Negal, is the scene of considerable activity in the way of preparations of all kinds. Lumber is being hauled for the rebuilding of the shaft house, and the boilers, engines and other machinery is all being overhauled and put in first

class condition. The shaft will be pumped out and retimbered, the road to the mine rebuilt, and the twenty stamp mill put in shape to handle the ore.

A number of men are now at work, and more will be put to work as the work progresses, it being the intention to put the property on a twenty-four hour operation as soon as possible.

The Parsons Mine is also undergoing similar repairs and preparations, and will soon be in operation after having been idle for a long time.

The Eagle Company is figuring strongly on the power plant proposition, and there is every reason to believe that it will be built, as their proposition has been completely financed, and the power plant will be necessary to the successful operation of their properties.

As stated in a recent issue it is up to the citizens of Carrizozo to get busy and convince this company that Carrizozo is the place to locate their power plant, which can no doubt be done if the matter is placed before them in the proper light and at an early enough date.

The Outlook outlined some arguments which might have weight in securing this plant for Carrizozo, and there are no doubt, many others of equal or greater weight that can be put forth.

Do we want this plant for Carrizozo, with its resultant improvements in our power and lighting system, and its other possibilities or shall we let it be placed elsewhere without even an intimation that we want it? **ITS UP TO YOU.**

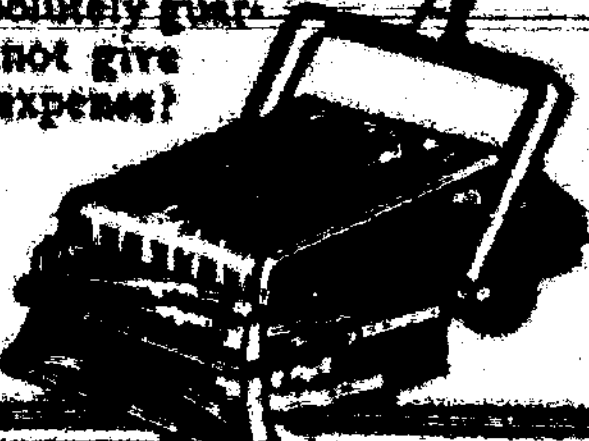

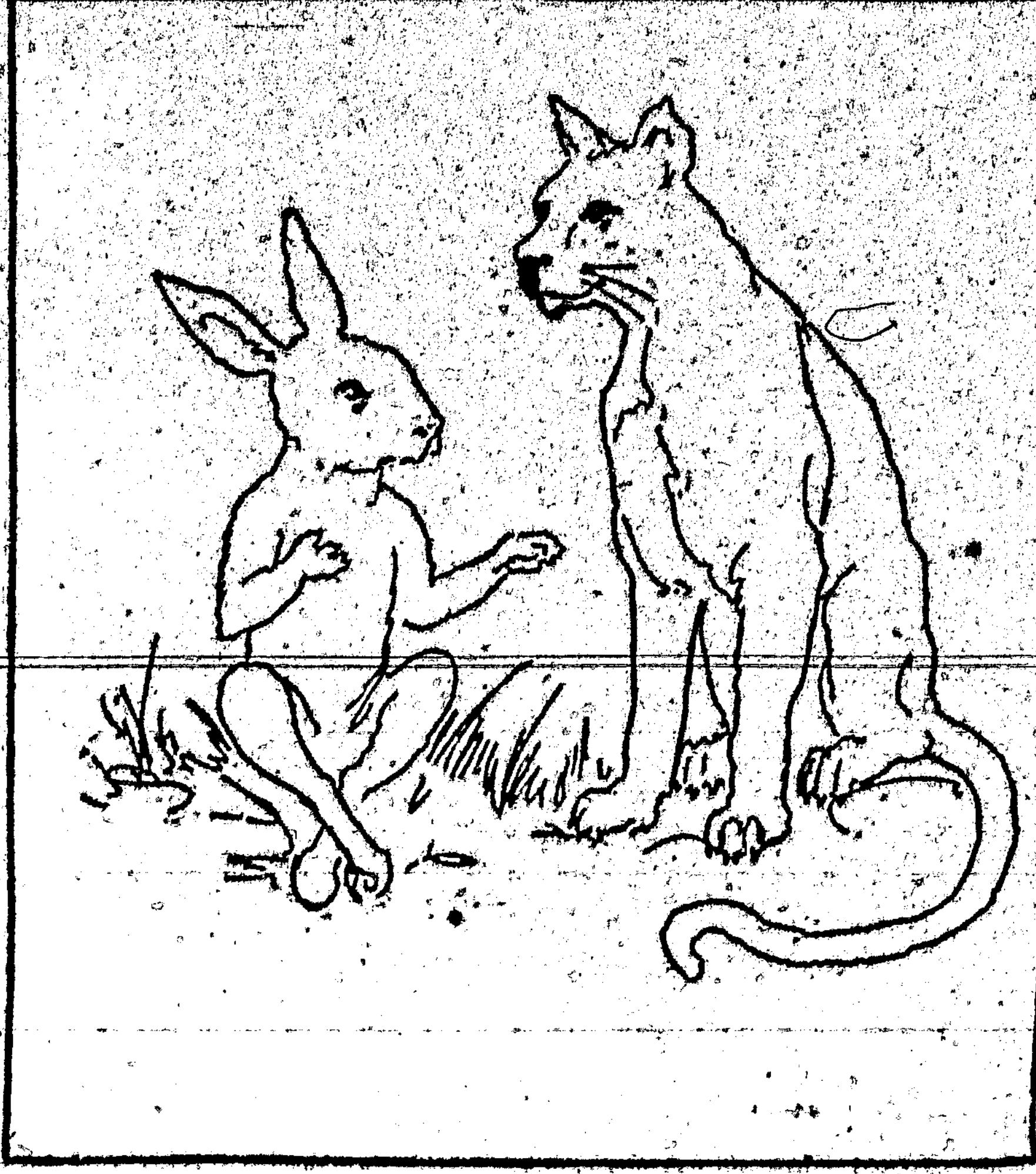

This collar is very smart, and is becoming to the majority of women. It is high at the back, but comes only just past the shoulders at the sides, leaving a wide opening at the front. A peculiar curve fits it to the neck in a way that is most pleasing.

An attractive costume fashioned from brown broadcloth and fine woolen material had an interesting neck finish of fur-lined shantung. The collar was fashioned on the lines of a shawl, but had a deep curve at the back. The vest and undergarments were also of the fur-lined shantung. The balance at the back was full, and started on to a cord which extended to the sides and finished with a round cord ornament. The jacket was draped in deep points at the bottom.

The skirt was a simple model, fashioned of striped and woolen material.

## ADMIRER AT MONTE CARLO

### Effective Combination in a Costume of Taffeta and Broderie Anglaise.

Taffets and broderie Anglaise are featured in the dresses seen at the smart restaurants at Monte Carlo, writes a Paris correspondent. A dress that made a sensation at a recent supper party was in straw-colored taffeta with a short double skirt, and above it a width of broderie Anglaise arranged as a tunic. The bodice was in cream mousseline de soie with the shoulder pieces in the same Madeira work as on the skirt.

Around the bust, as a lining, was a broad ribbon of ruby satin, and a dark ruby velvet girde gave a striking contrast to the two pale pink silk roses that rest upon the transparent muslin. A full band of ruby velvet at the wrists drew the transparent sleeves into a small compass. The fall of muslin upon the hand is one of the characteristics of the present season.

All the bodices are transparent, but it is essential to cover the low corset with ribbon that, as a rule, is independent of the bodice, and is pinned upon the figure, in order to make the transparency appear lighter than it would were the lining sewn to the mousseline de soie or tulle. A roll of taffeta finishes the bottom of the skirt in the approved fashion.

### SLEEVES AS YOU LIKE THEM

Dame Fashion Has Decried No Hard and Fast Effects for This Part of Costume.

In most features of the modern dress there is variety from which to choose. Some of the newest sleeves reach to the finger tips and are loose and baggy; others are nothing but little chiffon puffs banded around the arm just below the shoulder and are supposed to be worn with long wrinkled gloves or with under sleeves. Then there is still a third style which is between the two extremes, an elbow sleeve, loose and falling away from the arm to show a trimming of founces and quaint puffed edged bands. Verily, the modistes have given us much to choose from here.

Organdies and embroidered mulls are going to have first place among the summery dresses, and these dainty materials will be made up with taffetas and soft silks. And there will be no lack of the old-time style, trimming the overskirt effects of flowered dresses just as they appeared in the wardrobe of the young society girls of olden times.

### Serie and Conditions of Straw.

The glazed straw known as Meere is very much like the glazed straw of last year. Although it comes in many colors, black and dark blue are best liked. Belgian split straw is very popular, and there is the plect and the tagal plect. Also, there is a cria that is as fine as tulle; indeed, the plain weave might easily be mistaken for tulle. The lace weave straw is very attractive and is worn to imitate both Chantilly and Bohemian lace. Finer than either of these is the shadow lace straw with a large, loose mesh which, when used for the crown of a hat, is almost as inconspicuous as a hair net, and when used for the brim looks like a thin lace about the face. It has a distinct advantage over the lace and tulle in that it needs no wiring.—Vogue.

### In Pink and White.

A dainty dress is made of pale pink and white striped gauze, plaited so that only the white shows, with a band at the hem of pink and silver embroidery. When the wearer moves or sits down the plait part or droop over the containing band and the pink becomes visible. The bodice is made with two boxes, the inner, of white, creating the center, which embraces the shoulders, narrowing into a pink mesh fastening at the back with long ends fringed with silver.

### New Vejeur Designs.

A multitude of new designs are shown in vejeurs, among the more novel being field flowers such as cornflowers and meadow daisies. By way of contrast there are some very handsome Chinese designs in Chinese colors. Bird designs are also in evidence, the bird of paradise and parrot being conspicuous.

SEED-EATING RODENTS

IMPORTANCE OF REFORESTING PARTS OF NATIONAL DOMAIN.

One of Most Serious Problems is Protection of Seed From Attacks of Chipmunks, Ground Squirrels and Other Rodents.

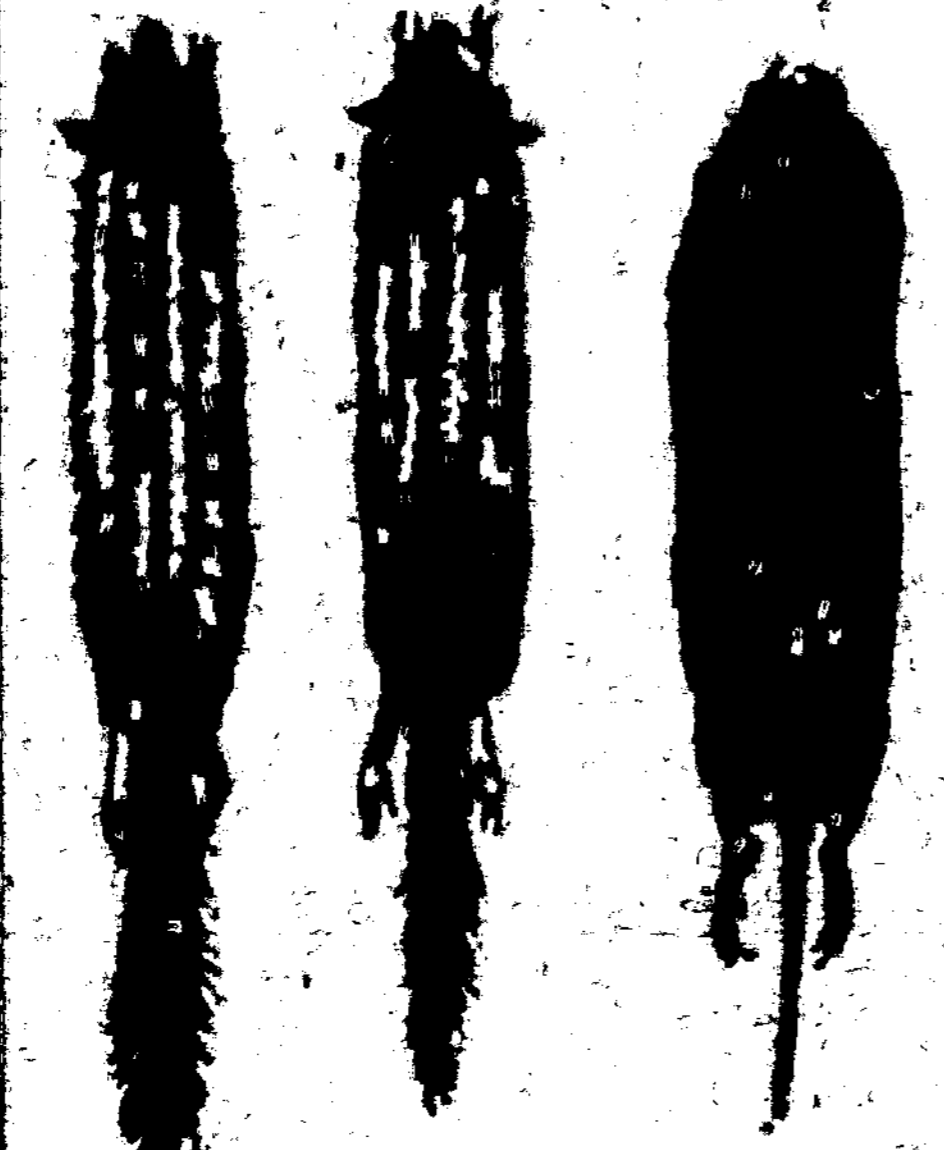
(BY N. DEARBORN) The demand for lumber in the United States constantly increases, while the forested areas, under the ax of the lumberman, the encroachments of agriculture, and the devastation by

fire, steadily diminishes. Hence the importance of reforesting such parts of the national domain as have been denuded of their forest growth. One of the most serious problems connected with the reforestation of treeless areas within the national forests is the protection of newly planted seeds from the attacks of mice, chipmunk, ground squirrels, and other rodents, whose depredations collectively continue the year through. The extent of this damage may be understood by the results of a reforesting experiment in the Black hills by the forest service, in which from 30 to 70 per cent of the seed was destroyed by chipmunks and mice within six days after planting. In order to get an idea of the abundance of these rodents, exhaustive trapping on a half acre contained 3,000 seed spots was undertaken. We secured three chipmunks and 11 white-footed mice, which in three days had pilfered 70 per cent of the seed. One of the chipmunks was seen to visit 38 seed spots in four minutes. It will be readily perceived that the destruction of seed on

such a scale threatens the practicability of reforestation, and that strenuous measures will have to be resorted to in order to stop the depredations of the pests which, in a large degree, prevent the renewal of many of our forests. Lime is Essential. The need of lime in the laying and breeding stock ration is very important. In one dozen ordinary sized eggs there are nearly four ounces of lime. This element is best supplied by giving cracked oyster shell in hoppers. Skim milk also provides life to a certain extent in palatable form and alfalfa or clover are satisfactory sources of supplying lime.

RENEWING THE FARM FLOCKS

Best to Keep Over Both Yearling Hens and Pullets in Proportion of About Half and Half.

Under the ordinary farm conditions I believe that it is best to keep over both yearling hens and pullets, in proportion of about half and half.

As a breeder I consider the yearling hen superior to the pullet, as the eggs are usually larger and will produce better developed chicks. In fact, the vigor of the offspring is not decreased if the hen is kept three or four years.

Considered as a breeder alone, her value does not depreciate as long as she produces good chicks. But we must judge her value also by the total amount of her egg-yield, and we know that the older she grows the fewer eggs she will produce.

Experiment station results and practical experience go to show that it seldom pays to keep hens after they are two years old, except for breeding uses.

Notwithstanding the fact that pullets will lay more eggs than yearling hens, I believe it pays to keep as many yearling hens in the flock as pullets.

Many who keep a farm flock do not consider the cost of raising the pullets to an egg-producing age, while the year-old hens are making a profit for them.

Keeping about the same number of yearlings as pullets enables me to market about one-half of the older birds during the summer when they are in good condition, and will bring the highest price.

In this way I have plenty of room for the young pullets early in the fall, and get them into their houses and

ready to begin laying before the cold weather comes on.

By planning my egg-producing flock in this way, I am able to supply regular customers, and maintain a fairly uniform egg-production during the entire year.

After the older birds are marketed, the yearlings alone must be depended upon to supply egg customers until the pullets begin to lay in the fall.

I have found it unsatisfactory to depend upon pullets alone to maintain a uniform production during the whole year.

Then again, if an incubator is not used for hatching it is imperative that we keep over a few yearling hens, if we are to secure early hatches to supply the increase to the flock.

Success With Ducks.

Ducks have fewer insect enemies than chickens, but the rodents seem instinctively to recognize in them a savory feast, and they must be carefully housed at night where such prowlers abound. Though quite helpless when young, as they grow under the great bill is a formidable weapon. They thrive best on soft food, corn meal, bran and ground oats being a good combination. Keep sand or gravel in the drinking trough constantly.

Breast is Main Thing.

In a market fowl the breast is the main thing, but in order to obtain a desirable breast it is necessary to have a good body first. So far as actual quality is concerned, the color of the skin is of no importance. But when the market calls for a yellow skin, it is important that only such be secured. Poultrymen can neither afford to quarrel with the demand nor try to reform it.

Do Some Experimenting.

Every farmer owes it to himself and his posterity to do a limited amount of experimenting in crop production, stock breeding and the maintenance of soil fertility.

What Silo Means.

Adding the silo to the farm simply means applying one of the first principles of modern manufacturing industry to the silage of all industries.

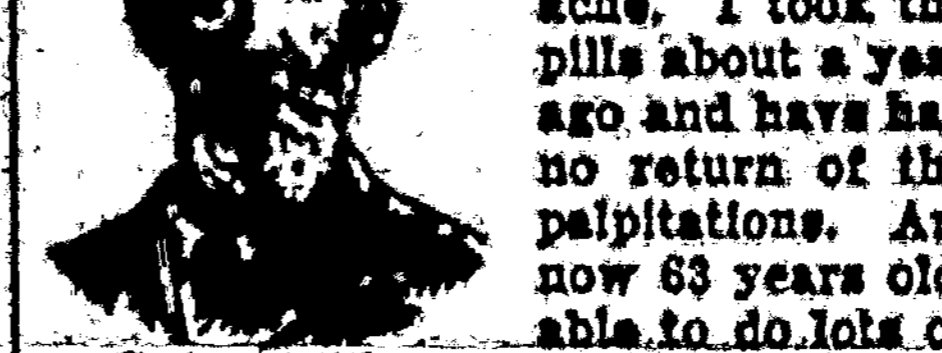

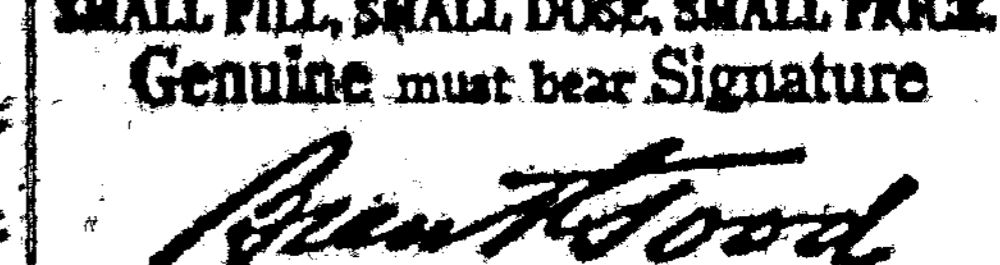
