Work on Eagle Creek Pipe Line to Begin. Train load of pipe received. Much wool shipped from Capitan.

CAPITAN BOOSTED BY THE LOCAL CORRESPONDENT

The Mocho Bros. who conduct a sheep ranch north of the Capitan mountains sheared their sheep and marketed forty thousand pounds of wool last week.

A fine rain fell throughout this section of the county Tuesday and we understand that it extended as far east as Roswell. Crops and range are looking fine all about here, and everything points to a record-breaking year.

Jim Mocho of Mocho Brothers, sheepgrowers of the Capitan mountains, came in Tuesday afternoon with Prager Miller in his car, to make arrangements for shipping their wool clip.

The train did not reach here Tuesday until about five p. m. Having a large train of pipe for the Eagle Creek pipe line out of Carrizozo, and the rain making the rails slippery necessitated their doubling the hill about five times.

Chas. S. Henning, engineer in charge of the Eagle Creek pipe line construction for the El Paso & Southwestern was in town Tuesday and reports that the pipe for its construction is beginning to arrive.

The following parties have made homestead entries during the past week at the Capitan land office: Jose Trujillo, 160 acres; Robert Hunt, 80 acres; Michael Buchanan, 160 acres; Mrs. Artie Titus, 160 acres; Thos. B. Yates, 160 acres and Thos. N. Hobbs proved up on 160 acres.

Rev. Charles Robinson and wife, holiness people, report that they will conduct a revival meeting at Alto beginning Thursday night of this week. Rev. Robinson and wife are fine singers and their singing never fails to draw a large audience.

The town is undergoing a fresh meat famine at present. Our town butcher has become very dilatory in supplying fresh meat and it has been suggested that the vigilance committee is about to wait upon him. "Will, you had better get a move on you."

Capitan is on the map and there to stay. It is a prosperous town in Lincoln County about twenty miles southeast of Carrizozo, the county seat, at the east terminus of the Capitan branch of the E. P. & S. W. railroad, surrounded by a most healthful climate. Some of the best coal fields in the state, as well as abundance of other mineral deposits. Altitude 6350 feet and a fine fruit country. One of the most healthful summer resorts to be found, six miles from here Fort Stanton is situated which is now used as the U. S. Marine Sanatorium for the treatment of tuber-

culosis, there being between three and four hundred patients there, new cases arriving and cured ones departing daily. Located near is a private Sanatorium for tubercular patients where good accommodation and care is furnished its patrons. Houses and rooms can be rented very reasonable, and plenty of good water eight to twelve feet below the surface. The Lincoln county

High and Manual training school is located here. Plenty of good grazing, timber or farming land is open for entry. A land office is located in town. There are two large wholesale and retail general stores located here which furnish to the trade for many miles around in a single way as well as in car-load lots. Eighteen postoffices receive their mail through this office. The population is about 450. Our people are congenial, neighborly, law abiding and accommodating. It has been said that there are other towns in the state better than Capitan. You can fool all of the people part of the time, part of the people all the time, but you can't fool all the people all the time. See? Our motto is, Don't be a knocker, hide your hammer and try to speak well of others. When a stranger drops in jolly him, tell him this is one of the best towns on earth, and it is. BALL TEAM CONTINUES WINNING STREAK

Carrizozo wins hot ten-inning battle from Fort Stanton Marines Sunday by Batting Rally

MANY LOCAL FANS ATTEND THE GAME

The Carrizozo Baseball team continued their winning streak Sunday at Fort Stanton when they took a hotly contested game from the Fort Stanton boys, by a rattling ten-inning finish.

The game was a comedy of errors from start to finish but they were so equally distributed between the two teams that the battle was an interesting one to witness.

Blakemore and Hightower both pitched high-class ball, but with indifferent support at times, especially on the part of the Fort Stanton boys Carrizozo took the lead in the second inning when two singles followed by as many errors netted them three runs. Fort Stanton took advantage of various opportunities offered by the errors of the local team and took the lead in the eighth, but the boys from the windy city were able to tie the score in the ninth, and in the first half of the tenth with two men on bases, rightfielder Lahey made his first hit of the day and the game was won, the final score being Carrizozo 7, Fort Stanton 6.

Hightower had a shade the better of the argument taking the game as a whole, as he struck out eleven men and paced out two, but the seven hits which he allowed came at inopportune moments for the Fort Stanton.

Blakemore allowed but four hits one base on balls, and one other pass to first, occasioned by Warren McDaniel getting his nose in front of a fast in shoot—instead of the bat furnished him for that purpose. The blood flowed freely for a few moments but McDaniel was able to finish the game.

There were fourteen automobile loads of Carrizozo fans in attendance and the "rooting" in exciting moments during the game would have done credit to a world's series.

With the team we have, and with the enthusiasm which is fast developing, there is no reason why Carrizozo should not have the champion amateur team in New Mexico this season.

James Gatewood passed through Nogal last week en route to his ranch at the Barrow Springs with seventy five head of yearling heifers for which he paid thirty five dollars per head.

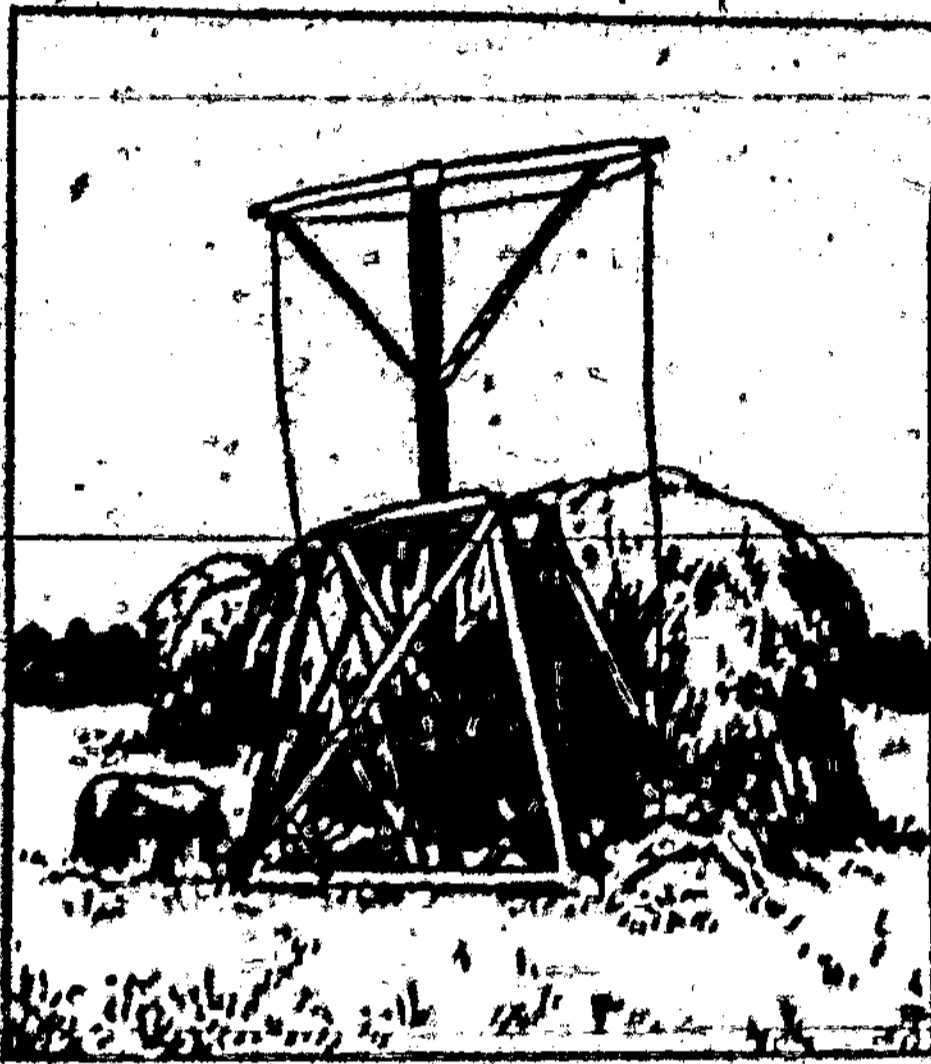
WIDE USE OF ALFALFA

SHOWS REMARKABLE ADAPTABILITY TO VARIOUS CLIMATES.

Now One of Staple Forage Crops of Old World and Ranks Among Most Important Legumes of Western Hemisphere.

The original home of alfalfa appears to have been southwest of central Asia, but from there it has been carried to practically every part of the world where agricultural pursuits are important. It is now one of the staple forage crops of every continent of the old world and easily takes front rank as the most important leguminous forage crop of the western hemisphere. The name "alfalfa" is of Arabic origin and means "the best fodder." The southern European name of "lucerne" was formerly applied to the plant in the eastern part of the United States and in Utah, but this name has practically given way to the name "alfalfa," under which it was introduced by the Spaniards.

The Persians were apparently the first nation which grew this plant. They took it with them when they invaded Greece about 490 B. C. The introduction of alfalfa into Spain was probably during the Moorish invasion in the eighth century A. D. The Spaniards introduced it into Mexico and South America during the sixteenth century. It is reported to have

been carried northward from Old Mexico into what is now the southern portion of the United States, but it was not until 1854, when it was taken to San Francisco from Chile, that its rapid extension over the irrigated sections of the western states commenced. Its culture has since been extended to many of the nonirrigated sections of the West.

The history of alfalfa in the eastern states runs back for at least two centuries, as the colonists made repeated attempts to establish it. The attempts on the part of the American colonists to establish it were unsuccessful. The limestone region of central New York probably constitutes the area of its longest continued culture in any section of the East. In South Carolina there is a field reported to be 75 years old. Alfalfa has also been grown locally in most of the eastern states for many years. The black prairie soils of Alabama and Mississippi are proving especially adapted to alfalfa. The successful districts have usually been the somewhat limited areas of limestone soils where the conditions are especially suited to the plant.

The recent efforts looking to its further extension throughout the East and South indicate that the chances of success increase greatly as the special requirements for its production are understood and provided for.

GARDEN FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

Quick Growing is Secret of Tender Crispness of Salad Plants—Keep the Soil Moist.

Among less common sorts asparagus-beets are very desirable, as the entire plant may be cooked for greens when young, or the large ribs and veins from the older leaves may be cooked and served as asparagus.

Brussels sprouts belong to the cabbage family and the tiny heads that form on the stalks are more delicate in flavor than meat cabbage.

Kohlrabi seems like a cross between a cabbage and a turnip, but if cooked when young and tender has a flavor like cauliflower.

Fatticus (fennel salad) may be sown and treated the same as spinach and furnishes one of the very early spring salads.

Leeks are as easily grown as onions and being less in flavor are more desirable for some purposes.

Ezdrive is another very fine salad

So far as climate is concerned alfalfa can be grown in every state in the Union. It is, however, very exacting in the humid sections as to soil and treatment. The hardy strains are able to withstand the severe winters of the North Central states. It is raised without irrigation in semi-arid sections where the rainfall is only 14 inches a year, and also in the Gulf states where the annual rainfall may amount to 55 inches. A rainfall of 36 inches a year is ample for this crop, and an amount in excess of this is usually a detriment. In moist climates the soil is frequently sour, and the clay soils especially are apt to be too poorly drained. In such a climate weeds and fungus diseases prove much more injurious than under less humid conditions. Although the adaptability of alfalfa is great, yet in the areas not perfectly suited to its successful production care is necessary to provide the very favorable conditions required by the young plants in order to overcome the natural drawbacks.

TAKING THE HORSE'S PULSE

Valuable Means of Assistance in Ascertaining the Nature and Progress of Disease.

The pulse is due to an automatic expansion and relaxation in the wall of an elastic tube—the artery—caused by the jets of blood pumped into these vessels by means of a force pump—the heart.

Each stroke of the heart is equal to one pulsation, viz: a rising and falling of the arterial wall.

In health the average number of pulse beats per minute is about 36 to 40. The larger the horse, the slower or fewer the number of beats per minute.

A very good situation to take the pulse is at the underside of the jaw. By rolling the tips of the fingers about a little they can be brought on to the blood vessel.

Don't press too firmly, nor yet too lightly. The animal must be kept still and quiet. In point of importance, the "character" of the pulse must be the best guide. That is to say, the blood vessel may impress us as feeling hard, soft, full, quick, small, wiry, regular or irregular.

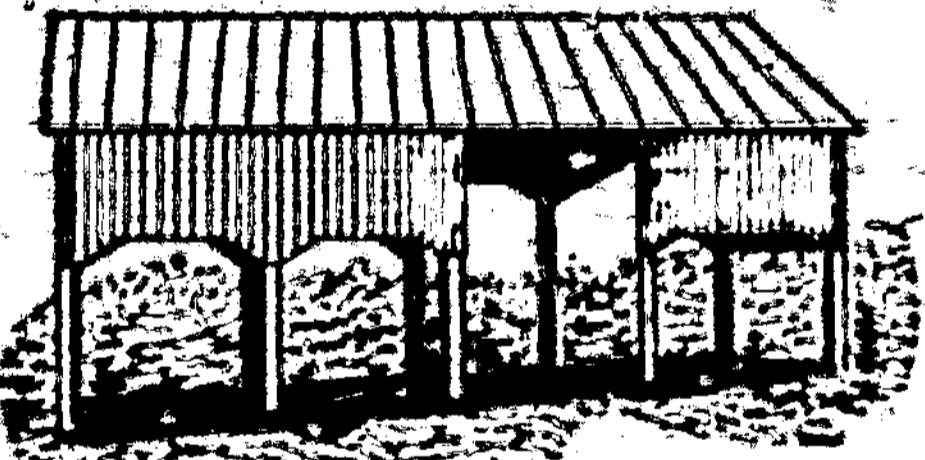
In pulmonary apoplexy it may be beating 120 times per minute.

When properly taken it forms a valuable means of assistance in ascertaining the nature and progress of disease.

WAGON SHED IS CONVENIENT

Constructed So That Teams May Be Driven Through and Vehicles Left in Proper Places.

All farm buildings should be constructed with a view to economy in expense and convenience in use. A most excellent wagon shed is so constructed that the teams may be driven

through the shed and the wagons left standing in their proper places. No time and labor are consumed in pulling or pushing the wagons into place.

Extra Early Vegetables.

Beans, beets, cucumbers, lettuce, radishes: Start in window garden and transplant outdoors.

Peas and corn: "Sprouts" in moist sand in the cellar and sprinkle in the rows, being careful not to break the shoots.

Tomatoes: Start in the house in February and keep potted till the end of May.

plant, and the seeds may be sown as late as August for plants to use during the fall.

Dandelions, of the improved, large-leaved sorts are among the finest salad plants, and if cut freely for use there is no danger of their becoming a nuisance.

Celeriac (turnip rooted celery) is finer for flavoring soups than the stalk-celery, and may be served in various ways.

Winter onions are very desirable because of the fact that when sown planted they come up year after year as soon as the frost is out of the ground, and are ready for use in two or three weeks.

Okra is less well known than it should be. It is fine for use in soups, stews and salads.

With all these (and other salad plants), quick growing is the secret of tender crispness and to secure it, the soil must be rich, and have plenty of moisture.

Elias G. Raffety is planting cane, beets, milo maize and other like crops on 40 acres of his desert claim. 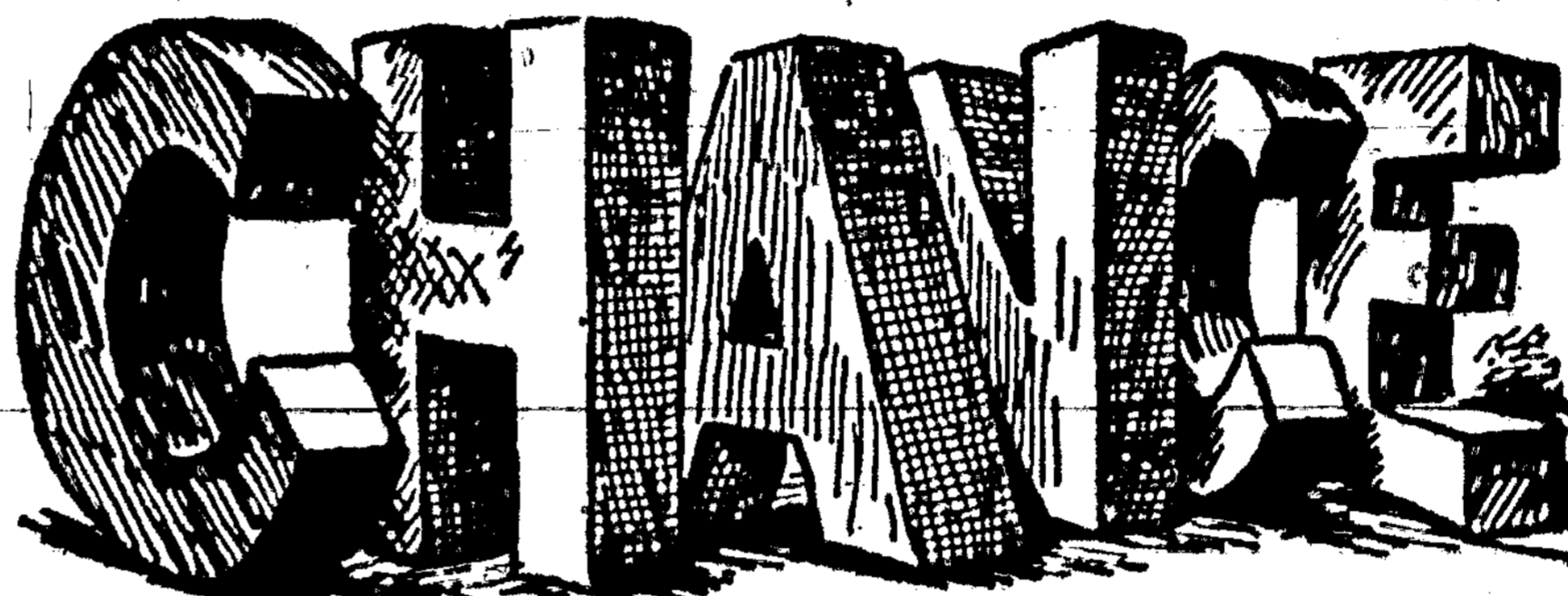

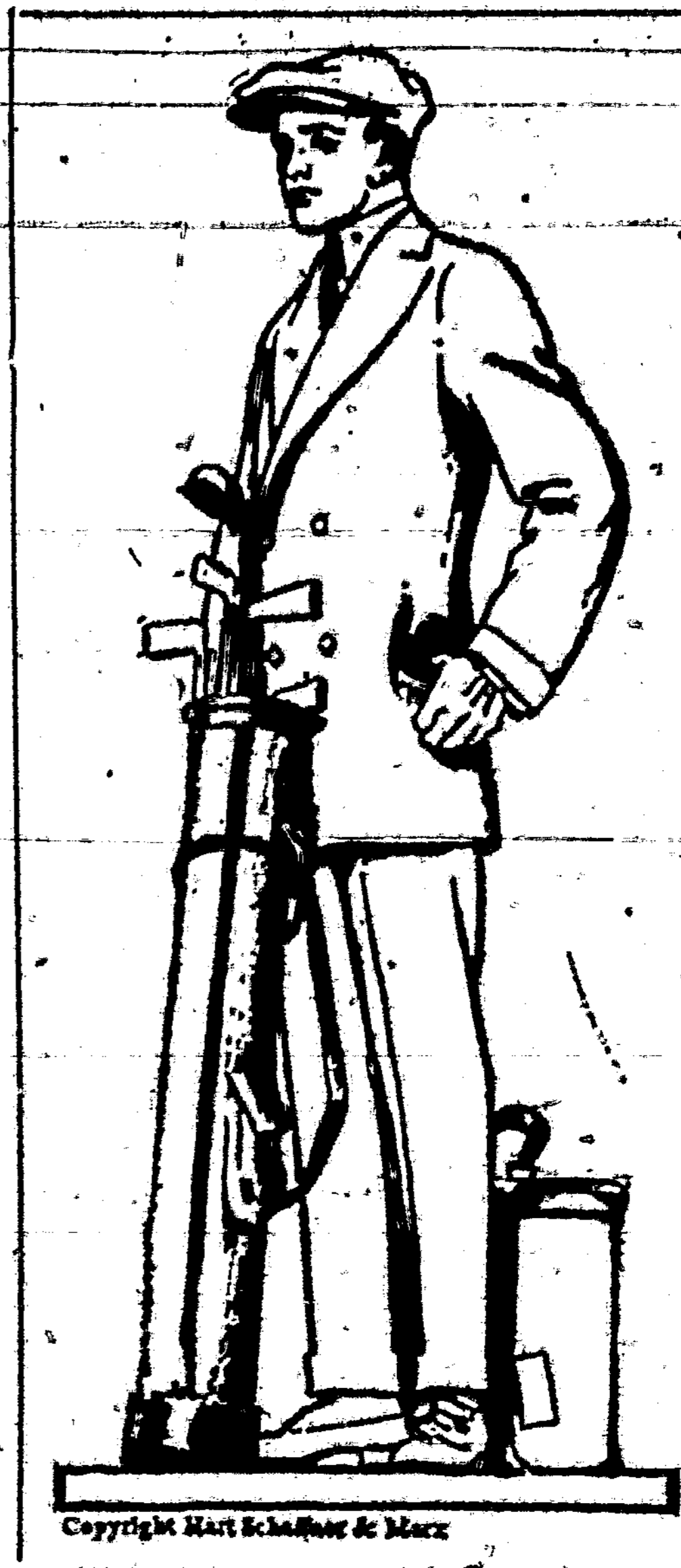
