## COURT PASSES SENTENCES AND ADJOURNS

Ramon Vigil Given Thirty to Forty Years in the Penitentiary for Murder of His Wife

### SEVERAL CASES ARE DISMISSED

The District Court wound up the civil case of Antonia Otero y Chavez vs. D. L. Spaid, Saturday evening, when the jury brought in a verdict for the defendant. Plaintiffs gave motion for new trial of the case and were given until Dec 3d to prepare motion.

Court then proceeded to pass sentences in the criminal cases of the term, which have been disposed of, ordering that Ramon Vigil, the aged Mexican who murdered his wife near San Patricio last summer be confined in the State penitentiary at hard labor, for a term of not less than nine, nor more than ten years.

Edugrdo Duran was sentenced to three months in the County jail and to pay a fine of \$100 and costs, fine and cost to be suspended upon the serving of the sentence and on good behaviour.

Jacobo Mireles was sentenced to not less than two nor more than three years in the State Reform School at Springer for burglary.

In the case of the State vs Amado Gutierrez, who was found guilty of the larceny of a mare, sentence was withheld until the Court could be satisfied of the age of defendant. Robert A. Hurt was cited to appear and show cause why he should not be punished for contempt of court but it was not learned what caused the issuance of the citation.

The case of the State vs Thos. J. Moore, an appeal from Justice of the Peace Court, was dismissed at appellant's costs.

In the case of Thomas Keebe et al vs. Monroe Harper et al, plaintiffs were ruled to furnish surety for costs.

The petit jurors were excused until 9 a. m. December 1st, and the Court left Sunday morning for his home at Fort Selden.

## REPUBLICANS SWEEP STATE

Hernandez Elected by about five Thousand. Williams Thirty Eight Hundred Plurality

### THE HOUSE TWO-THIRDS REPUBLICAN

Returns from the election of November 3rd, indicate sweeping gains for the Republican party, throughout the entire nation, and the practical elimination of the Progressive party from the map.

With but a few scattering precincts in the State to be heard from a careful estimate has been made of those missing, resulting in figures indicating election of Hernandez to the Congress of the United States by a plurality of five thousand one hundred and sixty nine, Williams plurality by the same method is estimated at three thousand eight hundred and forty eight. Short term amendment (two year term for county officers) has probably carried, tax amendment still in doubt.

Lower house of the State legislature will probably stand thirty-two Republicans, sixteen Democrats, one Socialist, and may give the Republicans the much-talked-of two-thirds majority.

Indications are that Hewitt was elected to the Legislature as Representative from Lincoln county, by a plurality of about eighty, and that Vigil, the Republican candidate, was elected as Representative from the "short-strin," district, by a small plurality.

Returns from different states throughout the nation show Republican gains almost everywhere, the Democratic majority in the lower House of Congress appearing to be reduced to about 18, and the probable Democratic majority in the United States Senate will be about 14.

Arizona and Colorado both seem to have entered the "d. y." column, as has also Oregon. Women's suffrage seems to have been defeated in every state, in which it was voted upon with the exception of Nevada.

The results, from a Republican standpoint are about all that could be hoped for. The Democratic majority in both State and National legislative bodies have been reduced to so narrow a margin, that the Democrats in those bodies will have to "stay on the job" in order to hold control of them, during the remaining two years of power, which the Democratic party has left them. The deletion of the Progressive party as a factor in national politics, and the large Republican gains, point to a decisive victory for the G. O. P. in 1916.

## SHOOTING AFFRAY OCCURS ON STREET

Attorney Buel R. Wood Wounded Monday Noon by Pistol Shot Fired by Arthur Arrington

### WOUND PROVES TO BE NOT VERY SERIOUS

Monday noon, while many of our citizens were on their way to dinner the town was aroused by three pistol shots, and on inquiry it was learned that Arthur Arrington, the popular and well-known employe of Ziegler Bros. had shot and slightly wounded Buel R. Wood, the shooting taking place in front of John E. Bell's store. Very little can be learned of the causes which brought on the shooting but it is understood that bad feeling has existed between the men for some time.

Arrington stated immediately after the shooting, that Wood had driven him from home and had been following him around for several days, and that he thought Wood was going to attack him, and when Wood met him on the street in front of Bell's he made a movement that Arrington thought was preparatory to drawing a gun, and that he shot to protect himself.

The first shot, which was from a 32-caliber Colts struck Wood in the left breast, struck a rib, glanced across the chest and came out the right side, only inflicting a slight flesh wound. The second and third shots went wild, Wood making his escape through Bell's store. He immediately went to Dr. Walker's office, where he was examined and his wound dressed. Arrington was placed under arrest, and waiting preliminary hearing, was held to await the action of the next Grand Jury under bond of \$1500 which was furnished at once.

Both men are quite well-known in Carrizozo, Arrington having been with Ziegler Bros. for the past year and Wood, who was formerly a fireman on the Southwestern out of Tucumari, having been located here for the past six months engaged in the practice of law.

The families of the two men have been living in the same house for some months, and a short time ago trouble arose between Arrington and his wife, resulting in his leaving home, and it is supposed that the ill feeling, in some way, grew out of these circumstances.

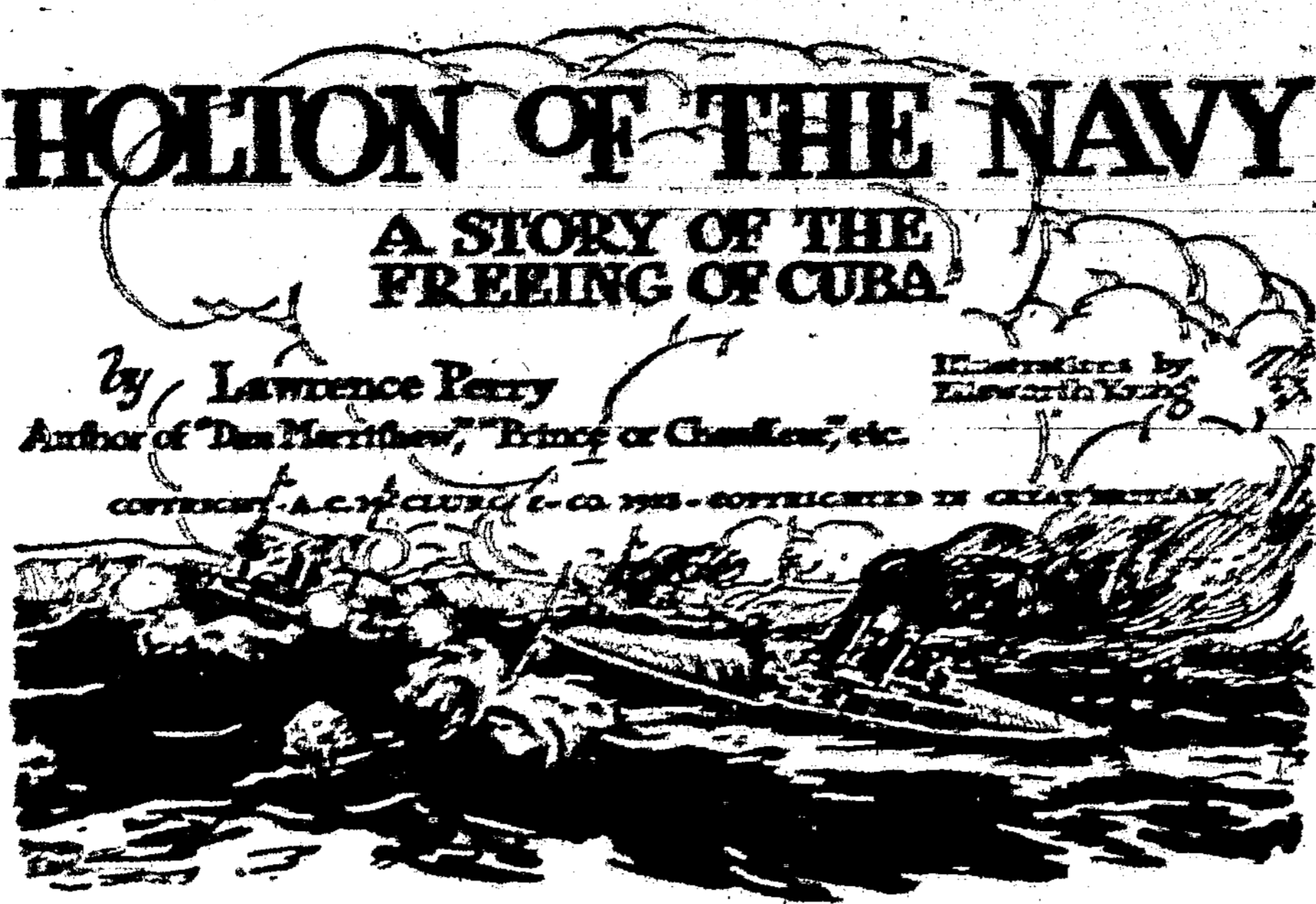
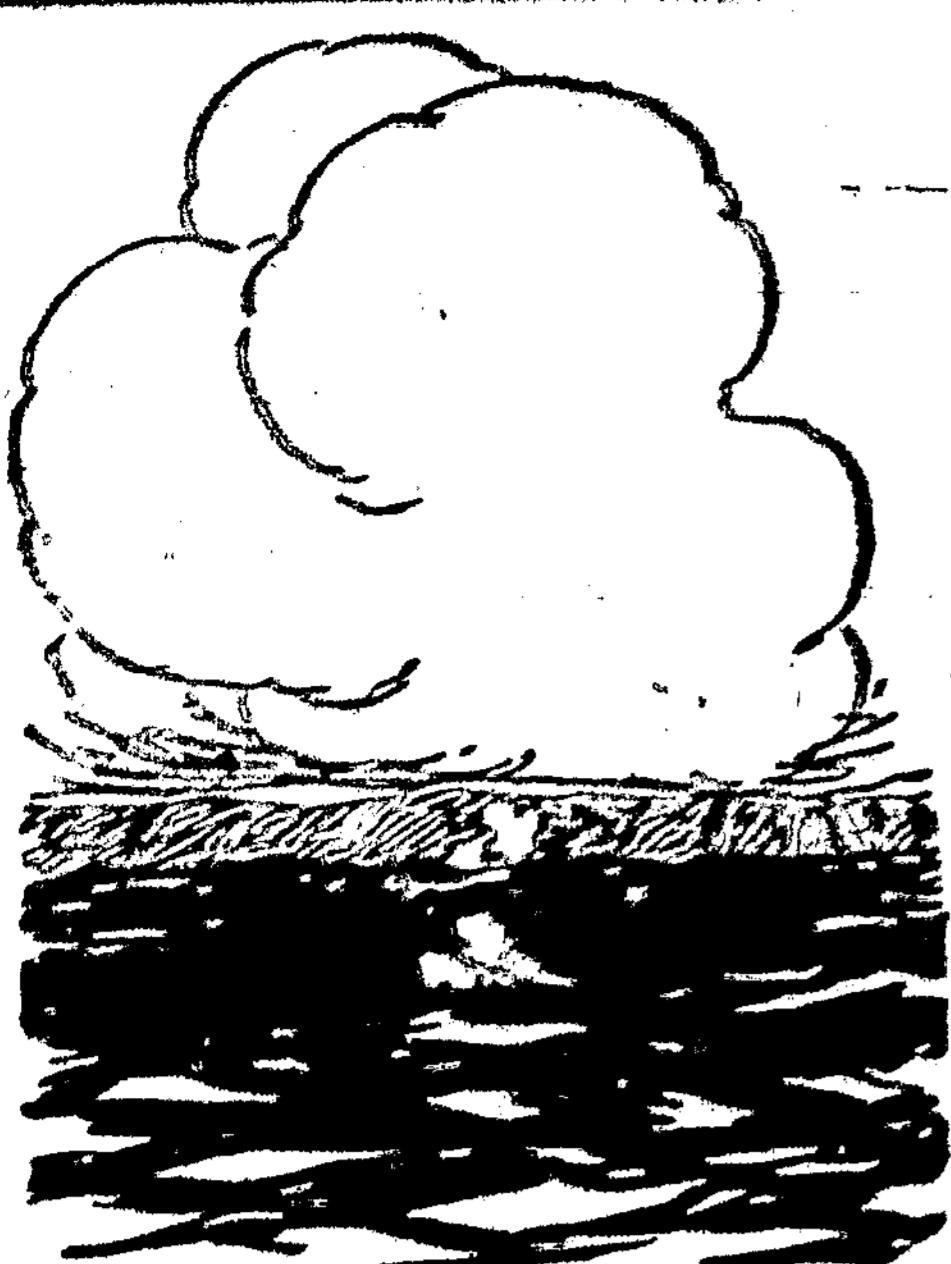

**ONE LUMP INSTEAD OF TWO**

The best sugar factories through out the country are facing a peculiar situation. After working at full capacity to meet a supposed demand for high-priced sugar, they find that there is no such demand. Although the sugar is offered at six cents per pound, wholesale, sales are slow. The jobbers and wholesalers, it seems, stocked up heavily when the war broke out and, with warehouses loaded to the rafters, they are not eager to put more money into the product. So the sugar is going begging at six cents. How long this condition will last is a question. The consumer, however, as long as he uses the usual quantity of sugar, may rest assured that he will not profit. The retail price of sugar has been advanced to about eight cents a pound and it is likely that it will be kept there indefinitely. The old "law" of supply and demand appears to have been repealed in this century. The only way to touch the speculators is through the pocket. A lack of demand or a falling off in demand is likely to result in a reduction in price, for the jobbers will not care to carry big stocks that are slow sales. Therefore if every American would cut down his allowance of sugar, just a trifle, we would see the prices tumbling in a few weeks. One spoonful or one lump, instead of two in your coffee every morning for a month would result in a return of five-cent sugar before Christmas.

I muled to the cornfield and ge-hawed until sundown. 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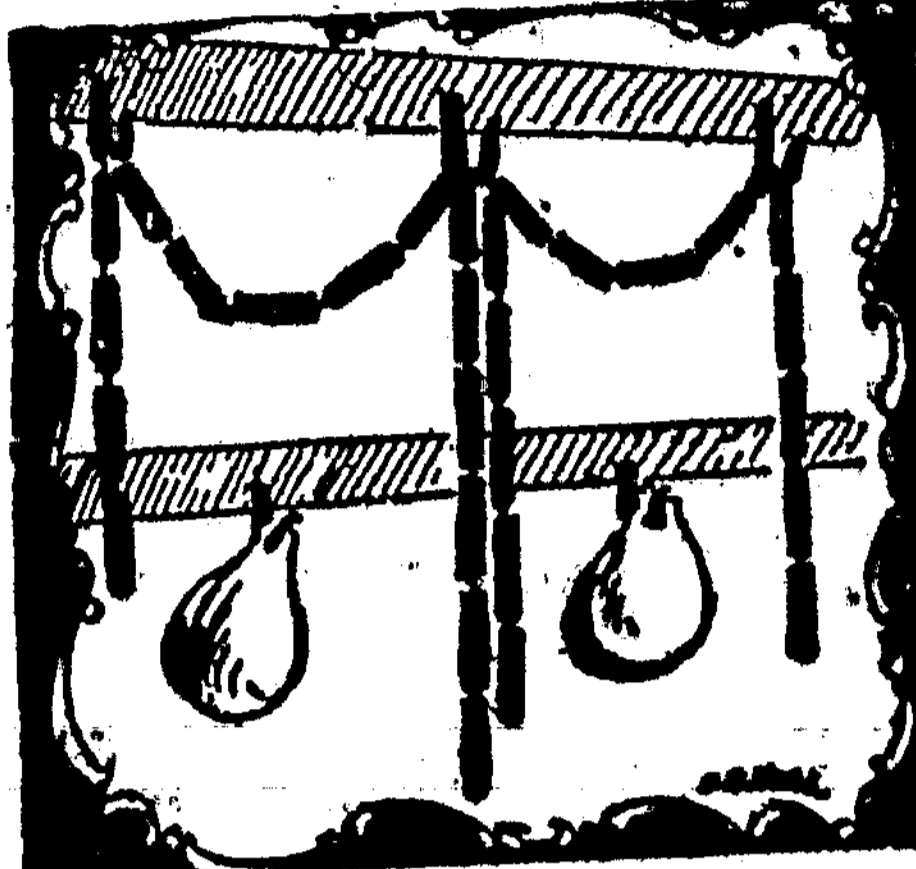

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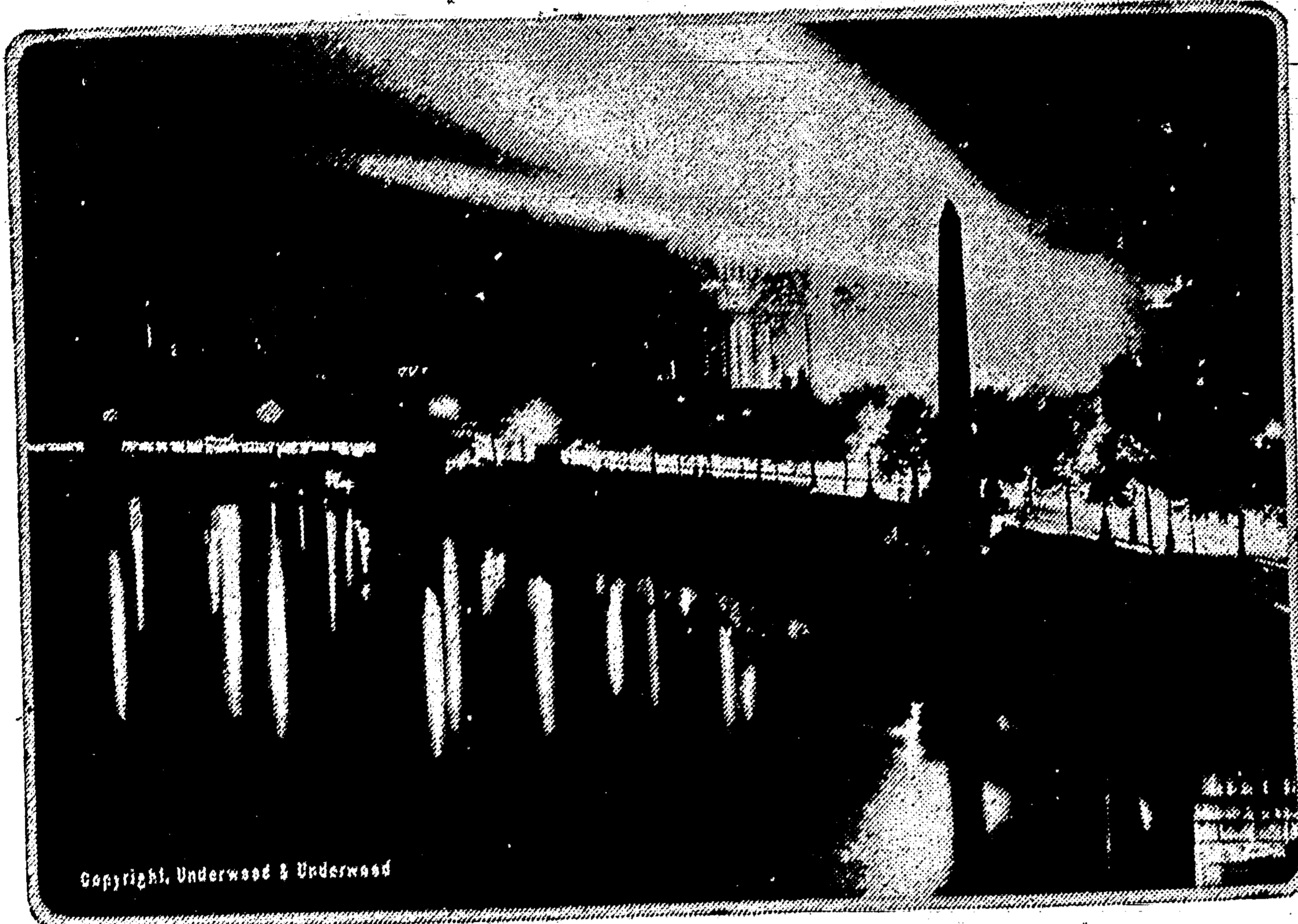

### PRINCES IN PAWN FROM FORTUNES LOST IN THE WAR

Royalty in England Reduced to Penury by Vanished Funds.

#### EVEN QUEEN FEELS PINCH

King George Comes to Aid of Relative Too Poverty-Stricken to Pay His Grocery Bill—Prince Arthur Has Rich Wife.

London.—All because of the war, which spares neither the high nor the lowly, several minor royalties resident in England find themselves within hailing distance of the poorhouse as a result of having been deprived altogether of their incomes and several of them actually would be in want but for the fact that King George has come to their assistance. Meanwhile not only the king and queen themselves but several of the other most exalted members of the royal circle have been hard hit in a financial way, and at least one of them has been placed in a mightily embarrassing and humiliating position.

#### Prince Christian's Income Gone.

Prince and Princess Christian, for example, have had their entire private income which came from German government annuities and money invested in German securities swept away. The prince, however, as the chief ranger at Windsor, has a salary of \$2,000 per annum and as such he also occupies Cumberland Lodge, one of the finest residences at Windsor in the king's gift, rent free.

It is absolutely impossible for the prince to keep up this establishment on a salary of only \$2,000 a year, which would not be sufficient to pay the servants' wages. The prince and his family before the war had an income of about \$14,000 per annum, and

this has now absolutely ceased, for it all came from Germany.

Prince Christian, like many other minor royalties in England, lived up to the last penny of his income, and when sudden financial pressure came he had no resources of any sort to fall back on, and tradesmen about Windsor, to many of whom the prince was in debt, refused to deliver the usual monthly orders without cash when the prince could not pay.

King George came to his relative's aid and arranged with the tradespeople at Windsor to supply Cumberland lodge with necessaries in the way of food.

#### Queen's Brother in Bad Way.

Prince and Princess Alexander of Teck, who are notoriously among the most impecunious of royalties in England, have also lost practically all their private means through the war.

The prince, who is, of course, Queen Mary's brother, received an income of about four thousand dollars per annum from interest on mortgages on real estate in North Germany, and the princess has about two thousand dollars per annum from German government annuities.

Queen Mary has had to come from time to time to the aid of her brother, but her majesty now has to support both him and the princess and their family altogether. The prince was appointed some little while back governor general of Canada, but it is unlikely that his royal highness will go to Canada until the war is over.

The prince and princess with their family are now occupying a few rooms at St. James palace. They have but two servants and are living in the plainest and simplest manner.

Of all royalties in England the ex-king of Portugal and Queen Victoria, his wife, have suffered most severely in pocket by the war, and the royal residence at Twickenham has been thrown into utter confusion.

The whole of the income of the queen was derived from German sources, and of course ceased, but that did not amount to very much, not more than a few hundreds a year. But King Manuel, who had invested very largely lately in Russian and French securities, on the advice of his banker in Paris, has for the moment been deprived of nearly the whole of a considerable income, excepting the inter-

est on some of his holdings in British industrial concerns, which have declined about 50 per cent in capital value.

The ex-monarch is in far worse circumstances, as a matter of fact, than he was at the time of the revolution in Portugal. He has no resources to fall back on and no one to come to his aid.

#### Queen Alexandra Feels Pinch.

Queen Alexandra has also felt the results of the war severely. Her majesty's extravagance and carelessness about her money affairs are matters that have caused a good deal of talk in the royal entourage of late.

During the last season Queen Alexandra entertained in the most elaborate and costly way at Marlborough house, and as a result piled up very considerable liabilities; to pay these it became necessary that she should overdraw her banking account for a sum of \$250,000; while arrangements were being made for this overdraft the war broke out, and her majesty's bankers would not entertain the idea of the loan.

Her majesty for some short time was placed in the most embarrassed position, for she could not obtain even any ready money, a fairly plentiful supply of which is necessary to keep the establishments at Marlborough house and Sandringham going, and there were certain liabilities to tradespeople which, though there was no actual legal obligation on the part of Queen Alexandra to pay at once, payment could not be withheld without giving rise to unpleasant gossip.

Prince Arthur of Connaught has lost an income of about three thousand five hundred dollars arising out of money invested in Germany, which was settled on him by his maternal grandfather. This was all the private means the prince had before his marriage, but he got, of course, an immense fortune with his wife, and neither he nor the princess have suffered any special inconvenience by the present financial disturbances.

The Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, a first cousin of King George, who has thrown in his lot with the German and is fighting for his native country, has lost for the moment a sum of about nine thousand dollars which he had banked in London and payment of which has been refused to the duke's agent in London.

### FEW SHEEP PAY WELL

Animals Are Most Profitable Investment for Farmers.

Owner of Flock of Thirty-six Grade Shropshires Cleared \$298 in One Year—Animals Given No Especial Attention.

(By J. M. BELL.)

The small farmer should always have a flock of sheep on hand, as these animals are one of the most profitable investments that he can handle.

This is an account of the proceeds derived from a flock of 36 grade Shropshire ewes in one season.

This flock received no especial attention, so far as feed and care were concerned, although, of course, at lambing time they were well looked after. The ewes who did not take their lambs naturally were induced to nurse them if possible; if not, then these neglected lambs were raised on the bottle, but in the entire flock of 36 lambs that were not two that had to be raised by hand.

The owner of this flock tells me that his 36 lambs netted him \$6.50 each on the farm; that the wool from the 36 ewes and one buck, who sheared an average of six pounds each, netted 30 cents the pound.

This makes 36 lambs at \$6.50 the head, \$234; 216 pounds of wool at 30 cents the pound, \$64.80; total, \$298.80.

These sheep were allowed the run of the fields that had good grazing on them the major part of the year, and

during the winter season, when the weather was very severe, the little flock was given a ration of hay, but they were never given any grain.

When the snow was on the ground or the nights were very cold they were put in the hay barn and just fed hay, a mixture of timothy, grass and clover.

This is a fair illustration of what can be done with a few well bred sheep at minimum expense, so far as feed and attention are concerned.

#### CONTROL OF SOIL MOISTURE

Many Gardeners Not Doing Much to Increase Supply of Humus—Cover Crops Are Valuable.

Most market gardeners depend upon the supply of soil humus and upon tillage operations to control soil moisture. Both factors are exceedingly important. Soils which are well charged with humus or decaying organic matter usually contain enough moisture to grow good crops of vegetables, provided the soil is properly tilled. A host of growers, however, are not doing as much as they might to increase the humus supply of the soil. It is unnecessary to rely wholly upon stable manures. Cover crops of crimson clover, rye, vetch, oats, etc., are usually easy to start and their value in adding to the humus content of the soil is very great.

#### Sour Skim Milk for Calves.

Calves will make as rapid gains on sour skim milk as they do on sweet, if the milk is handled with much care as to cleanliness. It is better to let the milk sour quickly and use it without delay. The department at Washington tried sour milk on 22 dairy calves at all times of the year and had no trouble with scours whatever, even changing abruptly from sour to sweet milk and sweet to sour. The calves do not like the sour milk as well as the sweet, but soon become accustomed to it. Aversion to the sour milk increased when it was fed cold, as in winter.

#### Best for Cheese Making.

The heavier breeds of cows are better suited to the needs of the cheese maker than to the requirements of the butter maker.

#### Dig Out the Borers.

Peach borers are best destroyed by digging them out. While it is a slow process, there is really no other way.

The best breed for the farmer is some general purpose fowl or any good breed to which he takes a liking.

### WAYS OF DOCTORING TREES

Fallen Leaves and Wood Ashes Fed to Roots to Give Natural Food—Another Good Plan.

In one of our pastures there grew an immense oak tree which gave signs of dying and so manifest were they that we chose to remedy from several suggested and began treating it.

A bar of two and one-half-inch iron tipped with a sharp steel point, was used in drilling holes in the soil at specified distances just under the tree. In the holes were crowded fall-

on leaves and some wood ashes. The holes remained open and occasionally more leaves were packed in. Before winter set in the tree presented a rejuvenated appearance. Seemingly all it needed was natural food.

Here is another treatment. Open wounds are generally left to decay right along, but we had all these and the open cavities well cleaned and carefully filled. Some were filled with cement and over the hollows and holes where water or dampness could collect small tin caps were tacked on.

An old tin gutter from the house makes a protector where the breach to be covered is long.

#### ENTITLED TO A GOOD ROAD

Farm Is Not First Class Unless It Has Improved Highway Running Alongside of It.

Despite not the road drag, but criticize yourself either for not knowing how to use it, or for not using it when you do know how, simply because you will not be paid for it. The farm is entitled to a good road alongside of it, and is not a first-class farm unless it has such a road. The farmer himself is the best man to make that road good, provided permanent bridges and culverts have been put in and the necessary drainage has been done at public expense. Then if the farmer for the compensation in some way provided will not keep his road decent, let him be the reproach of the community. A little healthy public sentiment along this line will do more to bring the road drag into use than any legislation that can be placed on the statute books.

#### Deduction for Stags.

Every farmer should know that 80 pounds is deducted from the stags by the buyers at the big stockyards. This is a pretty big discount for the owners' carelessness.

#### Preserving Eggs.

Eggs preserved in a water-glass solution will keep almost perfectly for several months. They will poach nearly as well as fresh eggs, although the taste is a trifle more flat after long storage. These are the conclusions of the Missouri College of Agriculture, after a careful investigation of various methods of storing eggs for winter use.

#### Quarantine New Pig.

If a pig is brought to the farm from the outside it should be thoroughly examined and kept in a separate pen some distance from the home herd long enough to determine that it is absolutely free from disease.

#### Great Soil Builder.

Lespedeza is a great soil builder, probably as valuable as any of the legumes for our lands that are deficient in lime.

#### Have Eggs Canceled.

Insist upon having your eggs canceled by the purchaser, so that he may know that he is buying good eggs and pay accordingly.

### MODERN WAR ARMS

Death Dealt by Machines—Battles Turn to Slaughter.

Wounded Officer Tells Striking Story of Horrors Attendant Upon Present Manner of Killing in the Great European Conflict.

Paris.—In an interview a wounded officer told a striking story of the terrible results of war with modern arms.

"This is not a war of men," he said; "it is a war of machines. There is an appalling soullessness about it that is inhuman. Men turn handles and death flies out in large bundles. That is what this battle has been. It is all really one battle on the Marne and the Aisne.

"No one can even conceive what the battle has been who has not seen the battlefield. Men could never kill

one another by heaps and hecatombs. They would sicken at such wholesale slaughter. They would cry: 'We are soldiers, not butchers.' A battlefield should not be an abattoir.

"Only machines ingeniously constructed to destroy men as locusts have to be destroyed when they sweep over fertile land, only automatic death dealers without heart, pity, or remorse could carpet the earth with the dead in this frightful way."

Another witness to the terrific slaughter, which is not yet generally realized, said that the French shells burst with terrific effect and tear legs and arms to pieces. If the wound is in the head or stomach it is all over. This soldier added:

"It is quite true, too, that many men have been found dead without any wound. We find them as we go over the fields of battle kneeling or sitting in the trenches in a natural attitude just as if they were still alive, just as they knelt or sat when

a shell burst and in an instant suffocated them with melinite fumes."

A Red Cross nurse, a clever, businesslike French woman, who had experience in the Balkan war, said:

"Germany must be one vast hospital and France is beginning to be the same. I have just traveled from the Atlantic coast through the center of France and saw wounded everywhere. 'Already beds are becoming scarce, though fortunately there are so many slightly wounded, that is, cleanly injured, that they recover quickly and make room for newcomers. But it brings home the immensity of the struggle to see every available school, institution and public hall turned into a hospital as well as every big railway station and numberless private houses.'"

#### "The Roll of Honor."

London.—A London newspaper heads its columns giving brief sketches of officers killed and wounded in battle "The roll of honor," with the second line the quotation from Kipling's latest poem, "Who Dies If England Lives?"

# Getting Rid of "Great White Plague"

Christopher Easton

ONLY a short time ago a thrill of horror swept over the world, as the story was told of the sinking of the Titanic, with its cargo of precious lives. Over fourteen hundred of our brothers and sisters drowned in a night. What wonder that—moved by the mighty protest of civilized humanity against preventable conditions which made such a catastrophe possible—congresses and parliaments be- stirred themselves as never before to make safer the ventures of great ships on the sea, so as to guard against like calamities thereafter?

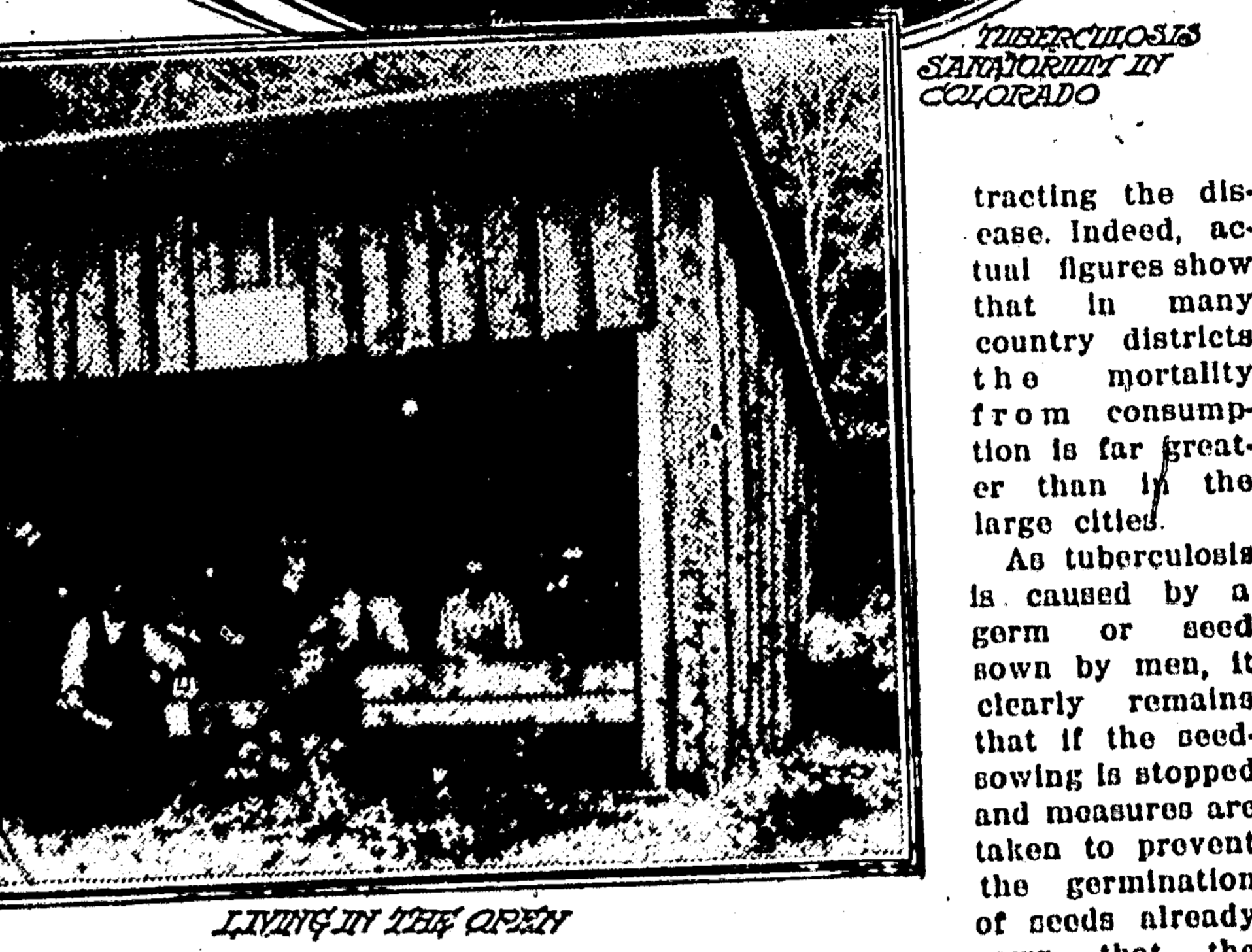
But a horror even greater than the sinking of the Titanic is every week enacted in the United States, as, between each two Sunday mornings, over nineteen hundred precious souls plunge down to the abyss of death through the ravages of tuberculosis or consumption. But their departure lacks the dramatic and spectacular effects which attended the loss of the great steamer; hence it makes so little impression on the minds of the public. Hence, too, the difficulty experienced in securing from legis-

latures, for combating the "white plague," a fraction of the moneys which they would freely vote to protect voyagers from the less destructive "white caps" of the sea. Yet the ravages of tuberculosis are far more easily preventable than are the calamities attendant on ocean traffic.

Our foe is an invisible one. It is true he marches upon us millions strong, but we know of his presence only by his works. We call him the "white plague" because of the color he gives the tubercles ("tubers," "lumps") which he causes to grow in our lungs and elsewhere in our bodies. When we hunt for him with a microscope we find he is a bacillus, or wonderfully small, rodlike plant or germ, which, having found his way, say, to our lungs, propagates himself with greater or less rapidity according to the circumstances surrounding him. The little invader may find his way into the body through lungs, stomach or skin.

The old-time belief that tuberculosis was hereditary is now known to be unfounded. Unless it is communicated to a child after birth he may never know the disease. He may, however, inherit a bodily condition which predisposes him to afford a ready lodgment of the germs in his tissues. The disease never "comes of itself." It requires the planting of a specific seed, ripened in some other organism. No one can become infected with human tuberculosis unless some other person or animal, infected therewith, has scattered the germs upon the ground, in the house, upon bedding, clothing or food, from which, through the air we breathe, the food we eat, or otherwise, they may enter into our bodies. It is communicated, through these carelessly scattered germs—oftenest from the dried spit of a consumptive—from one person to another, until a whole family or group of families may become agencies for the spread of the disease. Whole tribes and nations have been known to be free from tuberculosis until some traveler brought it to them, perhaps unconsciously in his own sputa, or in the clothing or bedding, it may be, of some companion who had died of it.

A secondary source of the disease is found in the fact that the tubercle of animals is very nearly the same as that in man, and so it may be communicated through the eating of milk or meat of infected animals. Intimate association with a person having the disease—sleeping in the same bed, drinking and eating from the same vessels, kissing and fondling, and breathing the dust raised by sweeping rooms inhabited by such—is the most common way in which tuberculosis is spread. The dwellings in which one or more cases of the disease have occurred, without the observance of modern sanitary precautions have often become effective instrumentalities for propagating the disease—family after family contracting it as each has successively occupied the house.

The home builder and housekeeper make themselves active agents in the spread of consumption when they so arrange the dwelling place that it lacks sufficient ventilation, particularly in sleeping rooms. A low-ceiled, tight little room, with only a fraction of the air space needed for a single healthy adult, and with the windows kept closed in winter to retain the warmth, affords ideal conditions for the development of the disease. Bad air debilitates and weakens the whole system, poisons the blood, and makes the tissues, especially the lung tissues—a veritable hotbed for the propagation of the germs. The story-and-a-half house, with the contracted space and sloping ceilings given to its sleeping rooms, is a menace to the health of all who live in it, whether it be called a cottage or a "bungalow."

The impression that tuberculosis prevails chiefly in the cities is an unfounded delusion. It is quite natural that such an impression should prevail, for we are accustomed to associate with country living, an abundance of pure, fresh air, plenty of room indoors and an unconstrained observance of the laws of health. But the actual conditions are found to be so often at variance with this ideal as to compel even the most zealous advocates of country living to admit that the mere fact of one's living in the country is no security against con-

## NAMUR AND BANK OF ENGLAND

First Deputy Governor of Great British Financial Institution Killed in the Trenches.

By a strange coincidence Namur, the Belgian city which is fighting so prominently in the great European war, is connected with a stirring story concerning the Bank of England, says London Tit-Bits.

As everyone knows, William Patterson, a Scottish farmer, was the founder of the great institution in Threadneedle street. His plan for a national bank was submitted to the government in 1691, but it was not till three years later that the chancellor of the exchequer, Mr. Montague, and Michael Godfrey, one of the richest merchants in London, put the scheme into operation. At this time England was at war with France, and Godfrey, who was the bank's first deputy governor, left his peaceful occupation to visit Namur, then being vigorously besieged by the English forces under William III. Godfrey had undertaken this perilous journey in order to consult the king respecting the supply of money to the army necessary to carry on the war. Thinking that the safest place would naturally be somewhere near his majesty, Michael ventured into the trenches and soon caught the eye of the king.

"Mr. Godfrey," said William, gravely, "I think you ought not to run this risk. You are a civilian and can be of no use here."

"True," courteously replied Mr. Godfrey; "but I am no more exposed than your majesty."

"Yet," returned the king, "I am in my duty, and therefore have a more reasonable claim to preservation."

At this moment a cannon ball, fired from the ramparts, struck Michael Godfrey and killed him instantly.

This sad event greatly affected William and he commanded the body to be taken to England, where it was laid to rest in St. Swithin's church, near the Bank of England. In the church records Godfrey's memory is honored thus:

"He died a bachelor, much lamented by all his friends, relations and acquaintances, for his integrity, his knowledge and the sweetness of his manners."
