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## THE UNDERWOOD TARIFF BILL

One of the Classic Blunders of the Present Administration is Now Before the Court of Custom Appeals

### DECISION IS LOOKED FOR AT AN EARLY DATE

The court is expected to interpret the meaning of the provision in the Underwood Tariff bill, proposing to give a five per cent discount in customs duties on merchandise imported in American vessels. Thus far that clause has failed in its purpose, just as the tariff measure of which it is a part failed to provide adequate revenue.

Enacted October 13, 1913, it failed on its first test, and that test applied, too, by the then Attorney General less than 30 days after the bill was signed.

No sooner had the tariff bill been presented to the Secretary of the Treasury for administration than a doubt arose in his mind as to the validity of the five per cent discount provision. He appealed for advice to Attorney General McReynolds, who is now on the Supreme Court bench. The provision was pronounced inoperative.

"The five per cent discount to American vessels, cannot be given," is the language of the Attorney General quoted by the Secretary, "without impairing the stipulations of existing treaties between the United States and various other powers, and consequently the subsection is inoperative."

Acting on this opinion the Secretary of the Treasury issued an order to customs collectors, instructing them to make no allowance of discount on duties under this provision.

Importers who had relied on the law appealed to the Board of General Appraisers. Their ruling resulted in further confusion, and neither side being satisfied, the case was taken to the Court of Customs Appeals, more than a year after the law had passed.

The Democratic Committee report on the five per cent provision defined it as "a discrimination in favor of American shipping, designed to build up our merchant marine and keep at home millions of dollars now being paid to foreign vessels to carry our products to foreign markets."

Yet although they fully realized the tremendous importance of this measure which they said involved millions of dollars, they lacked the foresight to consult their own Attorney General as to the possibility of enacting it into law. They had a vague idea of what they wanted, adopted a vague method of trying to secure it, and by careless guess work threw the whole matter into the courts.

Furthermore, even if the principle of discrimination had not been questioned by the Attorney General, the provision was so clumsily drafted that three different interpretations have been placed upon it. Counsel for the importers claimed

one interpretation, government attorneys claimed another, and the Board of General Appraisers furnish a third different from all.

During the debate in Congress on this provision, Republican members repeatedly warned the Democrats that, quite apart from its policy, its phraseology was meaningless and should be corrected to become effective.

It was so much breath wasted. The majority stubbornly refused to accept either caution suggestion or amendment. The result has been that this very important clause has thus far proven mere useless verbiage, except to cause litigation and expense to all concerned. About the only purpose it has served is to emphasize the fact that the inefficient methods of Democratic legislators have made it impossible for them to put even their own ideas into effect.

### WATER HEARING WEDNESDAY

A. F. Kirkpatrick of the state engineers office was here on Wednesday from Santa Fe, sitting as a referee in the water matter of Neighbauer vs Nabours involving water on Three Rivers. Senator Fall who recently purchased the Neighbauer place appeared for himself with witnesses while Mr. Nabours was represented by Lee B. Chase of Osceola. Testimony was taken as to the priorities of right on the Three Rivers branch.

The case of Mrs. E. Mathews vs. Gov. McDonald involving the waters at Jake Springs which was also to have been heard before Mr. Kirkpatrick, was continued to June 7th, owing to the illness of the protestant. Mr. Kirkpatrick will return at that time to hear the case and also to make some examinations on Three Rivers.

### AN UNEXPECTED FIND

Justice and Mrs. Massie had quite an exciting experience late Saturday night. Hearing a noise inside the yard investigation disclosed not the expected cow or horse, but a man lying prone on the ground just inside the board fence. Dr. Walker was immediately summoned as the man appeared dead; the doctor found him indeed a dead Mexican—dead drunk—and he was promptly escorted to his proper environment at the "cargel" across the street.

The Commencement Exercises Which Have Been in Progress all Week Will Close To-Night

### CLASS OF FIVE TO RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

Tonight's program at the High School will mark the close of the year's work. This evening a class of two boys and three girls will receive the diploma, the highest honor the school can bestow following an address by Gov. W. C. McDonald. It is also hoped that Mr. Rupert F. The four act playlet, "Down in Dixie," was most vividly enacted by the eighth grade, assisted by pupils from the seventh grade. The actors and actresses showed much careful and intelligent training. Mrs. W. L. Gumm in her graceful style presented the promotion certificates to the class graduating from the eighth grade into the High School, and the program was completed.

Thursday evening was class day and every number was delivered with credit and received a hearty round of applause.

The salutatory was delivered by Emuel Anderson. The speaker not only welcomed the audience to the evening's exercises, but took occasion to point out the value of high school training and to urge loyalty to the home institution.

It is now sold in smaller packages containing only a few doses, for 50 cents or \$1. The drug now is often adulterated.

## ANTI-DRUG LAW WORKING GOOD

Forty to Sixty per cent of the Men and Women Now in Prison are Adapted to the Drug Habit

### VICTIMS RECEIVING FREE TREATMENT

Since the strict enforcement of drastic anti-drug laws in New York has made it almost impossible for dope fiends to buy narcotics the results are both sad and interesting.

"An appalling situation in which drug maniacs are allowed at large," is Ernest K. Coulter's characterization of the present state of affairs in New York. Mr. Coulter represented Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt in the long fight to suppress drug traffic in that city. He was asked to tell what ought to be done to handle the many cases of drug victims who, deprived of cocaine, heroin and other habit forming drugs, are committing acts of violence and filling the city prisons and hospitals.

"I don't believe the people of the city realize the seriousness of the situation," said Mr. Coulter. "It must be understood that these men who rob, assault and kill to get morphine or some similar drug are insane. They are the most dangerous kind of lunatics when the craving comes over them. The drug means more to them than life, and they will never hesitate to sacrifice lives—others and their own—to get the stuff."

"The situation which has arisen is perilous in the extreme, but it is not unexpected, and ample warning of what would come about if the city did not prepare for it, was given a year ago before the Boylan law became effective on July 1, last. The city was told then that it must prepare to handle hundreds—yes, thousands—of unfortunates."

"Commitment of drug habitues to hospitals had been found to be a flat failure, because the hospitals were too overcrowded to keep these cases a sufficient length of time. In addition experience had shown that the hospitals were not the proper places for drug cases, because the clinical or medical treatment needs to be followed by a prolonged social, physical and mental rehabilitation. The prisons were then overloaded with drug users, and we found that in nearly every case the prison terms were too short for treatment to effect anything like a cure."

"Consider this: From 40 per cent to 65 percent of the prisoners are drug users. Leaving out those sentenced for this very thing, from 30 per cent to 50 percent of persons convicted of other offenses are found to be drug users. They have to be treated for this, but the workhouse sentences, for instance, are so short that nothing adequate can be done to rid them of the habit."

The Boylan law, the Vanderbilt and other anti drug crusades and to some extent the war has increased drug prices as much as 1,000 per cent.

A year ago a six ounce can of opium cost the "pipey" or smoker from \$6 to \$10. Now it costs from \$35 to \$55. Sold by the "toy," the smallest and most popular measure, it brought \$1 for first class opium or 50 cents for lower grade. Now Lai Yuen, the best opium, costs \$6 a "toy." Recently 300 six ounce tins of this opium sold for \$15,000 and the buyer expected to make \$3,000 profit.

Cocaine, now selling for \$22 an ounce, could be obtained a year

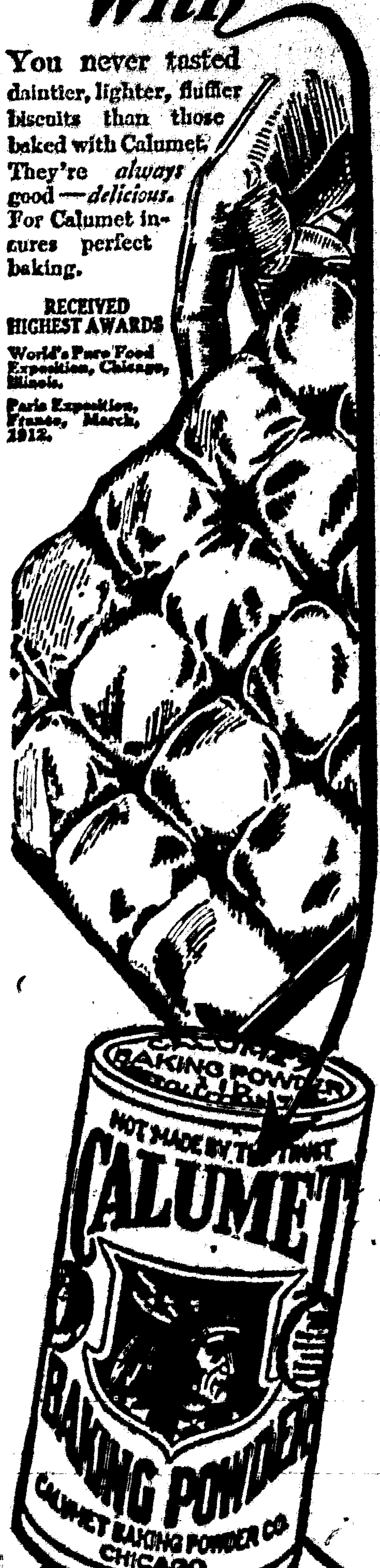

## NOTICIAS DEL SUROESTE

Los cowboys están arreglando un mitin en Las Vegas en julio. Se reunirá un grupo de ganaderos en Magdalena, los 12-14 de mayo. Se ha concedido el contrato para una nueva cárcel en Farmington por la suma de \$2,350.

Fred McFarland dentro de poco principiará los trabajos en el camino entre Logan y Nara Visa. El gran lago formado por el dique de Elephant Butte estará poblado de truchas, carpas y otros peces.

El gobierno de los Estados Unidos establecerá un laboratorio del Bureau de Entomología en Maxwell. Todos los negocios en Albuquerque fueron suspendidos durante el funeral del ex-alcalde Frank McKee.

En Albuquerque se ha dado un permiso para la erección de chozas de sanatorio en las tierras de mesa. James Barry de Clovis compró una hacienda de 14,000 acres sobre el río Pecos, a cuatro millas de Santa Rosa.

Columbus está considerando la posibilidad de establecer una fábrica de escobas y una planta de conservas. Ella R. Clapper, de Red River, condado de Taos, recibió del Gobernador McDonald su comisión de notario público.

El Gobernador McDonald será el principal orador en la dedicación del edificio de Nuevo México en San Diego el 3 de mayo. Casi medio millón de pesos se la suma que representa el valor del ganado expedido de Silver City durante el año 1914.

Los nuevos colonos llegando a la sección de Rana han pagado hasta \$500 por tierras previamente en decaición por el "homestead". El cuerpo de Justo Martínez, que vivía cerca de Pecos, fué pescado del río Pecos de esa. La novedad presenta las marcas de asesinato.

Ahora hay en el condado de Roosevelt 800 más propiedades tituladas que había el año pasado, según dice el asesor de condado McCall. Sabino Olivas fué elegido presidente de la junta sanitaria de ovejas y R. R. Pollock vicepresidente. Robert H. Crows fué reelegido secretario.

El comisionado de tierras de estado ha arreglado la transfeencia de 32,000 acres de tierra en el valle de Pecos, que traerán al estado la suma de \$142,000.

Se ha hecho el primer pago a los acreedores del Primer Banco de Estado de Tucumcari, que hizo bancarota hace un año. El pago es de solo 10 centavos por peso. "Big Boy," un indio de la tribu de los Navajos, fué matado varias millas al norte de Thoreau después de haber el mismo matado a dos policías indios Tom Brown y Willie Largo.

Los colonos hicieron una demanda de tierras públicas de 335,000 acres en el estado durante el mes de marzo, según se reporta por los seis oficiales federales de la oficina de tierras. Charles Hart compró el rancho de L. R. Greathouse en Upton, condado de Roosevelt, por la suma de \$40,000. Más de seiscientas cabezas de ganado entraron en la transfeencia.

Santiago Rivera de Antón Chico, James E. McFarland de Logan, E. E. West de West y J. R. Hull de Clovis han sido comisionados notarios públicos por el Gobernador McDonald. T. R. H. Smith, el banquero de Las Cruces acusado de operaciones fraudulentas en conexión con el Primer Banco de Estado de Las Cruces, consiguió un cambio de tribunal de su pleito en el condado de Socorro.

Se recibió en la oficina de tesoro de estado una remesa de \$1,000 para el camino de Mora-Cleveland en el condado de Mora. La suma precede de los comisionados del condado de Mora. El cuerpo de un niño recién nacido fué encontrado en el talud de Río Grande en Rancho de Atrisco, cerca de Albuquerque. Se supone que el cuerpo flotó hacia abajo en la corriente.

Las estadísticas compiladas por el secretario de estado Adolph P. Hill muestran que en las últimas elecciones hubo 5,418 electores "Hispano-Americanos" más que electores "Anglo-Americanos." El mes de marzo ha sido el más frío que se conoce en el estado, indicando un promedio de 5.3 grados por día debajo de la normal, y un grado y medio por día debajo de cualquiera otro mes registrado.

La construcción del nuevo campamento de Tyrone, a doce millas de Silver City en el distrito minero de los montes del Barro, cuarteles generales de operaciones extensas de la Phelps-Dodge Company, principiará dentro de semana.

Colorado. En Hayden se va a construir un nuevo paradero. El nuevo teatro de Oak Creek ha sido formalmente abierto.

La nueva fábrica de llantas de Arvada está casi terminada. En Limón se está conduciendo una campaña activa de limpieza y pintura. Otra vez los trenes de domingo están operando sobre la línea de Moffat.

El décimo-cuarto mitin anual de los W. O. T. U. de Colorado se celebró en Salida. Hace poco treinta y dos furgones de ganado se explotaron de Fort Collins en un día.

La nueva carretera de Paonia a Somerset está al presente casi completada. John Cross principió el trabajo en sus deberes de administrador de correos de Loveland.

En el condado de Larimer este año se sacrificará la suma de \$50,000 para trabajos de nuevas rutas. La gente de Steamboat Springs y Craig se están regocijando al ver el servicio mejorado de trenes.

Fort Collins votó la emisión de bonos para el agrandamiento del edificio de escuela superior. Los que se ocupan de la venta de forraje para ovejas y corderos están recibiendo precios muy altos.

James Scott, juez de la paz en Tellerburg, recibió un tiro y heridas de cuya gravedad murió más tarde. La producción de oro en Colorado este año sumará probablemente \$25,000,000, ó sea más de \$5,000,000 que en 1914.

Una parada de escuela dominical fué uno de los rasgos de los mitines de despertar de fé religiosa de Bulvin en Fort Collins. Louisville concedió una licencia de explotación de diez años a la Compañía de Teléfonos y Telégrafos Mountain States.

La pequeña Davy Frost salvó a la pobrecita Katherine Guheen del peligro de ahogarse en la zanja del viejo molino en Denver. El Dr. Welles vendió sus minas de Vulcan, que se hallan quince millas al sur de Gunnison, a unas personas de Denver por la suma de \$75,000.

El Juez C. Gunter fué reelegido presidente de la Asociación de alumnos de la Universidad de Virginia al banquete de la sociedad en Denver. Un Sirio muerto y dos están gravemente heridos a resultas de una riña del domingo entre casi cuarenta Sirios y Arabos en su colonia en Walsenburg.

John L. Brock, un capitalista de Alabama, ha comprado 384 acres de tierra irrigada de los Hermanos Prendergast de Broomfield, por la suma de \$38,000. El instituto de Distrito anual de Maestros Normales se celebrará en Fowler del 21 mayo al 10 de junio. Se estima que 200 maestros estarán presentes representando los condados de Baca, Bent, Prowers, Kiowa, Crowley y Otero.

G. A. Nieman de Silverton compró la propiedad anteriormente poseída por la San Antonio Mining Company. La propiedad se halla en la sección minera de la montaña Roja, estando los edificios de la mina en Sheridan Junction. A. A. Edwards de la Poudre Valley Ditch Company, quien, por medio de esta compañía, está en conexión con el distrito de Poudre-Greeley, tiene la autoridad para afirmar que dentro de algunos días se dejará afluir el agua en el tnel de Larame-Poudre.

El superintendente A. L. Swetzer de Monte Vista ha recibido la notificación según cual todos los propietarios de ovejas tendrán que presentar un certificado de inspección de sus rebaños antes de que estos fengan la libertad de entrar en las selvas nacionales de Río Grande. Cincuenta turistas sourtistas de Cleveland pasaron un día en Denver en su rumbo hacia la exposición Panamá-Pacífico.

Steve Delardo, un Italiano, recibió un tiro, al que de súbito sucumbió en Guinare de las manos de John Salvo, un hijo del cantinero de esa población. Al mismo momento Salvo se rindió y fué conducido a la cárcel en Aguilar en donde explicó las circunstancias del crimen.

Cincuenta mil pesos es el valor asignado al bueno del finado Theodore L. Marshall, hombre de negocios retirado, en un testamento presentado en la corte de condado de Denver por su viuda, la Señora Margaret Marshall. La mayor parte de la propiedad consiste en fértiles haciendas en el condado de Weld.

Phillip Kaiser, el Alemán quien fué condenado en la corte de distrito de Fort Collins, acusado de perjurio en conexión con su declaración hecha bajo juramento en su demanda por una licencia de matrimonio, fué sentenciado por el juez Graham a sufrir de uno a dos años de trabajo forzado en la penitenciaría de estado.

## NOTICIAS DE LA ULTIMA SEMANA

Acerca de la Guerra. Según las declaraciones del ministro de la guerra, el General Zupelli, Italia tiene ahora 1,200,000 soldados armados y equipados bien.

El almirantazgo inglés anunció oficialmente que el submarino británico E-15 fué destruido en los Dardanelos por unos botes Ingleses de pliquele. Dos torpederos turcos fueron volados, dice un despacho procedente de Saloniki, al momento en que pasaban en un campo minado por los buques rusos en la entrada del Bosphorus mientras que la flota de Turquía estaba en el mar Negro.

Como balance a su buen éxito en hundir un torpedero turco, que atacó el transporte Mantou al largo de Chios, los Ingleses perdieron el submarino E-15, que, mientras desempeñaba su deber bastante difícil de exploración en los Dardanelos, pasó sobre una mina en Keppez Point. Los tripulantes fueron constituidos presos. Según el reporte turco, están ausentes siete de estos.

Un incendio, principado por el rayo, causó una pérdida de \$15,000 cuando los almacenes de aceite de Barkhausen en Greenbay, Wis., fueron destruidos. Lluvias recias, causando gran daño a la propiedad, se reportan de la parte sudoeste de Texas. En la mayor parte de la tormenta el granizo sucedió a la lluvia.

Los mineros en huelga al total de cerca 2,000 se reunieron en Dillonvale, Ohio, en donde se tuvo un servicio memorial para los hombres matados en la huelga de Colorado el año pasado. Los beneficios totales hechos por la Utah Copper Company para el año expirando el 31 de diciembre, 1914, fueron de \$3,730,421.90, según lo estima el décimo-reporte anual de la compañía, cuyo ejemplar fué recibido en las oficinas ejecutivas en Colorado Springs.

En el Vedado, uno de los distritos más selectos de la Habana, Cuba, se han descubiertos tres casos de plaga bubónica. Es posible que la reina Helena de Italia pierda el brazo derecho a resultas de heridas recibidas hace siete años mientras trabajando entre las víctimas del terremoto de Messina.

El Baron Augustus Julius Clemens Herbert de Reuter, director de la Compañía de Telégrafos Reuter, se suicidó en Reigate, Surrey. El enojo causado por la muerte reciente de su esposa sería, dicen, la razón del acto.

Jimmy Reagan se ganó una decisión contra Billy Wagner en una partida de quince vueltas en Denver. Entre los cuarenta y ocho estados de la unión se hallan diez y ocho en que se permite el juego de pelea a puñaladas.

Los "Osos" de Denver terminaron su periodo de ejercicios de primavera con una victoria de 6 contra 1 sobre las "Papas" de Greeley, Colo. El Rev. C. J. A. Pahl, un misionario bautista, llegó a Pomona, Cal., en su última etapa de un viaje de 268,000 millas alrededor del mundo a bicicleta.

Jack Johnson, el ex-campeón de peso grande, y su esposa, salieron para España a bordo del vapor Maris Cristina. De España Johnson tiene la intención de continuar el viaje a Inglaterra.

La planta de Gary, Ind., de la American Bridge Company reanunció sus trabajos dando empleo a 450 hombres. William L. Miller, de 101 años de edad, anunció su casamiento en Joplin, Mo., con la Señora Nancy E. Pike, de sesenta.

Los jefes políticos y financieros de la nación estaban presentes en Providence al funeral de Nelson W. Aldrich, por treinta años senador de los Estados Unidos para Rhode Island.

La corte suprema decidió que el estado de Georgia no había negado a Leo N. Frank ningún derecho, según la constitución federal, sentenciándole a muerte por el asesinato de Mary Phagan, una muchacha obrera de fábrica en Atlanta.

En un discurso pronunciado en Nueva York en una comida, delante de la Asociación de la Prensa el Presidente Wilson declaró de una manera definitiva su idea de verdadera neutralidad y de los deberes de los Estados Unidos en conexión con la guerra europea.

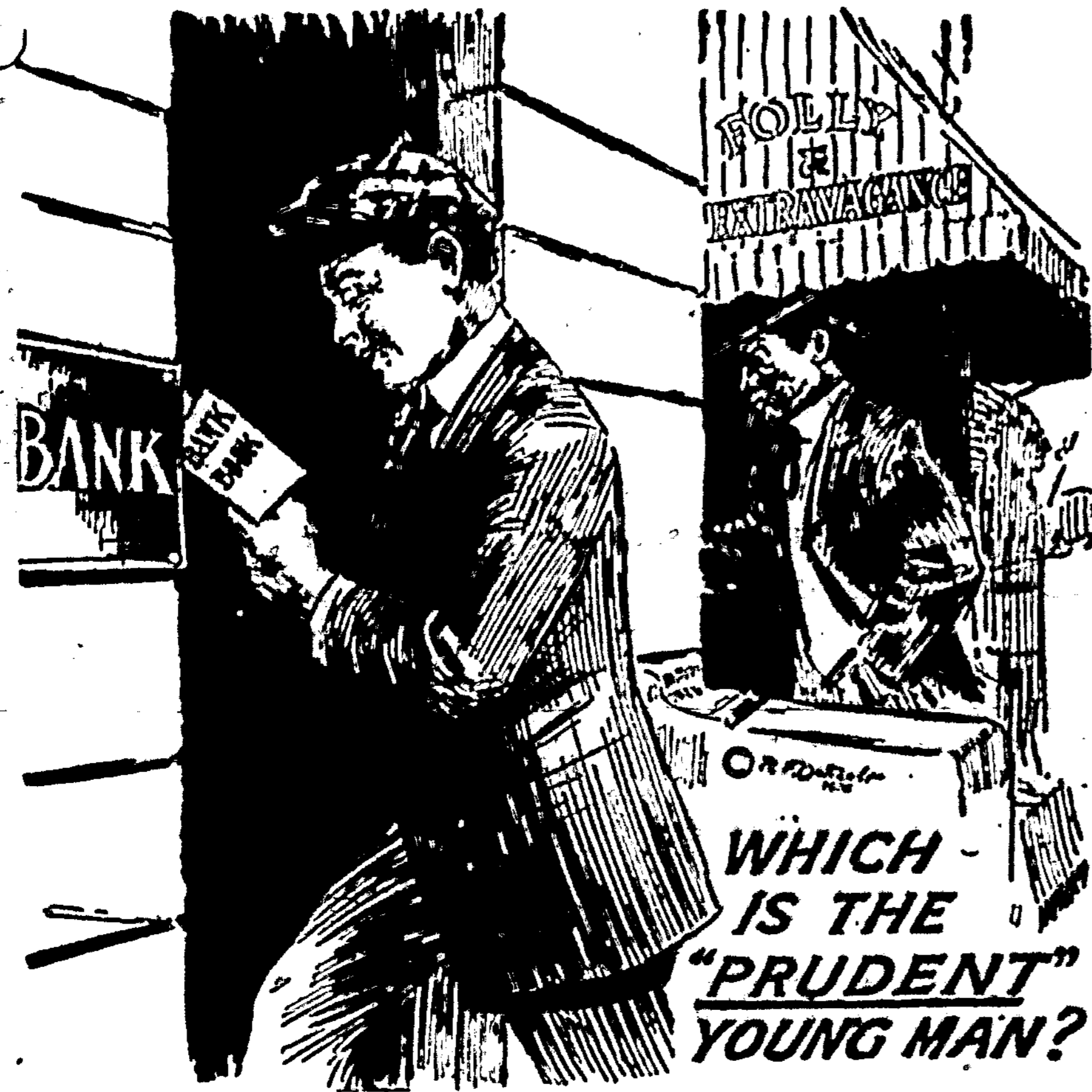

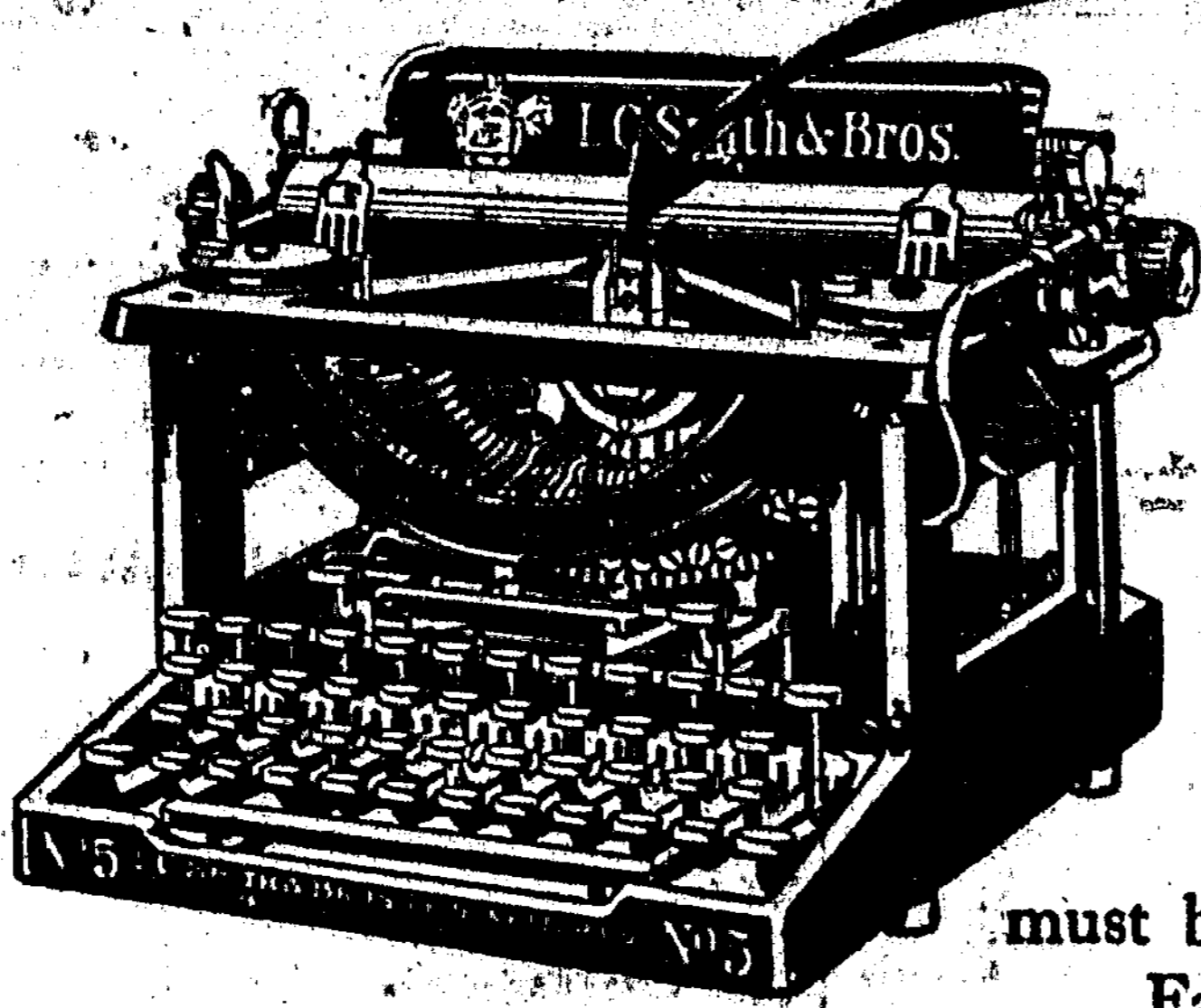

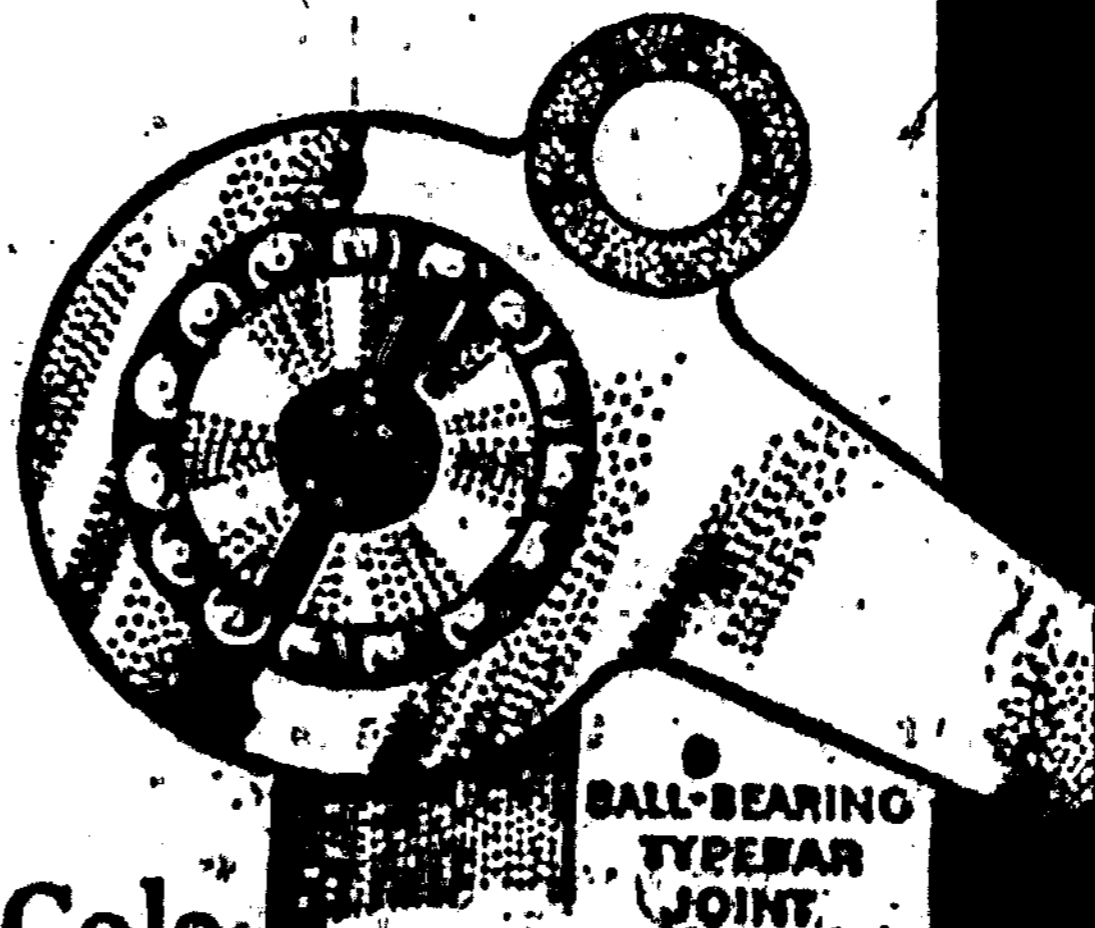

# GERMANS SINK NORWAY SHIPS

TEUTON REPORT DECLARES BRITISH ARE AGAIN BEATEN IN CLASH NEAR YPRES.

# GREECE READY FOR WAR

GERMANS POUR TROOPS INTO FLANDERS TO FOLLOW FIRST SUCCESS IN SPRING CLASH.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

London, April 26.—The crews of the Norwegian bark Oskar and Eva were landed at Bury Island, Scotland, by the steamship Anna flying the Danish flag. A German submarine overhauled the barks about 170 miles northeast of Longstone and allowed their crews ten minutes to board lifeboats. The submarine then shelled the vessels.

Subsequently the German submarine stopped the Danish steamer Anna, and ordered her to take aboard the crews of the Oskar and Eva. The barks were bound for Scottish ports.

The Norwegian steamship Capri, which sailed from Baltimore April 6 for Christiania by way of Ardrossan, Scotland, struck a mine at a point fifteen miles northeast of Tory Island, and sank, according to a dispatch received here by Lloyd's Agency from Inishtrahull, Ireland. The crew of the Capri was landed at Inishtrahull.

The Danish steamer Nidaros, 631 tons net, has been captured by a German warship in the North Sea, and taken into port at the Island of Sylt, one of the North Frisian Islands. The Nidaros sailed from Aarhus, Denmark, with a cargo of agricultural products.

The freighter Ruth was sunk by a German submarine when about 100 miles east of May Island in the North Sea. The crew was rescued and landed at Leith, Scotland. The Ruth left Leith with a cargo of coal for Gothenburg. Captain Anderson, her skipper, who is a Swede, reports that the first torpedo discharged by the submarine missed its mark. The second torpedo struck the Ruth amidships, wrecking the vessel. The sixteen members of the crew were all Swedes. They drifted about in small boats for twelve hours before being picked up.

Christakis Zographos, foreign minister of Greece, is quoted by the paper Information, in Paris, as declaring that Greece was ready to unite with the Allies in the operations at the Dardanelles if invited to do so.

The attack in Flanders has been transferred to the British lines held by the Canadians, and for two days the men from the Dominion have been engaged in a deadly contest with the Germans. The latter state in their official report that they have made further progress toward Ypres and that the British counter attack has been repulsed.

The French account declares that the Allies' counter attacks continue with success and that the British hold all their positions, and repeats the charge that the Germans are using bombs containing asphyxiating gases.

Taking advantage of the flood conditions the German general staff transferred a large number of troops to the west. It is believed that 500,000 new German troops have reached Flanders, and that more guns and material are to be used than were provided in the original attempts to destroy the allied armies in the west.

## ROCKEFELLER ASSAILS CRITIC.

Declares Walsh Statement About Letters Unfair and "Indefensible."

New York.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., gave out a statement in reference to the correspondence between himself and L. M. Bowers, chairman of the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company, which was made public by Frank P. Walsh, chairman of the United States Commission on Industrial Relations.

Mr. Rockefeller characterized as false the conclusion which Mr. Walsh drew from the correspondence.

Mr. Rockefeller asserts that Mr. Walsh had drawn inferences without ascertaining whether they were correct, a "proceeding which is wholly indefensible."

He said further that he would be glad to appear to give additional testimony before the commission at any time, "for we are desirous that the public shall have all the facts."

Another Earthquake in Italy. Avellino, Italy.—A severe earthquake shock occurred here Saturday afternoon and lasted several seconds.

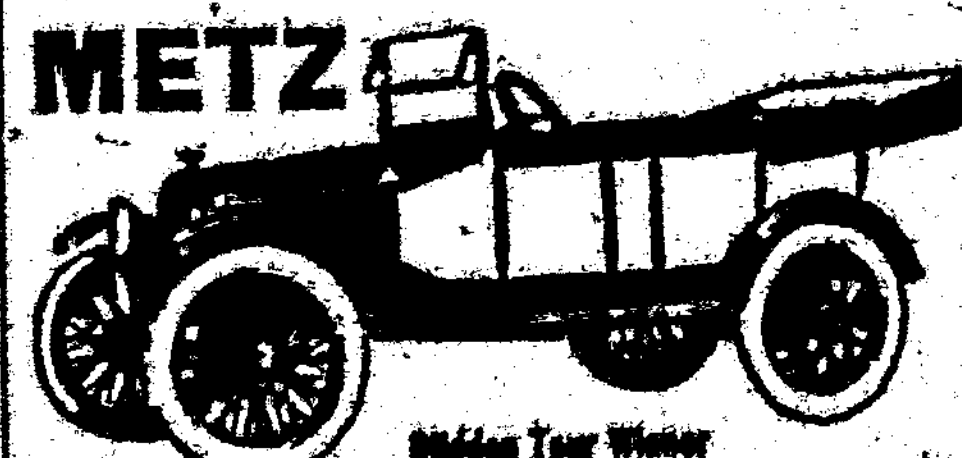

## UTILIZE A NATURAL POWER

Volcanic Steam Found Valuable in Italy for a Variety of Useful Purposes.

Clouds of sulphurous vapors fill the air in the region about Lardarello, in northern Tuscany, Italy, and the odor of hydrogen sulphide is plainly noticeable for miles around. Many hot springs are also to be found in this volcanic region and numerous jets of steam at pressures as high as three and a half atmospheres and with temperatures up to 750 degrees F. flow from fissures and crevices in the earth. The springs of the region and this steam are strongly impregnated with borlic acid, which is extricated at Lardarello in a plant which utilizes the steam for generating power and for supplying heat in the various processes in which heat is required.

In the generation of power at the borlic acid plant the steam is conducted into low-pressure cylinder engines which drive the various kinds of machinery in use. A similar engine is used for driving a dynamo which generates electricity for lighting the plant and the homes of the people living in the vicinity. The natural steam is also used by the people of Lardarello for heating and cooking purposes. It is now believed that the heat of the steam will soon prove to be of greater value than the borlic acid produced.—The Pathfinder.

Also a liberal toxine to be given compulsorily to some of the most persistent offenders. Last year there were numerous cases of typhoid-pneumonia in this place several of which proved fatal. In every instance, except one, where these cases occurred and in that case the family boarded where the disease broke out—the people kept their cows closely around their premises, and especially near their wells. Now experts on sanitation tell us that wells furnish a natural drainage for surface waters and all surface impurities for about as many feet laterally as the well is deep, so in order to have pure water it is absolutely necessary to keep the surface pure—or in other words if you don't want to drink filthy barn yard juice you must keep your barnyard away from your wells. The same conditions that prevailed here last year prevail today and yet these people when their families take sick, blame their hard luck on Providence, or the man in the moon, but Providence will probably continue to frown on their want of good horse sense, and the man in the moon will continue to smile seriously down on their newly made graves and their double-entry doctor bills.
