Yet the common housefly is more dangerous than these most dreaded wild beasts—in fact, the most dangerous animal on earth. Flies slay more people than the ferocious denizens of the jungle—because they carry disease-breeding germs from sick people to well people, from impure and decayed food to pure food. And when they do this the well person turns sick and in many cases dies, and pure food begins to decay, and then when eaten by a well person, it makes them sick and often kills them.

The fly is born in filth. It grows up to be nature's scavenger and a messenger of death.

In addition to the fly's two claws, each of its six feet is supplied with two sticky pads. Disease germs by the thousands stick to these pads and, when the fly walks over your hands or face, or the face of your baby, a trail is left on the skin. That is why you should clean up your premises and swat the fly.

MORE ABOUT THE INCOME TAX LAW

In the Report on the Income Tax Law There are at Least 25 Imperfections Demanding Correction by Congress

ENTIRE ACT SHOULD BE RECONSTRUCTED

"Apart from specific defects, the structure of the act as a whole is open to the gravest objections."

The criticism above quoted refers to the income tax law, passed by the Democratic Congress as a part of the tariff bill. It is taken from the report of the Taxation Committee of the American Bar Association. That report was non-partisan, made merely for the purpose of having the law improved from a formal and technical point of view. It was an extended, exhaustive and scientific analysis, conducted by men of the highest standing in the legal profession. Their conclusions therefore may be regarded as fair and impartial.

Their verdict is a severe arraignment of the careless, haphazard methods employed by the present administration in the enactment of one of its most important laws.

In this report on the income tax law there are pointed out no less than twenty-five manifest imperfections demanding correction by Congress. Without amendment it is said that the intent of the law can be reached only by judicial interpretation, involving tedious, expensive litigation.

With reference to provisions for the return that tax payers must make, the report declares:

"It is most unfortunate that there should be any doubt as to what this precise duty is. Here, if anywhere, the law should be clear and explicit. The provisions should be clear and explicit. The provisions should be placed together in intelligible terms, instead of being scattered, involved with other provisions and phrased in obscure language as they now are. The act conveys the impression that the farmers had not reached any definite conclusion in their own minds concerning the requirement of personal returns."

With no thought of making political capital, this report specifically outlines the one weakness that dominates the legislative methods of the present administration, saying:

"Political exigencies demanded the speedy enactment of the law, and there was not sufficient time for the consideration of detail."

Finally this Committee of the American Bar Association recommends a revision of the law that shall "extend to its form as well as to its substance."

"The entire act should be reconstructed," concludes their report, "and there should be placed upon the statute books an income tax law so arranged and expressed as to be convenient for reference, consistent in all its parts and capable of being understood by a citizen of average intelligence."

There is no good reason for the

flagrant imperfections in the income tax law. They could have been corrected by thoughtful, intelligent consideration, and their frequent occurrence in the act is still further proof of the needless haste, carelessness and inaccuracy that characterizes the enactment of laws by the Democratic Congress.

GETS THE THIRD MAN

A couple of weeks ago Hol Herring, of Corona, discovered that a bunch of cattle had been stolen and taken to Alamogordo to be disposed of. He got down to Alamogordo in time to save the cattle and arrest Jesus Flores, who had the stock in charge and who was conducting the sale. He brought Flores to Carrizozo and lodged him in the county jail, and after a little confidential talk with him, Herring, accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Baird went out into the wilds and arrested Alejandro Martinez, whom Flores claimed was a guilty party and brought him down to the county seat for safe keeping. A little later, Mr. Baird took another ride in his automobile and returned with Lorenzo Torres, who is now in jail, charged with being implicated in the theft of the same bunch of cattle. Flores will go before Judge Masie next Thursday and tell the court what he knows about the cattle he had in his possession, after which the court will pass on his case. In the preliminary given Martinez last Monday, the defendant waived and was placed under bond in the sum of \$1000 to guarantee his appearance before the county inquirers next October. The cattle found in the possession of Flores belonged to two or three parties, and among them were some stock belonging to Jess Jenkins, of Corona. Mr. Jenkins has had a great deal of trouble with horse and cattle thieves in the months which have passed; and it was for the surreptitious handling of some of his blooded stock that Daniel Sandoval was apprehended last fall by Deputy Sheriff Herring and bound over to the grand jury—but who, in company with the Raffles who bilked the Exchange Bank out of a cool hundred, went out into the rural precincts of Lincoln county one evening when the jailer wasn't looking and has failed to return. It is believed by the officers, and a few who have been losing stock for some time, that a well organized band of operators are associated in parts of the country north of Corona, and it seems to be their business now to break up the organization. From information the officers now have in regard to the men now in confinement, they are of the opinion they have made a pretty good start, with rather interesting prospects for further important developments.

NOTICIAS DEL SUROESTE

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Nuevo México. El condado de Dona Ana ha comprado un automóvil para el uso del alguacil. Julio 22 ha sido designado día de Albuquerque en las ferias de San Francisco. George Roslington fue nombrado recibidor de la Compañía de Tracción de Albuquerque. Del valle de Espanola se reportan buenas perspectivas acerca de la producción de frutas. Cinco furgones de seda y uno de caballitos de polo pasaron por Gallup destinados para Chicago. La Asociación Nacional Editorial estará festejada a la ocasión de su viaje a las exposiciones de California. Rodeo, condado de Grant, tiene un inmenso depósito de nitrato de sodio de un valor comercial, descubierta en 1913. La última idea en el asunto de recreación para los hombres de negocio de Roswell parece ser la de un club de golf. J. E. Minner y los hijos de la sección de Farmington esta estación vendieron por \$24,000 de lana y ovejas. Los cultivadores de maíz de Escoba en la sección de Portales han realizado \$35,000 de la venta del producto del año pasado. Se ha hablado de un precio de 20 centavos para la lana y \$2 para el trigo, y ahora el cobre parece alcanzar a 25 centavos. Ramer, esposa del Secretario de estado Ramer, sufrió una operación para un tumor en el hospital de San José en Denver. Se presentó un veredicto de \$1,000 para la Señora Phoebe A. Cunningham, en un pleito de heridas personales, en contra de la ciudad de Denver. La famosa campaña de la libertad símbolo de la Libertad, llegará a Denver en donde se quedará poco tiempo, solamente seis horas, el 10 de julio. Lella, la hija de siete años del Sr. y de la Sra. NOTICIAS DE LA ULTIMA SEMANA

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Acerca de la Guerra. En la Cámara de los liores en Londres el Secretario de la guerra Kitchener dió que tenía necesidad de 300,000 otros hombres para formar nuevos batallones. La Official Gazette publica un decreto por el cual todas las líneas y estaciones ferroviarias en Italia están puestas bajo la supervisión de las autoridades militares. La oficina de la guerra en Berlín oficialmente declara que los Alemanes capturaron 7,000 rusos en los dos días de batalla que precedieron el pasaje del río San, cerca de Presmyal. Según un despacho procedente de los cuarteles oficiales de Londres, transmitido por el consúl ruso en Urumiak, Persia, seis mil Armenios han sido matados en Van, Armenia, Turquía Asiática. La confirmación del reporte anterior acerca de la destrucción en los Dardanelos del submarino australiano AE-2 está contenida en una comunicación oficial publicada por el almirantazgo en Londres. Se ha declarado una revolución en Trieste, según dice un despacho al Idea Nacional de Roma; telegrafado de la frontera. El telegrama declara que cuarenta y siete mujeres fueron matadas y más de 300 heridas. La batalla se continúa sobre una frente de 200 millas en Galicia desde la boca del río San hasta Kolomea, según dicen las noticias de Petrograd. Los Rusos están mandando más tropas lo más pronto posible para oponerse con éxito a los diez cuerpos de ejército alemanes y los veinticuatro austriacos, cerca de 1,360,000 hombres, que operarán en esa región. Osts. La proposición de "Homs rule" relativa a los liores, fué votada en la elección de Denver. El Dr. Amos W. Barber, exgobernador de Wyoming, falleció en Rochester, Minn. El cuerpo estará transportado a Cheyenne en donde lo enterrarán. Los gobernadores de siete estados del oeste se reunieron en Seattle, Wash., para una conferencia de tres días. El asunto principal de la discusión fué el de maderas, irrigación, sitios de fuerza motriz y tierras públicas. El endorso de la nota del Presidente Wilson a Alemania y una oferta de 20,000 hombres para el ejército de los Estados Unidos en caso de guerra con Alemania fueron votados en Mattoon, Ill., por el Gran Consejo de la Orden Mejorada de Hombres Rojos de Illinois. El vapor Finland, de la línea Panam-Pacífico, el primero de los vapores grandes que han sido asignados a la línea New York-San Francisco, entró en el puerto de San Diego habiendo hecho el viaje de Nueva York por el canal de Panamá en quince días y diez horas. Llamado a la puerta por un golpe, John Ulrey, de 24 años, un ranchero que reside cerca de Grand Valley, recibió un tiro y probablemente fué fatalmente herido, de las manos de un hombre desconocido. La Señora Ulrey, su esposa de tres días, acudió a la puerta al oír el tiro y encontró a su marido caído en un derrame de sangre. Con la declaración que iba a "hacer algo muy gracioso" L. T. Engood, de veintidós años, un experto en negocios de comolones, calmadamente sacó su revolver, se lo puso en el pecho, en la oficina del hotel Navarro en Denver y, sonriendo, disparó. La bala entró en el corazón y el hombre se cayó muerto. Cuatro personas, presentes, vieron la tragedia. El jurado médico del crimen presentó un veredicto estableciendo que la Señora Kate Bell, cuyas cenizas fueron halladas entre las ruinas de su casa en Mineral Hill, murió por accidente, de un incendio de origen desconocido. Los restos del cuerpo fueron llevados a Las Vegas. Una telegrama recibida por la comisión de corporación de estado de W. J. Black, director general del tráfico de pasajeros del ferrocarril de Santa Fé, anuncia que se han hecho "reducciones radicales" en las tarifas de verano para turistas de los varios puntos del estado de Missouri a Las Vegas y Santa Fé. Washington. La Señora Ida Saffren Walters no tendrá que apurarse hasta que jueces para el enterramiento de sus dos niños hasta que venga al mundo su tercer niño. El juez Walters otorgó una suspensión en el caso hasta octubre próximo en conformidad con la demanda del promotor de distrito Martín de Nueva York.

FOR NATIONAL DAY

Plea is Made That Memorial Observance Be Made General Throughout Country.

Forty-seven years ago tender and patriotic hearts first consecrated one day to the tear and to the laurel. The grass on the graves of the blue and the gray had shown green but two seasons after the close of the great Civil war when the mournful duty of decking the last resting place of the departed brave formally began. Since that time the beautiful memorial plan has expanded until now, on the day of the annual remembrance, hundreds of thousands of the living place flowers on the hallowed mounds of hundreds of thousands of dead. But it is a melancholy fact that while the reverent custom has constantly spread in observance, sectionalism has attended the yearly remembrance, is the comment of Richard G. Conover. Not in the way of narrowness of observance, for both in the North and the South the graves of former enemies have not been forgotten in the local decoration. Blue and gray alike have received their equal quota of respect. It is in the deliberate setting apart of different memorial days that the traces of sectionalism remain. A country united for half a century has not yet fixed a day of common tribute to brave men who died for a principle. Time ripe to unite on Day. With the coming of the northern Memorial day of 1915 there also comes from veterans and patriotic men and women a desire to unite in one great national holiday every year the task of honoring the Federal and Confederate fighting men who have joined the great majority. That the time is ripe for the accomplishment of such a fitting project was evidenced at the half century reunion of the blue and gray on the battlefield.

Venerated and Exalted. Never before was there a Memorial day when so few veterans of the great war needed the bread given of the

of Gettysburg. There where they had frantically sought to shed each other's blood fifty years before the grizzled veterans, many on both sides clad in the same uniforms, embraced, drank from the same canteen and reposed at night, shoulder to shoulder, under the same tent. Any differences there might have been remaining between the living Federals and Confederates were then and there forever banished. On the same day North and South met to pay tribute to valor. In the same way it is proposed now to have the blue and gray all over the country, mourned annually on the same day.

GEN. MEADE'S RANK

Writer Thinks He Has Not Been Accorded His Proper Place by Historians.

By J. A. WATROUS. Lieutenant Colonel U. S. Army (Retired). HIS great achievements, towering military genius, steadfastness of purpose and his natural and acquired ability successfully to handle vast armies and win great battles, never losing a great battle, placed General Grant at the head of the long list of military heroes developed in the Civil war. He will hold that rank in history for all time.

But what of his lieutenants? It has come to be common in speaking of a few to give rank as follows: Sherman, Sheridan, Thomas and Meade. Other distinguished characters follow, but in this paper their names need not be recalled. Were one to say that Maj. Gen. George Gordon Meade should follow the name of Grant in enumerating important characters in the army one would endanger himself to a mob. But would that be so far out of the way?

The greatest single victory won during the war was achieved under the leadership of Meade. Grant won no single battle that would compare with Gettysburg in importance and its influence in settling the mighty contest. Vicksburg, in its influence, ranked next to Gettysburg. Even Grant conceded that the battle of Gettysburg was of vaster importance and had greater influence in the work of crushing the Confederates than that of Vicksburg. Sherman won no single victory equal to Gettysburg, yet he will always be recognized as one of the greatest generals of his age, and justly ranks next to Grant. Sheridan's victories, even the greatest of them, bear no comparison to Gettysburg. Thomas' splendid conduct at Chickamugus and his great victory at Nashville will always be regarded as proof of generalship of an exceedingly high type. Yet they were not such victories as Meade won at Gettysburg, under the most trying circumstances—circumstances as depressing almost as those under which Thomas won his greatest battle, that of Nashville.

No one would suggest that the roll be called in this way: Grant, Meade, Sherman, Sheridan and Thomas, or, as I think it should have been called from the start: Grant, Sherman, Meade, Thomas and Sheridan. I am only saying that which I hope will have some bearing in the future toward giving to Meade the high rank his superb services entitled him to—the credit that is his due.

Would Make for Perfect Accord. At no place or spot is the human heart more touched than when bending over a grave. If a spirit of good will and forgiveness is generated at a hallowed spot its influence is far-reaching. If animosities are recalled at the grave, the bitterness is apt to increase. A uniting all over the land on the one day in remembrance of the brave dead starts at the grave the holy work of perfect accord.

underlying loyalty, gratitude and devotion of their countrymen. But never was there a Memorial day when so many Americans who never were soldiers had need of paying this tribute to the men who risked everything and often lost all that the nation might live in safety, power and glory and go on to wider service to the world, leading the march of mankind. So the balance holds true. The ranks of the heroes are thinned by time, but the millions who reap where they sowed and rejoice in the fruits of their devotion and valor are a mightier host than ever. And in another sense there is an unflinching adjustment of changing conditions: There are fewer survivors of the heroic and terrible four years' struggle for the Union, but they are venerated and exalted as they never were when their ranks were full and their numbers made them a great power in the affairs of the nation. Unwholesome sympathy incapacitates one for serving others, whether the need be physical, mental or moral. -Annie Payson Call.

BAROMETER OF LIVE-TOWN

The best way to form an impres-
sion of a neighboring city is to look
at its newspapers. They are the
true barometers of business in a
town. If these journals are poorly
printed and sloppily written and if
there is little advertising, the com-
munity is almost invariably run
down. If the newspapers have a
clean typographical appearance,
and show the expenditures of money
for good reporting and writing, if
the advertising columns are well
filled, that community is going
right ahead.

People who may consider this
town as a place of residence send
for copies of its newspapers first to
see what is going on here, second to
learn how much public spirit the
town has. Our residents are con-
tinually sending away the home
paper and in so far as it is good
appearing, it makes friends for the
town and spreads its good reputa-
tion.

Newspaper publishers are gener-
ally with any growth of business
they may gain. Nine-tenths of
such growth is almost always put
back into the paper, in enlarging
plant and increasing the forces of
workers. The moral is, that if you
want a good impression of your
town spread abroad, help the home
paper to enlarge and improve its
facilities.

BURIAL CEREMONIES REFUSED

On Monday, early, Damaris Mar-
rujo, a Spanish American citizen of
Tularosa, died after a short illness.
His father was Victor Marrujo, one
of the builders of the Tularosa
Catholic church. It appears that
the deceased, a life long Catholic,
has for a year or more past, neglect-
ed the confessional and for that
reason we are informed Father Luc-
ian Migeon refused to toll the church
bell or to hold mass for him. The
deceased was a member of the local
lodge of the Alianza Hispano-
Americana and Clovis B. Aguilar,
president of same, appointed a
committee, consisting of Braulio
Dian, Benito Duran and Higinio
Chaves, to wait on the Father and
determine the reason for such pro-
cedure and to request that he ex-
tend the church ceremonies to the
deceased. The committee reported
that the Father refused to toll the
bell; to say mass and that he also
refused to give his sanction to the
body being buried in the Catholic
cemetery and threatened excom-
munication for all who assisted in
the burial in the cemetery.

The committee asked the Father
why he refused ceremonies for this
life long Catholic when it is remem-
bered that he tolled the bell and
said mass for R. S. Connell, who
was not known to be a Catholic.
The Father stated that Connell had
contributed financially to the sup-
port of the church. The lodge on
Tuesday afternoon disregarded the
Father and buried the body in the
cemetery at a plot selected by
Nicanor Bruenas, a relative of the
deceased. Considerable local inter-
est is being taken in the affair.—
Tularosa Valley Tribune.

ABOUT THE WAR

The British steamer Drumcree was torpedoed by a German submarine, it was announced in London. Her crew was saved, according to a dispatch from Cardiff.

A royal decree under which all railroad lines and stations in Italy are placed under the supervision of the military authorities is published by the Official Gazette.

A revolution has broken out at Trieste, according to a message to the Rome, Italia National, telegraphed from the frontier. The dispatch states that forty-seven women were killed and over 300 injured.

Eight of the fourteen members of the crew of the small government steamer Christine were drowned when that steamer was rammed and sunk by a Canadian submarine off the island of Orleans.

Italy has asked Switzerland to take charge of Italian interests in Germany. The Swiss federal council has accepted the charge. At the same time Switzerland has taken over diplomatic German interests in Italy.

The Austrian report says: "The allied Germanic troops are gaining ground in the east and southeast of Galicia. We captured an additional 5,600 prisoners in battles along the upper Danester. In one section to the north of Sambor, the Russians were driven from their main defensive positions."

A dispatch to the Daily News from Copenhagen says: "It is stated that the Germans have captured Riga, on the gulf of Riga, in northwest Russia. A private dispatch reports a big naval battle in the Baltic." Riga is Russia's principal port on the Baltic side from Petrograd. It has a population of about 300,000.

London advices of the 21st say a state of war exists between Italy and her former allies, Austria and Germany although no formal declaration was made. The Austrians have withdrawn their troops and customs guards from the frontier at Ponte Caffaro and Lodrone after burning the bridges, the telegraph and telephone lines and the electric light apparatus. Other bridges on the frontier have been mined as active hostilities begin.

WESTERN

The home rule (liquor) proposition was carried in the Denver city election.

Lassen's peak bubbled over again Friday and sent a river of mud cascading down the mountain side near Redding, Cal.

The body of former Gov. Amos W. Barber of Wyoming, who died in Rochester, Minn., arrived in Cheyenne, accompanied by Percy B. Hoyt and Mrs. Barber, the widow.

A provisional quarantine against all livestock from the state of Arizona, California, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington was declared by the Missouri board of agriculture.

Radical reduction in freight rates from California to eastern points was predicted before the National Wholesale Grocers' Association, in their ninth annual convention at San Francisco.

Indorsement of President Wilson's note to Germany and an offer of 20,000 men for the United States army in the event of war with Germany were voted at Mattoon, Ill., by the great council of the Illinois Improved Order of Red Men.

WASHINGTON

Several popular demonstrations because of the food shortage have occurred in the Mexican capital within the last few days.

Two of the submarines engaged in the Atlantic fleets war game off the coast were disabled, and were taken in tow for Newport to be repaired.

Confederation is out between Mexico, in the Mexican oil fields, and England, setting up one of the British navy's principal oil supply sources, according to State Department advices.

The Supreme Court affirmed the decision of the Ninth United States Circuit Court of Appeals in annulling five patents to Oregon leads held by the South-Kill Lumber Company because of fraud in entry.

FOREIGN

A new Portuguese cabinet has been definitely formed.

The French aviator, Moreau, fell 1,400 feet at Melun, twenty-seven miles southeast of Paris, and was killed.

The formation of a non-partisan cabinet for the period of the war is an established fact, according to London reports.

Sir Edgar Speyer has sent a letter to Premier Asquith resigning his privy councillorship and requesting also the revocation of his baronetcy.

The newly formed Portuguese cabinet has decided, it was announced at Lisbon, to maintain an absolutely neutral attitude toward all political parties.

A royal decree issued in Rome provides that all foreigners in Italy must register with the police within three days. Failure to meet the requirements of the decree will be punished by arrest and a fine.

Two thousand men, women and children joined in bread riots at Hermosillo, capital of Sonora state, and looted fifteen stores, two of them American, the rest Chinese, according to reports reaching Nogales, Ariz.

At Ramsgate, England, a coroner's jury returned a verdict of "wilful murder" against Emperor William in the case of John Smith, who died as the result of shock following injuries sustained in the Zeppelin raid.

There are nearly 1,000,000 Americans, Englishmen, Frenchmen, Russians, Italians and Serbians now in Switzerland who will receive protection from the Swiss federal government in the event of Italy's entrance into the war.

Senator Frietas, who shot and dangerously wounded Joao Chagas, president of the new Portuguese cabinet at Lisbon, was slain at the Entrocamento railway station by a soldier who witnessed the attack on Senator Chagas. Chagas is reported recovering.

The resignation of the veteran sailor, Lord Fisher, from his post of first sea lord of the admiralty, because he and his nominal civilian superior, Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, have been unable to work together, is probably the first step toward a sweeping reorganization of the British government.

SPORTING NEWS

The Goodwood races, one of the fashionable sporting events of England, have been definitely abandoned this year.

At Milwaukee, Ritchie Mitchell, lightweight contender, outboxed and outpointed Ad Wolgast in six rounds of a ten-round bout.

Johnny Griffiths of Akron, Ohio, won the decision over Joe Mandot of New Orleans in an eight-round bout at Memphis, Tenn.

Charles Moore, world's champion at three-cushion billiards, defeated Alfredo De Oro, former champion, by a score of 63 to 49 in the first round of their 100-point match at New York.

Smashing all records for transcontinental auto trips, E. G. Baker arrived in New York from San Diego, Cal. He made the trip in eleven days, seven hours and fifteen minutes, driving the car the entire route himself.

Stanley Yoskum of Denver was given the decision over Jimmy Reagan of San Francisco after twenty rounds of the roughest, toughest wrestling match ever witnessed in a Denver arena, at the Colorado Athletic Club.

The Oklahoma University tennis team, Dean and Monett at Chicago, defeated M. James and H. James of Northwestern University in doubles, 5-7, 7-5, 5-1, 7-5. M. James defeated Monett in singles, 6-1, 6-2, and Dean defeated H. James, 6-2, 6-3.

The American Automobile Association at its annual meeting in Boston re-elected John A. Wilson of Franklin, Pa., a cousin of President Wilson, as president. Except for the choice of P. J. Walker of California as vice president, all other officers were re-elected.

GENERAL

Mrs. Hetty Green, the richest woman in the world, has moved back to Hoboken.

Supreme Court Justice Hendrick signed an order transferring Harry K. Thaw from the Tombs to the custody of the sheriff in Ludlow street jail in New York.

President Wilson's stand in the international crisis was approved by the Lake Mohonk, N. Y., conference on international arbitration at the conclusion of its twenty-first annual meeting.

J. Edwards Addicks, former financier and once political power in Delaware, was sent to Ludlow street jail in New York in default of a payment of \$15,475, due on a judgment in supplementary proceedings instituted by Hiram M. Burton, the creditor.

Motor Dishwashing.

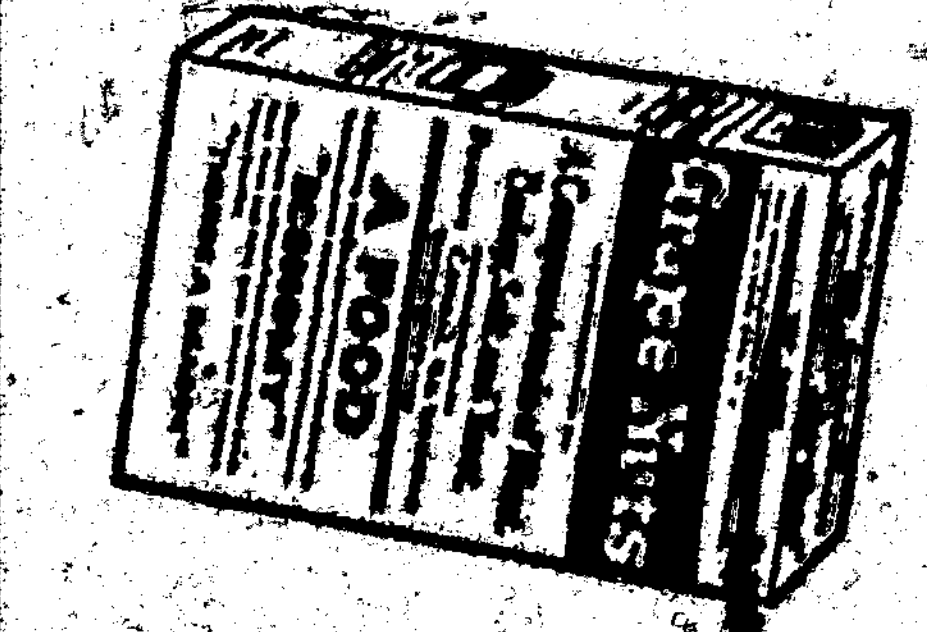
A recent invention that Modern Mechanics tells of is a motor-driven dishwasher. Of course, in large hotels dishes have long been washed by machinery under hot water jets, but this invention is for the family kitchen, although the larger size is made for restaurants and hotels. There is a container which holds wire trays in which the dishes are placed. This is filled with hot luds. At the bottom, which runs to a point, is a dasher that is rotated rapidly by a small electric motor. This forces the water up and between the dishes, cleansing them thoroughly in a few minutes. The dishes are not merely sprayed, but swept by waves of hot soapy water, and as the trays are stationary there is no risk of breakage. The conical shape of the bottom of the container insures drainage. With the wide use of electricity in houses here is available another labor-lightening device like the vacuum sweeper and the electric clothes washer.

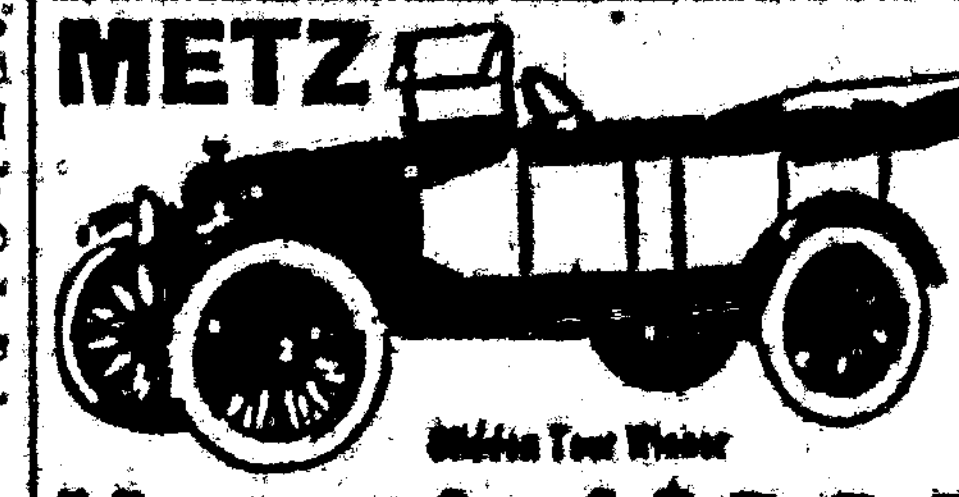
