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DOUBLE TRAGEDY OCCURED WEDNESDAY

Sam J. Potts Shoots and Kills Tom J. Coleman, His Hired Hand, Then Takes His Own Life

DOMESTIC TROUBLE THOUGHT TO BE CAUSE OF KILLING

One of the most horrible tragedies ever committed in this section of recent years occurred Wednesday morning about nine o'clock at the Potts dairy ranch three miles east of this city, when Sam J. Potts, the well known dairyman shot and killed Tom J. Coleman, his hired hand, and within a few minutes after the killing of Coleman, shot and killed himself.

Shortly after the killing Judge Ed. Masie was notified and went out and held an inquest over the dead bodies.

An examination of the body of Coleman revealed the fact that he had received five bullet wounds, each one passing entirely through the body, while that of Potts showed only one bullet wound which entered the roof of the mouth and came out at the back of the head.

Mrs. Potts was the only one about the premises when the killing took place, but did not witness either of the tragedies according to the story she told the coroner's jury. She stated that she was in the barn milking and did not know of any trouble existing between the two men until she came to the house for a milk vessel, when Mr. Potts informed her of what had happened. The witness further stated that her husband took her to the scene of the shooting and looking upon the dead man's face walked away to a hay stack only a short distance from the house and there took his own life, although Mrs. Potts stated that she heard no shot at this time and knew nothing of what he had done until she found his dead body a few minutes later.

While there was no evidence given to the jury by the witness showing that the two men had ever had trouble, it is believed by almost everyone that the tragedy was brought about by some family affair.

Mr. Potts had resided in this vicinity for the past seven years and had proven himself to be an honorable, upright man in every way. In fact his character up to the time of his death was above reproach, and this news comes as a great surprise to his many friends. He is survived by his wife and two year old son.

Little is known of Coleman who had only been in this section a few months. From letters found in his suit case he had friends in Los Animas, and other points in Colorado, although it is said he was a native of California. It is also stated that he had a wife and two children whose whereabouts are unknown.

Both bodies were brought to town immediately after the coroner's inquest and prepared for burial by embalmer Kelley.

The body of Potts will be shipped today to Beaumont, Texas,

for interment, where the deceased formerly lived.

Coleman's remains will be held here for a few days and if not called for by relatives will be buried in the local cemetery.

The jury was composed of Geo. L. Ulrick, Geo. J. Dingwall, Thos. O. Luster, Joe R. Adams, Henry Hoffman and Frank Gray. Following is their verdict:

"We the Justices of the Peace and Jury who sat upon the inquest held this 9th day of June, 1915, over the bodies of Sam J. Potts and Tom J. Coleman, found in Precinct No. 14, Lincoln County, New Mexico, find that Tom J. Coleman met his death by reason of five gun shot wounds fired by the hand of Sam J. Potts, and that Sam J. Potts met his death by reason of a gun shot wound fired by his own hand with suicidal intent."

THEY MADE AN EXAMINATION

Of the Books of Justice Alberto Garcia—Found Nothing Wrong—It Was An Abortive Effort.

GOV. McDONALD ONE OF THE COMMITTEE

It was an awesome committee who entered the office of Justice Alberto Garcia on Wednesday morning last and asked to see his public records.

The committee consisted of Governor McDonald, Supreme Justice Hanna and Perennial-Candidate-for-Any-Old-Thing Adolfo Hill.

Presumably this distinguished trio expected to find some evidence of the dire wrongs and appalling evidences of unrighteous intimidation, which the Santa Fe Knocker has been telling its readers about, and which is still only in the excited minds of the Knocker contingent, whose silly and furious fustian has been the laughing stock of the community.

Well, the partly distinguished committee made a thorough examination, as one composed of such men would do, and they called for the original papers and took Judge Garcia down the line from the first warrant he ever issued to the last act done by him and failed to find a flaw. The record was clean.

Then the governor of the state, who does not seem to have enough business of state importance to occupy his mind and attention, and mixes in the local city affairs for relaxation, or possibly for notoriety's sake, turned to his fellow slouts and said he didn't see anything wrong, and the near distinguished committee walked out of the judge's office, defeated.

There is fairness and decency in all things, even in a municipal election, though one would not judge from the attitude of the Knocker and some of its allies, that such a thing is necessary.

If Governor McDonald is so anxious to have a hand in the affairs of the city during his temporary residence here, in addition to those of the state, it would appear better if he displayed his charity and pity on someone more worthy than the heroes of the pardoning act so copiously and vociferously displayed and eulogized in the columns of the Knocker.

Was not the "gentleman" who was given the pardon by the governor the man who was given a smash in the face by Judge Richard H. Hanna last fall for offering an insult to the wife of another member of the supreme court, and was he not also the man who was caught in the act of stealing products from the Gross Kelley company some months ago?

Let's be fair about these things. If it is the intention of the governor and those working with him to enter upon a people's reform movement and aid in the restitution to decency of those who have gone wrong, then it is most commendable, but why has the spasm just taken hold of the distinguished

officials and why are they so very solicitous over these particular men at the present time and why do they single out a man who has been a constant violator of the law as the one who is suffering this awful persecution?

Constancy, though rare, is a very laudable quality, and it is one of the things of life which all like to see, but it loses its effect when it becomes merely a spasmodic attempt to make a flare and get a halo at some seemingly opportune time to walk into the limelight.

The examples of "intimidation" and "victims of malicious persecution" so furiously and excitedly exploited in the columns of the Knocker are scarcely those who appeal to the average citizen of Santa Fe, with the well known record they have made in the city, which is well known to all men. Both of the pardon "victims" have served time over and over again for violation of the law.—State Record.

H. B. FERGUSSON DIES

Harvey B. Fergusson, former congressman from New Mexico, who recently resigned as private secretary to William Jennings Bryan, died at his home in Albuquerque yesterday. He was 67 years old.

Mr. Fergusson was the first congressman from New Mexico, following admission of the state in 1911 and was reelected for the 62d congress in 1912.

He was defeated for reelection in 1914, and, at the conclusion of his term, became private secretary to Mr. Bryan, a post he held for several months.

Mr. Fergusson was at one time a resident of White Oaks and an associate of John Y. Hewitt in the practice of law.

THE UNDERWOOD TARIFF BILL

The Court is Asked to Interpret the Meaning of Paragraph 408 of The Underwood Tariff Act

FIRST IMPORTANT LAW OF PRESENT ADMINISTRATION

A typical example of inexcusable blundering by Congress in the enactment of a statute has been argued recently before the Court of Customs Appeals. The court is asked to interpret the meaning of paragraph 408 of the Underwood tariff act, the first important law of the present administration.

The paragraph provides free entry for "waste" of any of the articles therein described "SUITABLE" for the manufacture of paper. Careless use of the word "suitable" in drafting the law plunged it into uncertainty, for it admits a wide latitude of construction. Will free entry be given to anything that MIGHT be used in paper making; or must waste be used ONLY in paper making in order to enter free of duty?

Already two opposing constructions have been placed upon the statute, one by customs officials who imposed a tax, another by the Board of U. S. General Appraisers who allowed free entry. Now the higher court is appealed to for a third opinion as to the intent of the law makers.

The blunder is more notable because the language of former tariff acts was an ample guide, clearly emphasizing the need for unequivocal diction. The act of 1897 provided free entry for waste "FIT ONLY" to be converted into paper. The corresponding paragraph in the 1909 act extended free entry to waste "USED CHIEFLY" for paper making.

With these provisions in the old law, it seems as though intelligent revision would have been simplicity itself. But with their fatal gift of blundering the Democrats seized upon and inserted "SUITABLE" in the law—the one word that neither customs officials, lawyers nor business men affected could understand, and which rendered imperative the litigation now in the courts before the statute can be finally enforced.

ABOUT THE WAR

Italian troops have occupied thirty-seven villages, surrounding Cortina in the Ampezzo valley.

A British submarine operating in the Sea of Marmora torpedoed a large German transport in Panderma Bay.

After a siege of three weeks the fortress of Przemysl in Galicia has fallen to the Austrians. The Russians were in possession a little over 70 days.

Ninety bombs were dropped in the raid on London by a Zeppelin airship. Four persons were killed and a few were injured. No public building was damaged.

The headquarters of the German crown prince were bombarded by French aviators. Twenty-nine machines dropped 178 shells and several thousand farts.

Six merchant ships sunk was the toll of German submarine activities in twenty-four hours. Two of these were neutral vessels—one Danish and the other Swedish.

The Norwegian steamship Cubano was torpedoed and sunk off the Fianman Islands. The crew was landed on the Hebrides, a group of islands off the coast of Scotland.

Two Welsh trawlers have been sunk by German submarines—the Hlorid of Cardiff and the Victoria of Milford. The Hlorid was sent to the bottom about 150 miles southwest of Lundy Island and the Victoria 135 miles from St. Ann's Head.

With the fall of Przemysl, although this does not appear to be the limit of their efforts against the Russians in Galicia, the Germans have again turned their attention to the western front and simultaneously with the news of the arrival of German reinforcements in Flanders and the province of Artois, France, come official reports of their attacks on positions recently captured by the British and French.

WESTERN

Property loss of \$250,000, it was estimated, was caused by rain and wind in Clark county, near the Oklahoma line.

At least five persons were killed and a score more injured by destructive storms that swept western and northwestern Kansas.

Fire at Seattle, Wash., destroyed the coal bunkers of the Pacific Coal Company on the water front, causing a loss estimated at \$200,000.

Fire at Sheridan, Wyo., destroyed the general store of the Sheridan Commercial company, with a loss estimated between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

A "community church," designed to promote social, moral and spiritual welfare, is planned by prominent citizens of the Washington park district in Denver.

Warren Frases of West Palm Beach, Fla., better known as "Alligator Joe," died at San Francisco of pneumonia after an illness of a week. He had been exhibiting 5,000 alligators at the Panama-Pacific exposition.

With five men under death sentences awaiting the outcome of its deliberations, the Arizona State Legislature is in special session to consider the questions of capital punishment, land legislation and enforcement of prohibition.

At St. Joseph, Mo., an old game with a new twist made J. W. Klakorn, a rancher of Los Animas, Colo., a poorer but a wiser man. In passing, Mr. Klakorn paid just \$6,000 for a practical lesson on human nature and was standing ready with \$7,000 more which he saved because the police came along and revealed the ruse.

Mrs. Anna George, 51, committed suicide at Cheyenne, Wyo., by drinking a poisonous. After swallowing the poison she repeated and whispered "Dr. H. L. Gott, but he arrived too late to save her life. Mrs. George was given much medicine about a year ago, when Frank Runcoera of Los Angeles sued her for \$15,000 damage for breach of promise. He lost the suit.

Marie Adams, her twenty-year-old son and her husband, one of the wealthiest men in the country, crossed the ocean in which she was represented in Denver in the present time. She is San Bernardino, Calif.

FOREIGN

The latest casualty list made public in London includes among the wounded the name of Brig. Gen. Sir Philip Chetwood.

An American named Dyer, said to have been a clerk in the United States consulate at Monterey, Mex., was found dead in a street in Monterey.

A Swiss biplane, which was carrying Lieutenant Vollenweider of Bern and Corporal Frobat of Basle, fell from a great height near Zurich. Both aviators were killed.

The relief committee's information shows 200,000 persons in Albania homeless and starving, that 3,000 had perished of hunger and cold and that thousands more would die unless help reached them.

Countess Marie-Tarnovsky, sentenced in May, 1910, to eight years imprisonment for complicity in the murder of Count Kamorowsky, her fiance, at Venice in November, 1907, has been pardoned and released.

Prince Bagratio Mouchranksy, who two years ago married the Princess Tatiana, eldest daughter of Grand Duke Constantine, fell at the head of his squadron of the Cavalier Guards during the fighting in Galicia.

The little republic of San Marino, twenty-two square miles in area, although entirely surrounded by Italian territory, forms an absolutely independent state. A serious discussion is going on in this republic as to whether it shall remain neutral.

The American liner St. Paul was chased by a German submarine as it neared Liverpool. The hostile craft pursued the big liner right up to Mersey Bar. The purpose of the submarine is believed to have been to stop the ship and take off William Marconi, the wireless inventor.

Theophile Braga, who was provisional president of Portugal following the revolution which resulted in the abdication of King Manuel, was elected president of the republic by the National Assembly to succeed Manuel De Arriaga who resigned. Senor Braga was elected by a vote of 23 to 1.

The list of honors conferred on the occasion of the king's birthday was, as had been expected in view of the war, an unusually long one. The list is headed by the names of Field Marshal Earl Kitchener, secretary of state for war, who received the knighthood of the garter, and Sir Francis Bertie, ambassador to France, and Sir Kenneth Muir Mackenzie, clerk of the crown.

SPORTING NEWS

C. D. Plank of Denver won the Spalding gold medal, emblematic of the championship of Colorado, with the record of 96 out of 100, at Empire farm near Denver.

An Austrian hydro-aeroplane has been found floating in the sea near Brindisi, Italy. It is evident that the aviators who manned it have been drowned.

Frankie Murphy of Denver was given a decision over Harry Estes of San Francisco at the end of twelve rounds of a bout full of action at the Colorado Athletic Club in Denver.

Russell Wells and Richard Scott, both of Denver, won the doubles tennis championship of the University of Colorado at Boulder, defeating John McCann of New York city and Lake Lovelace of Boulder in straight sets, the score being 6-1, 6-2, 6-2.

The Western League is facing a crisis. Either the ball players must submit to a general reduction in salaries or the circuit will close down for the season of 1915, according to an ultimatum issued by President N. L. O'Neill.

At Wilkesbarre, Pa., a foul ball struck Victor E. Craig, 36, of West Pittston, in the head, while he was keeping score at a game of baseball between two Sunday school teams. He was knocked unconscious but was revived and continued marking the game until its close. Soon after he reached his home he died from a fractured skull.

GENERAL

Anthony Jannus and Fritz G. Wilson of Detroit, aviators, have been placed in charge of a new aeroplane factory at Torrance, Cal., which has contracted with the British government to build 1,000 aeroplanes at a cost of \$25,000 each.

Members of the Hynagogical League, a group of New York and New England, though heart and soul with Germany in the European war, are, in the language of the synd president, the Rev. William Brew, "American patriots who are German sympathizers; and if unhelpfully this nation should be drawn into the European war, we would stand for our country with the sword in the hand to be unhesitatingly used against the latter."

NOTICIAS DE LA ULTIMA SEMANA

Agencia de la guerra.

Las tropas italianas han ocupado treinta y siete pueblos, rodeando Cortina, en el valle Ampezzo.

Un submarino británico operando en el mar de Marmora hundió un transporte grande alemán en la bahía de Panderma.

Después de un sitio de tres semanas la fortaleza de Przemysl en Galicia ha caído en posesión de los Austriacos. Los Rusos la ocuparon por poco más de setenta días.

El vapor noruego Cubano fue derribado por un torpedero y hundido cerca de las islas Fianman. El equipaje fue depositado en las Hebrides, un grupo de islas al largo de la costa de Escocia.

Los cuarteles generales del príncipe de la corona de Alemania fueron bombardeados por los aviadores Franceses. Veintinueve máquinas dejaron caer 178 bombas y varios miles de flechas.

Noventa bombas fueron caídas en la incursión sobre la ciudad de Londres por un globo Zeppelin. Cuatro personas fueron matadas y algunas otras heridas. Ningun edificio público sufrió daño alguno.

Entre 500 y 700 reservistas, el primer cargamento de importancia desde la declaración de guerra en Italia, salieron de Nueva York para Nápoles, a bordo del vapor Principe di Udine, para alistarse con los combatientes de su país.

Dos barcos pescadores a la ristra galones fueron hundidos por submarinos alemanes—el Hlorid de Cardiff y el Victoria de Milford. El Hlorid fue atacado a 150 millas suroeste de la isla de Lundy y el Victoria a 135 millas de St. Ann's Head.

Con cinco hombres bajo pena de muerte esperando el resultado de su deliberación, la legislatura de estado de Arizona está en sesión especial para tomar en consideración la cuestión de pena capital, legislación de tierras y la aplicación de la ley de prohibición.

El miembro del congreso Frank W. Mondell de Wyoming, presidente del congreso internacional de agricultura en su caso, estuvo en Denver en su rambo hacia la Junta, en sesión se juntará con el comité de congreso sobre las apropiaciones en su viaje por el país para inspeccionar los proyectos de irrigación del gobierno.

La Señora Rena George, de 35, comió suicidio en Cheyenne, Wyo., bebiendo una substancia química de matar los gérmenes. Después de haber bebido el veneno ella se arrojó y telefonó al Dr. H. L. Wolff, pero él llegó demasiado tarde para salvarle la vida. La Señora George tuvo mucha publicidad hace como un año, cuando Frank Runcoera de Los Angeles entabló juicio en contra de ella por violación de la palabra de casamiento. El perdió el juicio.

Washington.

El poder de la junta suprema del Royal Arcanum para sancionar las leyes orgánicas relativamente al cambio de las tasaciones de aseguradoras fue afirmado por la corte suprema.

Los planes para continuar el trabajo suspendido por la contienda financiera Pan-Americana por medio de comités permanentes, aunque no oficiales, fueron anunciados en una declaración del secretario del tesoro McAdoo.

Las embajadas de Inglaterra, Francia y Rusia han dado al Departamento de estado la aseguranza de que sus gobiernos permitirán al Dr. Bernhard Dernburg, secretario de colonias de Alemania, la entrada sin molestia en su país cuando el salga de los Estados Unidos.

El algodón indicó una condición de 30 por ciento de la normal el 25 de mayo, según anuncia el Departamento de Agricultura en su primer reporte de la estación.

El comercio extranjero de los Estados Unidos continuó en su nivel elevado durante la semana pasada, dejando un balance favorable de \$18,170,405.

El martes, 23 de junio, fue elegido por la Junta de Comercio de la Mujer de Santa Fe para su fiesta de plaza. Esta es la gran fiesta ofrecida cada año para beneficio de caridad.

La aplicación de una nueva época en la industria minera, la extensión de proyectos de irrigación y el desarrollo de la industria de azúcar están considerados por Vernon A. Rand, gobernador de la provincia de Colorado. Estos obstáculos se pueden superar estimar consecuentemente, según los datos de un escrito leído en Denver durante del mitin de quinientos del Club de San Francisco, titulado "Un sistema para Colorado."

Se ha concedido el contrato para la construcción de tres puentes millas de la ruta de Fall River por la suma de \$16,255.

Para el año terminando el 31 de marzo, las ganancias totales de la Compañía de Tranvías de Denver fueron de \$3,208,984.

J. P. Theobald, de 25, falló en su caso en Berthoud. El era el "Elk" más antiguo en la línea de parada en Denver el año pasado.

La Asociación de la Sociedad Americana de Ingenieros Civiles de Colorado tendrá su seso y elección de oficiales anual el 12 de junio.

La primera mujer policía de América, la Señora Alice Stebbins Wells de Los Angeles, Cal., hizo una visita a Denver y al jefe de policía O'Neil.

Frank Atkins, propietario del primer teatro de Denver, murió en Johnstown. Tenía 76 años de edad y había vivido en el estado desde el año 1865.

En el Auditorium en Denver se tuvo un mitin de miles a título de protesta en contra de la condenación de John R. Lawson, jefe de los mineros, por asesinato.

El examinador La. Roe de la Comisión de Comercio Inter-estado dirigirá unas sesiones relativas a menores tarifas de transportación en Denver los días 11, 12, 14 y 15.

Una herencia total de \$30,000 para cinco nietos fue transmitida por la Señora Henrietta Walton Daniels en su testamento presentado para legalización en la corte de condado de Denver.

Joe Tringa, de treinta y seis un italiano, capataz en las fundiciones de Pueblo, fue matado al instante por un asesino desconocido al momento en que se sentaba en la cocina de su casa.

John T. Montfort, acusado de difamación criminal por el procurador de distrito Rush, fue libertado de la cárcel de Denver bajo fianza de \$1,000, proveídas por una compañía de casualidad.

La ciudad de Fort Collins presentó una acción legal por la cual la ciudad se esfuerza en obtener posesión de casi 150 acres de tierra en la vecindad del presente lugar de abastecimiento de agua.

Un antiguo empleado de la ciudad, Michael Henry, en una queja legal presentada en la corte de distrito demanda de la ciudad y condado de Denver la suma de cinco mil pesos por la pérdida de un dedo.

Ernest D. Patten, quien accidentalmente se dió un tiro en el pecho, el 16 de mayo, en Bayles, murió en el hospital de la Caridad en Denver. La neumonía se declaró en él y eso fue la causa directa de la muerte.

El sitio del Parque Nacional de Colorado está muy estimado por Mark Daniels, superintendente de los parques nacionales, que volvió a Denver después de haber visitado todo el terreno abarcado en el parque.

W. Tracey de Ballou, un empleado de la Cold Springs mina cerca de Gold Hill, fue cogido entre la pared de la mina y un carro cargado de mineral y recibió heridas muy graves. Tuvo dos costillas fracturadas.

TAINTED POLITICS

This country is suffering more from tainted politics than from any other malady at the present time. There is scarcely a campaign speech made, a platform demand written or a measure enacted into law that does not carry the taint of personal gain of some politician or political faction thereof.

There is more "blue sky" in campaign promises of many politicians running for office than was ever contained in the prospectuses of the boldest promoters of chimerical business schemes. There are more secret combinations formed by politicians in the name of "My Country" than were ever formed under any and all other aliases. There are more political rebates hidden in the phrase "Be it enacted" than were ever concealed under any and all other disguises.

The inordinate thirst for political power and unrestrained passion for mastery has caused more distress in this nation than the greed for gold, and it ought to be regulated by law. No business combination ever pursued their competitors as relentlessly, or visited more heartless cruelty upon their customers than a political party that seeks to make junk of an industry, or cripple a business for party success, through tariff measures, political supervision and oftentimes destructive legislation. Many political platforms are as alluring to the voter as the story of the rainbow with its pot of gold and their consummation about as far-fetched. Self-gain is the first law in politics. There are many men in office today who, if they could not shake plums off the tree of American liberty or cut a melon taken from Uncle Sam's commissary, would have less desire to serve the public.

The country is surfeited with patriots, who will bare their breast to bullets in defense of their country, but there are few men in public life who will bare their breast to voters or run the gauntlet of party disfavor in defense of agriculture or industry. No representative of the people, who will permit personal prejudice to dethrone justice, party success to disfranchise reason or the rancor of a political campaign to influence judgment can render capable service.

The preservation of our prosperity depends upon wisdom, courage and honesty in government, and the American voter should seek these attributes as implicitly as the Wise Men followed the Star of Bethlehem and they will often be found to rest over the stable; the plow or the staff of the Shepherd. The surest cure for tainted politics and machine rule is fresh air and sunshine and these important elements are most abundant upon the farm, and when farmers, bankers and merchants are elected to membership in legislative bodies, much of the trouble in government will disappear.

WATERED SECURITIES

Much has been said and more written about the evils of watered stock in big business concerns and the farmers of this nation believe that every dollar written into the life of any business organization, should be able to say "I know that my Redeemer liveth," but farming is the biggest business on earth, and there is more water in its financial transaction than that of any other industry. There is as much water in a farmer's note drawing eight or ten per cent interest when other lines of industry secure money for four or five per cent per annum, as there is in a business paying a reasonable compensation upon the face value of securities representing an investment of only fifty cents on the dollar. The only difference is, the water is in the interest rate in one instance and in the securities in the other.

The promoter oftentimes takes chances and his success is contingent upon the development of the property involved but the usurer, as a rule, takes no chances and his success cripples the property involved. There may be industries that cry louder but none that suffer more severely from financial immorality in both law and custom than that of agriculture.

The farmers of America today are paying \$200,000,000 per annum in usury on real estate and chattel loans, and this interest capitalized at five per cent, represents \$4,000,000,000 of netitious values which the farmer is paying interest on. This sum of money is almost equal to the annual value of crops produced in the United States.

The earning power of the farmer's note based upon his interest rate very nearly divides like the earth's surface—three-fourths water and one-fourth land. The largest body of water that floats upon the financial hemisphere now rests upon the farms and its waves are dashing and its billows are rolling against seven million homes threatening ruin and disaster to the prosperity of the nation. Will our public servants who understand how to drain the liquid of industrial properties turn the faucet and let the water off the farms?

NEWS NOTE

REMARKS OF WILSON

ON EXPLANATION

OF ATTACKS

WILSON IGNORES WILSON DE- MAND THAT SUBMARINE AT- TACKS MUST CEASE.

Special New York Times Service.

President Wilson today designated the honor to submit to Ambassador Gerard the following answer to the communication of May 15 regarding the injury to American interests through German submarine warfare: "The imperial government has subjected the communication of the American government to a thorough investigation. It entertains a keen wish to cooperate in a frank and friendly way in clearing up a possible misunderstanding which may have arisen in the relations between the two governments through the events mentioned by the American govern-

ment. Regarding, firstly, the cases of the American steamers Cushing and Gulf-light. The American embassy has already been informed that the German government has no intention of admitting neutral ships in the war zone which are guilty of no hostile acts, to attacks by a submarine or submersible, or afloat. On the contrary, the German forces have repeatedly been instructed most specifically to avoid attacks on such ships.

Neutral ships in recent months have suffered through the German submarine warfare, owing to mistakes in identification. It is a question only of ships isolated and exceptional cases, which can be attributed to the British government's abuse of flags, together with the suspicious or culpable behavior of the masters of the ships.

The German government, in all cases in which it has been shown by investigations that a neutral ship, not itself at fault, was damaged by German submarines or afloaters, has expressed regret over the unfortunate accident, and, if justified by conditions, has offered indemnification.

The cases of the Cushing and Gulf-light will be treated on the same principles. An investigation of both cases is in progress, the result of which will promptly be communicated to the American government by an international commission of inquiry, as provided by Article III of The Hague agreement of October 18, 1907.

When sinking the British steamer Falaba, the commander of the German submarine had the intention of allowing the passengers and crew a full opportunity for a safe escape. Only when the vessel did not obey the order to leave to, but had and unassisted help by rocket signals, did the German commander order the crew and passengers by signals and messages to leave the ship within ten minutes. He actually allowed them twenty-three minutes time, and fired the torpede only when suspicious craft were hastening to the assistance of the Falaba.

Regarding the loss of life by the sinking of the British passenger steamer Lusitania, the German government has already expressed to the neutral governments concerned its deep regrets that citizens of their states lost their lives.

On this occasion, the imperial government, however, cannot escape the impression that certain important facts having a direct bearing on the sinking of the Lusitania may have escaped the attention of the American government.

In the interest of a clear and complete understanding, which is the aim of both governments, the imperial government considers it first necessary to certify itself that the information submitted to both governments since the sinking of the vessel is complete and in accord.

The government of the United States proceeds on the assumption that the Lusitania could be regarded as an ordinary unarmed merchantman.

The imperial government allows itself in this connection to point out that the Lusitania was not an ordinary merchantman, but a vessel which carried a large quantity of war material, including a considerable amount of ammunition, and was manned with persons who have been especially trained in serving guns. The Lusitania, too, according to information received here had cannon aboard, which were mounted and concealed below deck.

The imperial government further has the honor to direct the particular attention of the American government to the fact that the British admiralty, in a confidential instruction issued in February, 1915, recommended its merchant shipping not only to seek protection under neutral flags and distinguishing marks, but also, while thus disguised, to attack German submarines by ramming.

As a special incitation to merchantment to destroy submarines the British government also offered high prizes and has already paid such rewards. The imperial government, in view of these facts, indubitably known to it, is unable to regard British merchantmen in the zone of naval operations specified by the admiralty staff of the German navy as "undefended." German commanders consequently are no longer able to object the customary regulations of the prize law, which they before always followed.

Finally, the imperial government must point out particularly that the Lusitania on its last trip, as on earlier occasions, carried Canadian troops and war material, including no less than 5,400 cases of ammunition intended for the destruction of the brave German soldiers who are fulfilling their duty with self-sacrificed and devotion in the fatherland's service.

The German government believes that it was acting in justified self-defense in seeking with all the means of warfare at its disposal to protect the lives of its soldiers by destroying ammunition intended for the enemy. The British Shipping Company must have been aware of the danger to which the passengers aboard the Lusitania were exposed under these conditions.

The company in embarking them, notwithstanding this, attempted deliberately to use the lives of American citizens as protection for the ammunition aboard and acted against the clear provisions of the American law, which expressly prohibits the forwarding of passengers on ships carrying ammunition, and provides a penalty therefor. The company, therefore, is wantonly guilty of the death of so many passengers.

There can be no doubt, according to the definite report of the submarine's commander, which is further confirmed by all other information, that the quick sinking of the Lusitania is primarily attributable to the explosion of the ammunition shipment caused by a torpedo. The Lusitania's passengers would otherwise, in all human probability, have been saved.

The imperial government considers the above mentioned facts important enough to recommend them to the active examination of the American government.

The imperial government, while withholding its final decision of the demands advanced in connection with the sinking of the Lusitania until receipt of an answer from the American government, feels impelled, in conclusion, to recall, here and now, that it took cognizance with satisfaction of the mediatory proposals submitted by the United States government to Berlin and London as a basis for a modus vivendi for conducting the maritime warfare between Germany and Great Britain. The imperial government, by its readiness to enter upon a discussion of these proposals, then demonstrated its good intentions in ample fashion.

The realization of these proposals was defeated, as is well known, by the declinatory attitude of the British government. (Signed) JAGOW.

The government of the United States proceeds on the assumption that the Lusitania could be regarded as an ordinary unarmed merchantman.

American law does not prohibit ammunition from being carried on passenger ships, it will be asserted, but only self-expanding material, and hence in the past have been permitted to carry arms and ammunition, by special ruling of the State Department on the meaning of federal statutes.
