COMMITTEE PASS ON SCHOOL EXHIBIT

Well Pleased With the Quality of Work Done by Pupils Sent in From Various Districts of County

WORK TO BE SENT TO STATE TEACHERS' MEETING

Last Saturday, Geo. E. Cardwell, Prin. Mrs. M. E. Blaney, and Miss Humphrey, committee to pass on articles for the county exhibit at the state teachers' meeting, met in the school superintendent's office and opened the boxes sent in from various districts. All were surprised at the quality and variety of the work and the amount that had been accomplished in the short time schools have been in session this term.

From Jack's Peak primary classes were paper construction work, the color of which was delicate and harmonious. This exhibit shows what can be accomplished where there is a will, as Mrs. Burnett's pupils used only such materials as any ranch has.

Ruidoso, No. 3, sent their first work in industrial lines: the delicate needle-work was ingenious, well executed, and true to line and design. The original drawings were cartoons full of life representing local and foreign subjects. Prin. Milton and Miss Kennedy have given proof that this term of school is accomplishing much.

Ocosingo sent the largest display which was varied and excellent. No machine sewing on the beautiful articles of the first year's sewing by the girls of the higher grades, and in justice to their endeavors let it be said that no work of the state colleges exhibited at the recent State Fair, surpassed in workmanship this class of Mrs. Blaney's. The maps and drawings were good, also. Miss Monroe's primary pupils sent paper construction work of many designs, and booklets of written lessons of high order.

Again, Nogal displayed splendid specimens of needle work which were no disappointment even after the excellent work furnished last year. We missed the woodwork of the boys of this school, but Mr. Cardwell says they have been repairing the inside of the building, making a permanent display in school.

Harris's box was full of the useful made beautiful many kinds of towels neatly hemmed, embroidered and decorated with crocheting. Mrs. Thompson and Mrs. Stemple are to be commended for guiding the girls' first work in practical every day work.

Foghead draws maps, neatly colored, some from Miss Keller's Mountain class.

From Prin. Cobb's classes in White Oaks were maps, relief and flat, drawn to scale and penmanship exercises. Miss Lusk's domestic class sent books of sample stitches, patching, and darning, with suggestions from her primary pupils.

This was also Lincoln's exhibit, but no one would have thought to see the dairy products

books, pin cushions, fancy work bags that it was a first year sewing class; beside the sewing, Miss Iona Stevens' primary pupils, sent colored drawings. From Prin. Stone's classes were a good variety of maps. Mountain View, Miss Sturges' school, near Encinas, sent pencil and colored drawings.

The work of the high school classes at Capitan and Carrizozo is to be shipped direct; there is no doubt from the enthusiasm of the term's work but that it will be worth of the grades.

The materials for industrial work were just received by the Carrizozo school, so all hands are busy in making a creditable showing which will be passed upon by the committee in charge of arranging the display in Albuquerque. Supt. C. Y. Balknap, Prin. Mrs. E. V. Jewett and Miss Mary Monroe will head this committee.

Supt. A. McCurdy, Mrs. Viola Thompson, and Miss Carmen Gilliam will take the county exhibit down and repack it. It will be put on exhibit at our county teachers' meeting at Capitan.

Do, even we who are in the work, fully realize the wonderful work being done by our county teachers? I frankly confess that I was amazed at the amount of truly good work sent in, knowing the handicaps under which many of the teachers had to accomplish it. Let us give these earnest builders of better county schools our hearty cooperation.

THE GREAT STATE OF NEW MEXICO

There is Much in all Departments to Attract Attention Here; Sojourner Tells of its Beauties

THE LAND CONDITIONS ARE MOST INVITING

I had done California four times, and was returning eastward by the way of the Grand Canyon, leaving behind—perhaps forever—the Golden State and its much advertised climate, its luscious fruits, its rich oil fields, and its quaint Mission architecture. My pullman companion was a stranger, and he asked me if I was going "through," meaning of course, east of the Mississippi. I told him "No, I'm going to stop in New Mexico for the first time." He ejaculated "Whew! None of it for me—only Greasers and dry claims." But I stopped, nevertheless, and wandered about the "Sunshine," as it is called, somewhat aimlessly, having no itinerary to guide me, going by railway train, automobile, horseback, or on foot, as convenience or fancy suggested, with sightseeing in view solely.

I had long thought, and thought that I knew, that California could not be beaten for climate, that is to say for health, health, health, health, rays, falling at just the right angle, and cool, invigorating nights; but I must confess that after I sojourned in New Mexico for about a month I became conscious of the fact that, in the matter of climate, as a physical rejuvenant, a comfort producer, and a worry-eradicator, this far southwestern and little known commonwealth is entitled to be decorated with the grand pink.

And if tuberculosis "taken in time" may be cured, there is much cumulative evidence within my personal knowledge to prove that, as claimed, Nature has provided a remedy for the plague in the marvelous New Mexico weather, not only in a season, but all the year 'round; and this means every year, the explanation being that in New Mexico sunshine is perennial; and this sunshine mixed with equal parts of a high altitude and a dry atmosphere, never failing, furnishes a panacea, at once sure and certain, if the afflicted will but halt do their part. The altitude varies from very high to medium low, so that the patient may select a place to do his recuperating best suited to his condition.

New Mexico is an arid, or semi-arid country. It also is a grazing country, affording winter as well as summer ranges. And really and truly there is no such grazing country anywhere else in the United States. Huge herds of cattle and large flocks of sheep crop the nutritious grass of mountain and plain, and there is no grass elsewhere more nutritious. Horses, mules, goats, and burros likewise are raised in New Mexico, and not in small numbers, either. All this livestock business is profitable—exceptionally profitable. Ranching and stock-farming are the chief, almost the

sole industries of the state.

There are ranches of many thousands of acres, many of them. Then there are small ranches, as small as 320 acres; ranches for the rich and ranches for the poor. All classes of stock are high priced, and while New Mexico is not populous, it is prosperous, at least in so far as the stock interests are concerned. Climate has much to do with stock culture; and the New Mexico climate is admirably favorable to stock growing and the caretaking of stock. Almost anywhere in New Mexico cattle and sheep are run, or may be, summer and winter, without being fed. The public domain is homesteaded, it is true, and the open range is fast becoming obsolete, but the homestead that is worth while—worth the filing charges—is a bit of a stock farm.

The state of New Mexico leases land to individuals, or companies, or corporations for grazing purposes, for 5 cents an acre per year for a period of five years with a right to renew on the same terms. Also it sells land at a minimum of three dollars and five dollars an acre, according to location, with thirty years in which to pay for it, the first payment being fifty or thirty cents an acre. The amount of land granted to New Mexico by the United States totals approximately 13,000,000 acres. From this land that the state leases and sells. The United States upon its own account has disposed of about 1,000,000 acres, and at the present writing there remains available for lease or purchase more than 28,000,000 acres.

Certain regions of this arid, or semi arid land is very productive agriculturally and horticulturally speaking, as for example, in the Pecos Valley. There fruits grown by means of irrigation, while not as numerous in variety as the fruits of California are quite as good in quality and better in flavor and when New Mexico shall have been exploited for years, as California has been; it will appear quite, if not more wonderful in some respects in which California just now seems to excel. Down in this Pecos Valley, extending almost to the warrent republic, and in juxtaposition, there are produced cantaloupes that rival the Rocky Fords; and so one can tell the difference. Five crops of alfalfa are harvested annually. All kinds of vegetables excepting Irish potatoes are produced in abundance.

There are busy bees galore in this valley. They too, represent an industry. They gather the sweetest of honey mostly from alfalfa, and they do not appear to toil unusually to spin, either!

CAN'T ASSESS PEOPLE FOR HIGH SCHOOL

Doesn't Care to Send Children to Capitan; Which Has Teacher to Every Five Pupils

INTERESTING DATA BEFORE TAX COMMISSION

That something approaching individual instruction is possible at the Lincoln county high school at Capitan, where there are four teachers and only 22 pupils, was brought out at this (Wednesday) morning's session of the state tax commission by H. B. Harding, attorney of the El Paso & Southwestern, El Paso & Northeastern and El Paso & Rock Island railroads. The point was made in consideration of a proposed levy of 3 1-2 mills in the Carrizozo school district for "interest and equipment," which Mr Harding stated was really planned with the idea of establishing a high school in Carrizozo. The school at Capitan is a county high school, but "feeling" between Carrizozo and Capitan has resulted in few Carrizozo children attending it. Mr Harding called the attention of the commission to the fact that as Carrizozo is not an incorporated town it has no legal right to levy taxes for high school purposes, and asked the commission to improve this fact on the county and school district authorities. The commission righted its entire willingness to do this.

The Lincoln county levies, in general, were found to be within the limitation fixed, and were approved. —Santa Fe New Mexican.

THANKSGIVING in Switzerland is a movable feast, coming at the end of the harvest season, and usually falling on a Sunday in the middle of October. The country is at the height of its beauty in this month, the chrysanthemums are in full bloom in every garden, the terraced vineyards are showing autumn colors, and there is a golden haze over the rugged mountains. A feeling of peace and plenty prevails; the harvest is garnered, the wine is made, and the people of this thrifty little country are grateful for the earth's bounties.

It may not be entirely according to our ideas of artistic decorating to have the interior of the churches on Thanksgiving Sunday resemble a market place, but nevertheless the right spirit is at bottom. In place of flowers, strings of apples are festooned from arch to arch, clusters of grapes adorn available corners, the altar and pulpit are banked with every kind of vegetable, carrots, turnips and even cabbages being used. Song prayers are offered in gratitude and thanksgiving for the good harvest and a lengthy sermon is delivered appropriate to the occasion. The sun outside is warm and the air inside is heavy, laden with a strong odor of the Marche. At the end of the last hymn one hastens gladly into the open.

The Sabbath stillness of the afternoon is broken by the blare of a brass band. A long procession winds its way about the narrow streets, followed by a crowd of men, women and children, for the Swiss people have the love of a small boy for a parade, and they indulge themselves in their fancy on every possible occasion. On this day the procession goes from church to church, stopping in front of each one, while the band plays a few selections. The crowd is not particularly attentive, but it makes up for that lack in good humor. Small groups stand about the church square, talking and laughing, until the last number is finished, and then take up their position in the rear of the cortege and follow it on to the next church.

Thus the day wears on, in gratitude for the bounties of nature. A strange Thanksgiving and a simple one compared to our historic holiday and our elaborate manner of celebrating it, but beneath the surface runs the same undercurrent of sincere gratitude.

CATTLE FEEDING MOVES TO SOUTHWEST

Cattle Fed on Maize and Kafir Break all Texas Records and Topped Market at Kansas City.

Cattle from the range territory topping the fed steer market in Kansas City simply shows that cattle feeding is no longer confined to the corn belt, as has generally been supposed. Steers from the Southwest which never had any Indian corn topping the market against several big consignments from the west central states show that the feeding industry is losing its prestige in the Mississippi Valley and is moving rapidly toward the Panhandle

and the highest at which Lone Star cattle have ever sold and in fact establishes a new record for fed cattle from the southwest on any market in the middle west.

On June 18, 1915, Mr. Keiser made a record on the Kansas City market with 965 pound yearling steers at \$9.00, which were fed native grains and silage, and which held the record for high priced cattle from the southwest until this year. In October, 1912, a bunch of Mr. Keiser's heifer calves

of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, where cheaper lands are to be found which raise an abundance of kafir, maize and sorghum, which have proven their high feeding qualities on the Kansas City market.

C. O. Keiser, of Canyon, Texas, in the Panhandle district, has fully demonstrated the truth of the contention of the superiority of the southwest over the older sections of the United States. Last week with eight carloads of two and three year old Hereford steers he topped the Kansas City market at \$9.25 per hundred with steers that averaged 1314 and 1356. Other lots averaging 1250 sold at \$9.16 and 1485 at \$9.10. The cattle were fed on kafir corn and sorghum silage, ground kafir corn and milo maize, and kafir fodder, all products of the southwest. They were on full feed only 90 days. The price paid for the cat-

tle was the highest at which Lone Star cattle have ever sold and in fact establishes a new record for fed cattle from the southwest on any market in the middle west. A few weeks ago he sold 100 three year old range cows to a Plainview, Texas, breeder at \$125.00 per head, which was a new record for the southwest. His herd of registered Herefords has won many blue ribbons in the show rings of the central states.

During the past year he has sold many car loads of young bulls to the big ranchers of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, who realize that the world is looking to the southwest for its beef supply and who are grading up and increasing the feeding adaptability of their herds by the use of high class bulls.

The Great Southwest will soon not only be the greatest breeding section of these United States, but will also be classed as the greatest feeding territory.

FARMER SHOULD ADVERTISE

Local Newspaper Affords Excellent Means for Disposing of Products to City Folks.

The local newspapers afford the farmer a means of disposing of farm products on a par with its value to the local merchant. But the farmer must make proper use of its columns or the expense will be another of the many leaks that the farmer suffers from, writes C. T. Chamberlain of Michigan.

My neighbor raised ten bushels of early potatoes more than he used during summer and fall, and required for seed. Potatoes for eating purposes brought 75 cents per bushel. My neighbor paid one dollar a peck for seed and he decided to get some of his expense money back. Instead of selling them for 75 cents he put them down in his dry cellar and the next spring advertised them in the local daily thus:

"Last summer I paid four dollars the bushel for my early Five Weeks potatoes. The dealer said if I planted them in April I could have them to eat in mid-June and he told the truth. I have a few of those potatoes to spare and I'll cut the price in two for my neighbors. Get them at once, two dollars per bushel."

This ad. was run three days for one cent a word—or it would have been had not the farmer cancelled it the second day. He sold out the first day and could have sold three times as many.

Another man has named his farm and sells every article of produce under this name. It is a guarantee of quality as patrons know and he could sell much more than his seventy acres will produce.

This man sells to a small city market, 5,000 population, and delivers his produce. He doesn't call it out, huckster fashion, from door to door, but has a telephone and takes orders by it. His ads. in the local papers keep the people informed of what he has to sell and orders are given and time of delivery arranged over the phone.

CARRANZA IS KING

The promised recognition of Gen-
eral Carranza, as head of the Mexi-
can government, carries with it no
fulsome praise for discretion and
judgment of Washington. There
has never been an atmosphere
about Carranza's actions to suggest
him as other than a man whose
principles are nil and whose con-
duct is worse than that.

He has been arrogant, deceptive
and decidedly incompetent. The
only possible justification for recog-
nition—his assumed control of the
greater part of Mexico—is open to
doubt.

It has been declared and at least
partially proven, by his Mexican
enemies, that they possess the power
to keep him far away from actual
control of the situation and his
potential possibilities are not bright.
Therefore, his recognition is tenta-
ment to administration that the
administration does not desire that
its influence be confined to assist-
ing a man of good qualities and
sincere purpose to control Mexico
but wishes merely to clear its
hands of an unfortunate state of
affairs by seeking the easiest way
out. This way has been afforded
by the willingness of our Pan
American conferees to agree in the
selection of Carranza, and it has
been taken advantage of at the
earliest opportunity.

The indictment of the adminis-
tration for its apparently unfaith-
ful attitude towards its pledges in
Mexico's behalf is tempered by but
one grain of approval, and that is
the decision to do something after
an inauspicious period of many
months, during which we have
alternately taken positions and
deserted them and spent millions
of dollars on Mexican problems
without approximating a solution
or even intelligently seeking one
good or bad.

The recognition of Carranza is at
least a definite move. We have
staked our hopes upon him, hope-
less though he may seem, and we
have implied that our influence
will be exerted to keep him in a
stable position as the head of
Mexican affairs.

Naturally, altruistic representa-
tions will be made to him concern-
ing the desirability of calling an
election and permitting the people
to choose their ruler, advising the
protection of foreigners in Mexico,
and assisting educational work and
religious endeavor. All of this,
will naturally, be completely dis-
regarded after the polite and formal
acceptance.

Our faint beam of anticipation is

left to warm our souls on our
"warmed over" Mexican policy,
namely that Carranza will develop
a power, legitimately or otherwise,
sufficient to put down other pre-
tending bandits and rule with a
hand so stiff that foreigners may
find in him the actual, if not
accredited, president of Mexico,
and through him gain assurances
essential to the conduct of their
affairs

If this slender ray fails to light
the way, we have the pleasant
prospect before us, of going back
where we started out, and doing it
all over again. Inasmuch as it is
impossible to make a worse mess of
it, that prospect need not alarm us
H. S. Hanner.

AND SO IT IS

When one class of people has any-
thing to say, it has become largely
the custom to make a political issue
out of it instead of a friendly discus-
sion, to print it in a law book instead
of a newspaper and to argue it be-
fore a jury instead of to settle it in
the higher courts of Common Sense.
As a result, political agitators, polit-
ical lawyers, political preachers and
masculine women are powerful in
politics and dissension, selfishness, in-
tolerance and hysterics run rampant
in public affairs, for when the low,
damp, murky atmosphere of misun-
derstanding envelops public thought
it breeds political reptiles, vermin,
bugs and lice which the pure air of
truth and the sunshine of understand-
ing will choke to death.

We have too many self-appointed
interpreters of industry who are in-
capable of grasping the fundamental
principles of business and who at best
can only translate gossip and add
color to sensational stories. No busi-
ness can stand upon error and might
rules—right or wrong. No industry
can thrive upon misunderstanding,
for public opinion is more powerful
than a King's sword.

When prejudice, suspicion and
class hatred prevail, power gravitates
into the hands of the weak, for dema-
gogues thrive upon dissension and
statesmen stoken upon strife.

The remedy lies in eliminating the
middleman—the political gossip—and
this result can be accomplished by
the managers of business sitting
around the table of industry and talk-
ing it over with the people. Inter-
change of information between indus-
tries and the people is as necessary
to success in business as interchange
in commodities, for the people can
only rule when the public under-
stands. Away with political interpre-
ters who summon evil spirits from
their prison cells and loose them to
prey upon the welfare of the people
in the name of "My Country."

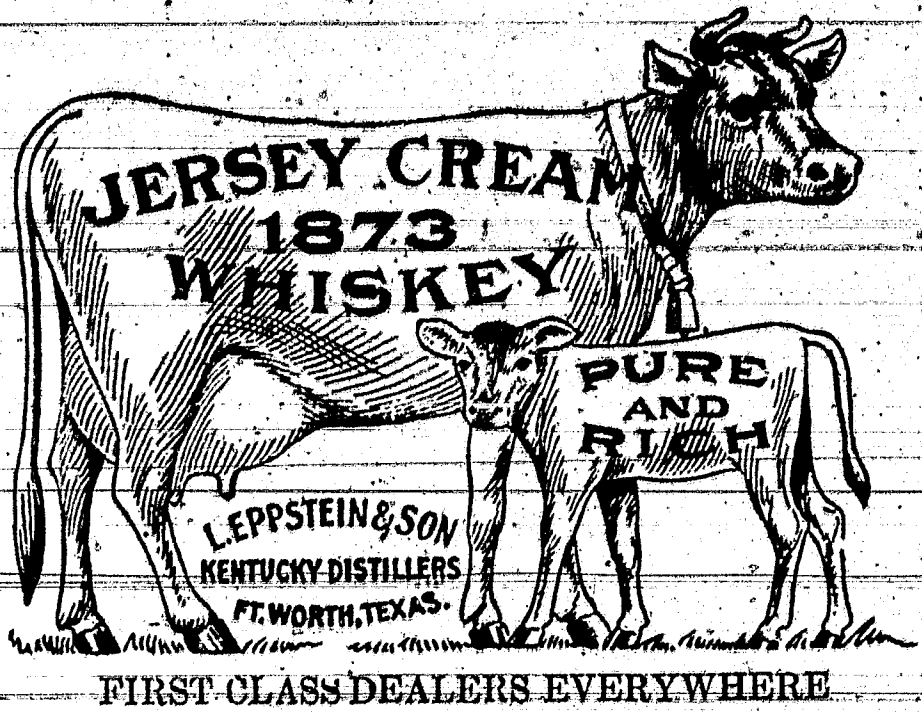

It must not be understood that the artistic effect has always been the only aim in city-planning schemes of the old regime. There were exceptions, the most remarkable one being the case of Berlin in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, when the Prussian rulers practiced in a very efficient and far-sighted manner city planning on an entirely social basis, working with powerful hands for the rapid opening and building up of wide and healthful suburban areas, without neglecting the beauty of the central district.

It is largely due to this powerful and advanced city planning that Berlin, from a little medieval town of 8,000 people, became one of the leading capitals of Europe, with 160,000 people at the beginning of the French revolution. This social kind of city planning, however, was the exception, and, with the entire change of the political situation caused by the French revolution, the social tendencies in city planning suffered the same decline as artistic city planning all over Europe.

Ireland's Stirling Song.

The origin of the unofficial anthem of Ireland, "St. Patrick's Day in the Morning," is most obscure. The earliest known copy appears in Rutherford's "Country Dances," published in 1749, but it is said to have been played by the Irish pipers at the battle of Fontenoy in 1745, and was probably current for some time before this. The tune is found attached to various rollicking old English songs. The Cumberland song of "Faithless Barbary Bell, whose lover vows to wear a red coat for her sake, is sung to a version of "St. Patrick's Day," the words "Barbary Bell's my darling" being substituted in the chorus for "Patrick's Day in the Morning."

Character of Ambergris.

Ambergris, which is used as a basis for much standard perfumery, was first found, an unattractive mass, floating on the sea or lodged upon the shore. How so unlikely a substance ever suggested itself as a perfume is not known, but it has been in use for centuries. It is believed by some to be the morbid secretion of the liver of a sperm whale. It is described as a fatty waxy substance, disagreeable to sight and touch, but even in its crude state exhaling a pleasant odor. The crude substance is subjected to chemical action to extract the active principles called amberine.

EPITOME DE LA SEMANA Una breve relación de acontecimientos en curso en este país y en el extranjero.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Acerca de la Guerra. Los Rusos han reanudado la ofensiva en Courland. Una batalla furiosa está en curso en esa región, según despachos procedentes de Petrograd. Cuatro barcos de los aliados fueron atacados y hundidos por los submarinos alemanes, y veintitrés personas perecieron, siendo heridas cuarenta otras. Según declara un despacho de Berlín las tropas anglo-francesas operando en el sur de Serbia sufrieron una derrota completa. Sus pérdidas fueron enormes. El Conde de Derby, director del servicio de recluta dice: "Si los jóvenes capaces de llevar las armas y que no son indispensables en ningún negocio de importancia nacional u otros negocios conducidos para el bienestar de la comunidad no se presentan de su propia voluntad antes del 30 de noviembre, entonces el gobierno, a partir de dicha fecha, tomará las medidas necesarias para redimir la promesa hecha el 2 de noviembre."

Washington. El visconde Chinda, el embajador japonés, dió una gran recepción en la embajada al honor de la coronación del emperador Yoshihito. El Presidente Wilson encuentra en la escritura tanta un apoyo para su política de defensa nacional, y en una carta a Seth Low, quien escribió al presidente hablando bien del discurso que pronunció en el club Manhattan, refiere a algunos versos del capítulo tercero de Ezequiel. Los oficiales del departamento de correo en Washington dieron un orden en contra de la "Compañía de Seguridades Americanas-Canadenses, una casa de Denver, hace poco encazada por Duncan Bowen, político y una vez exserpante de lectura en la división menor de la legislatura de Colorado.

General. Seis personas fueron matadas y más de ciento fueron heridas, muchas seriamente, en una horrasca que se extendió por la sección de residencias de Great Bend, Kan., a las 7:30 el 10 de corriente. Un mejicano, obrero de sección de ferrocarril, fué matado, siete otros fueron heridos y una propiedad estimada en \$40,000, fué destruida por una horrasca que se declaró en el sud de Wichita, Kans. El decimatercio jurado fué obtenido en Los Angeles el juicio de Matthew A. Schmidt, acusado de asesinato por su alegada cooperación en la destrucción del edificio del Los Angeles Times, el 1° de octubre, 1910. El incendio que cast enteramente destruyó el taller número 4 de máquinas de la Compañía de Bethlehem, Pa., fué apagado en fin, mas no antes de haber causado una pérdida estimada entre \$1,000,000 y \$4,000,000. Dieciséis y veinte personas fueron matadas en Chicago por automóviles del 1° de diciembre, 1914, al 1° de noviembre de este año, según muestran las estadísticas compiladas en la oficina del médico del crimen Hoffman.

Caste. Ciento oficiales de Villa salieron de Douglas, Ariz., para Piedras Negras, habiendo aceptado la amnistía. La huelga de mineros en las minas de Coalición de Rey de Plata, en Park City, Utah, parece haberse terminado con victoria absoluta para la compañía. Las deserciones de Villa continúan al paso de ciento por día, se dice. Seis agentes de Calles fueron ejecutados en las líneas de Villa, se supo en Douglas, Ariz. El senado de Georgia pasó un proyecto de ley prohibiendo la publicidad para los licores, haciendo un caso de delincuencia la falta de obedecer a la ley. Vientos fuertes, lluvia y nieves copiosas se extendieron sobre los estados de Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa y Kansas. Cuatro personas fueron heridas en Hartford, S. D., que fué visitado dos veces por el mismo tornado.

Extranjero. En Kioto, la antigua capital del Japón, Yoshihito fué consagrado emperador. Un nuevo crédito de guerra de proporciones enormes se está considerando en Inglaterra.
