Sojourner Tells of the Opportunities Offered in Great Sunshine State. In a State of Wonder and Beauty

### CLIMATE IS UNEXCELLED FOR THE HEALTH SEEKER

(Continued from last week)

Coal, copper, silver and gold are mined in the commonwealth. The coal deposits underlying the state have been estimated at billions of tons by the geological survey. The copper is of the same grade as that found in Arizona. The silver and gold have not been developed extensively. Given more ready means of transportation, more attention will be given to New Mexico. The state is on the map, but it is not in the railway literature, the government publications, nor the magazines yet.

There are several medicinal springs in the state and one of these days will be noted and popular. They are not as yet in good shape to accommodate visitors. The New Mexico scenery is picturesque and grand, excelling much that is historic and which people travel many miles to see and marvel at. Its small frontier villages comprise an archaeological exposition in themselves without an equal in novelty and antiquity on the continent.

New Mexico has a record of architecture of its own. It is the Pueblo Indian type. No finer modern examples are extant than in the buildings at the state university at Albuquerque. The men's dormitory named "Kwataks," meaning "Man Eagle," and the women's dormitory called "Hokona" signifying "Butterfly Maiden" are especially noteworthy for purity of reproduction. The striking feature are great wall areas, massive appearance, and absence of curves, due to the Indian's total ignorance of the arc principle. The trunks of trees were used by the ancient Pueblos to carry the weight of the wall over a door or a window. Their structures were not provided with doors on the first floor. The university buildings on the other hand have doors on the first floor, but they are hidden in angles, masked behind breast walls. The university grounds are on a hill, with miles of open space surrounding them, a mountain for a background, and a turquoise sky for a dome. The "Sun Dial" is a student's memorial. It is a fine imitation of ideal handwork of an archaic period, save for the legend expressing the sentiment that "I tarry not for the slow, for 'tis the day and great the work"—anything but an Indian's way of looking at life!

I had almost forgotten to state it, but it is true that New Mexico also has an oil field. It is in the Carlsbad district, far south and east, but as yet it is in its infancy. Prospecting is in progress by outside experts and capital from Oklahoma and California. The sharp eye should be there; all that is necessary is to bore deep enough after

having wisely located. Evidently it is there because it has been found, but never in gushing quantities.

The probable excitement of "opening up" a new State may not have entirely passed, although there is not a great deal that is new in these glorious United States—only New Mexico. All the romance and the stirring scenes of making a nation have been enacted and become history and tradition, excepting what may be extracted from a New Mexico boom. And one of these days the railroads will look about for something to boost and New Mexico will be chosen.

New Mexico has an area of 122,490 square miles—a bit of an empire. It has no large cities. Albuquerque is the largest, with a population of 15,000. Next in size and first in wealth is Roswell, an oasis in what once was a desert, a world of noble trees, a myriad of generous grass plots, with good buildings, public and private and handsome homes, flanking-wide, well paved and well lighted streets, always sanitary. Its population is about 8,000. Yet there are five hundred automobiles and owned by residents of Roswell, stockmen, orchardists, gardeners, business and professional men, together with a marked sprinkling of temporary denizens. Roswell is the parallel of itself, to date—one of the most delightful unique, yet charming, resorts, yet unspoiled between the two coasts—Chas. A. Reynolds

## JUDGE MANN KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Tragic Death of Former Jurist Shook to Friends Throughout State. Prominent Member New Mexico Bar

### WAS ONE OF THE LEADING REPUBLICANS OF STATE

Press dispatches in Saturday's daily papers, giving details of the tragic death of Judge Edward A. Mann, of Albuquerque, who was killed in an automobile accident near Gallup, last Friday evening, came as a shock to his friends in Lincoln county. Judge Mann was well known here and during his term on the territorial bench had held court in this county on several occasions. His last visit to this city was a year ago, when he made speeches in behalf of the candidacy of B. C. Hernandez for congress.

Judge Mann, with T. N. Wilkerson, another Albuquerque lawyer, was attending a term of the district court at Gallup. After court adjourned that evening for the day, they made a trip in the automobile of William Blakel, to a nearby camp. C. C. Manning, of Gallup, was another member of the party. On the return trip to Gallup the car skidded in a sandy wash in the road and overturned. Judge Mann was pinned under the car and his neck broken. Other members of the party were painfully, though not seriously injured.

The body was taken to Gallup and from there to Albuquerque, where the funeral took place Monday, the Masons, of which the dead lawyer was an active member, having charge of the obsequies. Business houses of Albuquerque closed during the funeral as a mark of respect to one of the city's most prominent citizens.

Judge Mann was born at Beatrice, Neb., March 12, 1867. He attended Belle Plaine College, in Texas, but did not graduate. He studied law in the office of L. H. Thompson, of Norton, Kan., and was admitted to the bar in Kansas, February 14, 1891. From 1900 to 1902 he was prosecuting attorney of Scott's Bluff, Neb. In 1903 he moved to New Mexico, locating first at Alamogordo, where for a time he was clerk in the United States land office. Later he formed a partnership with H. B. Holt and Judge Bonham. In 1904 he was appointed by President Roosevelt judge of the territorial district court, a position which he filled with distinction until 1909. Since 1910, he had made his home in Albuquerque.

Judge Mann was a member of the lower house of the state legislature and one of the leading Republicans of New Mexico. His death will be a severe loss to his party in next year's campaign, since he was an aggressive campaign speaker and organizer. As a public speaker he ranked with the best. In his profession, that of the law, Judge Mann enjoyed an enviable reputation throughout the state.

## MAX GUEBARA DIES

Max Guebara, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of the county, died in this city Monday morning, at the home of Mrs. L. H. Montoya, after a very brief illness. For the past three or four years he had been engaged in the mercantile business at Ancho, but formerly resided in Carrizozo, and conducted a general store across the track. He leaves to mourn his death a wife, three brothers, one sister and a host of friends. The remains were taken to White Oaks Tuesday morning for interment where the deceased at one time lived. The funeral was attended by a large number of friends and relatives.

## THANKSGIVING LUNCHEON

In response to invitations sent out by the Women's Missionary Society a large number gathered at the home of Mrs. H. S. Campbell this afternoon to partake of the Thanksgiving Luncheon which had been prepared by the members of this organization. In addition to the luncheon, for which a small sum was charged, an excellent program was rendered, and those present report a most enjoyable time. A neat sum was realized from the luncheon.

## COMMISSIONERS MEET

The board of county commissioners held a special meeting here Wednesday for the purpose of revising the tax levies of school districts Nos. 13, 19 and 7. H. B. Harding, tax commissioner of the E. P. & S. W. railroad, was present at the meeting and after it had been shown that the levies in the above districts were legal and that the money was not being extravagantly used, as the company had been informed, the levies were allowed to stand as had been ascertained.

## SCOTT VANCE KILLED

Scott Vance, an E. P. & S. W. railroad conductor was shot and killed in El Paso Wednesday night while eating supper at the Gem cafe according to yesterday's El Paso Herald. Donald Mackey, a carpenter residing in the Pass city is in jail charged with the crime. Mackey's divorced wife and son were said to have been dining with Vance at the time the killing occurred. Mr. Vance had been in the employ of the Southwestern for many years and had worked out of Carrizozo. He has many friends in this city among the railroad men who will regret to learn of his untimely death.

## WHITE OAKS' FUTURE LOOKS BRIGHT

The Discovery of Tungsten in Large Quantities in the Mines at White Oaks Promises Great Future for Town

### TUNGSTEN COMMERCIALLY PURE SELLS FOR \$10 PER LB.

The different mine owners in the famous camp at White Oaks have for the past twenty years been throwing upon the dumps thousands of dollars worth of the precious metal known as tungsten. It is estimated by people who have a right to know that over a half a million dollars worth of this metal has been thrown away, the mine owners little realizing that some day it would be of a high commercial value.

Up to fifteen years ago there was very little demand for it, and little did miners suspect that the crystalline black stuff which seemed to them a nuisance, would some day be classed among the precious metals.

For only about ten years has tungsten been mined in New Mexico, Colorado and California and the total production in 1914 was 1300 tons valued at \$7000,000, according to the best information we are able to secure.

About two months previous to time the Wild Cat properties sold out to a New York syndicate, of which Richard Weightman is at the head, it is estimated that \$75,000 worth of tungsten had been taken out of one mine by one man who held a lease, with two helpers, taking out as much as \$1000 worth a day for a long period of time.

This mineral, commercially pure, sells for about \$10.00 per pound and the ore in the North and South Homestake mines is said to run sixty per cent and is worth \$40.00 a unit of 20 pounds or two dollars a pound, which makes it worth close out to \$4000 a short ton. The demand is larger than the supply and the way things are looking at present, and with the people that are behind the White Oaks project, it is thought that the little mountain town will take on new life and come back to where it was some 20 years ago, although the new management does not plan to start operations on a large scale until some time next spring. But there is one thing sure and it is that White Oaks can boast of one of the most important tungsten camps in the world; as well as being famous for gold producing mines. It is said that latter have been received by the new corporation from England, France and several other foreign countries inquiring about their tungsten supply.

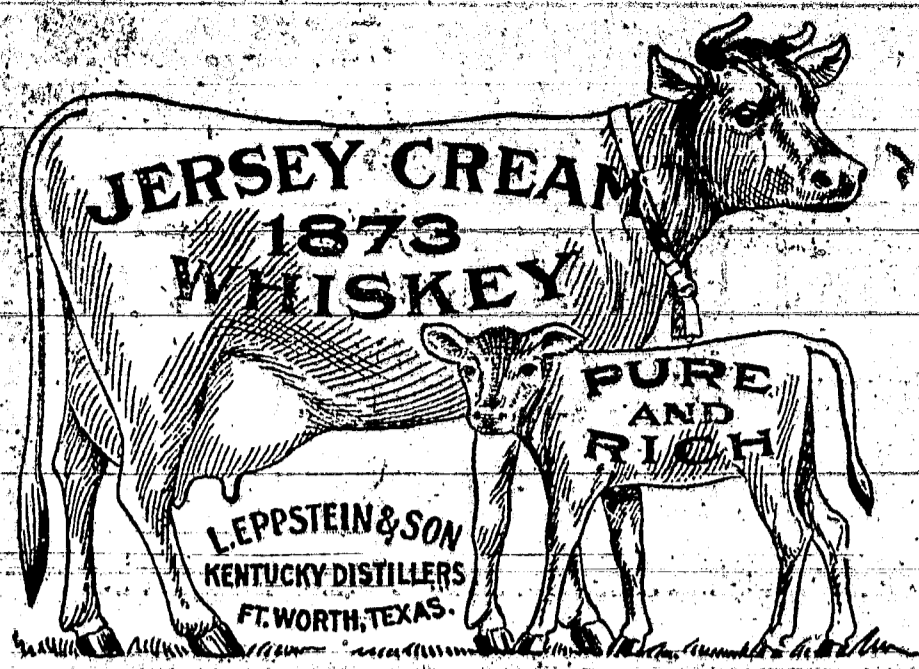

BIBLE STUDY ON

HOPE FOR THE SODOMITES.

Genesis 19:12-17, 23:29—March 9.  
"Come ye out from among them, and be ye  
separate, with the Lord, and touch no un-  
clean thing."—1 Corinthians 6:17.

WHEN Abraham was ninety-  
nine years old—in 2021  
B. C.—his encampment was  
at Hebron. There the Lord  
and two angels appeared to him as  
men. He knew them not, but enter-  
tained them. (Hebrews 13:2.) The  
one called the Lord was doubtless the  
Logos, subsequently man's Redeemer.  
The Lord on this occasion told Abra-  
ham that Ishmael would not be the  
heir of the Promise, but that shortly  
Sarah would have a son. The next  
year Isaac was born.

As Abraham walked a little distance  
with his visitors, he learned who they  
really were, and that the destruction  
of Sodom was im-  
minent. Nobly and  
generously he peti-  
tioned God's Mercy  
on the Sodomites.  
The Lord gave as-  
surance that if  
there were even ten  
righteous in Sodom,  
it would be spared.

Thus of the So-  
domites and the "Sodomites"  
antediluvians God  
made illustrations of the great lesson.  
"All the wicked will He destroy." We  
are to remember that these are not il-  
lustrations of eternal torment, but of  
destruction. These merely passed into  
destruction a few years sooner than  
ordinarily; for the death sentence  
passed upon humanity in Adam. But  
since "Jesus Christ by the grace of  
God tasted death for every man," all  
of Adam's children will eventually  
come from the tomb.

"And Delivered Righteous Lot."

St. Peter informs us that Lot was  
not in sympathy with his surround-  
ings. (2 Peter 2:7, 8.) The flight of  
Lot, with his wife and two unmarried  
daughters, is simply told in our lesson.  
The intimation of verse 20 is that  
God's Mercy toward Lot was because  
of his relationship to Abraham. This  
view is consistent with all Scriptural  
statements on the subject.

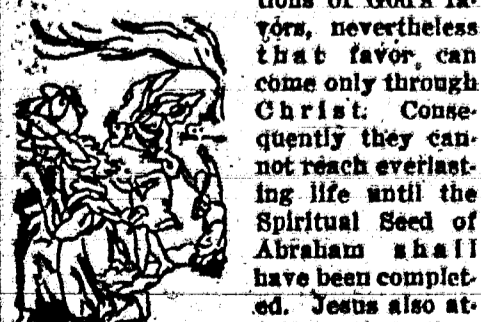
Adam's entire race was condemned  
to death in him. Hence Divine Justice  
owed them nothing. Divine Mercy had  
entered into a special Covenant with  
Abraham, but that Covenant extended  
to none other, except Abraham's seed.  
Therefore Lot's relationship to Abra-  
ham was the only reason why God  
should favor him.

"There's a Witness in God's Mercy."  
This does not signify that God is  
merciless, but that, having provided  
a way by which He will exercise Mer-  
cy, He rarely exercises it outside of  
that channel. The channel of God's  
Mercy is Christ Jesus, who declared:  
"No man cometh unto the Father, but  
by Me." St. Peter substantiates this  
statement. See Acts 4:12. The Scrip-  
tures clearly teach that none were  
saved until Jesus died. This is the  
key which unlocks the wonders of  
God's grace even though to some the  
statement may seem astounding.

We should rid ourselves of the  
thought that the holy men of the past  
went to Heaven, and the remainder of  
mankind to eternal torture. The Bi-  
ble most distinctly declares that all  
both good and bad, "slept with their  
fathers." They still sleep, awaiting  
the time when Abraham's Seed (Gala-  
thians 3:16, 29) will be completed, and  
set up God's Kingdom on earth, over-  
throw sin and death, and deliver the  
captives from the tomb.

The First, or Chief, Resurrection.  
The First Resurrection began with  
our Lord Jesus and is not yet com-  
plete; for all the Elect are to share  
both His sacrificial death and His Re-  
surrection. These will reign with Christ  
a thousand years, and as the Seed of  
Abraham, fully empowered, will bless  
all those redeemed by the precious  
blood of Calvary.—Revelation 20:4.

St. Paul emphasizes this point in He-  
brews 11:38-40, declaring that while  
the Ancient Worthies received indica-  
tions of God's fa-  
vors, nevertheless  
that favor, can  
come only through  
Christ. Conse-  
quently they can-  
not reach everlast-  
ing life until the  
Spiritual Seed of  
Abraham shall  
have been complet-  
ed. Jesus also at-  
tested that they  
had not gone to  
Heaven, saying, "No man hath as-  
cended up to Heaven."—John 3:13.

### TYPHOID FEVER CONTROLLED

Three years ago the field men of  
the Geological Survey, as well as  
some of the office force, took ad-  
vantage of the offer of the War  
Department to official antityphoid  
serum, and practically the entire  
force of men was inoculated. Since  
that time as far as reported, there  
has been no serious case of typhoid  
fever among those inoculated. Two  
cases of typhoid among the topo-  
graphic engineers indicate the great  
effectiveness of this inoculation.  
In both these cases the men simply  
felt "off feed" for a couple or three  
days and refused to go on the sick  
list; in fact typhoid would not have  
been suspected in either case except

that in one of them somebody sug-  
gested the possibility, and an ex-  
haustive hospital examination,  
blood test, etc., showed that the  
engineer had a theoretically well-  
developed case of typhoid, the prac-  
tical results of which, however, fail-  
ed to incapacitate him for duty,  
so that he did not even go to bed  
for one day.

**INTERNATIONAL KNOWLEDGE NEEDED**

(By H. S. Hanner, of White Oaks)

Early reports from Republican centers of activity point towards a veritable shower of "favorite sons" candidates for the presidency, when the time arrives to pick the standard bearer of the party in 1916. There have been brought forward to date, no less than seven probable starters, every one of mediocre quality as judged by record and utterance.

There have on the other hand been mentioned three, Lawrence Y. Sherman, Elihu Root and Chas. Evans Hughes, who possess the calibre that is essential to the leadership of a great national party.

It is barely possible that there is yet another who may be brought forward, capable of standing with Mr. Sherman, Mr. Root and Mr. Hughes.

When the Republican leaders get together to choose the man who shall stand in the van of the march, they will meet face to face the question of sacrificing petty ambitions and choosing a big man, or of elevating selfish hopes, jeopardizing the interests of the party and lowering national ideals by permitting a "favorite son" with little else to recommend him, to attain the honor.

It is hardly necessary to make the observation that in the first case, if political indications run true the possibility of Republican success looms large.

President Wilson has made his mistake, but his course in the main has suggested true patriotism, viewed from every angle—a patriotism tempered with good judgment and restraint which has not permitted the eagle to scream too loudly when such a challenge would have involved us in conflict. His apparent failure to comprehend the necessity for national defense and inability to realize the present weak condition of the defense we have has been palliated by a latter-day conversion to the defensive idea and the pledge to throw administration influence on that side of the scales.

In our past three years, over-full with international affairs, party lines have grown indistinct. It has been borne home to the United States that there are far more important things than those issue politicians usually put forward to contend for, and the casting of ballots in 1916, by intelligent voters, will be governed by the realization that the man they must be cast for, is the one best fitted to be President of a great nation in unsettled times. No small gauge pretender can ride his hobbies to Washington, under such conditions.

The same conditions, will be under due consideration, of all weighty matters concerning senators, congressmen and representatives, so that the clothes to be worn around the various departmental functions of government, legislative, in conjunction with the House of Representatives, executive, in conjunction with the president in handling appointments to office, formation of treaties and judicial as forming the high court of impeachment.

**Lesson to Be Learned.**  
According to the United States census, the population in California cities of over one hundred thousand people has increased, in the decade from 1900 to 1910, from 30 to 37.3 per cent. The population in districts outside of cities of ten thousand and over has decreased from 55.9 per cent, in 1900, to 46.7 per cent, in 1910. Most of this decrease of the percentage of population of agricultural districts has gone to the big cities of over one hundred thousand.

This clearly shows the prevailing tendency. It also shows the grave necessity for building cities that are fit places for the permanent housing of the larger part of the population.

**For Deaf and Dumb in India.**  
Fourteen years ago a school was opened in Palamcottah, South India, for deaf and dumb children, the only missionary effort among the 200,000 deaf of India. About 300 children of every race and creed, from all parts of India, and sent by every missionary society, have passed through the school, and over a hundred are studying there now. The Hindus are beginning to realize the good of educating the deaf, and last year asked government help to enable them to open a school in Madras. Last January a small school was opened in Madras; already it is full with 15 children.—*Missionary Review.*

**Dark Rooms in Brooklyn.**  
The number of dark rooms in Brooklyn, N. Y., has been reduced from 192,573 in 1900 to 8,016 on March 1, 1914. The number of windowless rooms has been reduced from 18,541 in 1900 to 691 on April 1, 1914.

**Best Not to Copy Too Closely.**  
"After the general change of the political situation in the middle ages that took away the city-planning activities from the princes, and either annihilated them or put them in the hands of the citizens, those citizens in very many cases turned out to be very ordinary, short-sighted, and uneducated bourgeois." Therefore, continues Dr. Wergel Hegemann, German expert, it behooves city planners of today not to take too seriously the work of city planners of yesterday. Beauty is all very well, but there are other things to be considered.

**American Surgeons in the War.**  
The satisfactory work done at American hospitals in two German cities has induced the German government to ask for more American surgeons of whose skill their German fellow surgeons "speak in terms of the highest appreciation." That is praise from a high source, and it is matched by the recognition given the work of American surgeons in French hospitals.

**Refugees Prove Relatives.**  
Belgian refugees, a boy and girl, were adopted by a man and his wife of Abercynon, Wales. The children now prove to be those of the wife's dead sister, who went to Belgium at a governess some years ago. A locket which was found on the little girl led to the discovery.

The women's clubs of Birmingham, Ala., have been the means of forming junior civic leagues in every school grade in the busy city.

The women, feeling that the children were growing up without knowledge of city needs, decided to educate for good citizenship.

First, they cleaned up the school yards, then the parks and the streets.

Today every young citizen who joins a league in his or her school grade signs this pledge:

"I will not injure any tree, shrub or lawn.

"I promise not to spit upon the floor in a street car, schoolhouse or any public building, or upon the sidewalk.

"I pledge myself not to deface any fence or public building.

"I will not scatter paper or throw rubbish in public places.

"I will not use profane language at any time.

"I will always protect birds.

"I will protect the property of others as I would my own.

"I will promise to be a true and loyal citizen."

In looking over an old work of Peter Henderson, written about forty years ago, we find this beautiful "slam" on New York city: "In New York and its suburbs the taste is much lower than it is in either Boston or Philadelphia. In those places, no doubt their excellent horticultural societies have done much to refine the tastes of the people, and it is to be regretted that neither New York nor its adjacent cities, with probably over two million people, have a single horticultural or floricultural society." At the present day, this distinction is none the less clear, and where these societies best nourish the highest appreciation of plant life is shown. There are better gardens, better gardeners, more varied plant life and more rare and costly plants in Pasadena than in any other city on the Pacific coast; also less crime and a higher standard of citizenship.—*Los Angeles Times.*

El gobierno de los Estados Unidos está preparando un censo de fabricantes de Colorado.

Se va a establecer en Longmont una fábrica para la manufactura de cajas de conservas.

La casa del Doctor Fred G. Hunt en Arvada, estimada en \$7,000, fué destruida por un incendio.

El Coronel John C. Moore, primer alcalde de Denver, falleció en su casa en Excelsior Springs, Mo.

Desde la fecha que fué vigente la nueva ley de compensación alrededor de 3,300 accidentes han sido reportados.

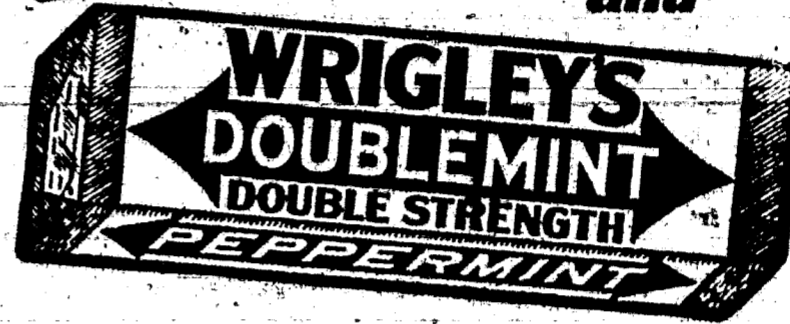

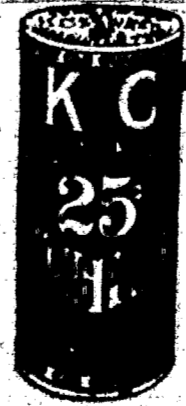
