CLOSING EXERCISES CARRIZOZO SCHOOLS

Graduating Exercises Last Friday Evening Marked the Close of Successful School Year

CLASS OF FIVE GRADUATES RECEIVED DIPLOMAS

The school term 1914-15 closed Friday, May 21, with the graduating exercises at eight o'clock in the evening at the High School auditorium. The class of five graduates received diplomas certifying the successful completion of the four-year course and entitling them to entrance into the University of New Mexico in lieu of the work done in the local institution.

The principal speaker of the evening was Gov. Wm. C. McDonald. The chief executive delivered a most inspiring and encouraging discourse to the gratification of the record breaking audience of patrons and friends of the school. The Governor, in a most delightfully informal manner, spoke from a long and eventful life's experience of the wonderful and inspiring spirit of the great west, of pioneer days when Carrizozo was still a thing of the future, and of the strong ties which bind him to this matchless region and to his Carrizozo home in particular.

The most genuine gratification was expressed at the marvellous growth of the public school system in our midst. That it has been commensurate with the growth of Carrizozo and its varied other interests is an indisputable fact, and the Governor expressed his especial satisfaction in being chairman of the local board of education at a time when his signature closed the contract for the present school building. That this building is now overtaxed to accommodate the rapid growth of the student body seemed to presage to the speaker a future for Carrizozo educationally which time only will make the pride of the county.

Some sterling counsel was addressed to the five young people to whom life's responsibilities were about to unfold, but they were of a general nature such as to make an impression upon anyone who would be of service and a blessing to the present age. Opportunity was taken to exchange the congratulations of "a good Scotchman" with Supt. McCurdy, his loyal endeavor to put Carrizozo on the educational map of the state in capital letters commended, his success lauded, and the present administration in general made to feel that their efforts have borne richly in fruitage. In short, it was a speech of general good will and will mean much in the way of inspiration and encouragement for the undertaking and faithful execution of plans already formulated for the enhancement and steady improvement of the good foundation laid. The Governor presented with a genuine delight the diplomas to the two young men and three young ladies who have been the objects of his observation at inter-

vals throughout their school career.

Many out-of-town visitors were present at these exercises, as well as at all the exercises of this commencement season. At no time was the large auditorium able to accommodate the crowds, but the general good spirit of hope and good cheer which was at all times manifest, smoothed improvised seats and rested tired feet for the business men who had to continue the day's standing well into the evening, in order to enjoy the programs of the various occasions.

Following the address by Gov. McDonald, Supt. McCurdy made public a few pertinent facts relative to the workings of the school and the faithfulness of certain ones in the student body. A number of cases of perfect attendance, meaning neither absence or tardiness, during the entire nine months, was noted and commended by the superintendent. Mr. McCurdy also delivered to the undergraduates, certificates of entrance to the next class in high school. Some of these pupils had made more than four credits of the sixteen required for graduation, and, in no case had anyone fallen short of the requisite attainment for promotion. Announcement was made of a prize to be given by Mrs. E. V. Jewett, principal of the high school, to the room which next year grow the best lot of pot plants by the commencement season. The accomplishments of Miss Humphrey's room along this line was most strikingly shown by the beautiful array of potted geraniums which lined the edge of the stage.

The stage decorations showed much good taste and persistent endeavor as it presented a most inviting appearance to the large audience of Thursday and Friday evenings. Pennants of every description formed a most attractive border and streamers of green and white crepe paper formed a veritable canopy for the occupants of the platform. Banks of evergreen and mammoth ferns and geraniums from the choicest collections of the community gave an air of beauty which seldom if ever rivalled.

The Outlook predicts for the Carrizozo educational system a year of phenomenal development along every line. We understand that arrangements are already being made for bids for the erection of a modern high school building, work to begin immediately. Every patron is a booster, and, with this happy state of affairs and a loyal and thoroughly progressive management, who can place any limit upon the possibilities which earnest co-operation has ever produced?

CEASE PROMISCUOUS DUMPING

At various and sundry places in the environs of the town where property owners have been menaced by the dumping of tin cans, bottles and miscellaneous refuse, conspicuous, far reaching signs have been posted, warning trash-haulers against further misdemeanors of this kind. Carrizozo is determined to be a decent town and also to appear so to the outsider when under his careful scrutiny, and every citizen should support, both with proper sentiment and consistent action, this worthy enterprise of civic attractiveness.

CRUDITIES OF THE INCOME TAX LAW

Several Amendments Will be Recommended to the Next Congress due to Imperfections in the Income Tax Law

COURTS MUST CORRECT ADMINISTRATION'S MISTAKES

Because of imperfections in the income tax law, numerous amendments will be recommended to the next Congress by the Treasury Department.

Official experts are quietly at work on this statute, preparing a report on the crudities it contains and outlining proper legislative action to correct them. The law is honeycombed with errors.

A striking illustration of this thread of weakness that runs through the whole gamut of Democratic legislation occurs in one of the most vital provisions of the income tax law. It relates to deductions that shall be allowed in computing gross income, a basic element in this system of taxation.

Paragraph B of the law states "in computing income for the purpose of the normal tax there shall be allowed as deductions" among other things "losses actually sustained during the year incurred in trade" etc. What is the meaning of the words "in trade?" The courts must decide.

The phrase is capable of an infinite variety of interpretations. As construed by the Treasury Department, deductions from gross income for losses "in trade" can be made only in connection with "that which occupies and engages the time, attention and labor of anyone for the purpose of livelihood, profit or improvement; that which is his personal concern or interest, employment, occupation, but it is not necessary that it should be his sole occupation or employment."

For instance, it is said that if a grocer has invested in real estate, in making his income tax return any real estate profit must be added to gross income; but losses from real estate investment must be deducted from gross income.

From every part of the country bitter complaints have been made against this ruling, and the question is to be taken to the courts for final adjudication. Whether the ruling is right or wrong, it is the uncertainty of the statute that reflects upon the intelligence of the political party responsible for it.

Nothing but heedlessness could have permitted it. The tax payer bears the burden of the blunder, it is a maxim in governmental affairs that every doubt in a law is resolved in favor of the government administrative officers. Errors in the income tax law are too numerous to mention in detail. Witness the fact that in the first few weeks of its operation thousands of applications for refunds were made. One of these has just been allowed, and is a fine example of the law's uncertainty.

The department refunded to one man who had paid \$500 as income tax all but \$12 of that amount. He had had the help of a revenue officer in making his return, yet so indefinite was the law that for fear of violation he paid the government \$500 instead of \$12.

Examination of the Department decision on the income tax law shows a mass of contradictory rulings. Over and over again opinions were reversed, because the terms of the law did not admit of clear interpretation.

Every day additional evidence is found that adds to the long list of legislative blunders committed by

the Democratic administration. Future Congresses and the courts must correct the mistakes, and meanwhile the people must pay for them.

CAPITAN SCHOOLS NEARING CLOSE

The Capitan High School Will Close a Very Successful Nine Months' Term on Friday Evening, June 4

PROGRAM WILL BE GIVEN WEDNESDAY EVE., JUNE 2

The Lincoln County High School at Capitan will close Friday, June 4, 1915, one week later than announced in last week's paper. By continuing the session until that date a full nine months' term of 180 actual teaching days will have been completed, thus complying with the recommendation of the state department of education.

There are no graduates this year and consequently no regular commencement exercises will be held, but a closing program will be given on the evening of Wednesday, June 2, this date having been chosen with the idea that an entertainment of the kind contemplated should become an annual feature of the closing week and should be given at a time which will not interfere with future graduation exercises usually held on the evening of the last day of school.

An interesting program consisting of music, both instrumental and vocal, impersonations and readings and the play, "The White Shawl" is being prepared. Rehearsals for the play and other numbers of the program have been going on for some time and judging from the enthusiasm shown by all members of the cast and others on the program and by their painstaking efforts to make thorough preparation this entertainment bids fair to be the best of the several given during the two years the county High School has been in existence.

The program is as follows: Piano Solo, Selected, Miss Irvin. The White Shawl, Act I. Reading, Selected, Mrs. Price. The White Shawl, Act II. Piano Duet, Miss Irvin and Mrs. Price. Good Night Song, The High School.

After the program the audience is invited to visit the Domestic Science room to see some of the work done by the sewing and manual training classes during the year, and to be served with light refreshments by the cooking class.

RETURNS WITH PRISONER

John B. Baird has returned from Estancia where he went to bring from the custody of the Torrance county jail, one Alejandro Martinez who is wanted in Lincoln County to answer to a charge of theft of cattle. Jesus Flores, his accomplice, has been for some time confined in the local county jail and both were arraigned at the same time before Justice Ed. Mussie. It is alleged that Martinez and Flores stole twenty head of cattle from Jess Jenkins and Hol Herring of Corona, driving the animals to Alamogordo, and disposing of them at this place. The stolen property was only a short time ago restored to the rightful owners. Pleading guilty to the allegations the accused were in default of \$1000 bond, remanded to the jail to await the action of the grand jury. Since Martinez imprisonment, steps have been taken by his relatives and friends to furnish bond for his release.

NOTICIAS DE LA ULTIMA SEMANA

Los Alemanes anuncian la captura de trincheras francesas sobre una extensión de casi un cuarto de milla en la vecindad de Berry-au-Bac.

La declaración oficial de Berlín concede que los aliados han ganado terreno entre Carency y Neuville pero dicen que los ataques en otras partes han sido repulsados.

La oficina de la guerra en París declara que los aliados hicieron muchos adelantos en Bélgica, cerca de Arras, Francia, y también en muchos otros puntos, y que los ataques alemanes fueron repelidos.

En Kinsale, Irlanda, el jurado de médico del crimen que investigó las circunstancias de tantas muertes a bordo del Lusitania presentó el veredicto que sigue: "El jurado juzga que ese crimen horrendo fué contrario a la ley internacional y a las convenciones de todas las naciones civilizadas, y por esta razón nosotros acusamos a los oficiales del submarino que causó la destrucción y al Imperador alemán y el gobierno de Alemania, bajo cuyas órdenes ellos actuaron, del crimen premeditado de asesinato."

Sport.

Gunboat Smith tuvo lo mejor de Dick Gilbert en su partida de doce vueltas que abrió el Club Nacional Atlético en Denver.

Una bolsa de \$2,000 para el "derby" que se celebrará el 20 de mayo en el parque de Overland en Denver durante el mes de la primavera. Unánime que ha atraído a Denver un enorme grupo de potros de tres años que jamás haya visto el parque.

Dos marcas hasta hoy sin rival fueron superadas en Albuquerque en la partida entre la Universidad de Nuevo Mexico y el Colegio de Agricultura de Las Cruces. Kirby de Las Cruces hizo el salto de 20 pies y 5/8 pulgadas; y Ray McGanna de Albuquerque hizo 16:15 en el cuarto de milla. Los Agates se ganaron la partida en 59 contra 49.

La ventaja de proeza del mundo en el escaler de murallas fué superada en Cheyenne cuando la escuadra N° 3, de Casper, Wyo., venció las escuadras de escuelas superiores de Cheyenne, Rawlins y Laramie operando en murallas de ordenanza militar, con cáñones del ejército, en 6:15 segundos. La escuadra victoriosa de Casper dos veces escaló la pared en 6:15 y una vez en 6:25, mientras que la escuadra segunda, Cheyenne N° 3, escaló en 6:25.

Washington.

El Secretario Daniels designó al Rev. Julius W. Atwood, obispo episcopal de Arizona, para ofrecer la invocación en la puerta al agua del acorazado "dreadnaught" Arizona en los talleres navales de Nueva York, el 19 junio.

Cincuenta hombres fueron matados en una batalla entre los partidarios de los Generales Antonio Barona y Juan Banderas, jefes Zapatistas, en la ciudad de México, según una declaración de la agencia de Carranza en Washington.

Alemania, por medio del embajador Gerard, notificó los Estados Unidos que los comandantes de submarinos habían recibido instrucciones especiales al efecto de no molestar los buques neutrales no empesados en actos hostiles, y que Alemania pagaría los daños causados a esos buques en la zona de guerra.

Las tropas de Carranza han recibido el apoyo de la región de los pozos de aceite de petróleo cerca de Tampico, según dicen las noticias recibidas de México al departamento de estado. La fuerza de Villa, que capturó la ciudad hace diez días, evacuó el 5 mayo, y la de Carranza entró. Para la batalla continuó en Ahuac, cerca de treinta millas de Tampico.

General.

En Atlanta, Ga., Leo M. Frank fué sentenciado de nuevo a colgar el martes, 22 junio, por el asesinato de Mary Phagan.

La aseguradora sobre el Lusitania se dijo en Nueva York, se elevaba \$7,500,000. El vapor estaba asegurado por \$10,000,000. El valor de su cargamento fué \$750,000.

El Rev. James Matthews Darwell, obispo de Massachusetts, fué nombrado juez de tribunal federal en Milwaukee bajo la ley de Wilson relativa a la organización de los jueces. La sesión de la corte fué abierta a Rich Super de Wisconsin y Wisconsin para fines judiciales.

Oeste. El congreso Sociológico del Sud en Houston, Tex., adoptó unas resoluciones endorsing la posición del Presidente Wilson "en la presente situación crítica," expresando confianza en él. Se anunció en Springfield, Ill., el casamiento en Peking, Ill., de William Homer Leavitt, antiguamente el hijo político de William Jennings Bryan, con la Señorita Clara Killius de Springfield.

Laurence Scanlan, obispo de la diócesis de Salt Lake City de la Iglesia Católica Romana y uno de los primeros misionarios del oeste, falleció en Salt Lake City después de una gran enfermedad.

Colorado.

La Señora Anna Mellicker, de 74, fué quemada a muerte en su casa en Pueblo.

La mina de Buffalo Head cerca de Pitkin promete volverse una de gran producción.

La compañía de teléfonos ha disminuido las tarifas a los abonados de Fort Morgan.

Un incendio demedio noche de origen desconocido destruyó un almacén de mercaderías del valor de \$14,000 en Cedaredge.

P. D. Zimmers, uno de los primeros colonos de Denver y contratista en general, falleció en Fairplay de neumonía.

George W. Alexander, de cincuenta y ocho, anteriormente mercader en maderas en Denver, murió en el hospital de condado de parálisis.

En Gunnison se halla expuesto una enorme roca de mineral de oro descubierta cerca de Spencer, sobre el camino de automóvil de Powderhorn y Cobolla.

Cuando se reciba la campana de la libertad en Denver en los primeros días de julio, se hará un esfuerzo para que a cada muchacho de escuela le sea posible leerla.

La Asamblea de Oficios y Trabajo de Denver telegrafió al Presidente Wilson una copia de las resoluciones adoptadas que dicen que el trabajo no quiere la guerra ni con Alemania ni con ningún otro país.

La Señora Harry Bellamy, que era la Señorita Frederica LeFevre y miembro de la sociedad selecta de Denver, es la madre de una hija de nueve libras vendida al mundo bajo el método de "twilight sleep."

RULE OF WAR MUST BE OBEYED

KAISER TOLD NOTHING WILL BE LEFT UNDONE TO OBTAIN U. S. RIGHTS.

GUARANTEE DEMANDED

POSITION SO EMPHATICALLY STATED THAT IT IS PRACTICALLY ULTIMATUM.

Washington. — President Wilson's note to Germany informs the Kaiser's government that the United States will leave nothing undone to obtain compliance with its request that Germany adhere to the international rules of warfare when attacking merchant ships on the high seas. The note is regarded here as the strongest representation that the United States possibly could make with reference to the sinking of the Lusitania and the Gulfight and other offenses affecting America.

It so thoroughly covers the aspects of the controversy and so emphatically states the position of the United States and its intention to insist upon its demands that the note is considered little short of an ultimatum.

One, and only one, loophole is left to Germany, by which she may back down from her policy of attacking vessels without warning.

The note suggests that it is possible that the commanders of German submarines have acted without instructions and that instructions to them in accordance with the American note will end the practices complained of.

Summary of Wilson Note. The principal points in President Wilson's note to the German government substantially are as follows:

One—The United States government calls attention to the various incidents in the war zone proclaimed by Germany around the British Isles, the sinking of the British liner Falaba, with the loss of Leon C. Thresher, an American; the attack by German airmen on the American steamer Cushing, the torpedoing without warning of the American steamer Gulfight, flying the Stars and Stripes, and finally, the torpedoing without warning of the Lusitania with its loss of more than a thousand lives of non-combatants, among them more than 100 Americans.

Two—These acts are declared to be indefensible under international law. The United States points out that it never admitted Germany's right to do them, and warned the imperial government that it would be held to a "strict accountability" for attacks on American vessels or lives. A strict accounting, therefore, is now asked from Germany.

Three—The usual financial reparation will be sought, although Germany is in effect reminded that no reparation can restore the lives of those sacrificed in the sinking of the Lusitania and other ships.

Four—Expressions of regret may comply with the legal precedents, but they are valueless unless accompanied by a cessation of the practices endangering lives of non-combatants.

Five—The right of neutrals to travel on the high seas on neutral or belligerent merchantmen is asserted.

Six—In the name of humanity and international law, the United States demands a guarantee that these rights will be respected, and that there be no repetition of the attacks on merchantmen carrying non-combatants.

Seven—The giving of warning to the American public without officially communicating them to the United States government is commented on in connection with the German embassy's printed advertisement before the sailing of the Lusitania, but irrespective of the failure to advise the American government of Germany's purpose, the point is made that notice of an intention to do an unlawful act neither justified nor legalized it.

Eight—The suggestion is conveyed that the German government, of course, could not have intended to destroy innocent lives, and that consequently the German submarine commanders must have misunderstood their instructions. The American government indicates its hope that this will be found to be true, and a cessation of the unlawful practices thereby.

Nine—In conclusion, Germany's attention is called to the earnestness of the government and people of the United States in this situation. It is made plain that the United States will leave nothing undone, either in diplomatic representations or other action, to obtain a compliance by Germany to the request made.

"Certainly, madam."


"Ah! That will do. And now, young man, you wish to have my decision?"

THE POSITION OF BURSUM

Following is the telegram sent by H. O. Bursum to the governor in response to the notice of his appointment to the position as a member of the taxation commission a few weeks since.

Hon. W. C. McDonald,
Governor of New Mexico,
Santa Fe, New Mexico.

My Dear Governor:

Your telegram tendering me the appointment as one of the Tax Commissioners was received by me today, upon my return from the ranch. I greatly appreciate the distinguished honor you thereby confer, but regret that under the circumstances I cannot accept. The Tax Law passed by the last legislature will, if properly administered, greatly promote equality among the Tax Payers, and lower the rate of Taxation. If I were permitted to name the majority of the members of the Tax Commission, I might consider the proposition of serving on the Commission for the purpose of demonstrating that the law is workable.

The newspapers of the state made a great ado over the fact that the notice of the appointment was not answered sooner and they placed upon the distinguished citizen of our state the stigma of discourtesy and charged him with cowardice and unmanliness but this is nothing new for Bursum as it is the habit of the opposition.

Aside from the fact that Bursum cannot afford to neglect his business as was the case with Herbert Clark, there is the insuperable objection which he has set forth and which is recognized by all those who look at the question in an impartial way, that it would be a hopeless task to work with those who would not be with him in the endeavor to make the working of the bill a success.

That there would be no politics in this measure if the author of it were on the commission is not for a moment believed by those who know anything of the political condition in New Mexico.

It would be politics to the limit and the end in view would be to put Bursum to the bad.

The success of the measure would have about as much show as the proverbial snow ball in the heated territory beyond the fabled Styx.

The difficulty in finding a person to serve on this commission is not as intricate as it might appear from the remarks of those who are not particular about its success, anyway.

From the passage of the bill to the present time there have been those who have continuously and

determinedly declared that it would not be a success and have done what they could to put stones in the roadway.

It is not likely that the appointing power will listen to a suggestion from a Republican or a Republican paper, but we would nevertheless take the liberty of presenting a name for consideration.

It is a man who has made a study of the tax question from a practical standpoint as a purely business man who has seen the situation from a business view.

The man is Leo Hersch of this city.

Mr Hersch is one of the largest tax payers in Santa Fe and is known everywhere for his honesty in all dealings and as a man who has made success of his own business which is one of the strongest reasons for regarding him as one fit to do business for the state.

There is a further advantage to be considered in this connection and that is that a man from this city can more easily attend the meetings of the board than one from the outside, without the inconvenience that might be felt by those who are forced to leave their business and come a distance to attend.

The nomination of Leo Hersch would give universal satisfaction—Santa Fe State Record.

CLEARED OF MURDER CHARGE

After an all night session, the jury in the case of the state against W. T. Henley, charged with the murder of Joseph L. Gee in the Palace saloon on October 22 of last year, brought in a verdict of acquittal at an early hour Tuesday morning.

The testimony showed that Gee and a companion named Miner had spent some time drinking in the Palace saloon on the night of the killing and that they had trouble with several other men who were in the saloon at that time. Henley had ordered them to leave, but this they refused to do, Gee going to the rear of the saloon and returning with a number of empty beer bottles which he threatened to throw at Henley. Henley then took a revolver from the desk in the office of the saloon and followed Gee to the back door where the two men engaged in a struggle, during the course of which Henley fired the shot that killed Gee.

Several character witnesses were placed on the stand to show that Henley had always borne a good character, both here and in Lincoln county, where he formerly resided.

In his opening remarks to the jury District Attorney James R. Waddill bitterly condemned the liquor business; which, he claimed, was the direct cause of so many tragedies of this nature.

Attorney R. F. Hamilton, for the defense, addressed the jury at considerable length, showing that Henley had acted in self defense after Gee had threatened to assault him with the beer bottles and also asserting that the state had failed to adduce testimony that would justify a verdict of first degree murder.

H. G. Bush assisted attorney Hamilton in conducting the defense.

All through the trial Mrs. Henley and her daughter, Jewell, were seated close to Henley and his counsel, Mrs. Henley especially showing signs of the strain under which she was laboring.—Deming Headlight.





HUNDREDS DEAD IN LISBON REVOLT

TRANSYLVANIA DODGES SUBMARINES AND LANDS 1,000 PASSENGERS IN SCOTLAND.

KAISER MAY ARBITRATE

GERMANY TO STOP SUBMARINE WAR PENDING NEGOTIATIONS WITH U. S., IS REPORT.

Western Newspaper Union News Service.

Madrid, May 17.—The latest news received here from Portugal is to the effect that a general of the insurrectionary party, commanding 3,000 troops, is now outside Lisbon, preparing to storm the city. A dispatch dated Saturday morning says the revolt spread to Santarem, forty-four miles northeast of Lisbon, and that the rebels triumphed. Seventeen soldiers and seventy civilians were killed and over 200 persons were wounded. The total killed and wounded undoubtedly is in the hundreds.

No further information as to the reported assassination of Dr. Affonso Costa, former premier, have been received.

London.—Official announcement was made in Rome that King Victor Emmanuel had declined to accept the resignation of Premier Salandra. The Salandra cabinet is to be retained without change.

Although it was made known unofficially that Signor Salandra would remain at the head of the government, this announcement was received with great demonstrations of rejoicing and manifestations in favor of war.

The excitement at Milan subsided on receipt of the news of Premier Salandra's retention. The general strike there passed without serious incident, although there was a demonstration in favor of war on the part of the crowd, estimated at 14,000. Similar demonstrations occurred at Florence, Naples, Messina, Bologna, Palermo and Catania.

The Austro-Hungarian embassy has warned all subjects of the dual monarchy residing in Italy to hold themselves in readiness to flee from that country immediately upon the receipt of instructions to that effect.

New York.—The Anchor line steamer Transylvania passed safely through the war zone about the British Isles and arrived at Greenock, Scotland, Monday morning. It was announced by officials of the Cunard line, to which the Transylvania was under charter. The Transylvania sailed from New York May 7, a few hours after the news was received of the sinking of the Lusitania. She carried nearly 1,000 passengers, including many Americans.

Ramsgate, England.—An air raid occurred here early Monday morning. About forty bombs were dropped. So far as has been ascertained three persons were injured.

London.—Ambassador Gerard has presented the note to the German foreign minister at Berlin, and while a reply is not expected for several days, it is reported from Washington that there is confidence among high officials there that passenger vessels will not be subjected to submarine attacks in the interim. It is reported from Berlin that the Kaiser is willing to submit the questions of submarine warfare raised by President Wilson's note to arbitration.

'INDIANS ATTACK-AMERICANS.'

Several Thousand Yaquis Holding Inland Towns of Sonora.

Los Angeles, Calif.—Fifty American men are surrounded near Esperanza, Sonora, by overwhelming numbers of Yaqui Indians, according to a dispatch received here by Charles F. O'Brien, owner of one of the large ranches in the Yaqui valley.

According to reliable information, the force under General Sosa, a Villa commander, sent to aid the Americans, is composed mostly of Yaquis, and cannot be expected to fight their brothers besieging the Americans.

Jose Maytorena, governor of Sonora, is said to have gained the support of the Yaquis in his fight against the Carranza faction by promising them the lands originally belonging to the Yaquis and now held by foreigners. The unrest of the Indians began when they came to believe the Mexican leaders would not and could not redress their wrongs.

Z. O. Stocker, one of the men reported injured, telegraphed his wife here that he was well. William Stocker is wounded.
